Establish TIF District

Village to Be Divided Into 3 Wards

The Kewaskum Village Board voted unanimously Monday night to establish three wards within the village for election purposes.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt explained to the board that Kewaskum fell into a category of municipalities under 10,000 population so that wards would have a minimum of 300 people and a maximum of 1,000 people. The wards are defined in a resolution as follows:

Ward 1 consists of all properties east of the railroad tracks except for Prospect Street addresses. This ward has a total population of 800.

Ward 2 is the northwestern portion of the village west of the rear lot lines of those properties located on Fond du Lac Avenue and north of the Kewaskum Creek. This ward has 841 inhabitants.

Ward 3 consists of all properties along both sides of Fond du Lac Avenue and east to the railroad tracks. Also included are all properties south of the Kewaskum Creek (including Bel-Ric Acres) and all Prospect Street addresses. This ward has 777 people.

Trustee Paul Blumer was prompted to ask, "what's the idea of breaking it down into wards?" Schmidt replied, "the state legislature just deemed that's the way it should be done." Schmidt also informed the board that, "we fall within 1

county supervisory district and we elect at large." The state law generally requires that each ward have its own ballot boxes. This would require 3 sets of records and 3 persons recording at the polls.

Schmidt did add that if the ordinance was adopted at least 60 days prior to an election by a community under 10,000

population, the separate ballot box requirement could be waived. In an election like last fall's where 6 ballot boxes were used, up to 18 boxes would be needed if there were 3 wards. Since ballot boxes cost around \$45 each, Schmidt wished to circumvent this requirement by adoption of the resolution now.

Tornado Warning Sounded Here; Area Escapes

Seven tornadoes were reported in the state Monday afternoon but the Kewaskum area escaped with a thunder and windstorm. However, the tornado warning siren was sounded in the village shortly before 2 p.m. after a tornado was sighted over Horicon marsh and was reported heading in this direction. One other tornado was reported in Dodge County.

The only apparent damage in Washington County was several downed trees and a power line near Boltonville in the Town of Farmington. One customer lost power from the downed pole but service was restored quickly.

However, a tornado destroyed a barn in the Town of Oakfield, Fond du Lac County at 1:15 p.m. A funnel cloud touched down in Oak Creek south of Milwaukee at 3:30 p.m., damaging a number of homes.

'Express Lane' for Taxpayers New Feature In County Treasurer's Office This Year

A new feature in the Washington County Treasurer's office this year will be an "express lane" for taxpayers with just one property who come prepared to pay the second half of their real estate taxes on or before the July 31 deadline, Fredric A. Seefeldt, County Treasurer, announced today.

"To qualify for the "express lane" a taxpayer must be paying the taxes on just one property, have his tax bill or tax key number in hand, and have his payment in hand, be it check or cash," said Seefeldt.

"Our experience last year indicated that the majority of the taxpayers coming into our office in the last days before the deadline are homeowners with just one property. Again, most of these folks have their tax bill in hand and a check or cash in the right amount ready to pay. I want to do a better job of serving these folks this year and I think the "express lane" will do just that," Seefeldt said.

"Slowdowns in the lines occur when taxpayers come into the office with insufficient information, and we have to take time to look up their properties in our various indexes. This in effect penalizes the people who are prepared and are waiting in line behind them. Taxpayers with a large number of parcels

take extra time and are equivalent to ten, fifteen or twenty individuals in terms of processing time," Seefeldt observed.

"With the "express lane," my staff and I expect to be able to better serve the one property homeowner and still properly serve the large property owner, as well as cut down the length of the waiting lines," Seefeldt said.

Seefeldt again reminded taxpayers that payments can be made in person or mailed to his office. The treasurer's office is Room 226 of the Courthouse, 432 E. Washington St., (Hwy. 33), West Bend. Office hours are 8 a.m. - noon and 1 - 5 p.m., Monday - Friday. Payments by mail should be addressed to: Washington County Treasurer, P.O. Box 518, West Bend, WI 53095.

