Ball Diamonds to Be Dedicated Developer Asks Village to Reconsider Parks Fee to Elderly Housing Project

Peter Knaup, developer of Meadow Creek Apartments, appeared before the Kewaskum Village Board Monday evening requesting elimination of the \$200.00 per unit parks fee assessed against his 25-unit elderly housing complex. Knaup said the Wisconsin Housing Finance Authority would not accept this as a cost in the construction of these units. Knaup told the board if these fees were not dropped, he would have to pay this \$5,000 out of his own pocket. Knaup hoped the board would help him convince WHFA to cover this cost

Knaup told the board he had submitted his building plans to plexes, one at Green Lake and the other at Kewaskum. Knaup

noted due to different construction costs and labor scales, the Kewaskum complex would cost \$125,000 more than Green Lake. However, WHFA financing aid would be the same for both projects. Two major cost factors were', Kewaskum wages would have to be paid according to Milwaukee Metropolitan scale which would mean a salary of \$16.06 per hour for a carpenter whereas the Green Lake project would be paying \$7.50 per hour. Also, trusses on the Green Lake units would be \$5,000 while Kewaskum's would run \$12,000.

Knaup commented WHFA feels the structures should cost the same anywhere across the state and will not take into consideration higher construc-WHFA for two identical com-, tion and labor costs. Faced with this problem, Knaup told the board, it may be necessary to

make some changes in the building plans to bring the costs within budget limits. Knaup hoped he would be able to get WHFA to reconsider their stand. If not, Knaup felt changes would have to include removal of central air conditioning and going with room air in the community room. He would also have to shorten community room and lobby space. Changing units within the building would also have to be considered. WHFA is allowing 750-775 square feet per unit, but the Kewaskum units have been designed for 1,100 square feet per unit. Knaup told the board he wanted them to "know all the facts right up front" and the problems he was facing. Knaup stated "I don't want somebody to say you showed us one thing and gave us another.'

The proposed Meadow Creek apartments will contain 24 units for elderly or handicapped plus one manager's unit. Two other buildings will contain 12 units for single parent and lowincome families.

The board unanimously voted to keep the \$200 per unit Parks and Recreation fee, but deferred payment of it for two years.

In other action, the board approved a motion requesting the Department of Transportation place the Main Street bridge on its priority list for replacement and repair. It was noted although the bridge is safe and not in need of immediate replacement, erosion and settling is occurring. There is a backlog of bridge work and it probably would be several years before the DOT got to the bridge, making it a good idea for Kewaskum to get on the priority list now.

Jeff Rohrer, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee informed the board a program dedicating Kewaskum's new baseball diamonds to Regal Ware has been scheduled for 9:00 a.m. May 23 at Kiwanis Park. The program will also include a flag ceremony. Protection and Public Safety Chairman Raynor Herriges said his committee was looking into the possibility of a parking limit at the intersection of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue. The board recommended a parking restriction from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday on Fond du Lac Avenue, which would allow right turns. Police Chief Hlavaty felt this would help the congestion problem. Herriges said he would discuss the matter with the business owner concerned with this area.

Village Retains Special Attorney For Shopping Center Litigation

On the recommendation of Kewaskum's legal advisors, McKenna and Kiefer, the village at a special meeting Wednesday afternoon approved the hiring of Charles O'Meara, West Bend, as their special attorney in possible legal action by the KEWA Shopping Center.

The law firm of McKenna and Kiefer requested the village work with another attorney since their firm is representing several other parties in actions against the shopping center and they felt there may be a conflict of interests.

Due to several legal problems which have arisen, the village has denied an Occupancy Permit for the building until all problems and claims are settled, either privately or through legal action.

The Board voted unanimously 5-0, to retain O'Meara. Trustees Paul Blumer and Dave Nigh were absent.

This year's 8th annual Arts Show will be held at the Kewaskum High School on Thursday, May 14, at 6:00 p.m. in the old gym.



cluded alto solos by Jama Jacak and Debbie Schmidt, a sopranoalto duet (Julie Dettmann, Tracy Coulter), the mixed quartet (Patti Sleger, Darcie Schmidt, Ken Fellenz, and Scott Nigh), and the triple trio (Debie Schmidt, Laurie Steiner, Mary Straub, Annette Jandre, Denise Anderson, Sue Schuette, Denise Jacobs, Mary Sleger, and Collen Shaw).

The cornet-trombone duet (Debbie Schlice, Ken Scott) and Patti Sleger's oboe solo both received thirds.

Many of the above groups had piano accompaniments played by Mrs. Judith Jacak, Mrs. Margaret McFadden, or Dave Bertelsen.

The special trio of Patti Sleger, Paul Anderson, and Julie Dettmann received a second. They played "Once, a Stream Called," a piece written by Patti's older sister Constance, who is a music major at St. Scholastic College, Duluth, Minnesota.

'She's been wanting me to do something of hers for a long time now," said Patti, explaining why she chose to do the

piece.

