## Ice Age Center Dedication at Dundee Saturday



The dedication of the first Ice Age Interpretive Center in Wisconsin will be held on Saturday, June 20, at 2:00 p.m., at the center which is located one mile south of Dundee on State Highway 67 in Fond du Lac County.

The \$700,000 Center will be named after Congressman Henry Reuss who was instrumental in setting up the Ice Age National Scientific Reserve. Scheduled to attend the dedication with Reuss are Department of Natural Resources Secretary, C.D. "Buzz" Besadny, National Park Service Midwest Regional Director, James Dunning, and Wisconsin Natural Resources Board Chairman, John Lawton.

The Center, a circular building 84 feet in diameter, is the first of four interpretive centers to be built in Wisconsin. The cost of operating the center will be shared 50-50 by the National Park Service and the state. The other Centers are scheduled for Devils Lake, Interstate and Mill Bluff State Parks.

The history of glacial activity, not only in Wisconsin but also worldwide, is depicted in the center's displays. Its effect on our landscape and plant and animal populations unfold for the visitor during the tour of the center's exhibit area, according to Richard Van Osch, the Ice Age Center Naturalist. The

displays are complete with plastic small scale model replicas of woolly mammoths and mastadons.

## Vicar Lindau to Be Ordained, Installed As New Fane Pastor

This Sunday, June 21, at 4:00 p.m., Vicar Robert Lindau will be ordained into the ministry of Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod. At the same time, he will be installed as the Pastor of St. John Lutheran Church, New Fane, where he has been serving his vicarage since June 1980. The public is invited to attend this very special service in the history of St. John congregation.

Vicar Lindau was born August 15, 1945 in Whiting, Ind. At age 6 his family moved to Crown Point, Indiana, where he attended a Lutheran elementary school. Already in the 3rd grade, his ambition was to be a pastor. He graduated from Crown Point High School in 1963 with the intention of entering the teaching ministry of the Lutheran Church. In 1967 he graduated from Concordia Teachers College in Seward, Nebraska, with a B.S. in education. He taught at St. Michael's Lutheran Church and School in Richville, Michigan, for 8 years while also serving the congregation as music director.

In 1974 he received his Masters in Music from Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. In 1975 Vicar Lindau accepted the call to be choir director and teacher of Old Testament history at Martin Luther High School in Milwaukee.

In 1978 he made the decision to enter the ministry and he and his family moved to Fort Wayne, Indiana, where for two years he was a full-time student. In May 1980, he graduated from the seminary receiving a Master of Arts in Religion degree. On May 29, 1980 he and his family moved to New Fane to begin his vicarage.

On August 1, 1970, Vicar married the former Christine Lawonn of Denver, Colorado, and this marriage has been blessed with four children: Rebecca, age 9; Robbie, age 8; Christopher, age 6; and Timmy, age 2. Vicar Lindau and family thoroughly enjoy living in the beautiful Kettle Moraine and especially enjoy the wonderful people in St. John's Church and the surrounding communities.

## Town of Kewaskum Boy, 4, Drowns in Small Pond

A four-year-old Town of Kewaskum boy drowned late Monday afternoon after he apparently wandered off of a pier and into a small pond at the nearby home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Tackes, 9242 N. Mill Road, located about one mile east of Kewaskum.

The victim, Timothy J. Hollister, son of Daniel and Sandra Hollister of 9202 N. Mill Road, was found in about six feet of water at 5:18 p.m. by a 17-year-old relative, Debra J. Tackes.

Ms. Tackes was mowing grass when she discovered that Timothy was no longer in sight. She had told the boy not to go near the pier, according to a sheriff's department report.

Timothy apparently wandered onto the pier and fell into the pond. He was found directly below a ladder that was connected to the pier. Ms. Tackes was about 200 feet from the pier when she noticed the boy was missing. Sheriff's deputies said he may have been under water for five minutes.

The boy was removed from the water and the Kewaskum Fire Department Rescue Squad

was summoned. Squad members attempted to revive the boy with cardiopulmonary resuscitation. He was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend, where further efforts to revive him failed and he was pronounced dead at 6:20 p.m.

Timothy J. Hollister, son of Daniel and Sandra Tackes Hollister, was born May 2, 1977, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital.