All payments by mail must carry a July postmark to be considered timely. "Any mail postmarked in August will be subject by state law to an 8% interest late payment penalty," Seefeldt cautioned.



"We have a tax incremental district," was the proclamation by Village President Jerry Stollenwerk after the board unanimously approved the establishment of boundaries. A public hearing was held by the Plan Commission on July 16 in regard to the district. Jeff Rohrer, who serves on that commission, reported that Dan Thompson of Action Associates was present to answer any questions on TIF and that Floyd Brenholt of the Kewaskum Schools was also present to relay their viewpoint.

At that meeting, Brenholt explained that \$20,000 in taxes would be lost to the school district, but that \$17,000 of this would most likely be made up by state aids, leaving \$3,000 that other municipalities would have to pick up. The school district was concerned that the townships' levies would be higher and that the state aid formula may be changed such that less aid might be received by the schools. Other concerns were that the property in the TIF district may be charged with "school tax" when the school district may actually not receive this tax money and that sidewalks should be of higher priority on the project plan. The Plan Commission did recommend that all sidewalks to Bel-Ric Acres be done simultaneously and after the first 3 projects.

At both that meeting and the board meeting, Dan Schmidt presented figures which indicate that the townships will over the next few years receive more state tax credit while the village will receive less credit such that any losses incurred by the townships due to TIF would be greatly offset. The Town of Kewaskum in 1980-81 received \$44,597; in '82 it will most likely receive \$38,484; in '83 it will receive \$55,909. The Town of Wayne in 1980-81 received \$60,998; in '82 it should get \$52,457, and in '83 it will receive \$75,806. The Village of Kewaskum, however, got \$223,861 in 1980-81; in '82 the village will receive \$144,935; in '83 it should get \$121,413. The townships will have increased aids of 24 to 25% while the village's aids will decrease 45%. Schmidt said, "this shows that the townships are all receivers of more money in the biennium. The village is a definite loser. The village has

the largest decrease of any municipality in Washington County."

The Plan Commission did recommend the establishment of the TIF district. It roughly includes the new park, a large area northwest of Braatz Drive, the area along the Milwaukee River within town and north of town, a small section of downtown south of Main Street, the area along the Kewaskum Creek, the village garage area, the shopping center property, and Lutheran Memorial Park cemetery south of town. A 7-page legal description exists and according to Schmidt took 2 hours to read for verification. A large map of the district is available at the Municipal Building. It is within this TIF district that projects such as the construction of a water tower and sidewalk extension will occur.

A separate public hearing on the project proposal will be held on July 30 at 7:00 p.m. followed by a special village board meeting.

Superintendent of Public Works Augie Bilgo and Trustee Don Mlodzik made a recommendation to the board to purchase a Ford firetruck chassis from Irl Ford-Mercury of Hartford for \$32,851. This was not the lowest bid, however, it was felt that the Ford

body would require less modification than some other chassis might, thus actually saving \$200 - \$1500. Bilgo said, "there are advantages, we feel, by going with a Ford." There will be a recommendation for the pumper equipment made at the next board meeting.

Gary Schneider, a surveyor with R.A. Weis & Co. of West Bend was present to explain a proposed duplex-condominium project initiated by LeRoy Zipperer, a West Bend Contractor. The two condo-duplexes would be located on the south end of Bel-Ric Drive. Each condo-duplex would be sold as 2 separate units instead of one, with exclusive use areas and a common use area being the driveway. The board accepted a recommendation from the plan commission and approved the rezoning of the land from an R-2 (single family) to R-3 (2 family residence) status. What is now 3 parcels of land will be re-divided into 2 parcels. A development plan must be presented to the plan commission for its approval.

The board approved placing 2 stop signs along Brooklane Drive at the intersection with Western Avenue, since the street has become a speedway with children present in the area. Western Avenue will continue to stop at this T-inter-

section.

The State Transportation Commission informed Dan Schmidt that the C & NW railroad will be fixing the First Street crossing in August and the Second Street crossing in September. Schmidt wrote back that this should be done simultaneously, since the cost would double if done separately. The Transportation Commission agreed and said the railroad "should coordinate this work with the village."

