## Open Bids on New Fire Truck Board Prepares Schedule of Proposed Projects to Be Funded Through TIF

The Kewaskum Village Board voted unanimously to begin preparing a schedule of proposed projects funded through a tax incremental financing (TIF) district.

Dan Thompson of Action Associates of Middleton, who has been retained by the board to complete a feasibility study and produce a plan for the TIF district, was present at Monday night's meeting to explain the possibility of completing various projects which would total nearly \$2 million.

Administrator Dan Schmidt had sent out a survey to the board members, asking them to prioritize various projects. The projects and their relative costs were:

1) Connect the water main on Milan Drive to Roseland Drive to provide a looped water

supply to Bel-Ric Acres subdivision - \$134,012.

2) Complete well #3 and construct a water tower and pumphouse and furnish with related equipment - \$799,736.

3) Construct an interceptor sewer from the main lift station to Main Street - \$85,600.

4) Construct another interceptor sewer from Main St. to Reigle Drive - \$104,500.

5) Construct another interceptor sewer from Reigle Dr. to Knights Ave. along the north edge of the village - \$177,000.

6) Install storm sewer, curbing, and sidewalk along the west side of Hi-way 45 to Hi-way H - \$73,265.

7) Construct a Main St. or downtown parking lot - \$129,920.

8) Install storm sewers, curbing, and sidewalk along Hi-way H from 45 to the bridge - \$95,903.

9) Install storm sewer, curbing, and sidewalk along the east side of Hi-way 45 to Hi-way H - \$73,265.

10) Extend Reigle Drive to the north and west along the river to eventually feed into Hi-way 45 and Hi-way 28 - \$979,615.

11) Install storm sewer, curbing, and sidewalk along the west side of Hi-way 45 from Hi-way H to Prospect Drive - \$73,265.

12) Repair the dam on the Milwaukee River - \$10,000.

13) Connect the Reigle Dr. sanitary sewer to an interceptor sewer - \$54,566.

14) Partially rebuild Old Fond du Lac Road to Hi-way 28 and 45 - \$123,424.

15) Construct a bridge on the Milwaukee River going east off Reigle Dr. plus a street to Parkview Drive - \$675,584.

16) Install storm sewer, curbing, and sidewalk along the east side of Hi-way 45 to Old Fond du Lac Road - \$83,164.

Thompson explained that the projects listed for funding through TIF were "clearly within the letter of the law" and that the board could be "assured that these are eligible uses of TIF."

He added that the first 2 priorities, the water line and tower could be looked forward to with confidence, since they would total around \$1 million. He said that the projects numbered 3, 4, 5 and 6 had a very good chance of being financed and completed and would bring the total to around \$1.5 million. \$1.8 million would be involved if projects through No. 9 were financed by TIF.

However, when reaching No. 10, the Reigle Drive extension, which would involve nearly \$1 million itself and would be a massive undertaking, he advised against including this in the TIF district. He claimed this would be difficult to proceed with and would bring the total amount of expenditure up to almost \$3 million. Later he explained that TIF projects up to \$2 million would have a reasonably optimistic chance of being financed and completed, however, he warned, "beyond that you may be down the rabbit hole with Alice in Wonderland."

Several other projects as No. 13, 14, and 15 are also associated with Reigle Dr. Without these projects, and adding projects No. 11, 12, and 16, the total amount of the TIF projects would come to over 1.8 million.

Thompson also explained that

## Parade to Feature 7 Bands, Drum Corps Picnic This Weekend

The annual Kewaskum Firemen-Legion fund-raising picnic will be held in River Hill Park (old village park) on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 11 and 12.

Saturday night there will be women's water fights at 6:00 p.m. In the beer garden live music will be supplied from 7:00 to 11:00 p.m. by Danny and the Sunliners. All of the rides, refreshments and food stands will be in operation.

Starting off the festivities on Sunday will be another excellent parade at 12:00 noon sharp, one of the highlights of the event. The parade will again be led by the Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club and will feature many bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams. These include the Kewaskum High School Band, Hartford Municipal Band, Old Mapleton Circus Band, Georgie Girls, Royal Knights Drum and Bugle Corps, Green Beret Marching Band of Janesville and Wausau Story Drum and Bugle Corps.

