\$6.2 Million Suit Filed

At a special Village Board meeting Thursday afternoon, the trustees voted unanimously to retain Charles O'Meara as legal counsel to represent Village Administrator Dan Schmidt and Building Inspector Henry Becker in a suit brought by KEWA Shopping Center against the Village.

Developers John Livesey and Dwight Ziegler have named the men both as individuals and Kewaskum Village employees in the \$6.2 million suit. Village President Gerald Stollenwerk stated he felt it was the village's responsibility to provide legal assistance since both men have conducted their activities according to the directions of the village board. Stollenwerk said he felt confident the men would not need the lawyer.

The case came before Judge Terence Evans of the Eastern District Federal Court Friday at 9:30 a.m. Prior to the hearing,

Evans met with attorneys for both sides in an unsuccessful pre-cut attempt to settle the situation. After hearing the case Judge Evans denied a request for Temporary Relief (an injunction that would have granted an occupancy permit).

United Foods, another prospective tenant, is disputing the terms of its 20-year lease and is attempting to withdraw because the center has not opened as scheduled.

Schmidt said last weekend that attorneys are attempting to work out an out-of-court settlement or mutual agreement. He noted that the Federal Court had set no further calendar date.

At Monday evening's regular board meeting, representatives of KEWA were to have been present, however, no one appeared. The board then went into closed session to discuss the case with their attorney and Ms. Patti Kurth, attorneys for Employers Mutual Casualty Insurance.

Kennelly Pharmacy Opens Without Occupancy Permit

Kennelly Pharmacy opened for business in its new store Tuesday even though a Federal Court decision has denied an occupancy permit to the KEWA Shopping Center in Kewaskum.

On the advice of his attorney, Kennelly co-owner Tom Leitzke began moving stock into the store and opened for business.

When the Statesman checked with Leitzke Wednesday morning regarding any legal action from the village, he stated he had received a letter informing him the store was in violation of

a village ordinance. He stated there probably would be some type of fine involved for opening without a permit.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated Wednesday that the pharmacy had opened without the village's knowledge or permission. When asked if the village was planning any legal action, Schmidt stated he could not comment at this time.

The Village Board had expected KEWA representatives at Monday evening's meeting to discuss some type of settlement, however, no one appeared.

Dates Set for Sale of Beach Passes, Lesson Registration

The Kewaskum beach will hold swimming pass sales and lesson registration for the 1981 summer on Saturday and Sunday, May 23 and 24, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.; Tuesday and Thursday, May 26 and 28, 3:00 to 8:00 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, May 30 and 31, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., and again on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, June 1, 2 and 4, from 3:00 to 8:00 p.m. The sale and registration will be held at the beach.

Prices for the season passes will be \$5.00 for village resident youths (17 and under), \$7.00 for resident adults, and \$19.00 for a resident family pass (two adults

and children). Non-village resident prices are double those of residents. Swimming lessons are free with a season pass for village residents and to non-village residents with a family pass. Non-village residents with individual passes (youth or adult) will pay \$3.00 per person extra if they wish to take swimming lessons.

The beach is scheduled to open for swimming on Saturday, May 30. Swimming hours will be limited to weekends until the grade schools recess for summer. The first session of swimming lessons is tentatively set to begin on Monday, June 15.

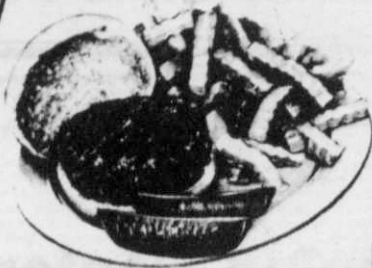

Confusion on Kiwanis Park Ball Diamonds Use Discussed

At Monday evening's Village Board meeting, Trustee Jeff Rohrer, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, tried to explain and clarify the situation regarding scheduling and use of the two permanent and one temporary ball diamonds at Kiwanis Park.