Schmidt noted, "we've received numerous compliments on our Main Street crossing." A cantilever gate will be installed with 85% of this cost incurred by the state. There has been a stipulation that the gate will not go down if trains are merely switching at Regal Ware or the malt house.

A speed reduction request for the south side of the village along Hi-way 45 has been approved by the Transportation Commission, 30 mph will be posted up to the shopping center parking lot. South of this, the speed limit will be 45 mph up to a point near Ray Klein's orchard.

A letter was received from Floyd Brenholt praising the

village's new Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. Brenholt remarked that, "the village has done a fine job with the park," and concluded, "without dedication and determination to do a good job, it could have been much less than it turned out to be." President Stollenwerk thanked him "for taking a few minutes out and sending a letter, 'cause we don't get many.'"

63% of MCW's Family Physician Graduates Remain in Wisconsin

The family practice residency programs of the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) and community hospitals are filling a need in the state.

Small cities in outlying areas of Wisconsin have gained 24 physicians from the first five graduating classes of the Medical College's Family Practice Residency Program. These physicians have set up practice in municipalities ranging from Prentice, population 598, to Ashland, population 8,980. They have also settled in Oconto Falls, Sister Bay, Burlington, New London, Park Falls, Hudson, Kewaskum, Ripon, Jackson, Chilton, Shawano, DeForest, and Pulaski. Dr. Aurora Estrella practices in Kewaskum.

In all, 73 (63 percent) of the 115 family physicians graduated from MCW's residency program have remained in Wisconsin.

The program was established in 1974.

Six hospitals provide family practice training through the MCW program: Good Samaritan Medical Center-Deaconess campus, St. Luke's, St. Mary's, and St. Michael, all in Milwaukee; Waukesha Memorial, and the Southeast Family Practice Center, a joint residency program beginning this July at St. Catherine's Hospital in Kenosha.

Rural municipalities are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to attract young physicians today. The federal government recognized this problem when it identified a national need for family physicians in rural areas and encouraged more physicians to train in family practice.

The Medical College of Wisconsin is an independent free-standing school for medical and related health sciences. Its

principal mission is to provide medical science education, research, and patient care services. It is the leading provider of physicians for Wisconsin.

In addition to the M.D. curriculum, MCW offers Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy curriculums in the basic sciences. It also has training programs for graduate physicians (residents), students in allied health professions, and continuing education programs for practicing physicians and other health professionals. Its new School of Nursing is offering a baccalaureate degree-completion program for RNs.





DNR to Participate in Farm Progress Days With Groundwater and Forestry Exhibits

The Department of Natural Resources will once again participate in Farm Progress Days with exhibits on groundwater protection and forestry management.

This year Farm Progress Days will be held July 28, 29 and 30 on the Richard and Helen Van Epern farm at the intersection of County J and Highway 41, just north of Kaukauna in Outagamie County.

The DNR groundwater display will provide the public with facts on groundwater, how it is contaminated, and how it can be protected. Because groundwater is virtually impossible to clean once it is polluted, the display and DNR staff will have information on proper agricultural waste disposal, well installation and well testing for bacteria and nitrates. The groundwater display will be located in the UW-Extension tent in tent city.

DNR will also have forestry displays and demonstrations on

two acres just south of tent city. Exhibits will show how to manage woodlands and select firewood. Four tree stands, wildlife plantings, tree varieties, windbreaks, and pulp and saw timber can be viewed. Tree identification and tree farming tips will also be offered. Working saw mills will produce timber and shingles on the grounds. Fire control equipment will also be displayed.

Survey Being Made On Senior Citizen Needs in County

The Washington County Office on Aging, the Committee on Aging and the Advisory Council on Aging have contracted with Dr. Russell Moberly and Associates, to survey the needs of the aging in Washington County.

This is being done under the provisions of the Older American Act, Title III-B, which provides federal funds to help older Americans to live with maximum independence and avoid unnecessary premature institutionalization.

The State of Wisconsin Plan on Aging requires that the needs of older persons in each county be assessed to "provide adequate and effective opportunities for older persons to express their views on policy development and program implementation."