Other units will include beautiful floats, baton twirlers, majorettes, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, comic entries, orchestras, antique cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations and more.

The parade will form on the high school campus and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All partici-

pants should be present to line up no later than 11:30 a.m. Persons wishing to enter the parade should contact Bob Staehler, parade chairman. Theme for this year's parade will be "SEASONAL FUN IN '81." Businessmen, industries and organizations are urged to enter a float. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and children's specialties.

Immediately following the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps or bands in the park. There will be continuous music throughout the afternoon and evening. a specific timetable of projects must be prepared so that they may be completed during the 1982, 83, 84, and 85 construction seasons. A TIF district may exist for no longer than 20 years with the district being terminated 15 years after the last expenditure. He also explained that the schedule may be changed through public hearing processes, however, it is simpler to delay one certain project than to move another project forward.

The board unanimously accepted the proposed priority list such that Thompson can prepare a specific timetable. The next step in the formation of a TIF district is a public hearing on July 16 held by the Plan Commission for the purposes of establishing boundaries of the district. This recommendation will then go before the village board on July 20.

Thompson also mentioned that a state budget bill may have some effect on TIF. The state senate and assembly both have 2 separate versions of the budget bill which have to be reconciled. Thompson said this was unlikely to happen before early August and suggested another public hearing be scheduled July 30 or August 3 concerning the proposed project plan and schedule. He advised that, "In order to avoid any doubt about what law we're operating under, the safe thing to do is ... to have the project plan put together and adopted by you before the budget bill passes."

President Jerry Stollenwerk also opened bids on a new fire truck chassis and pumper and equipment. The bids were: Irle Ford-Mercury of Hartford bid \$33,126 for the chassis only; Cooley's IHC of West Bend had \$32,025 for the chassis; Barnett Bros. of Columbus bid \$52,255 on the chassis modifications only; Pierce Manufacturing of Appleton had a combined bid of \$95,903 for the chassis and modifications; 3-D Fire Apparatus of Bonduel had a bid of \$91,955 for the chassis and modifications; FMC Corp. had \$95,829 for the combined bid; W S Darley of Melrose Park, Ill. asked \$96,612 for the combination; Milwaukee Mack Sales bid \$47,099 for the chassis only, and Able Fire and Safety Equipment of Chicago had a combined bid of \$99,850. These proposals were turned over to the Fire Dept. Equipment Committee and the Public Works Committee for their recommendation.

Dan Schmidt reviewed the audit report for 1980 as conducted by Kannenberg, Kieckhafer & Co. of West Bend. He commented that "We came out real well" when the revenue was compared to the disbursements. He added that the village "... did that by watching our budget and being very

careful when we bought things."

There were several recommendations which were eventually approved by the board. Several involved transfer of funds from one account to another such as the \$11,873.70 in the Machine and Equipment Outlay category being moved to the Village Improvement Fund or \$5,443.35 of \$10,443.35 being moved from the Land Use Planning category to the Village Improvement Fund while \$5,000 of this went for Dan Thompson's services this year. Also \$26,000 from the sewage fund and \$10,000 from the water dept. will be transferred to repay the Village General Fund. The General Fund had been used to offset losses in these 2 departments.

Another approved recommendation was the consolidation of several savings accounts which only earn 6% interest so that 1 or 2 certificates of deposit, either of \$50,000 or \$100,000 value, can be obtained with a higher interest rate of 15%. An example of one combination would be the Fire Service Fund, the Public Library Fund, the Park Development Fund, the Subdivision Open Space Fund, and the Village Improvement Fund, although the village records would indicate each category within this lump sum.

In other action, the board accepted a bid of 70c per unit for the slurry seal type of street sealing from Struck and Erwin of Madison. Jim Buchanan, a representative of S & E, commented on the advantages of this "wet bottom slag" type of seal. He said since the aggregate was black, it facilitated snow removal in the winter, that the material was harder which permitted more flexibility, and that it was an appropriate use of a waste type material - a by-product of burning coal at a power plant.

