the Budget Committee's first meeting Wednesday evening were presented with a letter starting the problems and goals which will be faced by the goup in an effort to create a reasonable and sound budget for the Kewaskum School District.

Preliminary 1981-82 figures show a budget of \$4,568,754.00, an increase of 17.1% over 1980-81. It is proposed that \$335,000 to \$350,000 be cut from this figure.

Superintendent Floyd Brenholt explained that a preliminary computer printout of budget requests was in. He felt this contained errors, duplication of requests or several people requesting the same item which would eventually be weeded out, accounting for

increase limit (excluding gas and oil costs which would raise the limit to 9%). Approximately \$30,000 of the \$250,000 has already been eliminated by the board's staff reductions. It is felt another \$15,000 will be cut through staff turnover. Cutting one bus run and the Campbellsport route would also be part of the cut down to 8%. The result is another \$205,000 which still must be cut from the budget.

Brenholt told the meeting, after a preliminary review, it appears we can hold the budget to 8% through cuts in supplies, equipment and possible staff changes. Brenholt stated a 1% reduction amounts to about \$40,000.00 being cut from the budget.

School Board President John

School Board member-elect Tom Brigham asked Brenholt, 'you feel 8% is rock bottom to continue programs then?" Brenholt stated "if you feel after we've made our cuts there's still some fat, you could really be hurting the pro-grams." Committee member Richard Theusch stated "another big factor we have to consider is salaries which are presently under negotiation." Brigham commented what you want this committee to do is come up with cuts over and above those which the staff will present.

Tessar felt the board should also look ahead to closing the Administration Building and moving the offices to the high

more individual attention to its students as well as being close to home. Another parent stated, the windows would have to be boarded up, noting that if you've purchased lumber lately you know a sheet of plywood "isn't cheap," and the district would still have to maintain the building. Parents asked what it would cost if the school had to be re-opened should Beechwood's population increase again. Brenholt noted population forecasts show a steady decrease in population through 1985 and the other schools would probably be able to handle any increase. It was noted that Beechwood is operating at only 45% capacity now.

Parents concerned with private school busing asked how many students would be affected by dropping their busses. Brenholt noted 96 students in the Kewaskum, Beechwood, and Newburg area are now being transported. Martin Haack, a parent, noted the school board is talking about an \$8,000 cut, but actually cutting the busses would result in only a \$4,000 saving since part of the cost is funded. Another parent stated "how do you justify putting 96 cars on the road as far as energy conservation." Haack stated "I think safety on the bus would be much greater

than in a car." One parent suggested combining private school routes with West Bend's routes, noting it had been done in previous years. Tessar said the possibility would be checked out

On staffing changes, Richard Theusch stated he wanted his position regarding dropping of the high school assistant principal position clarified. Theusch noted that through some very bad mis-information, people in the district thought he was recommending the dismissal of Roy Esser. "This was just not the case. My suggestion was made during a personnel meeting, from which the inaccurate information apparently got started. The board had heard a rumor, that has since become fact, that one ag teacher would be resigning. AMPI Delegates Firm on Price **Supports at Annual Meeting**

MINN., MINNEAPOLIS, April 13, 1981 ... Most of the nation's dairy co-ops are willing to compromise on lower price supports, but not dairy farmer members of the nation's' largest, Associated Milk Producers, Inc.

Representing 30,000 dairy farmers in 20 states, 612 delegates reaffirmed a long-standing policy of seeking supports at 80 to 90% of parity, Saturday, April 11, in Minneapolis at the windup session of the co-op's annual meeting.

Delegates also took action on 86 resolutions that shape co-op policy and programs for the coming year.

An attempt from the floor to amend the support price re-solution to 75% rather than 80% failed with a near unanimous vote.

Two congressmen warned that even a 75% support level faces tough sledding as the new 4-year farm bill is being put together.

Kill your marginal cows before they kill you politically and financially, advised Tom Har-kin, D-Iowa, and Tom Hagedorn, R-Minn., ranking majority and minority members of the subcommittee on dairy, poultry and livestock.

Both called mounting dairy surpluses "a liability," but admitted the vagaries of the weather could turn them into a "national asset" over night.

AMPI delegates endorsed a resolution urging producers to manage milk production "in accordance with utilization." AMPI urges members to 'cautiously review expansion plans.'

Delegates were urged "to consider a 1% of gross pay price as a minimum level of dairy promotion contributions.'

Wisconsin could raise \$27 million annually if such a program were implemented, compared to nearly \$2.5 million in 1980



State park and forest group camps vary in size, with the most common group camp large enough to accommodate between 75 and 100 campers. Outdoor group camp facilities at the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest can accommodate about 1,000 campers

DNR park officials emphasize that group camps are not just for youth, but for adult groups as well, and are available at 23 state parks and forests.

Advance outdoor group camp reservations may be made up to one year before the beginning. of the camping date. Groups interested in advance reservations should pick up a group camp reservation application from the Madison office of the DNR, DNR district headquarters or any state park or state forest office. Complete information on the location of group camps, rates and camping accommodations are listed on the registration form.

"Since many group outings require extensive planning, reservations early in the season are highly recommended. Thorson said, "and it is a good idea for groups wishing to reserve a group campground to contact the park superintendent by telephone first. This advance discussion is important in that it provides both the group leaders and the park officials the opportunity to determine the com-



patibility of the campground to the experience or planned program of the group. Some group campgrounds can accommodate tents only," Thorson added, "and it's important that prospective campers know this in advance.

Also, modern indoor group camp accommodations are available at Wyalusing State Park, and the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. Reservations for these are accepted also, but only from groups using the facilities for conservation education purposes. A rustic indoor group camp facility is available at Devil's Lake State Park.