Rohrer noted that 29 teams, covering 454 people, have been scheduled for league play this summer. Some problems have arisen as all games have been scheduled for play at the park since the village, in an economy move, has decided not to maintain any other diamonds in the village.

The major comment from people representing the various leagues was the roughness of the temporary east diamond. Merle Miller and Harvey Ramthun were concerned for the safety of children in Little League, especially players in the infield. Rohrer asked if skinning the diamond and adding ground would help improve conditions. Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo thought this would help con-

siderably. It was noted there has been a steady drop in the number of kids playing hardball because they don't want to get hurt.

Rohrer stated "the village wants to benefit the whole community in whatever we do. There was no intent to slight anybody, we tried to give everybody a fair chance at the diamonds," adding however, the committee did not want to see a lot of work and money put into these diamonds if people were not going to make use of them. Rohrer noted a major problem in scheduling was the lack of lights. This would allow for more games on the permanent diamonds. However, there are no funds set aside in the budget for lighting at the present. Miller noted scheduling should be for the children

first and adults second.

Miller stated, "if we could run our concession again, this would help us with our lighting fund. A previous drive to collect \$1,000 for lights resulted in a contribution of only \$12.00."

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the meeting that the new concession stand had just been completed and letters to area organizations inviting them to operate the stand had gone out within the last few days.

In other business, the board voted unanimously to advertise for bids on the purchase of a new pumper truck. Bilgo noted the new truck would replace the 1950 Ford pumper which has been in operation for thirty years and is obsolete. On accepting a bid, delivery will not take place until 1982. Delivery time is approximately 6 to 9 months. The village has been budgetting \$20,000 annually for purchase of a new truck.

Trustee Dick Schmidt noted

the Highway Department had been out to check the Main Street bridge. It was found safe, however, the department is considering putting a new mat on the approaches and top of the bridge.

Trustee Raynor Herriges informed the board he had talked with Bill Kulas regarding the placement of "No Parking" signs on the corner of Main and Fond du Lac. Kulas said he had no objections. The board unanimously voted to install signs stating "No Parking 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday, except holidays." This would affect approximately five parking spaces from the corner, allowing for "right turns" during rush hours.

Village President Gerald Stollenwerk informed the board the trustees had received an invitation to participate in the Memorial Day parade from the Robert G. Romaine Post of the American Legion.

Village
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School Board Ponders Program For Gifted, Talented Students

George Allmann, District Reading Specialist, appeared before the Budget Committee of the Kewaskum School Board Thursday evening, with his proposed program for "Gifted and Talented" students.

Allmann began his presentation with a background into the method used in locating G and T students within a school system. Two basic tools are the IQ test with a rating of 128 or over and the Iowa Test results. Using these figures, he was able to locate 51 students on the elementary level which he felt fell into G and T category.

Allmann, along with several parents of gifted children, would like to see an "in house program" such as the Waukesha system set up in the Kewaskum School District. This would involve the hiring of a 1/2 time instructor who would work one day a week with grades 2 through 6. Students would remain within their own classrooms rather than leave to work with this teacher. The cost of this program would be approximately \$9,000 to \$10,000. Superintendent Brenholt informed the committee that the way funding stands at the present, the bulk of this might have to come from local taxes. He felt approximately \$4,000 would come from state aids and \$6,000 from local taxes. Brenholt noted the Title IV program is in question right now and he would not count on any help from there.

School Board President John Tessar commented the Budget Committee has been assigned the job of trimming the budget and Mr. Allman has presented a program which would add another \$10,000. Tessar stated, "I am thoroughly confused after looking at this literature tonight." Tessar noted one confusing issue that bothered him was, no two people he talked to gave the same definition as to what a "gifted and talented" child was. Tessar felt a G and T student would be one with an IQ

over 140 and "stood above those around him," but that differed from Allmann's criteria. On Allmann's figure of 51 gifted students, Tessar said, "I didn't think we had that many in the whole system."

