All-Day Kindergarten Out

Parochial Busing, Assistant Principal And Business Manager to Remain

At Monday evening's meeting, over 110 Kewaskum area parents listened to School Board members make still further recommendations for cutting the 1981-82 School Budget.

The item which appeared to have brought out the largest number of concerned parents was the proposed cut which would eliminate private school busing. Parents of private school students would then have been issued transportation contracts amounting to approximately \$167.00 per child. Tom Brigham, school board member, began the discussion noting it was one of his recommendations while campaigning for school board. Brigham felt the district would save approximately \$26,000 by dropping private school busses. Several parents disagreed with Brigham's figures stating actual savings would only be \$6,000 -7,000 (the district receives aid for almost half the busing cost) which is a drop in the bucket when the board had already vetoed a motion to close Beechwood School that would have supposedly saved the district

A private school parent noted, we're saving Kewaskum \$150,000 a year sending our children to parochial schools. Another parent stated ''we pay our taxes which help support the district and all we ask in return is the busses to take our children to school and now you want to deny us that.''

One parent addressed her comment to Brigham noting some private school parents have to pick up their kindergarteners and she wanted to know how he and all the other Kewaskum district parents would like it if they had to do

the same. She commented the district could probably save quite a few dollars on that busing alone, but I don't think the people would like the idea.

Board member Richard Theusch stated, "we've looked at the Beechwood closing and all-day kindergarten and dropped them, let's continue to keep busing these kids."

Board member Charles Ogi noted every meeting there is a different group of people here with their own interests. "I would like to see people come to all the meetings." One mother replied to Ogi's comment, "I was here two weeks ago for the first time and I went home so angry and frustrated that I will be at more meetings." Ogi stated "I wish you would be at every meeting so you can see how this board gets whipsawed."

Referring to West Bend's recent staffing cuts because of declining enrollment, a parent asked whether Kewaskum couldn't do the same. Superintendent Brenholt noted Kewaskum had already dropped two positions. He noted again comparing districts of similar size, Kewaskum was running on a budget about \$600,000 below the normal average. Brenholt stated West Bend would have to cut \$2,850,000.00 to get down to Kewaskum's present budget level. Board member Jerry Secor stated "I don't think we're going to save money, it just looks like we're trying to force people back into our community by dropping busing. The motion to drop private school busing was defeated 4-3.

When the board was asked if this decision was final, Board President John Tessar stated "if our budget is defeated in July, this board will have to sit down and decide where to cut; this could include Beechwood, all-day kindergarten and parochial busing. A parent commented "then we're not done with this yet." Tessar replied "you are until the Annual Meeting."

Other recommended cuts were the elimination of the Business Manager and Assistant Principal positions. Tessar stated, "I feel at this time these positions cannot be eliminated since contracts have been issued." Ogi noted he was still in favor of dropping the Business Manager position. Brigham noted legally the district would still have to honor the contracts and pay the salary. Theusch noted Ogi had been appointed to head the Staffing Committee last June and if he felt this and other cuts were necessary, he should have acted on them much earlier. Ogi then made a motion to drop the business manager position for 1982-83, seconded by Brigham. Brigham stated "I feel we could do well with a 1/2 time business manager and reading specialist combined under the title of Administrative Assistant. Theusch asked "would you allow 'an individual' who is Business Manager to qualify himself to fill this postion?' Theusch noted there has been no consideration of eliminating the Reading Specialist position. A parent asked if both the Business Manager and Reading Specialist are putting in full 8-hour days, how can you consider making them halftime, "its like comparing apples and oranges," is either qualified for the other's job. The motion to eliminate the Business Manager position was defeated 5-2.

Richard Theusch moved to drop the issue of Assistant Principal; there was no discussion.

On the subject of all-day kindergarten, Brenholt stated ''I don't feel we're in a position that we have to go to all-day







WORC Holds Creative Reading Discussion, Election of Officers

Members and guests of the Washington - Ozaukee Reading Council met at the Cedarburg Inn, Cedarburg, on May 5. Ms. Tia Bojar, Assoc. Prof. of Reading at Cardinal Stritch College addressed the group on Creative Reading. Ms. Bojar recently was selected as one of a team of U.S. educators who spent sixteen days with a team of educators in Russia. She briefly mentioned differences between U.S. and Russian schools. Russian schools serve the state. They maximize the utility of each individual student utility to the state. In the United States schools serve the individual student.

In her address on Creative Reading she stressed that all students who are average or above can reach creative thinking if they have become independent in the use of basic skills. Creativity is a high level thinking process. In order to help students into these higher levels of thinking, adults around the child, both parents and teachers, must be aware of the student's level of distractability, level of productivitity, ability to manage time, ability to make choices and his/her ability to self assess.

Children must be given time

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to formulate creative responses. Too often we expect an answer in seconds. Higher levels of thinking, synthesis and evaluation, take more time.

Creative Reading is the highest level of reading. It cannot exist without the ability to use the basic skills of reading independently. Basic skills of reading include the skills of listening. The use of A.V. materials and library skills are essential to creativity. Writing skills and reading skills can't be separated. In addition to the solid foundation of basic skills, situations must be set up to encourage creative thinking. Not only should children be asked to recall and repeat knowledge, they must be helped to think creatively.

Payments in Lieu of Taxes Sent by DNR

Recently 753 Wisconsin towns and municipalities with property managed by the Department of Natural Resources within their boundaries rereceived checks from the DNR totalling \$885,000, according to C.D. "Buzz" Besadny, DNR

Besadny said the payments, in lieu of taxes on state-owned lands, were made in accordance with state statutes on lands classified as State Forest lands, Game Management lands, Fish Management lands, Park lands and Central Wisconsin Conservation area leased lands.

The payment schedule which

determines how much the DNR pays each town and municipality is lengthy and complicated, but essentially results in a payment of at least 50c per

The payments were made from the following DNR funds: Fish Management - \$86,668; Wildlife Management - \$295,-151; Forestry Fund - \$309,968, and Park Fund - \$163,191.

In a letter to the municipal and town officials who received the payments, Besadny said: "These payments illustrate how local and state government can work together to perpetuate our outdoor heritage for ourselves and future generations. Funds for this payment are provided by the Outdoor Recreation Action Program (ORAP). The Legislature is currently considering renewal of ORAP, which began in 1959 under former Governor Gaylord Nelson and was enhanced in 1969 under former Governor Warren

The payments are made to reduce the impact on local property taxes when the state acquires land which is removed from the tax roll.

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
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To the Editor:

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

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30.



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
