Acquisition of Fairmont Foods Co. By Minneapolis Firm Announced

The acquisition of the Fairmont Foods Company's dairy processing facilities in Green Bay and Kewaskum by Marigold Foods, Inc. of Minneapolis was announced by Marigold Chairman and CEO David C. Ramsay.

No changes in basic plant operations, procedures, or sources of supply are contemplated. Marigold has however, introduced its Kemps Quality Chekd label throughout the marketing area served by the two facilities, according to William B. "Bill" Ramsay, President.

George A. Sanda, Marigold Executive Vice President, has been assigned overall responsibilities for both production and marketing. A past president

and director of the Wisconsin Dairy Foods Association, Sanda has also been a member of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Advisory Council. Sanda, who resided in Green Bay from 1964 to 1970, had previously served as Fairmont's Regional Manager from 1964 to

Larry Gergens, also formerly with Fairmont, and now a Marigold Vice President, will continue as General Manager of the two plants, reporting directly to Sanda.

Marigold Foods has been a prominent factor in the dairy industry in western Wisconsin for more than 60 years. The present organization includes the outgrowth of the old Tri-State Dairy of LaCrosse,

Reedsburg, and Eau Claire, which had marketed its products under the Dolly Madison label before converting to Kemps Quality Chekd in 1978.

Marigold's home office is in Minneapolis, and, along with Green Bay and Kewaskum, has processing facilities in Minneapolis and in Rochester, Minnesota. Kemps Quality Chekd milk, ice cream and dairy products are marketed in the seven state region of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri. Illinois, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Fire Destroys Garage and Contents at Klesmith Home

Fire late Monday afternoon destroyed a garage and damaged a utility room at the Robert Klesmith rural home at 4600 Ridge Road southwest of Kewaskum. Also lost in the blaze were tools and equipment, a washer, dryer and freezer.

School Energy Study Issue Rises, Only to Die Again

At Monday evening's meeting, the issue of having Bray & Associates do an energy study for the Kewaskum School District was again brought up by School Board President John Tessar.

At last month's meeting, a motion to contract with Bray to conduct the survey died for lack of a second.

School Superintendent Floyd Brenholt again expressed his support for this study, stating "it may seem like an expenditure now, but it will be a saving in the long run.'

It was brought up that the school district could go ahead on its own and implement many of the energy saving steps without spending money on an energy survey. Travis Canfield, of Wisconsin Energy Management, another energy study firm, stated "my guess is this school district has done all the easy things such as caulking, insulating, etc." He felt, how-

After further discussion, a motion to go ahead with the study was made by board member Gerald Secor, seconded by Jean Goeden, however, it was defeated in a 5-2 vote against the study.

Tessar noted he didn't know the Committee on Staffing was also expected to make recommendations regarding these activities. Brenholt noted adjustments or dropping of activities could affect staffing since contracts, to be issued in March, would have to be revised showing any changes. Board member Dr. Charles Ogi commented, how come recommendations cutting down the seven activities were not made, instead your administration suggested adding two, softball for girls and tennis for boys. Why not a recommendation to cut out one or two? High School Principal Clark Pearson said, "he personally did not care to see any activities cut. I could live with more programs for the kids. I feel the activities are beneficial to the kids and keep them interested in school.

Brenholt stated "we made a number of recommendations, the first one was the addition of

was that the board, between now and next year, should study ways that they want to determine what sports should be offered at the high school and really, we were also saying at the same time that if the board wants to cut, if you are going to limit to a certain number of activities, then we felt those activities ought to be the ones that the kids want. Some sports are traditional, but not what the boys and girls want." Tessar informed Brenholt the Committee will make their recommendations on February 23.

The board also voted to increase, by 20c, the price of meals in the reduced price lunch program due to Federal Government cutbacks in reimbursements. Borch noted the smaller increase (approximately 4c) in the regular meal program could be absorbed this year due

to a \$5,000 surplus left from last year's lunch fund.

Borch also told the board the state is considering dropping all reimbursement for Drivers Education programs, raising the possibility of increased fees to students taking the course.

President Tessar, noting the large group of people attending the meeting, commented that it was probably due to the newspaper articles which mentioned the possible closing of Beechwood School.

Tessar stated "there will be no disscussion on this matter tonight. This board has not made any recommendations." He told parents the Committee on Staffing will meet Thursday evening, February 12, at which time recommendations for budget reduction will be discussed. Tessar invited all interested parties to attend this open meeting.