Survivors include his parents; one sister, Nadine Ann at home; his paternal grandmother, Gladys Hollister of Mondovi, Wis., maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Tackes of Kewaskum; great-great grandfather, Robert Tackes, of Fillmore, and great-great-grandmother, Sabena Stern of West Bend.

Visitation at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, will be after 4 p.m. Thursday with a prayer vigil at 8 p.m. Services will be held Friday at 9:30 a.m. at the funeral home and a Mass of the Angels will follow at 10 a.m. at Holy Trinity Catholic Church, Kewaskum, with Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Burial will be in the church cemetery.

## Agreement Reached In Mall Dispute

Developers of the KEWA Shopping Center and the Village of Kewaskum have finally reached a settlement which will result in issuance of occupancy permits to KEWA tenants.

At a special meeting late Thursday, developers presented lien waivers along with their agreement to drop their injunction suit against the village.

Kewaskum Commissioner Bill Martin has received a dedication deed covering the disputed driveway along with a mortgage release from First State Bank, Campbellsport.

Present at the meeting besides the board were KEWA's attorney Ralph Cagle, Director of Construction Charles Falk, Charles O'Meara, Kewaskum Special Attorney, Zoning Administrator Richard Zurling, Building Inspector Henry Becker and Thomas Leitzke, co-owner of Kennelly Pharmacy.

Mueller Excavating has reportedly received payment for their improvement work on the driveway, but it was not clear who had paid Mueller.

For Leitzke, the dispute went

almost to the wire as Washington County Judge Merriam had ruled an occupancy permit had to be issued by Saturday or the new store would have been closed.

Although the problem between the mall and village has been solved, a court hearing before Judge Becker Wednesday will determine Kennelly's status as far as fines for opening last May without an occupancy permit.

## Area Escapes Brunt of Storm

The heavy rains and tornado-like winds that ripped through Washington and neighboring counties Monday afternoon, spared this area of any major damage or injuries, although the warning sirens were sounded in Kewaskum around 3 p.m. after a tornado warning had been issued for the county area. The storms caused widespread damage and injured eight people elsewhere in southern Wisconsin.

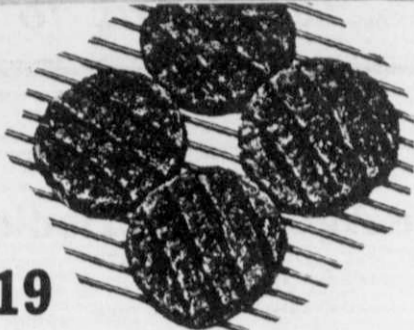

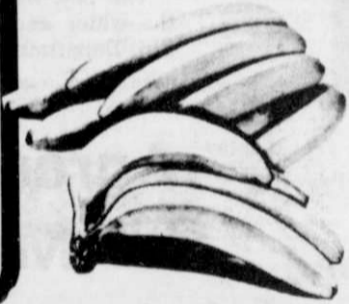

## Village Board Votes to Go Ahead With TIF Study

After a short discussion Monday night, the Kewaskum Village Board voted to hire Dan Thompson, TIF Action Associates, to create a district and finalize a TIF district plan.

The price tag of another \$8,000 in consulting fees for this second phase of the study raised several questions. Trustee Dave Nigh noted he still had reservations about the feasibility and economic value of the program for Kewaskum. "I'm still not sold, its \$6,000 and now \$8,000 and we haven't done anything yet." Nigh felt many of these projects could be done by the village on its own through General Obligation Bonds. Trustee Raynor Herriges stated, "the more we talk about it, the more we get confused. I had my heart set on it, now I'm bending the other way."

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt felt \$8,000 was a substantial sum to pay for Thompson's consulting, noting that most of the facts and figures had come from his office. Trustee Paul Blumer asked Schmidt if he could handle this second phase of the program. Schmidt replied, "right now, no, if this were a second district, yes." Schmidt felt the \$8,000 was like an insurance policy, Thompson knows what questions to ask and where to look for answers. With time a major factor in making any decisions by the village, Schmidt felt the board should go with Thompson since they have worked with him from the beginning.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer, Chairman of the Plan Commission, noted the commission had recommended the village go ahead with the second step of the

study. The point was again brought up that even after implementing this phase of the study the village is still not obligated to join the program. Village President Jerry Stollenwerk stated, "the one thing we must keep in mind is do we have \$1.0 million in 'must-have' projects, and secondly, time is of the essence."

