School Board Adds Gifted and Talented Funds to 1981-82 Budget

After weeks of cutting and trimming, the Kewaskum School Board Monday evening made a surprise move by reversing its trend and adding \$10,000 to the 1981-82 budget.

Two board members, Tom Brigham and Charles Ogi, who have been the most vocal about seeing the budget lowered were the backers of a program for gifted and talented students which will increase the budget by \$10,000 to cover the cost of an additional teaching position and materials to operate the program.

School Board President John Tessar stated he was amazed at the attitude of the board saying, "in one breath you're talking cut, cut, cut, and now you want to add \$10,000."

One parent was upset that the G & T program was not going to be discussed. Tessar commented the program was presented, however, as a member of the Budget Committee, he would not recommend the program this year. School Board member Jerry Secor noted he was for the program, "if you stand pat and don't reduce this budget.' Brigham said he wanted to see this program in the budget either by a \$10,000 reduction allowing the program to be included or adding the extra funds to the present budget. Brigham's motion, seconded by Ogi, to add the necessary funds passed unanimously.

After the vote, Tessar stated, "my personal reaction is if our annual budget is turned down in July, I will vote to take G & T out as the first cut.'

In other action, the board voted to adopt a User Fee for co-curricular activities. Member Byron Gessner motioned to charge \$5.00 for middle school and \$15.00 for high school activities. It was generally felt that charging middle school students \$10.00, might tend to discourage them from participating in programs when, instead, they should be encouraged to become involved in the various activities available to them.

Reading Scores Big in Area MS READ-a-Thon

Students at St. Mary Immaculate Conception and Kewaskum Elementary stacked up the books in this year's edition of the MS READ-a-thon. One hundred and six youngsters completed a record 1,637 books to lead the fight against multiple sclerosis in West Bend and Kewaskum.

A few weeks ago, local MS volunteers presented an exciting challenge to St. Mary and Kewaskum students: "Join the MS READ-a-thon and read for the need of others." With the support of their teachers and parents, the children responded by reading books and recruiting sponsors who contributed a quarter, half-dollar or more for each book read to the Wisconsin Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

Larry Hisle of the Milwaukee Brewers, who is the local Chairperson, said, "The students put so much effort into the MS READ-a-thon because they want to help people who live with multiple sclerosis." Larry also noted that the student volunteers have become eligible for special recognition awards for their great effort.

The funds collected in the MS READ-a-thon are used to support the research and patient service programs of the MS Society. Multiple sclerosis is a neurological disease which together with closely related disorders afflicts an estimated 500,000 persons in this country and millions around the world. Its cause is unpredictable. Many MS persons are able to lead normal lives, but others must use canes, crutches or wheelchairs. The cause of multiple sclerosis is unknown.

Larry Hisle commented, "The people of West Bend and Kewaskum should be proud of the superb effort put forth by the students of St. Mary Immaculate Conception and Kewaskum Elementary to help combat MS."



TIF Report Reviewed Again at Joint Meeting

Dan Thompson, a TIF Action Associates, appeared before a special joint meeting of the Kewaskum Plan Commission and Village Board Monday evening.

The village is feeling the pressure of deciding whether or not to become involved in the Tax Incremental Financing program and how soon they will have to make a final decision. Village Board President Jerry Stollenwerk stated one factor affecting the village is a bill in the state legislature which could have a major effect on Kewaskum's plans. Thompson's report presented three programs, Option #1 resulted in an area larger than the 5% total value allowed in a district exceeding the limit by more than \$1.0 million, making it legally unfeasible. Option #2 would be the most favorable covering four projects, the watermain loop on Milan Drive to Roseland, well #3, a downtown parking lot and the interceptor sewer at Knights Avenue. The total estimated price tag for this plan would be \$1,540,000, which is very close to the TIF 5% limit, making Municipal Building remodeling improbable. Option #3 would

eeting remove property around the Village Hall, reducing the proposed district slightly, but al-

posed district slightly, but allowing the village to be approximately \$400,000 below the 5% ceiling. This would provide a cushion area should any projects exceed their projected

projects the village should seriously consider. His comment was to develop a "musthave" district and reconsider the "nice to have but not essential" projects. Of the four projects, the watermain loop seemed to be the only real "must-have" since the village has had serious breakage problems in this area for some time due to defective mains.

Thompson noted if the village decides to go with Option #2, they can hold off creating a district until August. However, if the village should decide to create a district and go with Option #3, Thompson felt the village should move as soon as possible.

The Plan Commission went to record as recommending the Village Board pursue the issue. The TIF program will be on the Village Board agenda for June 15.

