Ernie Mitchell to Retire

School Board Vetoes Beechwood School Closing by Unanimous Vote

On a unanimous 7-0 vote Monday evening, the Kewaskum School Board voted against closing the Beechwood Elementary School.

The Beechwood closing, though not actually recommended, was being considered as a possible way to cut a substantial sum (approximately \$40,000) from the district's 1981-82 budget.

Several parents voiced their feelings regarding next year's budget. Of the over 90 people present, 90% appeared to be against the areas being considered for cuts. One parent commented he felt the district was doing a decent job of providing the children with a good education, but rather than making cuts, he felt there were more things the district could and should be doing to provide an even better education. The

parent stated one thing the board should consider was a program for gifted and talented students. Another parent stated, "I want a good education for my child as well as those of other parents, they are our future."

School Board member Charles Ogi again presented his eight recommendations, noting he would like to see definite action on three during the meeting. In reply to Ogi's recommendation to eliminate the Elementary Guidance Counselor, a parent stated, "I think he helps our children become a whole person, not just a brain." Ogi commented the classroom teacher should handle any guidance as they know the students the best. Several teachers spoke out noting they do general counseling, but when a specific and difficult problem arises, it was not possible to give individual attention and this is where the Guidance Counselor comes in. He is able to give personal

attention to students as well as parents if the need presents itself

Mr. Dickinson, the Elementary Guidance Counselor, commented even he felt limited, "I don't have as much time as I would like."

A motion to drop the guidance position was defeated by a 4-3 vote. Ogi suggested elimination of one teacher aide. A concerned parent stated, "if parents are volunteering their own time as additional teacher aides, how can we eliminate a position that appears to be needed." One Farmington School aide stated "none of the board members except Mrs. Goeden has ever been to the schools to see what aides do." Ogi's motion died for lack of a second

Dr. Ogi motioned to eliminate a secretary. Superintendent Brenholt noted these people all have specific duties and it would be almost impossible to shift them around and still



Shaking a small baby can lead to whiplash, brain damage, and even death, because an infant's head is relatively heavy and the neck muscles are weak. Many battered babies' are actually shaken babies,' reports Dr. John Caffey of Pittsburgh Univ. School of Medicine.

Many parents who would never strike an infant, may shake it in what they mistakenly think is 'harmless' punishment. Dr. Caffey says 'Shaking may cause repeated bleeding within the head and eyes, leading to permanent disorders such as cerebral palsy, mental retardation, and vision impair-





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

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

Local Residents Badly Injured in Crash Fatal to 2

A woman from Newburg and a man from West Bend were killed Thursday and four others seriously injured in an accident at the intersection of State Hwy. 145 and County Trunk G.

Killed were Yvonne M Amundson, 33, of 1630 E. Decorah Road, Newburg, who suffered head injuries and a broken neck, and Allen A. Barwick, 35, of 1356 Wayne Road, West Bend, who sustained head injuries.

According to police, the two were in a van driven by Barwick that was southbound on County G when it collided with a pickup truck. The truck, driven by Michael E. Bingen, 27, of 8289 Sunset Circle, Kewaskum, was apparently northbound on State

Bingen was taken to Community Memorial Hospital in Menomonee Falls where he was listed in serious condition after the accident with a fractured spine. His son, Adam, 3, was listed in critical condition with multiple fractures. Both had been pinned in the truck.

Two other passengers in the Barwick van, Charlene E. Barwick, 34, and David A. Barwick, 11, were also taken to the same hospital. Mrs. Barwick sustained fractures and David a possible concussion.

Police at first said details of the accident were unclear as there were no witnesses and police had not been able to talk to any of the victims.

The two deaths raised the Washington County fatality count to 12 thus far in 1981.

accomplish all the necessary recordkeeping and office work required in the various schools. Brenholt stated "it would be like trying to run eight busses with seven drivers." Elimination of the secretary position also died for lack of a second to Ogi's motion.

School Board President John Tessar asked the board to delay any decisions regarding the Business Manager and Assistant Principal positions as the board had received a teacher resignation and a request from a principal asking he be relieved of his duties. Tessar felt these staff changes should be studied before any additional recommendations were made. The board voted 5-2 to delay action on these two positions along with the Industrial Arts teacher contract.

In reference to Ogi's recommendation of combining Special Education classes, and elimina-tion of two Special Ed positions, Brenholt stated people from the Department of Public Instruction were in the school recently and they would not recommend the approval of combining classes due to the large number of students. Instead, they recommended addition of one more special education aide.

Board member Richard Theusch explained how elimination of seven busses might be accomplished. Theusch noted that parents have commented they do not wish to have their children ride the busses for more than 45 minutes. This results in busses carrying approximately 51 students. If the busses left filled to a capacity of 66, this would eliminate the added busses. Theusch noted, however, the board still had not

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heard from the bus company if the plan was even feasible.