A motion by Herriges, second by Trustee Dick Schmidt passed 6-1, with Nigh voting "no."

In other business, Schmidt informed the board the Main Street, Highway 28 railroad crossing would be closed for repairs next week. Schmidt said he had received notice from the railroad stating they did not know when repairs to the First and Second Street crossings would be made. Schmidt requested the village send a letter to the Department of Transportation and railroad requiring all three crossings be repaired at once. The DOT is the agency who inspected the crossings and determined them unsafe for travel. Previously, the railroad had stated the First and Second Street crossings would be repaired the week after Main Street.

The board granted a building permit to Peter Knaup, Meadow Creek Apartments, for the installation of footings and foundations. Knaup told the board it would be notified of a groundbreaking ceremony and invited them to attend.

The board accepted the bid of Payne & Dolan for asphalt work in the amount of \$28,582.00. The board voted to table action on bids for slurry seal until further studies were completed.

Schmidt reported on the Police Commission's meeting last Thursday. Orval Behnke has been appointed Chairman and Ed Jones Secretary. The commission will hold quarterly

meetings to conduct any business matters.

Schmidt informed the board a "Tennis Challenge" has been set for the park. Boys and girls will be in groups 17 and under, men and women's groups will be 18 and over. The cost will be \$1.00 for village residents and \$2.00 for non-residents. Players will set up their own matches.

The board motioned to adjourn.

## Elected at Girls State

The 14 cities in Badger Girls State met June 7-13 in Madison to elect state officials as well as county and city officials to govern them during the week.

Jenny Zemlicka, 1527 Stark St., Kewaskum, was elected Alderman of the mythical city of Tamarack.

Ms. Zemlicka was selected by the staff of her high school to attend the week-long program and was sponsored by the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary of Kewaskum.

More than 700 high school aged citizens of Badger Girls State gained practical experience in government as they formed political parties, elected city, county and state officials, held hearings on bills and passed laws. The Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary and the University of Wisconsin-Extension Department of Governmental Affairs are co-sponsors of this program.

Highlights of the week in Madison included the impressive Inaugural Ceremony where Wisconsin state officials were sworn in by a Wisconsin Supreme Court Justice. The girls also met a number of governmental officials during the week. They participated in the legislative process as they held hearings on bills, and passed laws at their legislative session in the State Capitol on Saturday.

The 8 ppm. of monoxide in the lungs of non-smokers was the equivalent of smoking 4 or 5 cigarettes - enough to produce a dull headache, tired feeling, and perhaps a non-smoker's cough among those present.

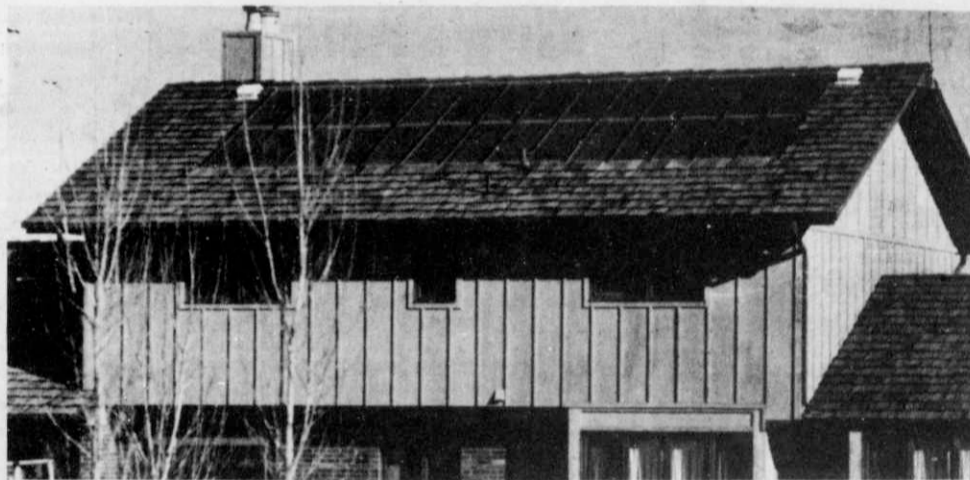

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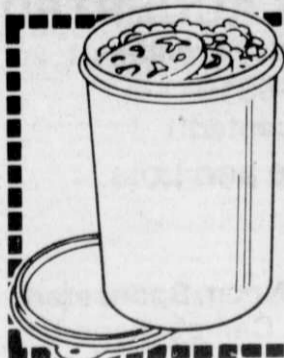