Dr. Moberly has developed a questionnaire to determine the economic and social needs of our aging citizens. All aging citizens, age 60 or over are invited to complete this questionnaire. This is your opportunity to express your feel-

ings and attitudes concerning your needs, interests and desires and your willingness to participate in programs which attempt to satisfy the needs of our older Americans in Washington County.

Washington Street, West Bend, WI 53095, telephone 342-2929 ext. 4497, 644-5204 ext. 4497, 338-4497. All senior Citizens are urged to get and complete this questionnaire as soon as possible. All answers will be treated in a confidential manner and will not affect any present benefits. However, the results of the survey will affect aging programs for the future.







MOTORCYCLE SAFETY AWARENESS MONTH



Motorcycles Have Equal Rights • Share The Road

With motorcycling the fastest growing means of transportation in the past decade, the State Patrol is emphasizing motorcycling safety laws as the "Law of the Month" for July. Captain W. C. DeGuire, Commanding District No. 3, of the Wisconsin State Patrol, said cycle laws are especially timely since Governor Lee Sherman Dreyfus has proclaimed July to be "Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month."

Captain DeGuire said State Troopers will be directing their efforts toward behavior of "other" motorists as it may affect motorcycling safety as well as convincing cycle riders that excessive consumption of alcohol is the greatest single factor in motorcycling fatalities.

"Failure to yield the right of way to the motorcyclist is the most frequent violation in cycle/car crashes," he said. "Usually the other driver simply didn't see the cycle until it was too late. However, in some cases, the auto driver saw the cycle but assumed it would be able to stop in time," he added.

In the event of a crash, a cyclist's best friend is a good helmet, he said. "A recent DOT study indicates that the death and injury rate for unhelmeted cyclists involved in crashes is substantially higher than for those riders wearing helmets," Captain DeGuire pointed out.

Other drivers should develop the habit of looking for motorcycles, mopeds and bicycles in traffic, and to not make turns in front of an oncoming cycle unless they are absolutely sure that it is safe, he said.

Other law enforcement agencies are urged to participate in the "Law of the Month" campaign, which selects timely laws for emphasis each month.

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'Society's Pressure Points' Theme of This Year's Soil Stewardship Week

"Society's Pressure Points" was the theme of this year's Soil Stewardship week proclaimed by Governor Dreyfus.

Webster defines a steward as one who manages another's property. Since God created all things including the land, they do not belong to us but to God, the ultimate owner of all that we have. We are stewards of our soil, not proprietors. Therefore, for us to degrade the environment in pursuit of affluence just for the sake of accumulating more and more, diminishes the rightful heritage of those who follow us.

The precious topsoil on which our crops are grown is eroding from wind and water at the rate of 14 tons per acre per year according to former USDA secretary Bergland. Only 1.5

tons per acre is formed annually under top conditions. Farm technology has provided farmers with the best for top production but the best seed, fertilizer and pesticides will not function well without topsoil. Spurred by foreign demand and high cash returns, some farmers are planting continuous cash crops, sometimes on marginal land resulting in the most damage to the land. Pressure for urban growth also can prematurely convert farmland to houses and roads. Every year 3 million acres of American farmland are converted to non-agricultural uses. This loss has touched every corner of America including Washington County. But nobody seems to be starving. However, unless the steady trend of disappearing farmland stops, it will someday touch all of our lives and those of our children.

Flood Insurance Meeting in County

A public meeting has been scheduled for 10:30 a.m. on August 12, in the Washington County Courthouse Auditorium to discuss the preliminary results of the Flood Insurance Study for the unincorporated areas of Washington County. Representatives of the Federal Insurance Administration, the study contractor, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the County Land Use and Park Department will be in attendance.

The study investigates the existence and severity of flood hazards in the unincorporated areas of the county and aids in the administration of the National Flood Insurance of 1968 and the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973. The study will be used by the Federal Insurance Administration to convert the county to the regular program of flood insurance.