"The whole song, I would say," she continued, "is about how insignificant we are to nature ... and how easily we fade away." She emphasized that this was her own and not necessarily Constance's interpretation.

'Once, a Stream Called'' is the second of four songs which make up what Constance calls the "Bordeaux Cycle." It was named after the poet'G. Jake Bordeaux, to whose lyrics she composed the music.

Battle after battle had to be fought before the trio could advance to state. To begin with, the odd combination of soprano (voice), piano, and recorder (an ancient flute-like instrument) did not fall into any traditional category, and the original music was not on the list of recommended solo and ensemble music. Special written permission had to be obtained from Madison. (Thus, the term 'special trio'').

The first judge they played for, however, had his own feelings about the piece.

'He said it was too impressionistic; he couldn't judge it,' said Patti.

Patti talked to Kewaskum band director Larry Ammel about the judge's refusal. "He called the director at Kiel, and (the director) told him that they talked to the judge, and he still wouldn't give us a rating.'

After more phone calls to Madison, the trio received permission to try again at the choir's solo and ensemble contest two days later.

Problems continued to develop as conflicts arose for Laurie Lemke, who had been playing the recorder part. Laurie was unable to attend the contest on the new day, so with two days remaining, Patti switched from the vocal to the recorder part, and Julie Dettmann stepped in to learn the vocal part.

They received a I* rating at the second contest, allowing them to advance to state.

Patti was then faced with an extremely difficult situation: choosing between the original trio and the rearranged version. In the end it was decided that Both Laurie and Julie were



School Board to Meet on Monday





ing of 26 part-time summer employees for various departments in the village. Trustee Dave Nigh told the board this is five less than were hired last year. Of the 26 hired, all but three reside in the village. A summer employees meeting has been set for May 16 at 8:30 a.m. to review rules and regulations.

The board also voted to adopt Ordinance 81-5, covering sewer user charges and use. The board voted to increase the sewer connection charge from \$20.00 to \$200.00. In comparing Kewaskum's increase to other areas, Administrator Dan Schmidt said Allenton is now charging \$600, Slinger \$1,200, Cedarburg \$500, and Saukville \$1,400.

Schmidt told the board he would like to correct a rumor which was going around regarding Little League baseball. Schmidt stated "never has the Little League been denied access to the park or has the village ever considered charging Little League." 

This letter is in response to Mrs. Ruth Schmitt's letter to the editor which appeared in the West Bend News May 4th, entitled, "Now Is Not The Best Time For Kewaskum Sports Fee." Although I am not certain the same letter will appear in The Statesman, due to the factual errors contained therein and their potential impact on the tax-paying public of our school district, I feel obligated to respond.

First of all, the idea that approval of a boys' tennis team would be the reason for a user's fee is an error. The proposal regarding a tennis team is part of a plan which encompasses all athletic offerings and involves two changes from the status quo.

These include offering boys' tennis as a spring sport (which on a recent student survey

showed a potential participation number of 48) and combining boys' and girls' golf teams into a co-educational team with one coach. We do this now in cross-country. We had approximately 6 girls on the golf team last fall and on the student survey a potential number of 7 girls this fall.

In this proposed realignment, we are not increasing the number of coaching positions since the coaching position eliminated in golf will be assumed by a boys' tennis coach. We will get more participation per dollar spent, and no one will be eliminated from participating.

Secondly, Mrs. Schmitt stated that formation of a boys' tennis team will increase the budget \$1500 - \$2000. This is simply not true. With the above-mentioned plan, the cost will be approximately the same.

A third error involves Mrs. Schmitt stating that a fee will be charged to anyone participating in sports. The motion which was unanimously passed by the Board was acceptance of the concept of initiating a user's fee for extra-curricular activities. This includes sports, but also includes other co-curricular activities. A specific plan for implementing this user fee is to be developed by the administration for presentation to the Board.

The rationale for the user's fee is to help alleviate the burden on the taxpayer by having students who participate and benefit from extra-curricular programs pay a nominal annual fee.

Mrs. Schmitt's fourth error is assigning a monetary value of \$10.00 as being the determined amount of the user's fee. The amount has not been established and will be part of the forthcoming recommendation from the administration.

Her letter further states, 'Not every family will want to

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disclose their finances in order to waive a \$10.00 fee." I am recommending the same criteria be applied to a user's fee that is applied to students who presently receive school lunches at a reduced rate. This fee should in no way have the effect of limiting participation.

In summary, I feel these proposed changes are programmatically and budgetarily sound. As a school board member, it is my responsibility to recommend policy and fiscal outlay, and to provide the best educational and extra-curricular opportunities for students at a realistic cost. Included in this mission is an attempt to ensure the greatest utilization of our tax dollars for the greatest number of students.

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





Driving a 1980 No. 72 Camaro, Goeden earned \$775 for Sunday's finish and Saturday's qualifying heat.


