Reha Named Middle School Principal

School Board Finally Votes to Have Two People Share Counseling Duties

The Kewaskum School Board finally settled the high school guidance question by voting 5-1 to have 2 people share the counseling duties at both the elementary and high school levels.

This decision finally broke 3 previous deadlocked votes on the matter, but only after much fevered debate with candid verbal barbs being hurled by board members as well as the administration.

At the onset, Sharon Blank, one of the applicants, stated, "I would like you to just reconsider a motion that Jeanie Goeden had made...about the sharing of the position of guidance counselor." She also indicated that Milt Dickinsen, another applicant who had been Elementary Guidance Counselor, agreed to the sharing of duties and felt it

was workable.

Board member Charles Ogi then wondered about splitting counselor duties as he would wonder about splitting any type of job. Goeden reasserted her position, "I don't feel that we're splitting; I think that we're sharing." She also modified her former stance by saying, "the more I think of it, I don't feel... a woman would have to be in that position. I'll even go as far as saying that." Ogi still wondered how the duties would be split.

The newest board member, Tom Brigham, then wished to talk in favor of the combination. He referred to an opinion of Board President, John Tessar, who felt that in the business world a split position would most likely not work. Brigham claimed, "at Regal Ware you're talking about pots and pans and here you're talking about

He later gave up the band business and started playing the organ. Silver Lake Resort at West Bend was his first job as entertainer at the organ, playing there many years. When Willard and Marge Lynn operated the Glacier Inn, they engaged Tiny to play the organ on Friday nights for the pleasure of the patrons. Following seven years at the Glacier Inn, Tiny was engaged to play at Hon-E-Kor Country Club where he has just completed 19 years. Tiny's versatile entertainment will be missed.

The annual Kewaskum Firemen-Legion Picnic held Saturday night and Sunday again was a fine success in spite of extremely hot, humid weather (90 degree at parade time Sunday) interspersed with thundershowers.

A light rain fell for the women's water fights early Saturday evening but soon ended and a large crowd came to the park, especially in the beer garden to listen to Danny and the Sunliners. It was sunny and hot Sunday until shortly after 4:30 p.m. when a thundershower accompanied by wind and threatening skies (including a tornado watch) sent people scurrying from the park for cover. The storm soon passed to the southeast and people flocked back into the park for the evening men's waterfights and picnic, which featured Ida Red in the beer garden. The Bill Thull Orchestra played from the bandstand during the afternoon, while the Syl Groeschel Band entertained in the beer garden. Fortunately, more thundershowers held out both nights until just after the picnic closed down.

Sunday's parade, annually one of the best in the area, was another excellent one lasting over an hour. A highlight of any parade is the musical organizations and there were at least a dozen of them in this year's line

of march. First prize among the floats again went to Regal Ware, who had another truly excellent one. Thousands of people lined the streets for the parade but no doubt the heat kept some of them from the park.

Following Regal's prize winning float, second place went to the Kewaskum Girl Scouts, third to Kewaskum 4-H, and fourth to the New Fane Kettle Riders Snowmobile Club. Children's entry winners were: 1. Farmington Girl Scouts and Brownies; 2. Summer Fun (Dawn Miranda); 3. Three clowns (Jessica, Christopher and Tammy Schmidt); 4. Clown girl with balloons (Jennifer Spoerl).

Harry Koch was selected as parade marshal for having completed 18 years' work with the parade committee.

Six teams were entered in the women's water fights Saturday evening. The first place trophy went to the team from Fredonia, second place trophy to the Kewaskum II team, and third to Campbellsport.

There were a large number of teams in the men's water fights Sunday evening, 18 in all. First place trophy was won by Theresa, second by Beaver Dam and third went to Newburg.

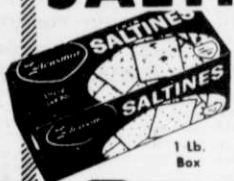

pan; we're talking personnel. Pots and pans - they have nothing to do with it."

Brigham continued that he had seen male-female guidance counselor combination work at the university level and that he wished to address some concerns about the division of responsibility that had been previously mentioned by Ogi. Brigham proposed that each counselor would be at the high school 2½ days and at the elementary schools 2½ days per week. He also suggested the elementary school assignments be divided by number of classes instead of students i.e. Blank would be assigned Wayne and Farmington with 18 classes and Dickinsen would have KES and Beechwood with 21 classes. A third suggestion was that high school students be divided alphabetically such that Dave Wietor, the only present counselor at the high school, would have ½ of all freshmen through seniors while Blank and Dickinsen would each have ¼ of all freshmen through seniors.