## St. Joseph's Community Hospital Files For Expansion Approval

St. Joseph's Community Hospital has officially filed notice with both the Southeast Wisconsin Health Systems Agency and the State Department of Health and Social Services to add 32 beds to its current 115.

According to Fred Bury, the notice detailing the hospital's needs for expanding the number of beds is required under the state Certificate of Need law. State approval is required before the hospital can add the beds.

Bury pointed out that no state or federal funds are involved in the addition. The estimated \$99,000 required will come from the hospital's capital development and reserve funds. The effect on the current per diem rate would be one of decrease. Bury estimates that if the 32 beds were in operation today the per diem rate would drop from the current \$258.06 to \$252.87. This would happen because of the potential increase in patient days at the hospital.

The beds for the unit would be in now-closed third floor of the 1947 addition to the hospital. "That area is in good condition, but will have to undergo some revitalization to bring it up to current standards for use in patient care," Bury stated. He added that he hoped to receive the required approvals, undergo the work in the building, and have it staffed by the first of the year.

Administrative procedures on the notice will include review and public hearings by the Health Systems Agency. They will then make their recommendations to the state, which has final authority to grant permission to proceed with the additional beds.

He estimates this will take three months before the Health Systems Agency makes its recommendations to the state, which must then approve or disapprove within 30 days.

"Ironically, Southeast Wisconsin has an abundance of hospital beds, but Washington County has a shortage," Bury continued. He noted that in the period from July 1, 1980 through April 1, 1981, "we went through 119 days with beds for emergencies only. And on 48 of those days we actually had a waiting list for available beds. That's the reason some patients with elective surgery had their surgery rescheduled. We realize this causes a great inconvenience for the patients as well as the doctors and hospital staff. But without enough beds to accommodate the

patients, we had no alternative."

He says he is optimistic that the Health Systems Agency will be cooperative. The state, he added, is trying to get a moratorium on hospital building and expansion. "But most areas aren't growing like West Bend is. I'm really hoping for singular consideration. And I think we've got the data to back up our application. The area has seen a 32.9 percent population growth in the past ten years. Since June of 1975 we've doubled the number of doctors and dentists on the staff. And since 1976, we've gone up nearly 4,000 patient days per

year. That's over ten more patients every day than we had just five years ago."

"No, the 32 bed addition will not be the end of our growth. We are developing long-range plans for where we are going to be in the next few years. Realistically, we estimate that the addition of these 32 beds will meet our needs for the next three to five years."

Does he see a problem with staffing the unit? "I'm optimistic. Obviously we won't open until we do get it staffed. And we may find ourselves opening the unit in sections. But at this time I think we'll find the staff to care for the unit."