Blood Bank Reminder

Area residents are reminded that the Milwaukee Blood Mobile unit will be at the Kewaskum High School gym (old) on Tuesday, February 17, between the hours of 1:30 to 6:30 p.m. Donors who have been coming in on a regular basis will receive postcards. New donors are encouraged to walk in anytime.

There are no rules or restrictions on who can receive blood. As long as enough people donate, patients will receive all the blood they need.

If you are in good physical condition you can donate every 10 weeks. You may donate at age 17 if a parent or guardian signs a consent form which will be available at the school. Recording your confidential medical history, taking your blood pressure and testing a single drop of blood takes about 15 minutes. The actual drawing of the blood from your arm takes only 4 to 10 minutes. In 1980, 62,481 volunteer donors provided 99,700 pints of blood collected in the region. These donors measured that momentary prick in their arm against the restored health of the patients who needed their

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Tax Incremental Funding [TIF] Picture Clarified Here

At Thursday's joint meeting of the Plan Commission and Kewaskum Village Board, many questions regarding Tax Incremental Funding, which had been plaguing members, were clarified.

Dan Thompson, of Action Associates-Madison, stood before the group for more than one and a half hours explaining the program and answering questions. Thompson gave the meeting a short rundown on his background and credentials in the field of Tax Incremental Funding, followed by a history into the reasons for and eventual development of the TIF program.

Thompson's experience with TIF started when he was employed by the Department of State and Local Affairs. His assignments was to aid the 12 to 18 communities who were the first to use the TIF program for projects in their areas. Thompson left state employment when he felt that more time was needed to properly develop programs. Through his early experiences, with the TIF program, Thompson was able to help make amendments that have brought TIF to its present status. One of these amendments regards state aids to school districts. Many communities were against the orignial TIF because their school districts lost tax dollars which were raised within the TIF district. The present program now allows the state to reimburse districts thereby eliminating the previous loss of funds. TIF postpones Tax Base Equalization until a district has been completed. Relating this fact to Kewaskum, Thompson said the approximate \$1.8 million of construction now under way would mean a substantial increase in the village's total equalization, resulting in a large loss of state aids. TIF would delay this increase for the life of the district and the village would get to keep 100% of the environmental value.

Thompson was asked what kind of time period would be involved. Once a TIF district is in effect, community project expenditures must be spent within five years, and the

district itself terminates 15 years after completion of the last project. In essence, a TIF district can last between 20 and 30 years. Commission member Charles Miller asked for a ballpark figure of "what it would cost to get into this thing." Thompson stated consulting fees for the full cost, through adoption of the plan, could run from \$10,000 to \$40,000. Thompson noted an Optional Use Report would cost considerably less and takes about four months to prepare. A recent report done for Stoughton cost \$6,000, and included four different plans from which a selection was made.

Thompson noted "you don't need an out-of-town gun to create a legal TIF District, however, considerable time and money could be lost if a community decided to do it on its own, whereas a consulting firm would know the proper and quickest routes to go.

Commission member Bob Kirst asked if Kewaskum's proposed project list would be eligible. Thompson felt all the items would qualify, stating there is no state agency that has the authority to challenge a district. Thompson noted the state laws are so broadly written, they can cover just about anything and Kewaskum's list was not out of line.

Thompson stated "It (TIF) puts back in the hands of local government, a financing tool without cutting their throats."

Tax Incremental Funding is designed to help communities develop and construct projects that would be financially out of their reach through local tax revenues.

Miller asked "do we have money in the budget to put a man (like Thompson) on the

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FOR THE BEST OF CONCRETE MATERIALS payroll?" Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated money had been set aside and was available under Land Use Planning.

Miller stated, "I admit I have been the one who's been putting the brakes on this thing, but now I think we should get someone going on this."

Commission member Jeff Rohrer noted it was now up to the members of the Board and Commission to take time to explain TIF to the people of the community so misunderstandings would be minimized.

Village Board President Gerald Stollenwerk thanks Thompson for his time noting everyone felt more informed after his presentation.

Stollenwerk said TIF will be on the Plan Commission agenda February 24.

Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan primary, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his or her choice for a candidate.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two ballot clerks or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in making his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so that the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the machine or booth, and where paper ballots are used, give his or her name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand the inspector his or her folded ballot to be placed in the ballot box, deposit any unused ballots in the blank ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly. and shall leave the polling place promptly

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist in marking the ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.


