Found in West Bend

140 Pounds of Explosives Detonated at Kewaskum

Approximately 140 pounds of unidentified Class "B" explosives found in West Bend were detonated by the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department Bomb Squad Monday morning.

West Bend police received a call from the owner of Matenaer's Mobil Service, 905 South Main Street, West Bend, that possibly dangerous materials had been found behind

the service station.

West Bend police contacted the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department, which dispatched their bomb squad to the scene. The explosives were removed to vacant state land on Highway 28, east of Kewaskum, where the squad detonated the materials.

West Bend authorities felt the explosives had not been placed at the station to cause damage but was a dumping place to dispose of them.

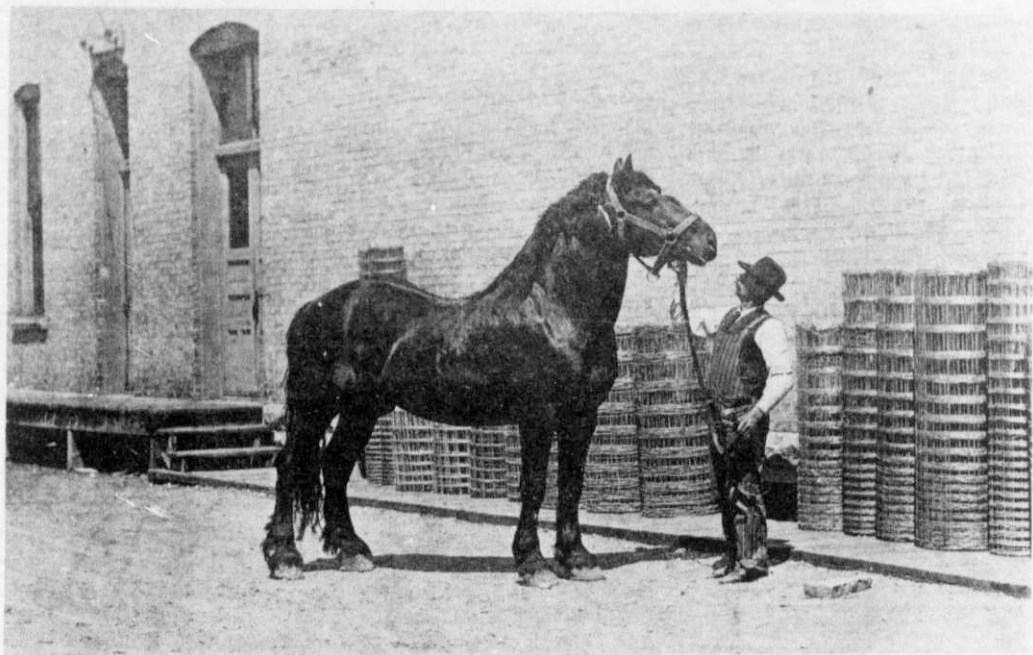

WZUU's David Haines Visits High School

"We use everyday four-letter words," said WZUU News Director, David Haines Friday morning, March 20, as he spoke to 60 Kewaskum High School Mass Media students.

Haines' talk, arranged by Kevin Chambers, Mass Media teacher at KCHS, compared radio journalism to that of newspapers and television, and revealed some aspects of a radio broadcaster's life. He spent the rest of the hour answering questions from the students.

Radio is one-to-one communication, Haines explained, because most people are alone while listening to the radio. An announcer must be able to catch the listener's attention and hold it, without the help of a newspaper's banner headlines or television's news film segments. This means using common words and "picture" words to communicate.

"I'll use 'ripoff,'" Haines said. "I'll use 'slammer' or 'slam'."

WZUU's newscasts have received a variety of reactions. Some people in the journalism field are unimpressed with the style of broadcasting, but "the average Mr. and Mrs. Joe like it because it's interesting."

Haines was quick to applaud radio announcer Paul Harvey's news reading techniques. "He puts feeling into it," he said, explaining that Harvey uses good voice inflection to fit each unique news story.