Member Jean Goeden asked Allmann if the program could be implemented with staff we already have. Allmann felt it could not. Two parents, Mr. and Mrs. Allan Rinzel, stated it would cost them \$2,500 tuition, plus transportation, if they would have to send their child to a school having such a program. Principals Ken Erickson and Clark Pearson noted that classes and seminars have been set up in the Middle and High Schools for the advanced students. Brenholt noted "perhaps we never called them programs for gifted and talented, but the district has provided them." Pearson stated, "I don't think our good students have fallen by the wayside."

Tessar stated, "I'm going to look at this budget before I make any recommendations." Committee member Richard Theusch recommended the program be tabled for further consideration.

In considering other items, Theusch questioned whether it would be possible to save money by making changes in the hot lunch program. Namely, dropping it for the high school students. Business Manager Bob Borch informed Theusch the Federal Government requires hot lunch for all grade levels if school districts participate in the funding programs.

The Administrative Staff presented its recommendations for a User Fee on co-curricular activities as follows:

- 1) That the fee would be a one-time-per-year fee of \$10.00 if a student participates in one or more of the covered activities.
- 2) That there would be no exemptions from the required fee.
- 3) That the activities to be covered would include the following:

a) All those who participate in interscholastic athletics grades 7-12.

b) Anyone who performs (onstage during a performance) in a play or musical and who is attending the school putting on the performance.

c) All those in grades 7-12 who participate in forensics.

d) All those participating in interscholastic chess.

e) All those in grades 7-12 who participate as cheerleaders.

f) All those who participate in the high school jazz band.

g) All those who participate in high school swing choir.

h) All those who participate in high school intramural programs.

4) There would be no refunds made for any reason.

5) That no student will be allowed to practice or participate until the fee has been paid.

6) That, if the board adopts a user fee for co-curricular activities, it be reviewed after one year to determine the effect upon programs and student participation.

One parent asked if this \$10.00 fee could include the late bus, making these activities more accessible to the rural students. (Noting it had cost her \$250 transporting her child back and forth to participate in just one play). The staff stated including the cost of the bus would increase the fee substantially anywhere from \$20 to \$25.

When the committee was asked if this would be a hardship for some families, Theusch commented, "if these high school kids are really interested, they'll go out and earn this \$10.00, they don't have to

bother their parents."

A student asked if the user fee couldn't be set according to the activity's cost. Theusch noted it costs \$15,000 a year for football, that comes to \$200 per student. "At that rate, you wouldn't have anybody playing." Theusch said he would like to see a fee of \$15.00 for high school and \$5.00 middle school. The Budget Committee will present the User Fee at the next School Board meeting June 8.

Bob Borch presented summary budget figures as requested at the last budget meeting. The 1981-82 figures show an increase of 8.2% over the 1980-81 budget (not including fuels and debt retirement). The 1980-81 budget was \$3,899,475. The proposed 1981-82 budget is \$4,220,788. Including the cost of fuels and debt retirement, the district could be looking at a budget of \$4,918,356, an increase of 9.3%.