Flood information is important for the development of accurate and adequate floodplain management ordinances. In addition, lenders, insurance agents and realtors all have a

special interest and responsibility in keeping abreast of the community's status in the program.

A technical meeting will also be held at 8:30 a.m. on August 12 intended specifically for community officials to review minimum floodplain management requirements of the program, to review the draft maps and to have an opportunity to ask questions of the state and federal officials in attendance.

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Real Estate Tax Payments for 2nd Half Due July 31

Seefeldt cautioned that all payments must carry a July postmark to be considered timely. "Any mail postmarked in August will be subject by state law to a 1% per month interest penalty retroactive to January 1 of this year," he stated.

Seefeldt also advised that to insure prompt crediting of their

account, taxpayers should include the tax key numbers of the properties on which they are paying taxes. "This number can be found in the upper right hand corner of their tax receipts," said Seefeldt.

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

He was followed by Randy Mueller of Saukville, who got through only an inning and two-thirds, and John Jazak of West Bend, who finished up. Jazak struck out six.

Ray Maderich of Thiensville-Mequon rapped out three hits for the East stars and Bill Tschanz of Grafton and Chris Stadler of Thiensville-Mequon had two hits each, as the East stars totaled 15 hits. The West was held to four hits.

The East got their first run in the second as Grafton's Bruce Bertling doubled, and scored on a single by Maderich. It remained 1-0 until the fourth when the East got three off Mueller. Chris Schroeder of Thiensville-Mequon walked and four singles in a row by Maderich, Todd Huffman of Thiensville-Mequon, Keith Peterson of Cedarburg, and Tschanz scored the runs. A fine crowd turned out for the game which was played in dark, dreary weather. The all-star players, managers, coaches, and scorekeepers were awarded plaques in pre-game ceremonies conducted by Commissioner Jake Oelhafen.

Other Kewaskum players who played on the West team besides first baseman Backhaus

included catcher Ron Theusch, right fielder Tom Bartelt, third baseman Al Jaeger and left fielder Randy White. Theusch got one hit in two times at bat.

Dave Drexler, 33, is the 31st "runner of the month" and first "nonstop" runner. That is he began running in high school and has continued for these almost twenty years!

Stratford High School, where he graduated in 1966, did not have cross country but Dave was on the football team and wrestled. Dave was also on the track team for four years. As a senior he placed third in state in Class C in the quarter mile with a time of 51.7.

At Stout, where he was a '77 graduate with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Industrial Arts, he still holds the 660 record of 1.12. His best quarter mile was 49.09. To stay in condition he ran on the cross country team.

He began teaching in Augusta, Wisconsin, and in a few months missed the regular running of the previous years so he began to run with a member of the Indianhead Track Club. His first competition was the 10 mile Carson Park Run in May of '71. Although he never ran that far before he completed it in 60 minutes and felt good.

Then he became very eager to

try a marathon so he increased his mileage and training and in August finished the Paavo Nurmi in 3:12. Of his twelve marathons a 2:53 in the Drake Relay Marathon at Des Moines, Iowa, was his best time.

"I am looking forward to the (8th annual) Kewaskum Kettle 20 on Sunday, August 16," Dave said. "It will be a good training run for the Grafton to Milwaukee Lakefront Marathon on September 20, in which I hope to run a 2:50," he added.

Dave is flexible in his running schedule but likes to run 5 to 10 miles daily including interval work. A five mile track session consists of a one mile warmup, three miles of intervals with alternating a fast and slow lap and a one mile cool-down run.

At 5' 10" he has remained about 155 pounds during all these running years but feels that 148 is his best running weight. His resting pulse is 43. He has had no serious injury from all his running and hopes to continue to run for a long time. To his running he credits, among other things, his more awareness of foods and nutrition. He readily encourages others to run and obtain its benefits.

For eight years he has been teaching industrial arts at Kewaskum High School. For six years he has coached boys

track, the last two as head coach. For four years he has coached boys and girls cross country.

His son Anton, age 6, was only 3 when he ran the one mile in the March Run in West Bend in '79. They run together occasionally. His daughter Lynette is 4.
