# West Bend Cleans Up After Devastating Tornado Kills 3, Injures 51; Damage Estimated Over \$10 Million

When the sun came up Saturday morning, it revealed the tragic results of the devastating tornado which hit West Bend's northwest side at approximately 12:02 a.m. that morning. The storm, which left death and destruction in its path, claimed the lives of three people, injuring 51, six still hospitalized Wednesday morning, one in serious condition, and between 10 and 15 million dollars in property damage. Approximately 36 homes were completely demolished with another 47 homes sustaining varying degrees of damage. At least 45 vehicles were demolished and 19 damaged. Four boats and two campers were also destroyed.

West Bend Mayor Jack Pick stated Moraine Park Technical Institute alone had received approximately \$4 million in damage.

Killed in the tornado were: Scott Schlefke, 10, of 1520 Roosevelt Drive, whose body was found beneath the ruins of his home by a squad of firefighters, of which his father, Ronald, was a part; Eugene Dunn, 52, of 2016 Green Tree Road, whose body was found in a field; and Ida Nolan, Milwaukee, whose body was found nearby in a basement. Pearl Dunn, Nolan's daughter and Dunn's wife, were also among the injured.

Among the injured were Mrs. Gerald (Cheryl) Wagner, 29, fair condition; Chad, 3, good condition; Wanda, 7, fair condition, and Vicki, 11, fair condition. All are of 1516 Roosevelt Drive. All were hospitalized with Mrs. Wagner scheduled to be released Wednesday. Mrs. Wagner is the daughter of Mr. Mrs. Harold Justy

near 18th Avenue. The twister then crossed the subdivision that includes parts of Jefferson, Roosevelt, Sunset Ridge, Patricia Drive and Greentree, and then continued across Hwy. 45 into Young America, northeast of West Bend.

A West Bend policeman, one of the first on the scene, said, "It's just amazing that so few were killed or hurt in this thing. Considering that it hit just after midnight, there should've been at least a hundred people killed and many more injured.

There was extensive damage to Moraine Park Technical Institute on Hwy. 45 just north of West Bend. Walls collapsed and much of the roof was torn away. Five hundred fulltime and 1,800 part-time students who attend classes were affected. It is questionable whether the 45,000-square foot structure is repairable or will have to be torn down. No classes could be held this week.

The tornado hit without warning. The police department received two phone calls simultaneously at 12:08 a.m. and emergency sirens were sounded but by that time the storm had already pushed through along its path of destruction.

As the tornado traveled northeast, reports of damage in the Boltonville area were received. A farmer on Hwys. 144 and A reported damage to his barn, home and cap on one of his silos. A farm on Hwy. H and Boltonville Road had part of the roof torn off a pole barn. Farmington Elementary School received damage to the roof area located over the gym. There were also scattered reports of damage in the Town of Wayne, Campbellsport, St. Kilian, Kiel, St. Anna and other points in surrounding areas.

Margaret Seideman, Kewaskum, a nurse who was on duty at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, Friday night noted you have an emergency plan for treating disaster victims and you hope you never have to use it, but Friday night that plan was put into action. Seideman said things fell into place as victims began arriving at the hospital. The most seriously injured were treated and admitted to the hospital. By 4:00 most of the less seriously injured had been treated and released.

Cleanup operations began immediately and earlier this week most of the tornado cleanup had been completed as residents, neighbors, relatives and

crews and other trucks worked continuously hauling away debris scattered over the section. West Bend police, assisted by police from many other cities and villages, kept the area

closed, allowing only residents and authorized people into the damage area.

On Saturday, Gov. Lee Dreyfus declared a state of emergency for areas hit by savage storms, including West Bend.

# **Ogi Elected to School Board on** Write-in Vote; Brigham, Goeden Win

In a surprise outcome, Dr. Charles Ogi, who was not a candidate for re-election, was swept back into office as a Kewaskum School Board member by a write-in vote in

Tuesday's election. Out of three school board Kewaskum with 366, followed by Goeden with 349, Schlice 282, McFadden 281, Ogi 248 and Horner 122.

# Village-Town Consider Joint Radio System

A plan for a village-town mobile radio system was presented to the Village Board Monday evening.

George Allmann, Town of Kewaskum Chairman, told the board such a plan had been discussed previously but not definite decisions had been made. Allman felt the radio system would benefit everyone concerned by having one base unit to handle both the village and town radio bands. Purchase of mobile units for the town and village trucks seem to be the only major purchases required. Police Chief Don Hlavaty stated he still had the base and municipal license from the Police Department's old radio system. He felt these could be used for this joint hook-up. The board assigned the project to the Public Works Committee for further investigation.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer and Village Administrator Dan Schmidt -presented the Plan. Commission's proposed TIF Project List covering the eight high priority projects the commission would like to see developed through TIF in the village. Schmidt told the board these projects along with several lower priority items had been forwarded to Dan Thompson for incorporation in his Feasibility Report.

Rohrer informed the board that backstop fencing work at the Kiwanis Park along with 200 feet of baseline fencing installation had been completed.

Park fees for the use of kitchen and shelter facilities have been revised for 1981. Charges for River Hills Park kitchen will be \$25.00 per day, the shelter building will also be \$25.00 per day. If people wish to use both buildings, the cost would be \$50.00 per day. Due to increased costs, there will no longer be a \$10.00 refund as in past years. Use of the Kiwanis Park shelter will cost \$10.00 per day with no refunds.

