#### Recommendations on Budget Cuts Made By School Board Staffing Committee

One of the committee members made a comment near the closing of Thursday evening's meeting, "we're damned if we do and damned if we don't." That seemed to sum up the situation facing the Kewaskum School Board's Committee on Staffing, as they tried to construct an equitable list of cuts from the 1981-82 school budget.

Faced with trimming approximately \$126,000 from the budget, the committee met for four hours trying to come up with budget reductions which would have the least effect on the students, yet give some relief to the taxpayers of the district.

The committee reviewed literally every phase, place and position within the school district looking for places to save and reduce the budget. The committee told parents attending the meeting their job was to make staffing recommendations only, however, it was almost impossible not to get into other areas affecting the budget such as bussing, sports, etc., as it all eventually reflected back, in some aspect, to staffing.

Parents from the Beechwood School area, who were concerned over its possible closing, were told by committee member Richard Theusch, "if we had the parents of kids that go to West Bend, Newburg and Random Lake here and told them they would have to transport them, how do you think they will feel: They would be just as upset."

Other recommendations reviewed were: all day kindergarten (alternate days). Kindergarten teacher Mrs. Connie Zemlicka was not in favor of this as she noted kids at this age have a limited (10-15 minute) attention span and tire quite easily. Dropping one high school bus run, dropping the Campbellsport bus and transportation contracts to parents for children attending schools in West Bend, Newburg and Random Lake were also discussed. In the area of sports, Theusch asked the audience "would you object to cutting the most

expensive sport?" Some parents were for the idea. (Football costs the district \$15,000-\$16,000 a year). Theusch stated, "if we considered that we'd have half the school district in here."

Chairman Dr. Charles Ogi noted, "somebody's ox is going to be gored," but nobody wants it to be theirs.

Elimination of the assistant high school principal was also brought up. It was felt different phases of this job could be worked into the contracts of

#### Agenda Changed, Another Meeting Monday, Feb. 23

The amended agenda for the Wednesday, February 18, meeting of the Board of Education of the School District of Kewaskum deleted discussion and action on professional staff for 1981-82, including the report of the committee on staffing and a report by Mr. Pearson on high school registrations. This will be discussed and acted upon at a meeting on Monday, February 23 at 8:00p.m.

other staff positions. Ogi also felt he could not see the need for a full time business manager and would like to see it reduced to half time.

Ogi suggested dropping two sports, "I would go strictly by the numbers," (keeping the activities participated in by the largest number of students).

Dropping Physical Education at the high school was also mentioned.

Some parents in the audience voiced their disagreement with some of the items proposed for cutting. Member John Tessar asked 'how many of you people out there would be here tonight if it hadn't been for the article about closing Beechwood none."

One committee member noted, "we're only three people trying to do a job."

After looking at the proposed cuts in the way of dollars,

possible closing of the Beechwood School was again brought up. Tessar asked Theusch if he would make such a recommendation. "Sure, I'll make the recommendation, if we're going to shoot for the \$126,000, we haven't come anywhere near that figure tonight."

The following recommendations were to be made at the School Board neeting February 18, by all members:

1) Eliminate 1½ elementary teaching positions, 1 at Beechwood and ½ at Kewaskum Elementary. (approximate savings \$22,500).

2) Eliminate three intern positions. (approximate savings \$7,000).

3) Eliminate half-time agriculture teaching position, high school (\$8,500).

Dr. Ogi's recommendations were:

1) Eliminate full time Business Manager position.

2) Eliminate Elementary Guidance position.

3) Eliminate two special education positions.

4) Cut athletic program to 6 sports for boys and 6 for girls. Take the 6 with the highest student interest. This would result in adding boys' tennis and girls' softball and dropping cross country and golf for both boys and girls.

5) Combine freshmen and JV under one coach and on one team.

6) Cut one teacher aide position.

7) Eliminate Physical Education at high school.

8) Eliminate one secretary

position.

Richard Theusch's recom-

mendations:

1) Tentatively eliminate one additional elementary teaching

 Tentatively eliminate one additional elementary teaching position in the event the Board decides to close Beechwood School.

2) Eliminate assistant principal position at high school.