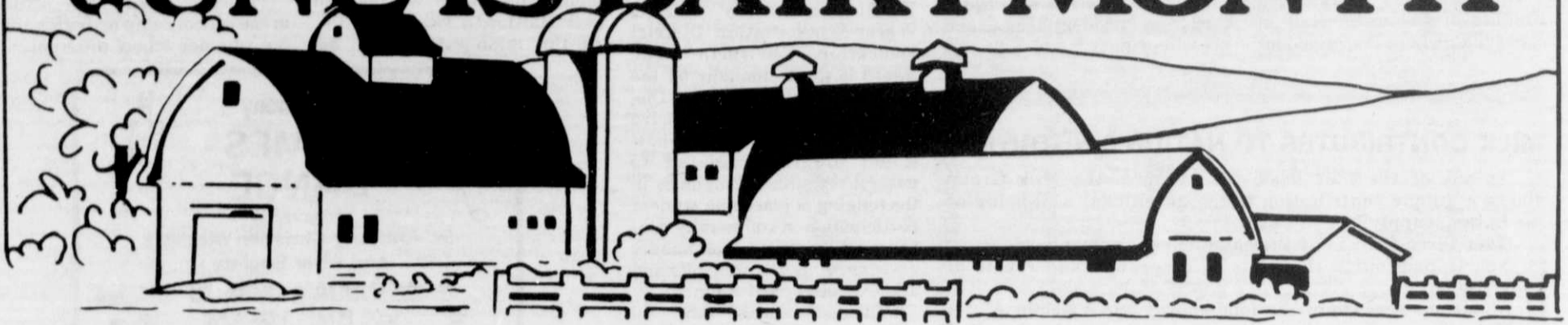

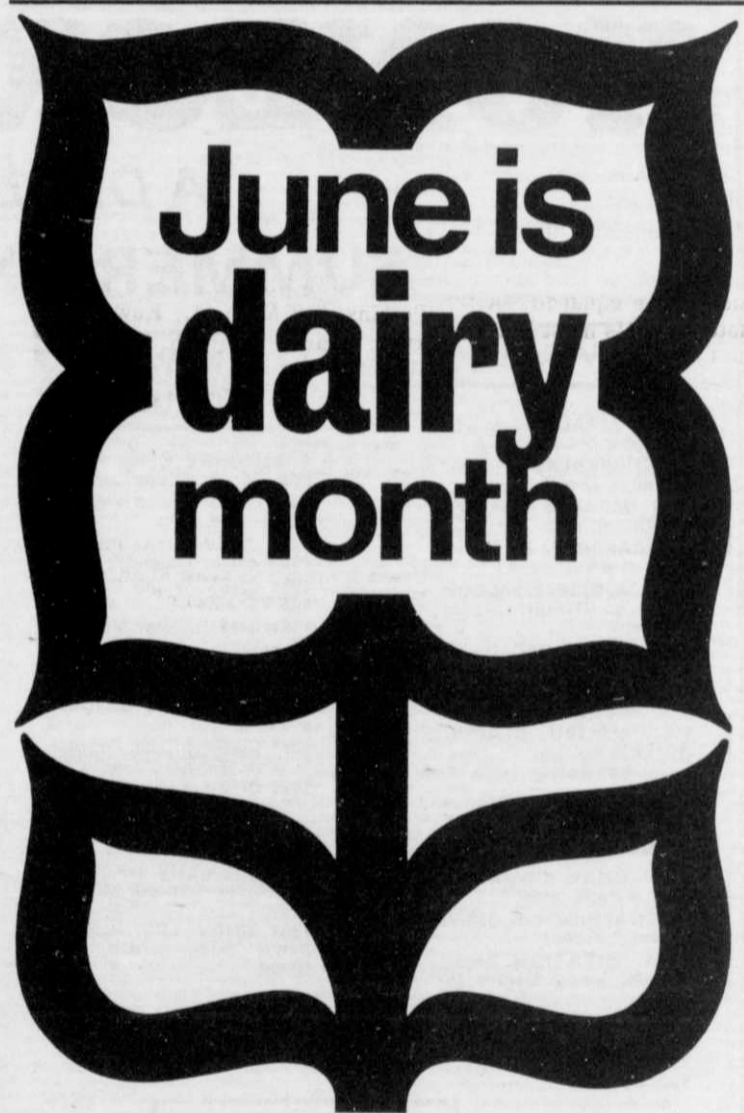

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
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## Letters to the Editor

#### FROZEN FRUIT SALAD

- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tablespoons frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon sugar