He stated some advantages of this third proposal. "Each counselor then would have the same students for 4 years" and "the same counselor would have all members of the same family."

Tessar then commented, "Apparently you did your homework, but did you sit down with Clark (Pearson - High School Principal), Dick Zarling (Director of the Elementary Education), and Floyd (Brenholt - Superintendent of Schools)...?" Tessar wished to hear such proposals rather as a recommendation from the administration. Later he also commented, "we have to get our administrative staff involved in something like this. All of a sudden you're telling them how to teach, and we don't know anything about it."

Supt. Brenholt, when asked about the proposal, said, "I'll react to it. I think that the way it was brought up is very poor. I object to that strenuously." He added that if proposals were introduced in this manner why should administration exist. High School Principal Clark Pearson concurred, "I have to agree with Floyd."

Brigham admitted to not consulting the administration. "This is news today." Then he candidly stated, "what I'm trying to do is get a swing vote. Doc's (Ogi) my swing vote."

Eventually Tessar asked, "why are you trying to swing his vote, not mine or Richard's (Theusch)? Do you feel that we're completely negative to this whole thing?" Brigham replied with an emphatic "yes" and he added that he was merely trying to address considerations that Ogi questioned. Tessar then stated, "I don't think there's anybody as flexible as I am." This, like many statements made throughout the evening, was met with laughter by the audience of about 15 people.

Tessar then elaborated on his position about splitting duties, saying that he had only said problems would arise if it was a combined position, and that he was not totally against the proposal. He also mentioned frequently that the content of Brigham's proposal had merit. His main objection was to the method of introduction. Board member Jerry Secor then interjected, "we probably do lots of things that maybe aren't just really 'class operations'." This also elicited guffaws from the audience.

Theusch, who had previously voted against the proposal, due mainly to the opinion that guidance would be one of the first things to be eliminated if the budget was not approved at the annual meeting, commented on the swing vote theory. "Doc has always been a big advocate of never acting on anything the first time it's presented to the board. So this is the first time Doc has seen it. I don't know how he could actually vote on it." Brigham once again responded that Ogi had been concerned about the points the proposals addressed for quite some time Goeden commented on the swing vote, "I wouldn't even try to convince Doc. I would try to convince you (Tessar) and Rich (Theusch), and I know you are, per se, male chauvinists."

Jan Hubbell, a counselor at West Bend, commented that the proposal had merit and was done by the majority of high schools in the area and seemed to work out well.

Finally an amended motion to include only the first 2 points and highly recommend the high school student assignment schedule passed 5 to 1 with Richard Theusch voting no. Tessar and Ogi, who had voted against the combined positions last time, were apparently 'swung'.

The board unanimously approved a nominee for the position of Middle School Prin-

icipal. Tessar stated it was the "recommendation of the administration to move Dennis Reha to this position." Reha had been principal at the Wayne Elementary School. Former Middle School Principal Ken Erickson will take on teaching duties at Beechwood Elementary. Victoria Marone had resigned as principal there, so Brenholt's recommendation was that Tom Larsen be made the principal at Beechwood as well as Farmington with Erickson acting as teacher-in-charge at Beechwood. This was approved by the board. Erickson would handle daily discipline problems but would not have any supervisory duties over the teachers. Larsen would visit the school at least once a week and deal with staff evaluations.

The board also granted Mrs. Jan Nesladek, an elementary teacher at Beechwood, a child care leave of absence for next year and accepted a resignation from Cynthia Greve, a Special Learning Disabilities teacher, who is getting married and relocating in western Wisconsin.

The board agreed to offer contracts to Shirley Mayo and Marilyn Wynveen for elementary teaching positions. They had been laid off last year.

The location of kindergarten sections was approved by the board. Richard Zarling said that by busing 8 children who are normally in the Farmington attendance area and 1 from the Kewaskum area, Beechwood could hold 1 section of 23. Farmington would have 1 section of 26. Six children from the Wayne area would be bused to KES to allow for 3 sections of 25 each.