John Tessar; Make no further staff changes. In the area of cocurricular activities, recommend they remain as they are presently.

## Sewer Rate Increases Discussed by Board

At Monday evening's meeting, Dr. Raymond Kipp, advisor for the Water Department, presented his analysis on the status of Kewaskum's sewerage costs.

Kipp told the Village Board his study of the budget showed Kewaskum could be looking at a rate increase of 65% if it hoped to come up with the sum of \$245,000, allocated for the 1981 budget without making any budget reductions. However, Dr. Kipp presented a list of places where reductions could decrease the budget by approximately \$59,600. If all these cuts could be made, Kipp felt the village could look at a more conservative increase of approximately 27% from 79c per 1,000 gallons to \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons for residential users. Four commercial users are also looking at substantial increases. Regal Ware would be lowest with an increase of approximately 20%, Great Lakes Malting 56%, while Marigold Dairy and Kewaskum Frozen Foods could be facing increases of 107% for sewer service.

Kipp noted sewerage rates have not been increased in Kewaskum since 1973, yet the Sewer and Water Department's budget of \$126,000 in '73 has increased almost six times to

#### Only 109 Votes Cast in Primary

Herbert Grover and incumbent Barbara Thompson were nominated for state superintendent of public instruction at Tuesday's primary election. Grover, who made a surprisingly strong first place showing, and Mrs. Thompson will meet in the April 7 general election for a four-year term in the \$58,139 a year job. With not all wards reported Grover received 113,677 votes to 80,663 for Thompson. The other three candidates were far behind.

Only 109 votes were cast in the Village of Kewaskum, where Grover also led by a large margin. The results: Grant Douglas Tews 5, Douglas J. LaFollette 16, Barbara Thompson 27, Reinhold Kaebitzsch 8, Herbert J. Grover 53.

## Education Association Wins Arbitration Share vote each year, liquidated The liquidated day

After negotiating a year, the Kewaskum Education Association was notified Friday it had won its arbitration case with the School Board.

The new contract for 1980-81 is approximately \$195,000 above the 1979-80 contract.

Other benefits won by the teachers include: dental insurance, Association right to grieve, salary schedule for 1980-81, deletion of the Fair

Share vote each year, liquidated damages, just cause protection for discipline, reduction in rank or compensation, and replacement teacher (limited term employe) definition, rights and privileges.

The new 1980-81 salary schedule runs from a base beginning BA salary at Step 1 of \$11,100 to a MA+30, annual salary at Step 16 of \$22,309.00, compared with \$10,450 through \$20,289, in the 1979-80 contract. The increase will mean an average increase of \$1,800.

The liquidated damages fee for late contract termination was increased from \$100 to \$200, requested by the union. The School Board had asked for the right to sue a teacher who wished to break their contract.

The case was presented and litigated by Uniserv Director Dennis Eisenberg. Eisenberg stated, even though the case was settled in favor of the teachers, they would have to receive \$2,500 increases to maintain their current living standards.

rates in seven years, you can tell them they've been getting a bargain for five years.

Looking at budget reductions and a 27% increase, Kipp felt an increase next year would also be substantial as it would take approximately two years to catch up to current sewerage charges. "If you want to do it all in one year, you'll be looking at a 65% increase." Anticipating the reaction to a 27% increase, Trustee Dave Nigh stated, "its been too cheap too long." Kipp commented, you can use up to 10,000 gallons of water and discharge it down the sewer for \$5.50 a month (combined water and sewer charges). That's extremely reasonable compared to other areas

Kipp suggested hereafter Kewaskum raise rates annually, noting Fort Atkinson has been on this schedule for seven years and their annual increase has run between 5 and 8%.

Village Board President Gerald Stollenwerk said proposed sewerage increases would be brought up at the March 2 meeting.

In other business, Trustee Jeff Rohrer presented recommendations from the Parks and Recreation Committee. Among them were adjustments in the pay scale for baseball umpires. The hourly rates approved will run from \$5.35 the first year to \$6.25 per hour for five years experience. Rohrer suggested advertising for bids for fencing at the new basketball court. It is hoped the village will be able to take advantage of a state funding program before it expires in June. Rohrer also informed the board starting this year the village will be maintaining only the two baseball diamonds at the new park and not ten diamonds as in previous years.

