## Three Firemen Retire; Honored at Banquet

This past Saturday evening, Feb. 28, the Kewaskum Fire Department held their annual banquet at the Kewaskum fire station.

This year, as in years past,

the wives and fiancées of the Kewaskum firemen, along with the retired honorary members and their wives, were guests of honor. A total of 108 persons attended this year's event. The

guest speaker for the event was Bruce Johnstone, Fire Service Training Coordinator from Fond du Lac MPTI.

A special tribute was paid to three members of the department who retired from active duty this past year, after serving their community as a fireman for a combined total of 86 years. They are William Harbeck, 36 years; Donald Seil, 29 years, and Alex Laubach, 21 years. Each man received a plaque for their many years of service.

A special honor was given to Donald Seil, who was chosen Kewaskum Fireman of the Year for 1980. Don served as a member since 1951, both as a fireman and for many years on the rescue squad. He also served as the department treasurer for the past 12 years. He, through his knowledge, ambition, personality and cooperation, has done much for the good of the fire department.

## Preliminary Census Report Shows Village Population at 2378, Up 452

The latest set of preliminary population figures released over the weekend by the U.S. Census Bureau assigns a 1980 population of 2,378 to the Village of Kewaskum. The 1970 census figure was 1,926. This is a sizable increase of 452 residents in the past ten years.

The Town of Kewaskum census figure for 1980 is 1,243, an increase of 77 over the 1970 figure of 1,166.

The Town of Wayne census figure showed 1,483 for 1980. The 1970 figure was 1,214, an increase of 269.

The Town of Auburn report for 1980 is 1,828, a substantial

increase of 572 over the 1970 figure of 1,256.

The Town of Ashford report for 1980 is 1,610, an increase of 140 over the 1970 population of 1,470.

The Village of Campbellsport report for 1980 shows a population of 1,748, an increase of only 67 over the figure of 1,681 for 1970.

Washington County is the projected big gainer in 1980, according to the latest Census Bureau. Washington County now has a 1980 population of 84,786, up 20,947 or 33 per cent over the 1970 figure of 63,839.

## 27% Hike Effective Sewer Rate Increase Is Approved by Board

The Village Board Monday night acted on the recommendation of their Wastewater Treatment Consultant, Dr. Raymond Kipp, to increase rates for sewer service in the Village of Kewaskum.

With Trustee David Nigh voting against the motion, the board voted 5-1 to increase rates from 79¢ to \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons for residential users, with the increase being retroactive to January 1, 1981. Industrial users in Kewaskum will see increases in their costs ranging from 3½% to 55% for sewer service.

At the public hearing, Kipp reviewed the report he had presented at the previous meeting, again showing where reductions will have to be made in order to keep the increase down to 27% rather than 65% if the budget cuts are not made. It was noted that even though the amount of flow had decreased from 600,000 gallons per day in 1973 to approximately 500,000 per day in 1980, there was an increase in the BOD and solids treatment which are processed resulting in higher chemical and hauling expenses.

Nigh asked Kipp when the treatment plant started losing money. Kipp stated "I think from day one. For six years every industry and residence has been getting a break."

Wastewater Treatment Superintendent Pete Albers said he had heard Random Lake charges run approximately \$100.00. Kipp noted Kewaskum's '81 rates are not as high as many areas in the state and

they're still a bargain.

The board is considering annual sewer increases in the future in an effort to avoid such large step increases. Kipp said other areas for which he was consultant were averaging 5-7% annual increases for their services.

## School Board Candidates Appear at Forum

Four of the five candidates running for Kewaskum School Board in April appeared before a voters forum Thursday evening.

Jean Goeden, the only incumbent, (seeking her third term) spoke before the meeting along with Thomas Brigham, Ralph Horner and Richard Schlice, who are first-time candidates. Margaret McFadden, who is making her third try at gaining a seat, was not present.

Goeden felt the extensive experience gained on the board should be considered in her favor. Goeden has served on all the board committees during her two previous terms.