On the recommendation of

Chief Hlavaty, the board denied a request for a stop sign on the corner of Pleasantwood and Lazy Lane. Hlavaty felt a stop sign would only result in creating a raceway. Without a sign, drivers on both streets will be required to use added caution.

President Gerald Stollenwerk reminded the board that April has been designated "Recylcing Month" and he urged everyone to support the Junior Woman's and Lions Clubs in their recycling efforts.

Commissioner Bill Martin told the board there will be two public hearings scheduled for April 20. The first hearing will cover the Exodus House expansion.

A hearing will also be held on the tavern license application of James Rinas, who plans on taking over operation of Flynn's Tavern.

Donald Stoffel was elected chairman to succeed Roger Schlief. He received 332 votes to 73 for Arthur Zahn. Incumbent Ervin Seifert (225) was re-elected supervisor, together with Kenneth Jandre (190). They defeated Roger Schleif (168) and David Flitter (146). Incumbent Camilla Butzke beat Ruth Ramthun for clerk 287 to 119. Incumbent Elmer Krueger won over Norman Heberer for treasurer, 262 to 147. Merle Laatsch defeated George Peterson for constable, 237 to 132. A total of 410 votes were cast.

#### TOWN OF FARMINGTON

Although there was no opposition, 303 voters turned out in the Town of Farmington, probably due to the school board race. Chairman John "Jack" Theusch received 280 votes, supervisors Eugene Laatsch and Carl Hauch 262 and 251, treasurer Kenneth Ramthun 283, Clerk Joaine Oneska 267 and constable Richard Laufer Hall.

In state balloting, incumbent State Superintendent of Schools Barbara Thompson was defeated by Herbert Grover. Unofficial returns in 2,569 of 3,450 wards gave Grover 323,652 votes to 250,181 for Thompson.

Of the five referendum questions voted on, the "yes" votes won out.





Short course students can earn two-, three-, or four-year certificates.


White says 237 students attended at least one term this session, marking a new enrollment high in the recent history of the program.





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

# **Kewaskum Teachers Present 1981-82 Contract Proposal**

Robert Getter, negotiator for the Kewaskum Education Association, met Wednesday evening with the school district's negotiating committee to present his union's contract proposal for 1980-82.

With recent settlement of KEA's 1980-81 contract, negotiators are back to the bargaining table in an effort to work out new contract terms.

Getter told the meeting his group is seeking a two-year contract, with a 13.5% increase raising a teacher's base pay from \$11,100 to \$12,600, and 1982-83 salaries aligned to the cost of living index, going up the index rate plus 2%

Other requests include an increase from one to two personal days which would allow teachers to conduct personal business, plus early retirement with benefits from 62-65 if employed by the district for ten years.

If accepted, the two-year proposal would cost the district" approximately 17% more than the present contract.

The school district, which is also proposing a two-year contract, did not offer a salary increase, but instead presented a 6% across the board increase which would include salaries and benefits.

Other changes proposed by the school district included reduction of child care leave to eight weeks. Presently teachers can take leave to the end of the year. Dropping evaluation of teachers as provided for in the teacher's contract, making it a function of board policy and eliminating the \$200 damages teachers must pay when breaking their contract. Business Manager Bob Borch noted the district can always take them to court for breaking a contract.

Substitute teachers would be granted full pay and benefits if they had been employed by the district for 60 continous days. Present contract requirements are only 20 days.

The two groups will meet for further negotiations on April 20, but future bargaining sessions will be closed to the public.

### **Board of Education** Meeting on Monday

The Board of Education of the School District of Kewaskum will hold its regular monthly meeting on Monday, April 13, 1981. Beginning at 8:00 p.m., the meeting will be held in the district administrative offices.

The request of Michael and Sandra Bodden to transfer their property from the Kewaskum to the Lomira district will be considered and acted upon by the Board.

Formal ratification of the 1980-81 agreement with the KEA will be on the agenda. The Board will also consider a position to take on an upcoming proposed WIAA constitution change dealing with conference realignment.

Approval of payroll and vouchers payable, staff for the annual kindergarten screening, accepting of some teacher resignations effective at the end of the school year and appointment of Board members to participate in graduation will be on the agenda. The Board will also consider items to be sold at auction, a date for the annual meeting and ordering supplies. Miscellaneous items which arise will also be considered.

A closed session will be held following the regular meeting to take a look at possible bus contract costs for 1981-82.

# **35 KHS Students Advance to** State in Solo, Ensemble Contest

## Petri Supports Bill **To Make Nine-Digit** Zip Code Voluntary

Congressman Tom Petri has given his support to a bill that insures that the proposed ninedigit zip code will be a voluntary, rather than mandatory, system.

Petri has co-sponsored the bill, which was introduced by Congressman Edward Derwinski, the ranking Republican member on the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee.

"A great many people are concerned that they will have to add four digits to their zip code to have their mail processed,' Petri said. "While the Postal Service has insisted that use of the longer zip would never be mandatory, this bill is designed to guarantee that the Postal Service will keep that commitment.'

The Postal Service has planned to implement the new zip code by June 1.

'The idea behind this bill,'' Petri said, "is to make sure that the Postal Service doesn't stick the people with a mandatory



Be leary of the itinerant contractor who shows up at your door using high pressured sales tactics. Contact your local building inspector to make sure the contractor is reputable, ask for references, get at least three estimates from different contractors and get a written contract.

The contract should contain the name and address of the company; if the contractor will hire subcontractors, be sure to get their names on the contract. The contract should include a description of everything you are paying for, the total price of the job, and starting and com-