Police Chief Hlavaty received board approval to install "No Parking' signs on both sides of Second Street. The board voted unanimously for a "No Parking from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Week Days Only" restriction.

The board also approved the appointment of David Backhaus to the Police Commission. Backhaus, a Lieutenant and Watch Commander in the Washington County Sheriff's Department, will fill the unexpired term left vacant by the death of Roland Pledl.

Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo presented quotes for the purchase of a Recordograph Chart at \$1,455.00, and a new recording meter at \$245.00. Bilgo noted the present meter was installed in 1929. The bids were turned over to the Public Works Committee.

Everyone is encouraged to attend and participate. A public forum serves to inform the electorate and affords them the opportunity to meet those who serve them in public office.



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
#### Honored for 25 Years at Regal

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
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#### Area Farmers, Landowners Receive Soil and Water Conservation Awards

Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District farmers and landowners dominated the list of awards winners being honored by the Southeast Wisconsin Assoication of Soil and Water Conservation Districts at the association's winter meeting. People receiving awards for outstanding conservation work in Washington County included:

Walter and Roger Neumann: father and son in the Town of Kewaskum, who operate a 215 acre dairy farm in sloping glacial land, and won the wildlife habitat development award for bonafide farmers. In 11 years they have laid out over 173 acres of centour strips to control erosion and provide food and cover for wildlife. They have also used conservation tillage practices, constructed grass waterways, dug a wildlife pond, and improved the timber stand on their 11 acre woodlot.

James Reigle, Regal Ware president, and Charles Ogi, Kewaskum veterinarian: won in the non-farmer wildlife habitat category on land purchased near Kewaskum. They developed a conservation plan in 1969, planted 18,000 trees in 1970, and planted 2,400 feet of hedgerows. Several food patches of corn, buckweat and sorghum for wildlife were also planted in that same year. 

## Farm Tractor Safety Course

Accidents cause more deaths to persons between the ages of 15 and 24 than all other causes combined. On the farm, the major cause of accidents is working with tractors and farm machinery. Most of the accidents happen when the operator does not know how to operate the tractor or machine correctly or is unaware of the dangers involved.

To help reduce accidents, a farm tractor safety course has been started. A federal law says that no youth between 14 and 16 years of age may be hired to operate a tractor on a farm unless he has taken the safety course.

A tractor safety course will be conducted by the High School Vocational Agriculture Departments and University of Wisconsin Extension in Washington County. It will be on Saturdays: at the West Bend High School beginning March 14 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. It is open especially to youth who will be 14 and not over 16 years of age by June. However, if there is room, other youth will be accepted. The federal law requiring the safety course does not apply to youth who will be working on their own farm. However, the safety course would be a good thing to enroll in even if a youth does not plan to work for others.

The course includes instructions on understanding how to operate a tractor with the emphasis on safety. To complete the course a member must attend four sessions and then pass a written and a driving

### Larson Says New Plans Makes Home Mortgages Affordable

Dick Larson, president of the West Bend Savings and Loan Association, thinks he has at least a partial cure for the sick housing industry in Washington County - a remedy that may be used throughout the state.

Larson, like most S&L officials, suffered through a depressed 1980 market that saw record low activity in the housing market. He hasn't taken it lying down.

Instead, Larson crafted and then recently unveiled a new mortgage plan that he feels will help put the American dream of home ownership back within the grasp of the moderate-income family.

The Appreciation Payment Mortgage (APM) plan overcomes the high mortgage payments that are keeping many otherwise qualified buyers from entering the market, he said. 'It even cures dandruff," he joked.

A resurgence of home buying and selling by moderate-income families will send healthy ripples of activity all the way through the housing market, said Larson, who unveiled APM at a meeting of area brokers and

The response was enthusiastic, he said, adding that West Bend Savings and Loan has already had three applicants.

Unlike the much-publicized Shared Appreciation Mortgage plan (SAM), the APM allows the home buyer to keep his monthly payments low without signing away any of the equity he is building in his home. Instead, his monthly mortgage payments are subsidized by the association which uses the increased value of his home as collateral.