Haines hoped that some students had picked up a few pointers about careers in broad-

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casting from his talk. He admitted that it was good for WZUU's public relations to "communicate other sides of David Haines" and of the station.

For example, a typical day for him begins at 3 a.m., but he still manages to go out at night. "You've heard of working a split shift," he said, "well, I sleep a split shift."

A few students asked Haines to relate some interesting things that have happened to him during his broadcasting career. He thought about it for awhile. "It's like asking you what you had for lunch last Tuesday," he said. He's come to expect the uncommon.

There had been one time on Haines' birthday - when his fellow announcer "Larry the Legend" arranged for a number of fur-coat-clad models to walk into the studio while Haines was reading the news.

The models suddenly opened their coats, revealing only bikinis. He continued reading as one of the young women sat on his lap and put her arm around his neck. Just as she was getting ready to kiss him, he quickly turned the microphone down, gave her a kiss, and then continued reading.

At various times during his career Haines has covered circus parades, talked to Ralph Nader, Richard Nixon, the Commodores, and countless other famous personalities, and even floated over Milwaukee in the Goodyear blimp.

The obvious question was finally raised by one of the students: Does he enjoy being a radio news director?

"I'd have to enjoy my job," he said, "if I have to get up at 3 a.m."

High School Math Team Takes First Place in Meet

Rebounding from a last place finish last year, the Kewaskum High School Math team took first place at the Slinger Math meet Monday, March 16.

Coaches Joe Harlow and Ed Slegler accompanied the 14 Kewaskum students who participated in the meet. Eight students were chosen to be on the Kewaskum team, and the other six joined with two extras from Oakfield to form the extra team (which later became known as "Miscellaneous"). Both teams

competed on the varsity level, with "Miscellaneous" coming in fourth out of six teams.

Individual awards were given to high scorers. Kevin Plzak and Kevin Chesak tied for fourth place overall, DuWayne Schacht took sixth, and Ken Scott tied with Steve Portens of Ozaukee for seventh.

The meet consisted of four individual tests, each one containing three problems to be done in 15 minutes. Tests covered algebra, geometry, ad-

vanced math, and problem solving. The final event was a 15-minute test with six problems. Each team was allowed to work together on it.

Kevin Plzak, Rick Howell, Scott Nigh, Jenny Mueller, Andy Rosenberger, Cheryl Burkhalter, Kevin Chesak, and Jan Hazlewood made up the Kewaskum team.

Representing Kewaskum on the extra team were Ken Scott, Ken Bauer, DuWayne Schacht, Craig Rosenthal, Sandy Kirchner, and Valerie Plaum.