Brenholt initiated a discussion on the proposed village Tax Incremental District. In a letter to the board he said the increased valuation in the TID would be around \$2,000. He said the school district could be short \$20,000 in tax monies, but an additional \$16,000 to \$17,000 in state aid may be received, but he cautioned that there is never any assurance of this. He said the result is that the \$3,000 or \$4,000 that is normally charged to the village would have to be assessed against other municipalities. "The school district will get its money but instead of coming from this tax incremental district in the village, it's going to come from the townships."

Tessar noted that this was "strictly a village decision," but it was agreed that Brenholt would attend a public hearing

about TIF on July 16 at 7 p.m. at the Kewaskum Municipal Building. He said the Wisconsin Association of School Boards indicated that TIF districts were not to a school district's advantage if municipal growth would occur anyway.

Theusch Resigns; Brown New Chairman Of Town Farmington

Vaughn Brown is the new chairman of the Town of Farmington.

Vaughn, 71, took over last Tuesday night after Jack Theusch submitted his resignation. Vaughn had served in the post once before, from 1973 to 1977.

Theusch, a detective with the Washington County Sheriff's Department, was unopposed in this year's spring election and was elected to a third term as town chairman. He cited a conflict with his job as a detective as the main reason he was resigning.

After learning of Theusch's plans to resign, Brown informed one of the town supervisors that he would be interested in serving as chairman again. Neither of the two town supervisors, Carl Hauch or Eugene Laatsch, was interested in taking the chairman's job. Laatsch made the motion to appoint Brown, and it was unanimously approved. Clerk Joanne Oneska voted with the supervisors.

Brown took the oath of office and chaired the remainder of the meeting.

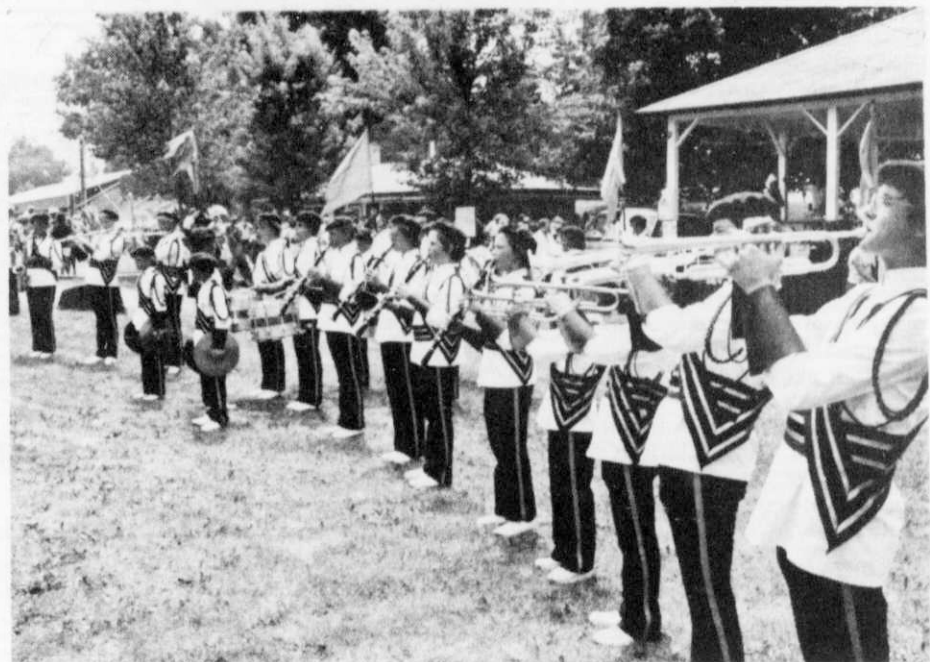

Ivan "Ike" Kumrow, Soil Conservation Technician, U. S. Soil Conservation Service has received a special achievement award for the period of October 1, 1979, through December 31, 1980. Ike was presented with a certificate and cash award by Don Kurer, District Conservationist, at a regular Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District meeting on Wednesday, June 24.

In a recognition letter from Cliff McQuire, State Conservationist, Ike was cited for displaying "high quality and quantity of conservation planning and application resulting in a high percentage of conservation on the land."

Ivan Kumrow has assisted landowners in Washington County since 1965. One of his most recent activities is to assist landowners in the Big Cedar

Lake watershed, plan and apply soil and water conservation practices to protect the quality of water runoff from the land to the lake. He has personally assisted farmers in planning 770 acres which resulted in five critical manure storage facilities being installed to protect the lake. In addition, 53 acres contour farming, 41 acres contour strips, 1,375 feet of grass waterways, 500 feet diversion terraces and 100 feet of rock lined grade stabilization structure was installed. Also 4,900 feet of grass waterway remain to be constructed.