Brigham, an associate professor of physical education at UW-West Bend, discussed the 1981-82 school budget noting places he felt the board could make substantial cuts in an effort to reduce the budget. Among his recommendations would be supplies and equipment cuts for one year, combining of high school and elementary bus runs, dropping parochial bus runs outside the district, and combining the business manager and reading specialist duties resulting in an administrative position with 50% of the time spent on business and 50% co-ordinator and evaluator.

Horner, an employee of Gehl, voiced his concern for getting "true value" from tax dollars spent and the impact of tax increases on people with fixed incomes.

Schlice felt his main contribution to the board would come from his experience in budgeting and management. Schlice is a foreman at the West Bend Company.

The five candidates are vying for three openings, Goeden's and those of board members Dr. Charles Ogi and James Oelhafen, who are not running for re-election.

## Village Board

Trustee Jeff Rohrer noted "so it will take us two years to catch up." Kipp stated "hopefully, your next increase shouldn't be so much."

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the board he had checked with the Chamber of Commerce with regard to petitioning for village home mail delivery. Schmidt stated the Chamber felt they did not want to get involved. The Chamber felt, itself, along with other businesses and individuals would prefer to keep their Post Office boxes. If village home delivery were to be available, box holders could be faced with rental charges four times higher than they are now paying.

Schmidt said the major point which should be clarified is "home mail delivery" does NOT mean to the resident's door. It would mean corner delivery. So, any person who had a corner lot could be looking at the possibility of having a box for every home in the block at the end of his front yard. Trustee Raynor Herriges stated "If there's anything I would hate, its 20 mailboxes on my

corner." The board passed a motion to table the question of village mail delivery. Schmidt noted the Village of Franklin had petitioned for village mail delivery and their request had been denied partly due to economic conditions and government spending cuts.

Rohrer presented the Plan Commission's recommendation to contract with Action Associates, Madison, for a TIF Optional Use Report. Action was tabled until the March 16 meeting as the contract had not been received as of Monday's meeting.

Dan Schmidt told the board he would like to refute some statements regarding the village which had been made by individuals at the Voters Forum Thursday evening.

James Scott, a challenger for one of the trustee positions, stated he was very concerned about keeping tax costs down, noting his own tax bill had increased \$527.00. Schmidt noted that accurate figures showed a tax of \$900.00 for 1980, and \$1,185.00 for 1981, an increase of only \$284.00. One individual at Monday's meeting noted he had also been at Thursday's forum. He said, after hearing Scott's statement, he went home to figure things

out and according to his calculations, Scott's home would have had to have been assessed at \$92,800.00 or his home had not been completed at the time of his first tax bill.

Schmidt also wanted to clarify the statement that Scott "could not obtain a list of salaries and places where employes reside." Schmidt stated at the time Scott came into the office, he was asked if there was any other information he needed and Scott did not ask for any further data, all which was available to him.

Scott also stated he would look into employes' salaries and the budget for places to reduce taxes. "However, he has not had an opportunity to look at the budget." For approximately the last 2 1/2 months, the Village Board has been working on its 1981 budget during its public meetings, and about the only people attending to hear their budget recommendations were board members, department heads and news media. Village Board meetings are open to the public and any interested residents are invited to attend them.

Eugene Bohn, Moraine Insurance, presented his recommendations for changes in village insurance coverage. Since no immediate action was required, the matter was tabled for further study.

Village Board President Gerald Stollenwerk read his proclamation making the week of March 15-21, American Legion Week, congratulating the American Legion and Robert G. Romaine Post on its 62nd anniversary.

Experiments indicate that skin to skin contact between a newborn and its mother immediately after birth [instead of the usual hospital lag of several hours] may be beneficial in stirring strong maternal attachment for the baby. Such touching also is known to be important for the well-being of the baby. Follow-up studies one and two years later showed that early contact fostered a stronger attachment of mother and child.