Here's how the APM works in a hypothetical example:

- A home buyer wants to purchase a \$62,500 home with a 20 percent downpayment and a mortgage of \$50,000. The monthly contract mortgage payment during the first year is about \$620, higher than the buyer can afford.

The association assumes that the man's income and the value of the house will increase annually by 5 percent, a very conservative figure.

The association gives the

includes the option to use a subsidy of up to \$200 per month. His mortgage payment is reduced from \$620 to \$420, an affordable level

- The subsidy is actually a loan against the increased value of the house. The subsidy, which carries a financing cost of only \$100 per year, is added to the mortgage balance and the length of the mortgage is extended.

The APM buyer will have the option each year of using or not using the subsidy, Larson said. If the buyer wants to use the subsidy, the mortgage interest rate will be adjusted upward or downward, depending on the situation that year.

The APM is written for five years but can be extended beyond that, Larson said, although he doubted that would happen in most cases.

He estimated that 95 percent of the people who use the APM plan would wean themselves from the subsidy by the end of the five years. As their income increases over that time, Larson said, most will decide to start making the full contract payments and build their equity in the home at a faster rate.

The reason, he said, is that the percentage of income necessary to meet mortgage payments usually decreases over the years.

"The family that spends 25 percent of its income on housing and buys a home now, usually finds that in a few years, not only has their house value gone up, but their income has gone up too," said Larson. Now they are really only paying 15 to 20 percent of their income (for mortgage payments).

One of the best aspects of the APM is that it allows a moderate-income person to build inflation-hedging equity in a home and enjoy the tax breaks of home ownership without "busting his tail" to meet mortgage payments that eat up nearly half of his income, Larson said. The subsidy limit is \$200, he said, but the actual subsidy amount will be based on the premise that 25 percent of the homeowner's income can go toward mortgage payments.

In the example used above, the person bought a house buyer a five-year mortgage that , today for \$62,500 and sold it in

five years for \$76,000. Under a typical mortgage plan, that person would have reduced a \$50,000 mortgage to about \$48,000 and would make about \$27,500 in the sale.

If the same person used the \$200 APM subsidy for the entire five years, he would have increased the original \$50,000 mortgage to \$62,000.

At the same sale price, however, he'd still make about \$14,000 and would have enjoyed the tax breaks of home ownership over the period, Larson said.

Larson said the concept of APM came to him on the way back to West Bend from a meeting with federal savings and loan officials in Washington. The APM needs no federal approval and already has the blessing of the appropriate state officials and mortgage under-

No laws or regulations had to be rewritten, he said, because Wisconsin is already one of a handful of states that allows such creative financing without a plethora of red tape.

The APM is tailor-made for the family with a moderate income which will increase, but not dramatically, over the first few years of home ownership, said Larson.

Graduated payment plans will prove more attractive to some families with incomes that will increase significantly during the initial years of a mortgage. Generally, graduated payments plans start with lower payments that are supplemented by the downpayment. The monthly payments increase over a three-year period.

Larson said that both APM



and graduated payment plans will be valuable tools for those in the Washington County housing industry. The president-elect of the Wisconsin Savings League said if the APM is as successful as he hopes, he will introduce the concept to other S&L's throughout the state.

The unveiling of the unique APM plan may provide an indication why Larson is so excited about the concept.

After explaining APM to a room full of builders and brokers, Larson asked how many had recently experienced lost sales because a prospect couldn't afford the mortgage. Almost all of them raised their hands.

Then Larson asked how many could have sold at least one of those prospects if APM had been available. "They almost all raised their hands again,' said Larson.

Jeff Lehnerz covered him closely in the first half and allowed Christel just four points as he did a good job. The Indians couldn't hit from the outside nor the free throw line, missing 15 for the night. Piepenberg and Koehler each had 12 points for the winners, high for both teams.

On Friday night the KHS girls played a makeup game at Two Rivers against the undefeated Raiders, who clinched a share of the Eastern Wisconsin title by snowing under the Indians by 41 points, 73-32.

The Indians were only in the game for the first quarter, trailing 15-8 at the period's end. After that it was all Two Rivers as they outscored Kewaskum by decisive margins in each quarter.