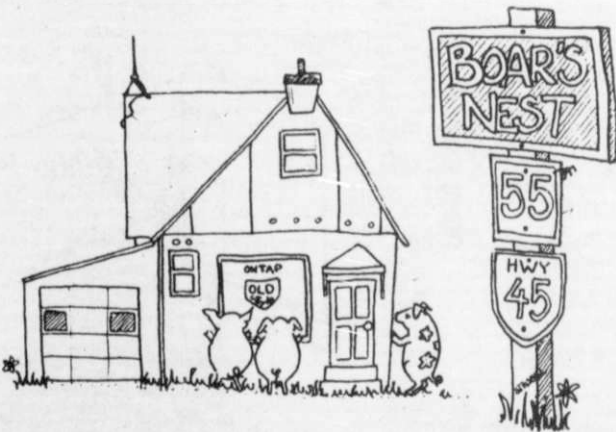

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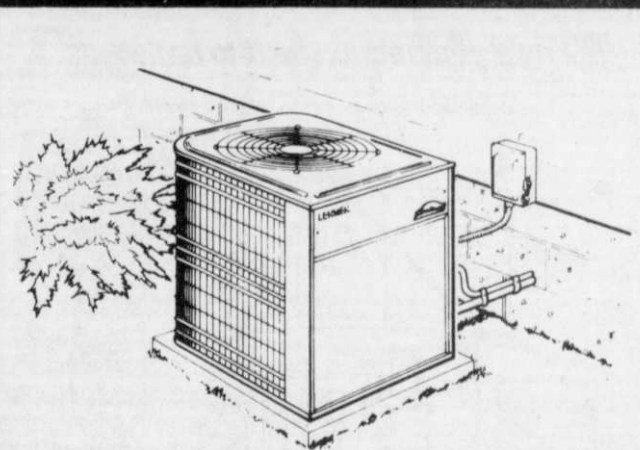
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Kewaskum Special Olympic Team Very Successful at Meet

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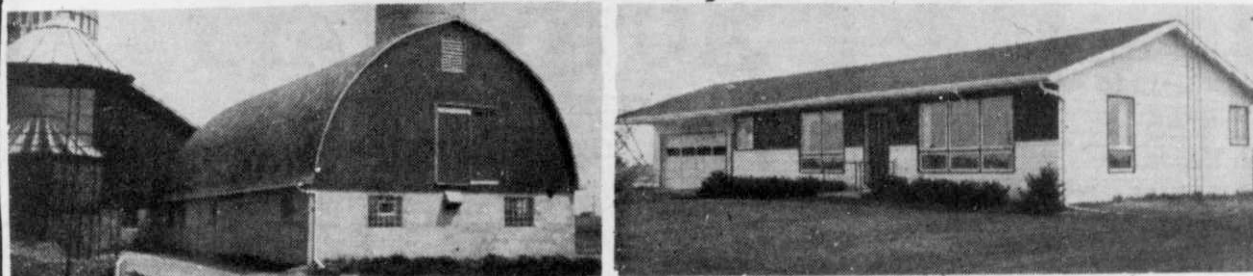

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. All Village Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of April 20, 1981, were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

Peter Knopp, developer of the proposed elderly housing project, reported to the Board that he is having trouble trying to justify some of the construction costs and fees to the State Housing Authority and requested that the village grant some relief in the area of the park and open space fee. He further stated that the project would definitely proceed after some adjustments have been made in the cost figures. The Board took the request under consideration.

The application of Herman Berndt for building permit for the construction of a one family residence at 1162 Kewaskum Street was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fees. The application, accompanied by State approved plans, of the Exodus Transitional Care Facility for a building permit for an addition to the existing facility at 1421 Fond du Lac Avenue was approved and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper permits upon payment of the required fees. Motion by Trustee Rohrer, seconded by Trustee R. Schmidt. Voice vote was unanimous.

It was the decision of the Board that Peter Knopp, the developer of the proposed elderly housing project, should be charged the regular park and open space fee but that such fees should be deferred for a

period of two years. Motion by Trustee D. Nigh, seconded by Trustee Herriges. Voice vote was unanimous.

The Administrator was authorized to obtain quotations for the revision and up-dating of the Municipal Code of Ordinances. Motion by Trustee Rohrer, seconded by Trustee Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

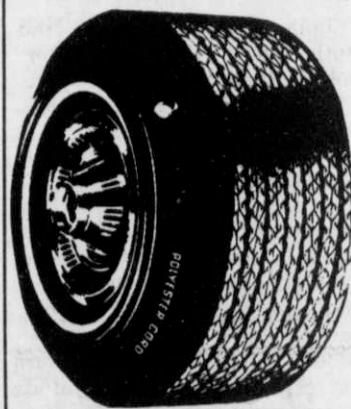