Ike has two trout ponds of his own, with springs producing over 200 gallons of water per minute. His hobbies are auto mechanics and flying. He, his wife Jan and daughter Carrie, live about two miles north of Boltonville on Cranberry Road.

The meeting was then adjourned by Bobby Friedemann and Michelle Becker.

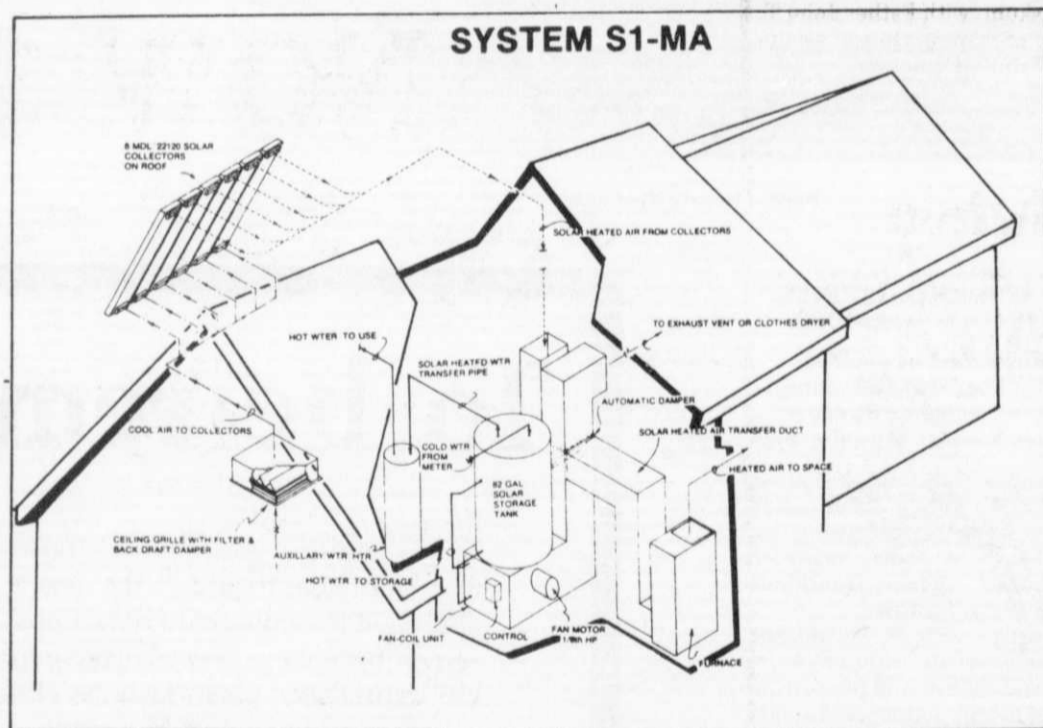

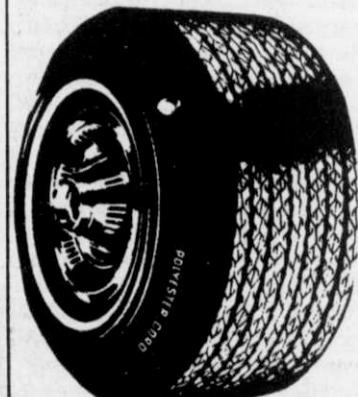

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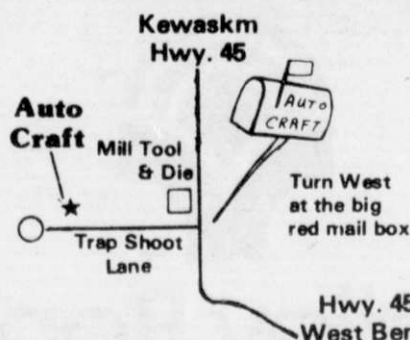

A phone call from Sussex, Wisconsin informed us that a pornographer is moving into that community, and the caller asked for information about pornography.

We ask you to please publish this letter as your readers should be concerned about what is going on near them.

According to a recent report the U.S. has perhaps 20,000 adult bookstores, each generating about \$150,000.00 to \$200,000.00 a year in gross sales if it is run efficiently. If the stores is in a good location, one sex film in a small booth can possibly produce \$1.8 million a year. Sexually explicit videotape cassettes, priced at \$70 to \$100, are top-selling items.