Jeff Rohrer of the Parks & Recreation Committee mentioned that several people had been cut on the open ended pipes on the ladders on the raft at the pond. Some plastic caps had been installed but were somehow removed. The possibilities of welding this or inserting wood dowels were mentioned. Otherwise, the beach is running smoothly with over 620 swimming passes issued.

The board also approved bartenders licenses for Janet Roehl, who will be working at John & Dee's, and for Duane Kongslien, Jerold Campbell, Henry M. Buskel, Mary C.

Thiemer, Patricia A. Oppermann, and Kenneth L. Weyers, who as Jaycees will be dispensing soda and that refreshing and frothing elixir, beer, from the concession stand in the new park.

Dear Sir,

The Kewaskum School Board has been deadlocked on its decision of a replacement for Ernie Mitchell as high school guidance counselor.

Motions to move each of the two candidates into the position have failed to get the necessary votes. At the last meeting, I, as one of the School Board members, suggested an alternative, and the more I've talked with other parents, the more I am convinced it is a beneficial solution to the problem.

I have suggested to the other School Board members to have the two candidates - both of whom are very qualified - work together on the elementary and high school levels.

This plan would make it possible for high school students to have the choice of three counselors to talk to in cases of scheduling, careers, and personal problems.

Also for the first time in many years, the plan would mean there would be a woman counselor available for the high school population.

Both candidates have stated this plan could work, and that they would be willing to work together in the effort so that everyone could benefit from the shared duties.

The plan would not only profit high school students. I feel it would aid the elementary students as well. First of all, there would be two minds working on problems which individual elementary students might face.

Second, we have quite a male domination in the school system in the fifth and sixth grades. Almost all of the teachers in these two grades are males.

Making a woman available for these students could be of definite assistance to them, especially in today's changing and complex society.

## School Board to Have Busy Agenda Monday

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of the School District of Kewaskum will be held on Monday, July 13, 1981. Beginning at 8:00 p.m., the meeting will be held in the district administrative offices.

A closed session will be held at 8:00 p.m. to discuss administrative salaries and the board will reconvene in open session at approximately 8:20 p.m. Personnel assignments will also be discussed at this meeting.

Included on the board agenda under old business will be action on the positions of principal at the Middle School and Beechwood School. A formal recommendation by the board to the annual meeting on the property exchange with St. Lucas Church will be acted upon, as will the waiving of any rights or purchase of the property formerly owned by Mrs. Jeanette Backhaus Moe. At a school board meeting Tuesday, June 16, Mrs. Sharron Miller was elected to another three-year term.