Member Jean Goeden stated she would like to see the late bus reinstated, at least on the middle school schedule. After checking bus costs, it was decided it was impossible to include the bussing as part of the fee. One parent suggested charging each student who rides the late bus a flat fee for the year. Business Manager Bob Borch noted this could run as high as \$100 and not many parents would be willing to pay that much. It was noted that Johnson Bus enters into private contracts with parent groups. Superintendent Brenholt and Borch said they would check this out and get the information back to Goeden in the event the parents would want to contract for bus service on their own.

The question of filling the elementary guidance position was dropped. A motion to transfer Mr. Dickinson to the high school guidance position died for lack of a second, making discussion unnecessary at this time.

The board voted unanimously to present the amended budget of \$4,831,841 including G & T, to the annual meeting July 27, at the high school.

In other decisions, the board approved a 1981-82 contract for service from Johnson Bus Company, a teacher contract for a speech therapist, an 8.5% across the board wage increase for support staff and the establishment of NOW checking accounts.

The board also approved use of school buildings during the summer for a Jaycee wrestling program and Kewaskum Booster Club gymnastics program.

The board voted against appealing the CESA decision which allowed the Michael Bodden family to transfer their property from Kewaskum to the Lomira School District. Tessar

noted "this decision has opened a whole can of worms," which could present future problems with families wanting to transfer in or out of the district. Kewaskum's policy has been not to allow any families to transfer out or accept any who want to join the Kewaskum school system.

Tessar read a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Buchel commending teachers Mr. Heckle, Mr. Getter, Mrs. West and Mrs. Leong for their work and dedication, noting Kewaskum was fortunate to have such teachers.

Byron Gessner stated the board should recognize Ernie Mitchell and Ken Erickson for their service to the district.

The board adjourned to closed session to discuss teacher negotiations.





County Trains Corrections Officers

Thanks to cooperation between the Washington County Sheriff's Department and Moraine Park Technical Institute's Safety Division, Washington County has some of the most highly trained Corrections Officers in the state.

'As a result of their training in the Advanced Jail Officers Training program," said Jon Flood, instructor-coordinator, "they now meet the standards required by the American Corrections Association, the National Institute of Corrections, the American Bar Association, the American Medical Association and the National Sheriffs Association.

Because of this 92 hour program Washington County's Correction Officers know a great deal more about the constitutional rights of individuals who have been arrested but not convicted. They understand more about those who are emotionally disturbed and they have a greater understanding of interpersonal communications. MPTI instructors Tom Donovan and Jim Dillon also assisted in instructing the class in the areas of the legal implications of how jails feed, clothe and counsel prisoners. Community relations and resources were also a part of the program.

'In addition to upgrading the officers," Flood explained, "MPTI and the Sheriff's Department aimed the program at increasing the pride these people have in their work and at letting them know there is a future in their profession." The housing developments will be located in Green Lake, Green Lake County, and Kewaskum, Washington County.

A quasi-public corporation, WHFA provides low-cost mortgage financing for low and moderate income housing through the sale of tax-exempt revenue bonds.



The architect for the development is Hackner, Schroeder, Roslansky and Associates, Madison, Wisconsin.







Planned Parenthood Chapter of County **Elects Officers**



June 7-13 Proclaimed As Safe Boating Week

Wisconsin Governor Lee Sherman Dreyfus has proclaimed the week of June 7 through 13 as Safe Boating Week in the state.

He joined with Department of Natural Resources boating safety officials, representatives of the U.S. Coast Guard, the Coast Guard Auxiliary, the U.S. Power Squadron, the American Red Cross, and other state, county and city water enforcement officers to express a unified effort in the interest of safe boating in Wisconsin.

In signing the Safe Boating Week proclamation, the Governor called attention to the recreational opportunities provided to millions of people by the state's lakes, rivers and streams.

Noting that more than 700,000 boats belonging to Wisconsin citizens and nearly 350,000 boats from other states will be used throughout Wisconsin this summer, the Governor urged every boating family to work together to make boating a more enjoyable, safer, and fuel efficient sport by improving boating skills, taking proper care of boating equipment and by attending a boating safety course.


The Governor urged all boaters to conduct their recreational activities on the water in a manner consistent with the enjoyment and safety of other water users including skin and scuba divers, swimmers and anglers.

Dale Morey, coordinator of boating safety in the DNR, reminded all boaters that it is essential to practice safe boating procedures, not only during Safe Boating Week, but whenever afloat.

He noted that becoming familiar with water conditions where you plan to boat will contribute to a safer, more pleasant experience.

Morey said, "This is particularly true for boating trips on streams, rivers and flowages where it is important to know the location of any dams and portage trails for getting around them.