## Meeting for Town of Kewaskum Residents

### 'Farmland Preservation - Trying to Save the Good Earth'

Approximately 30 Town of Kewaskum residents heard representatives from Washington County Parks & Planning Commission, Land Use & Development Committee and the ASCS office explain the Farmland Preservation Act. This program is being developed in hopes it will save one of Wisconsin's most valuable natural resources, good productive farmland.

Paul Mueller, representing Land Use, told the group what the purposes of Washington County's Farmland Preservation program were. These aims being to identify all productive farmlands, rate the farmlands according to productive potential and importance, to suggest what public and private steps are necessary to preserve farmland yet at the same time allow for necessary county growth, and to use this planning as an educational and informative exchange of ideas between individuals, government, farmers and non-farmers of Washington County.

Mueller noted some of the goals of this program are to identify productive farmlands, and support their preservation and management as an important economic resource while providing for urban and rural growth that doesn't unnecessarily consume or conflict with farms. The program also hopes to support needed public facilities that accommodate planned growth without adversely affecting farms and farmland operations. Mueller stated "we are not here to

defend the State Tax Credit program, we are here to supply information and get people interested in the programs."

The audience was told that 13 Washington County townships had been contacted at least once regarding the program and now all the townships are being approached again to provide more information and data regarding Farmland Preservation.

Brian Vandewalle, a consultant from Madison, explained the steps taken in mapping the county. Each of the six maps displayed had a specific purpose: 1) Identifying good farmland, woodlands and wetlands, 2) Photos of towns, 3) Ownership boundaries, 4) Floodplain boundaries, 5) Farmland soils, and 6) Soils limited for residential and septic use.

Vandewalle noted this mapping and identifying was done to provide information which would enable local governments to plan their zoning in an effort to preserve good farmlands in their areas.

Jack Trzebiatowski, of the Washington County ASCS office, gave a short simplified explanation of how tax credits to farms work and the steps and requirements involved to participate in tax relief for this program. Tax credit is a tool for the state to encourage and provide incentives to participate in this plan. Trzebiatowski noted tax credit relates to the land, not the farmer and at any future date, should a farmer take his land out of the program, the last ten years of credit would have to be repaid to the state, either by the farmer himself or any future owner should the farmer sell his

land and the new owner used the land for non-farm purposes. In other words, the tax credit would then be considered a tax deferral which would have to be paid. The reason for this is to insure the preservation of farmland as an agricultural resource. Repayment of deferral can be avoided by keeping the land agricultural.

Trzebiatowski said 4,200 Wisconsin farms have applied for tax relief, with each receiving approximately \$1,400.00 credit. Washington County had 13 farms apply, receiving an average credit of \$1,200.00.

The speakers are hoping their contact with all the townships will generate an increased interest in the farm preservation program.