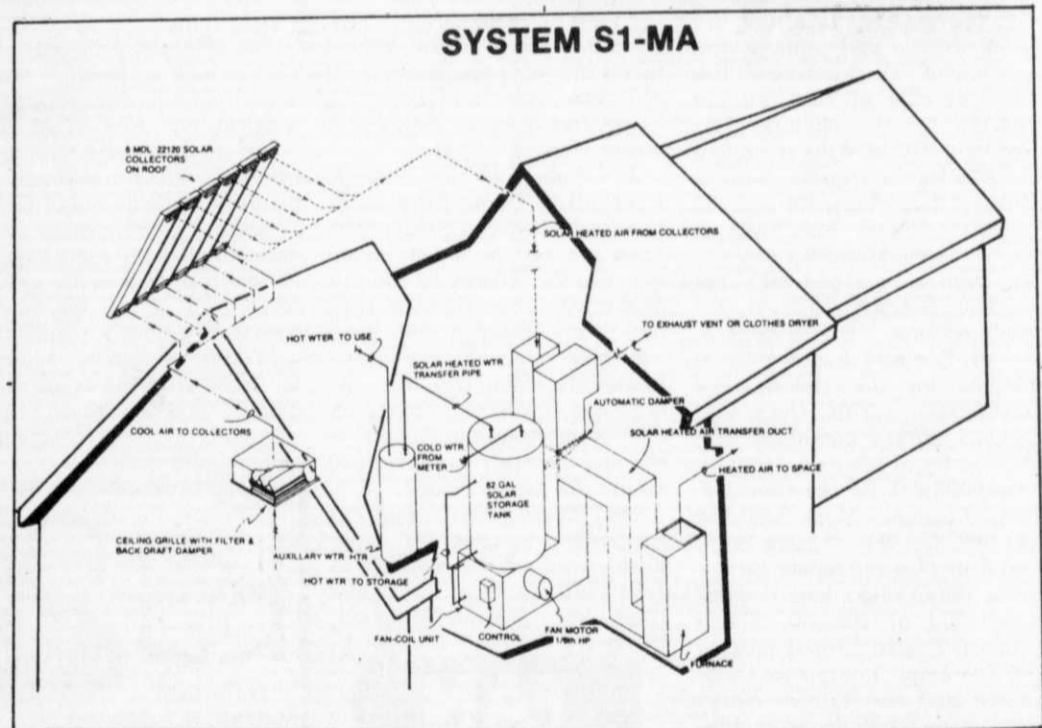

## Tips on Watering Plants in Your Yard

Lawn, flower and garden waterers beware... anyone seen standing in their yard holding a watering wand is subject to charges of gross neglect! Instead of helping your plants, you would be hurting their overall health.

Here's a tip for homeowners who want to keep their trees, shrubs, flowers, gardens or lawns in good condition during the hot months of July and August. Don't water too often and when you do, water deep.

The average loss of water from a plant covered area through evaporation and transportation is approximately one to one and a half inches per week. This may go even higher in the hot days of mid-summer. Therefore, if it doesn't rain at least one inch per week in summer, you need to supply that amount of water to plants of highest priority in your yard.

If you are concerned about your water bills, the priority of watering plants should be as follows: garden, flowers, trees and shrubs and finally your lawn. Bluegrass is a cool season plant that naturally goes dormant during times of warm temperature and little rainfall. Going dormant does not hurt your lawn grasses.

How long does the sprinkler need to run to apply an inch of water? For the average water pressure and average size hose it takes about two hours to apply an inch of water. If your hose is smaller or your water pressure lower than normal, it will take more time to apply this amount of water.

One way to check your own particular set-up is to place small straight sided tin cans at different intervals in the sprinkling area and catch the water over a measured period of time. Then measure the depth

of water in the cans with a ruler and calculate the rate of your sprinkler. This simple method will also give you an idea of the distribution pattern of your sprinkler.

Deep, weekly watering of your plants can keep them looking green and healthy through the hot period of summer. Don't get carried away with frequent light waterings which can lead to more serious insect, disease and stress problems.

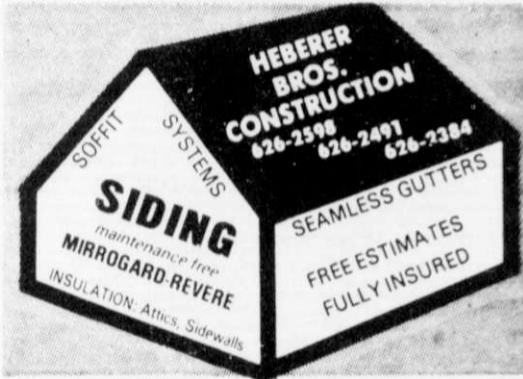

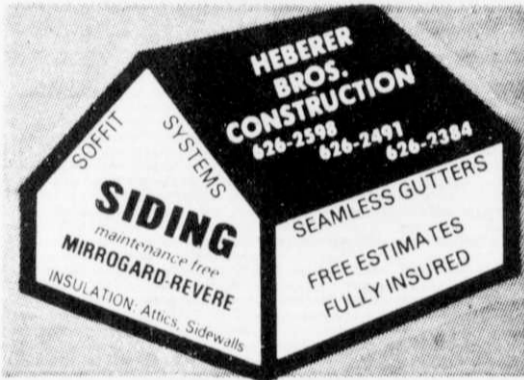