Board member Tom Brigham made a motion to initiate the concept of a \$10.00 per student/per year user fee for extra curricular activities with the administrative staff recommending fees and activities. The motion passed 7-0.

Brigham also recommended that parochial busing, the athletic program for boys and girls, full-day kindergarten and busing be put on the agenda for the May 11 meeting. A program for gifted students will be on the Budget Committe's meeting agenda scheduled for May 15.

Business Manager Robert Berch asked the board for permission to increase lunch prices effective May 1. Single lunches would increase from 95c to \$1.00, elementary from \$3.75 to \$4.25, and grades 7-12 from \$4.00 to \$4.50. The request was denied. Borch noted that without these increases the lunch program might end up with a \$1,000-\$2,000 deficit at the end of the year. Borch also informed the board, meals would probably be \$1.35 next year if President Reagan's proposal to drop reimbursement entirely goes through and school commodities are reduced. It was noted the number of lunches being served had dropped from over 156,000 as of March 1 last year, to 140,148 as of March this year. Borch commented, "I think you're going to lose a lot of people next

The board denied a request of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Bodden to transfer their property from Kewaskum to the Lomira School

The board approved a request to have a Japanese student attend school next year through the "Youth for Understanding" program.

The board accepted end of the semester resignations from Ernie Mitchell, high school, and Mrs. Ann Glish, Farmington School.

Plan Commission Hears Preliminary Report on TIF District at Meeting

By GERRY MUELLER Statesman Staff Writer

At Tuesday evening's meeting, Dan Thompson, of Acting Associates, presented the Plan Commission with preliminary facts and figures for a proposed Tax Incremental Financing District in the Village of Kewas-

Using Kewaskum's 1980 equalized tax values, Thompson stated his early calculations show the areas (135 different tax parcels) being considered for inclusion in the district would generate a construction loan value of approximately 1.25 to 1.50 million dollars. (TIF loan payments are spread over a twenty year period).

Thompson reminded the commission these figures are an estimate, since actual equalized value figures for 1981 probably would not be available until possibly June.

Thompson felt the 1.5 million dollar figure was fairly accurate at this time since there will be about another 2.0 million dollars added to the 1982 tax rolls from new construction including the shopping center, condominiums and the elderly housing projects.

Plan Commission member Bob Kirst commented whether it was even worth going into a TIF district worth 1.5 million dollars, when one project alone, extension of Reigle Drive, is anticipated to cost 1.0 million

dollars itself. Thompson felt it

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted that the four top priority projects in the TIF plan list were well within the \$1.5 million figure. These included the water line loop to Milan Drive, Well No.3, and the interceptor sewer or public parking lot. These are projects which the village will have to develop in the near future, if not through TIF then through general obligation bonds and tax levies.

Thompson noted this is one reason he would suggest a Project Plan List ranging between 2 to 2.5 million dollars. He stated the board and commission members must make one point very clear to the public regarding this 2 million dollar figure, this being the fact that although you have a 2 million dollar price tag on your list, it does not mean that this is what the village will be spending. It simply provides many different projects at various cost levels from which the village can make its selections for actual construction within the 1.5 million dollars

Having a project list containing several options allows for any changes. In the event one project is dropped for one reason or another, the village would be able to replace it with another project from the list. Thompson again emphasized

the fact it is easy to drop any project if it has been included in the TIF Project List when the district is submitted for approval, but almost impossible to add a project once the district has been approved and goes into effect.

Thompson stated "the project list does not obligate the village to carry out all the projects."

Thompson noted it is hoped as a district develops, it will provide added increment funds allowing for development of more projects.

In closing his presentation, Thompson informed the commission there is a bill presently pending in Madison which could have a serious effect on Kewaskum's proposed district. Senate Bill No.198 would restrict vacant land area to 25% of the district. Kewaskum's would exceed that as 37 of the 135 parcels in the proposed district are vacant at the present time. Should this bill be passed, it would reduce Kewaskum's district considerably.

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

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



Prospects Good for Opening of Fishing Season on May 2

Prospects are bright for opening of Wisconsin's 1981 fishing season, according to James Addis, director of the Bureau of Fish Management, DNR. The season will open May 2 at one minute past midnight for warm water fish and at 5:00 a.m. for trout.

Addis said water levels are good to excellent in most lakes and streams throughout the state. Water in the Chippewa flowage is a little low but is rising and should be at a good level by opening day.

All lakes are ice-free; most have been for several weeks. Above normal temperatures during most of the past several weeks have warmed waters to a higher degree than usual for this time of year. This means most species will have finished spawning and will be ready to resume normal feeding activities. Anglers would do well to look for action where they usually would try two or three weeks later in the year rather than in traditional opening day spots.

Traditional winter-kill lakes have not had die-offs for the past couple of years due to mild winters and should provide excellent fishing.

Anglers are asked to keep the fishing regulations folder they receive this year for use next year also since it lists regulations for both 1981 and 1982. Publishing the folders to cover a Sunday, May 3 - Saukville, two year period is being done as a cost saving measure.