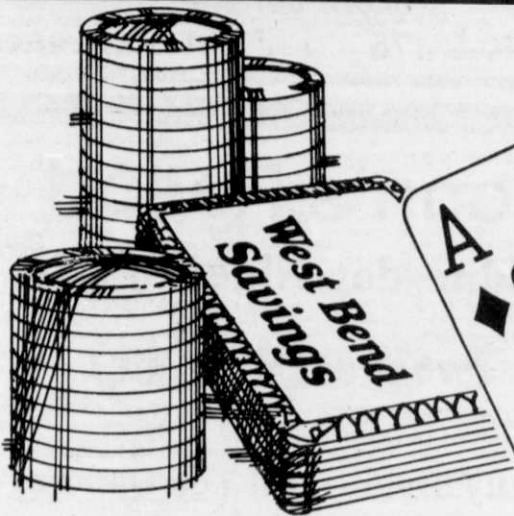

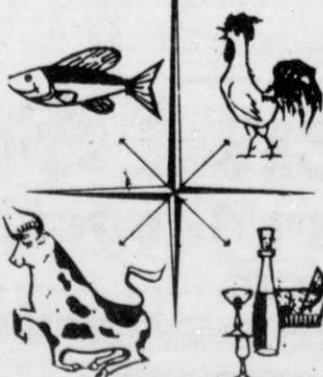

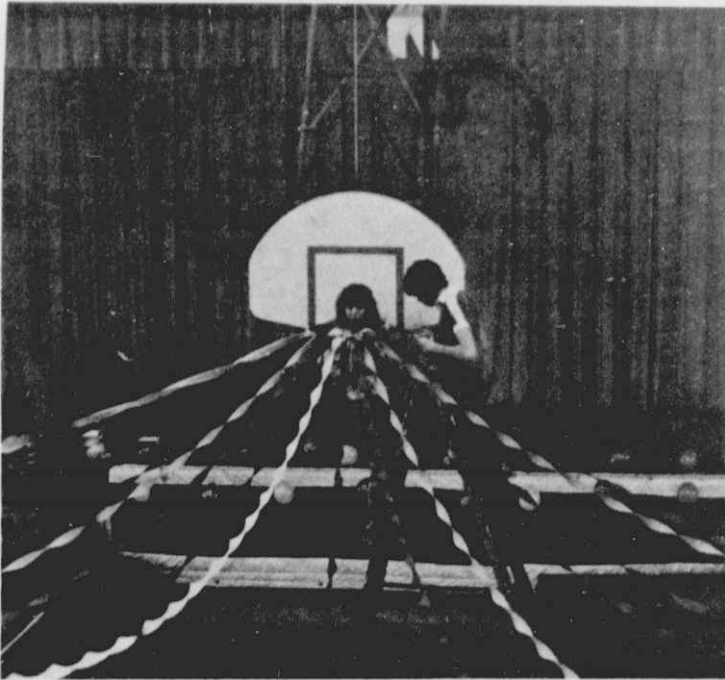

Fasching is a festival in German-speaking countries which officially begins in November and continues until Lent, similar to the famous Mardi Gras. It is a wild, colorful time of fun and celebration where everything goes. In Kewaskum, Fasching is celebrated on a much smaller scale, with one evening of food, entertainment and dancing.

About 150 were served in the high school cafeteria, which had been redecorated with tablecloths, centerpieces and streamers across the windows to give it a more festive atmosphere. The meal was authentically German, including Koenigsberger-Klopps (meatballs) and Schweinebraten (pork roast) as main courses and rich Black Forest tortes, apple strudel, and peach cakes for dessert.

"People whom I talked to were really impressed with the amount of food they got for their money," said German Club advisor Therese Rosenthal. Shelly Sekas, a junior at KHS, provided accordion music between the meal and the program, which was held in the gymnasium-across the hall from the cafeteria.

The program, written by the students, was a fractured version of the German fairy tale "Aschenputtel," or "Cinderella." The skit featured Heidi Edgar in the title role, Brian Brenner as the Prince, Mary Schmidt as the fairy godmother, Sue Lemke as the stepmother, and Shelly Sekas and Laurie

Lemke as the stepsisters. Most skit members agreed that the costumes borrowed from the Kewaskum Jaycees added a lot to the play.

Written into the skit were some modified folk dances taught to a few club members by Cheryl Abitz, a dance instructor from Fond du Lac.

## VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope, or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before election day in the case of applications mailed to the municipal clerk, and 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election in the case of applications made in the clerk's office.

With one exception, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot must make a separate application before each election. Voters indefinitely confined to their home or care facility because of illness, age or disability need not file an application before each election; a special statement on the application form can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to them before each election; if they fail to make and return the ballots sent to them in an election, they must complete another application later on.

Absentee ballots can be voted at home anytime after they arrived in the mail. They can also be voted right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. If returning the ballots in person, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and subscribed and sworn to by the clerk or the deputy clerk who are authorized to administer oaths. In either case, the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.

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## NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the Statutes.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies of all dogs is required (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. If required by the governing body of the city, village or town, the certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs 5 months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$6 for the unneutered male or unsayed female dog, or one-half of these amounts if the dog became 5 months of age after July 1 of the license year. The governing body of any town, village or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. A kennel license which is required by owners having more than three dogs on their premises shall cost \$25.

Dog licenses can be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year.

**PENALTY**  
Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1 will be assessed a late fee of \$5.