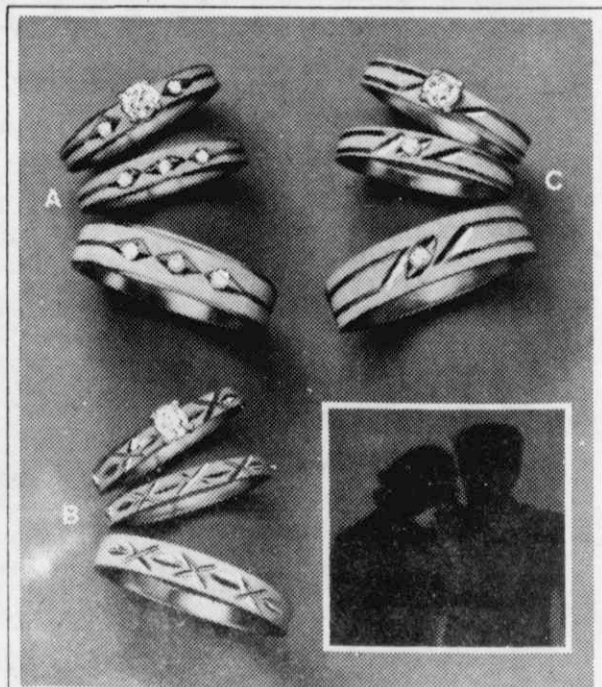

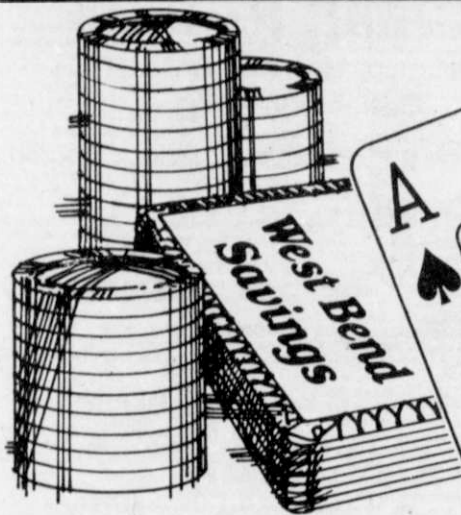

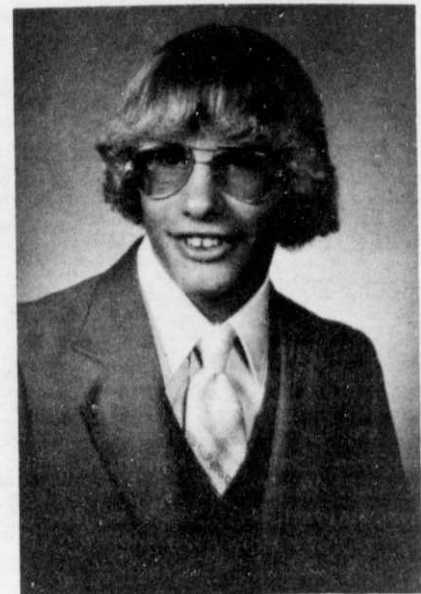

To guard against painful insect stings:
Sweet smells attract bees, so avoid strong perfumes and scented hair sprays or lotions.

Tornado Safety Rules

When you receive word of a tornado warning for your area, you should take immediate shelter. Seek inside shelter if possible. If in the open, move away from a tornado's path at a right angle. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

In homes with basements, seek refuge near the basement wall in the most sheltered and in the part of the basement deepest below ground. Additional protection is afforded by taking cover under heavy furniture or a workbench or covering up with mattresses, pillows and blankets.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning and destruction during strong winds, and should be abandoned in favor of a preselected shelter, or even a ditch in the open. Damage can be minimized by securing the trailer with cables anchored in concrete footing.

Personal preparations should include availability of a battery-operated radio, in case of power loss; knowledge of safety rules and how to tell if a tornado or severe thunderstorm is approaching; and change of family plans in order to remain near shelter during a severe local storm threat.

Tornado Alert

The fire siren will be sounded on Thursday, April 2, at 10:30 a.m. to acquaint residents with the tornado or other disaster signal. It will be sounded at a steady pitch for three minutes.

In the event of a tornado or other impending disaster take precautionary measures.

The alerts will be held throughout the year on the first Thursday of each month.

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, make a cross (X) or mark in the square after the name of the person for whom you desire to vote. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the ballot, write the name in the blank space provided for the purpose.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