- 1 can (8 1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained

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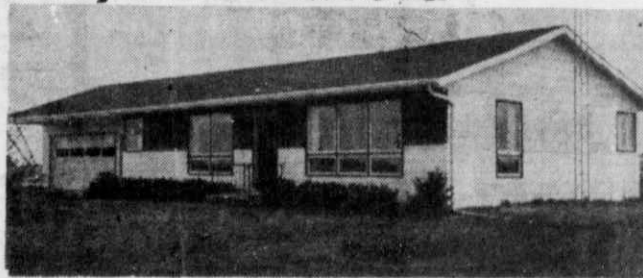
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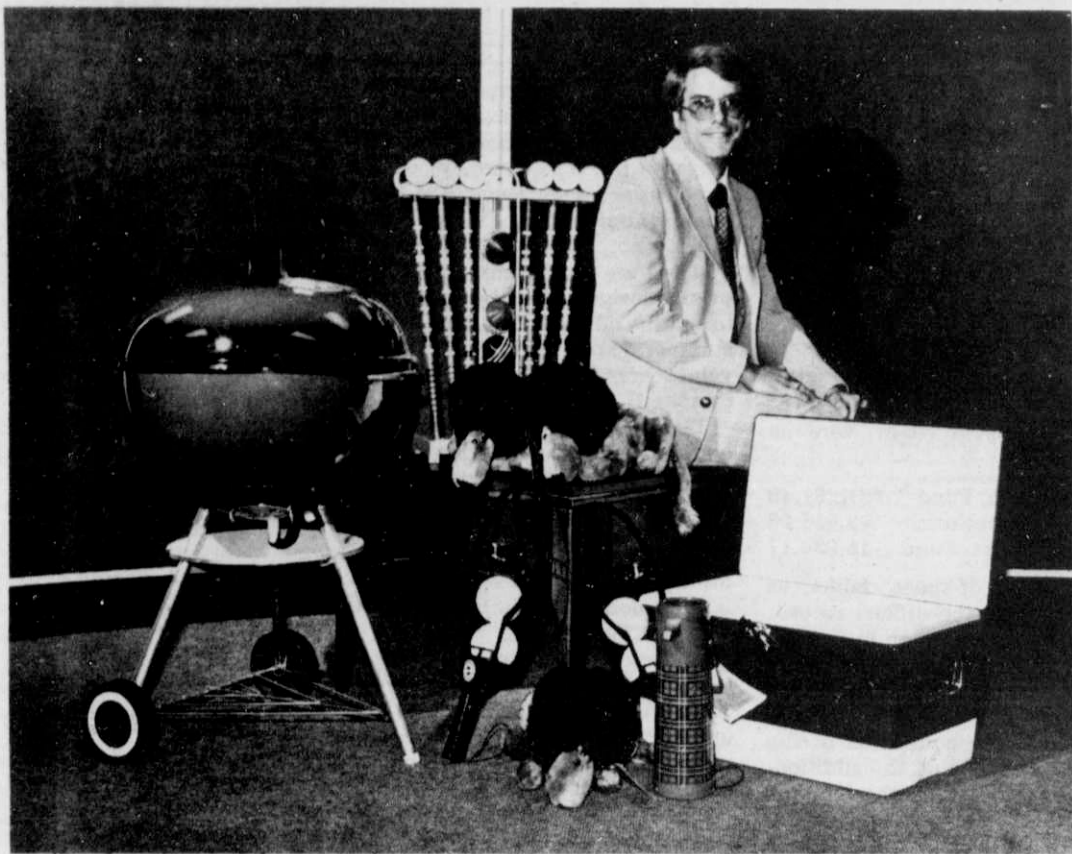

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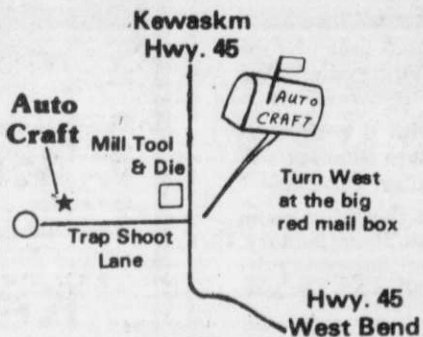
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## St. Agnes Hospital Sets New, Expanded Visiting Hours

ICU - CCU: Limited to immediate family - 24 hours/day. Time limits determined by nurse.

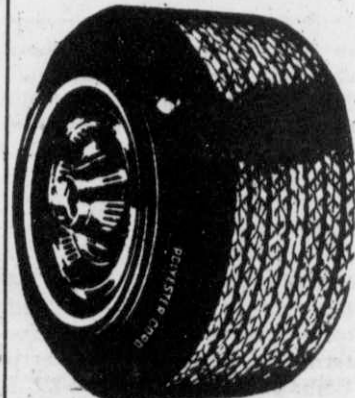

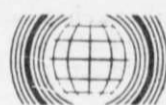