The ten leading sex magazines have a circulation of more than 16 million copies a month, and in 1979 returned more than \$500 million in estimated revenues. There are hundreds of obscene publications, some of which even depict children in intercourse, sex with animals, homosexual conduct and other sexual perversions of all sorts. Most of such publications eventually get into the hands of children.

There are about 800 full-time movie houses, with 400 or 500 more exhibiting sex films periodically. On cable television in some communities there are highly explicit sexual scenes. There are clubs that play provocative statements and sound over the telephone, including sexual coaching, according to one report.

The Wall Street Journal recently projected that the porno cassette business will be about \$4 billion annually by 1985. According to the founder of CITIZENS FOR DECENCY

THROUGH LAW it isn't going to do us a bit a good to have churches and schools if that happens, because these people will eat away the minds and hearts and the souls of our children who are getting the impression that this is an acceptable life-style.

We urge every concerned citizen to contact his or her elected officials - local, state and federal - and request the enactment and enforcement of stricter obscenity laws.

We appreciate donations so we can continue to inform and serve our fellow citizens.

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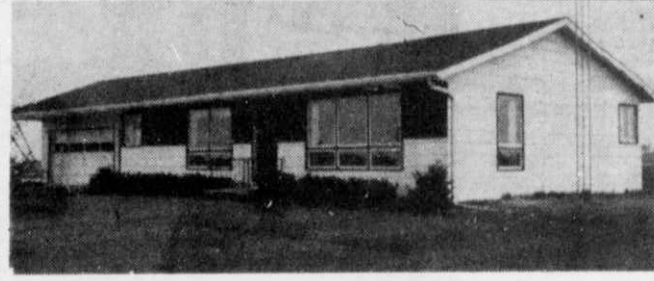

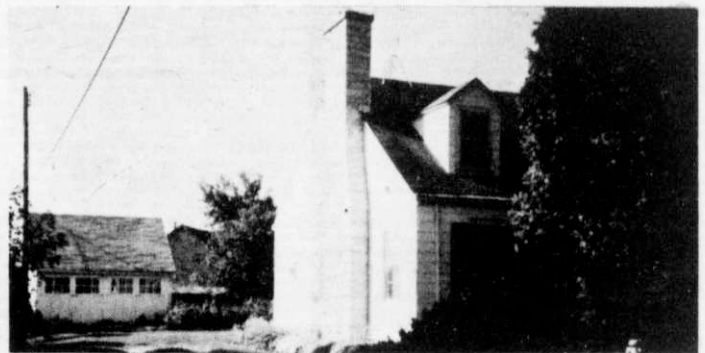

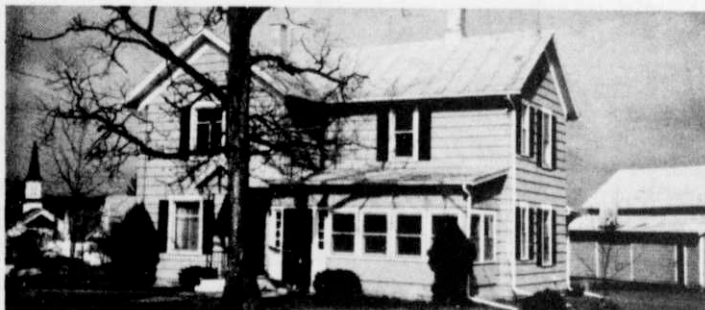

Reporting Deadline For Crop Acreages Nears at ASCS

All farmers are strongly urged to report their 1981 crop acreages to the ASCS office no later than July 20, according to Donald E. Sampson, director of the Washington County office.

"We certainly don't want to see people denied deficiency payments or disaster protection because they failed to report," quotes Sampson. Current prices of wheat and barley are well below the targets or price guarantees. The target for wheat is \$3.81 per bushel and \$2.60 per bushel for barley.

If the average price received by farmers during the 5 month marketing period (July thru November) falls below the target rate, the deficiency payment is triggered. Payments are determined by multiplying the difference between target and the average grain price times the acres times the ASC yield.

Sampson would also like to see farmers aware of the disaster provisions which is really free crop insurance. 60% of the ASC yield is guaranteed. Payments are made when production falls below 60% of the normal expected ASC yield. With the hot weather and drought conditions anything could happen.