(f) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

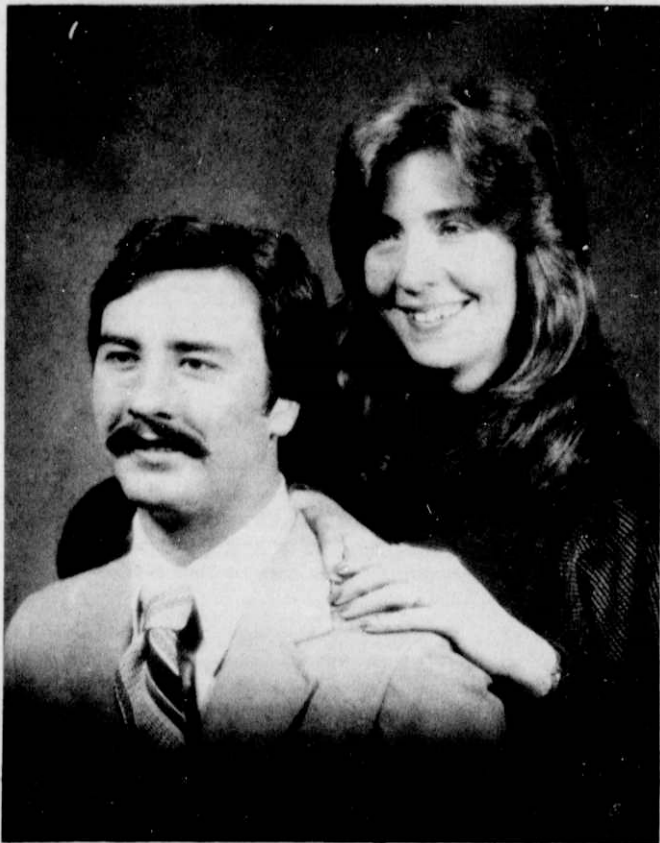

**First Report
For County on
Stewardship Appeal**

First reports from parishes and missions of Washington County indicate that the county has already achieved 39% of its \$177,000 goal for the 1981 Catholic Stewardship Appeal. Pledges and gifts as of March 15 total \$69,447.

According to first reports for the entire archdiocese the 1981 Stewardship Appeal is slightly ahead of last year's campaign. Reports from the entire archdiocese thus far total \$2,468,708

from 53,281 donors. This represents 55% of the goal. At a comparable time last year pledges and gifts totaled \$2,208,819.

"We are encouraged by these first reports but we see that there is much work ahead," said Washington County District Leader Leo F. Schlaefel of West Bend.

He said that the associate district leaders and parish leaders were stressing an increase of participation by the largest possible number of potential donors.

The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office in the sample ballot below.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Voting instructions shall be given substantially as follows:

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a non-partisan election, the elector shall place a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the candidates name for each office for whom he intends to vote or insert or write in the name of his choice for a candidate.

If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsement and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding officer that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

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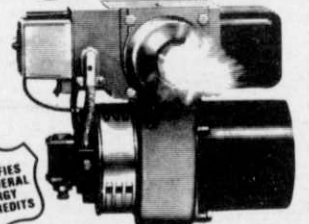
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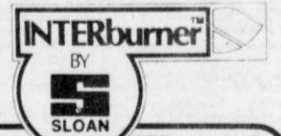

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

Vetter Returns to Europe to Compete In World Cross Country Ski Races

Dennis Vetter, former resident of the Kewaskum area, has returned to Europe to compete in two additional World Loppet cross country ski races, also known as the world cup races. These races are the world's ten most famous cross country ski races and the completion of these is the goal of many amateur citizen cross country skiers throughout the world.

On Saturday, March 14, Vetter competed in the 42 kilometer Engadin Skimarathon Race located in the St. Moritz area of Switzerland. This race has the largest number of participants in the world, this year numbering about 12,000 skiers.

On March 21 he skied the 55 kilometer Norwegian Birkebeiner Rennet located in Lillehammer, Norway. This race is unusual from other World Loppet races in that each skier carries a twelve pound backpack, simulating the Norwegian ancestors carrying a child on their back as they skied.

Vetter has completed five of the World Loppet races previously. These races have been the 60 kilometer Dolomitenlauf in Lienz, Austria; the 70 kilometer Marcialonga in Cavalese, Italy; the 90 kilometer Konig Ludwig Lauf in Oberammergau, West Germany; the 55 kilometer Riviere Rouge Race in Lachute, Quebec; and the 55 kilometer American Birkebeiner in Hayward, Wisconsin, this being Vetter's fifth appearance in that race. The 90 kilometer Konig Ludwig Lauf in West Germany is noted for its distance in that it is the longest one day race held anywhere in the world (57 miles).

Next winter (1982) Vetter plans to complete the remaining races in the World Loppet League. As of this time (March, 1981), a total of 14 citizen skiers in the world have completed these international races and have earned the World Loppet medallion. Hopefully, Vetter will become one of these just one year from now.

Vetter is the son of Leland and Vivian Vetter, Route 1, Kewaskum, and was known during his Kewaskum High School days as a cross country runner. His interest in cross country skiing began about six years ago and has increased throughout this time.

Slinger Edges Lakes Team for Second Place

In the final game, Slinger knocked the Kewaskum Lakes team out of a second place tie by edging them at Slinger Sunday night, 121-116. As a result Slinger took second while Kewaskum had to settle for a tie for third with Port Washington in the "B" Division.

A big 32-22 second quarter opened up a 9-point lead for Slinger at halftime, 62-53. They maintained their lead through the third quarter and led by 11, 95-84, at the period's end. Kewaskum spurted in the fourth quarter and cut the lead to 2 points with about three minutes left. However, Slinger answered the challenge with some big buckets down the stretch and they prevailed.

This was a hard-fought battle between the two long-time rivals in the division. The win gives Slinger (6-8) sole possession of second place and a trophy. Kewaskum finished with a 4-10 record and must settle for third place.

Manager Bill Backhaus said, "We gave it our best shot but just came up a little short, that's all I can say. Slinger just played a little better game tonight than we did. They're a good team and they deserve second place. As for us, well we've got the tournament coming up and we can look forward to next year. We came along way this year. We played good team ball the

second half of the year and we've got a lot to be proud of."

High scorers for Kewaskum were Leon Laatsch with 37 points, Don Gruber with 23 and Tom Edwards with 22. Ray Schreiter with 26 and Jeff Wolf with 25 led Slinger.

These base (100-year) flood elevations are the basis for the flood plain management measures that the community is required to either adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

DATES: The period for comment will be ninety (90) days following the second publication of this proposed rule in a newspaper of local circulation in each community.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The federal Insurance Administrator gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations for selected locations in the nation, in accordance with section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR Part 67.4 (a)). These elevations, together with the flood plain management measures required by section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their flood plain management requirements. Back are seven lettermen, six seniors and one junior. They include Jeff Decker, one of the top returnees from the state-placing relay unit and a good sprinter and low hurdles; Perry Kempf, relay performer who is strong in sprints and hurdles; Jim Geldreich in high jump where he was Scenic Moraine outdoor champ last year; Gordon Medley, shot and discus; Scott Klein, distances; Craig Larsen, distances and Mike Paul, junior sprinter.

The girls were again successful in their meet Saturday, this time against the defending Class B state champions, Lake Mills. Final score was Kewaskum 67 - Lake Mills 33.

The Indians again took first place in all the running events. But in the field events the Indians yielded first in the shot to Masche of Lake Mills with a toss of 33' 3½" which was exactly one foot better than second, which was taken by Brenda Fuller of Kewaskum. The high jump was a bit disappointing for Kewaskum where they earned only one point by Sue Bade, while Petruska of Lake Mills won the event with a fine leap of 5' 2". Petruska is the defending state champ in this event. In the long jump Amy Nigh had her best jump of the season to take first for the Indians with a jump of 15' 3¼".

Katie Lightner again was a double winner, first in the 45m. low hurdles where she beat defending low hurdle state champ Claas with a time of 7.4. Katie also won the 45m. dash. The Wilson sisters were both victorious, frosh Wendy in the mile with a time of 6:11.3 and senior Barb in the 800m. run with a 2:40.8. Julann Zemlicka won the 200 with a 28.8. Carol Schmidt in the 3200m. run with a 13:35.2 and the 8 and 16 lap relay units were both victorious.

The girls then enjoyed a potluck at Coach Fifrck's home. Their next meet was on Tuesday, March 24, against Plymouth.

Record breaking performances topped the boys' 61-57 victory over Lake Mills. They were Jeff Decker and Jim Geldreich.

Decker set a new 200 indoor mark of 25.3 and his 20-5 in the long jump established a new Kewaskum indoor record. Decker also aided the 800 meter relay squad of Perry Kempf, Mike Paul and Stuart Stautz to win and in .2 of a second better than their previous time.

Decker went 6-2 in the high jump, tying his best and the school's best outdoor record and setting a new indoor mark. He also ran the 45 meter dash, taking a second with a time of 6.1.

Kempf doubled in both hurdle events and Scott Klein took two seconds in the 800 and 1600 meter runs.
