Kewaskum Native Recipient of International House's 'Student of the Year' Award



Board Chairman Henry Kissinger (right) has announced that Paul S. Berg was to be one of the two recipients of International House's "Student of the Year" award. Founded in 1924 by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., International House is a residence and program center for more than 500 foreign and American graduate students located on Riverside Drive, near Columbia University, in New York City. Berg became a resident of International House two years ago, and has since held the following positions there: House Manager, Manager of the Theater Service, Resident Fellow, and President of the Resident Council. He was elected to be one of two student trustees on the Board of Trustees in October, 1980. He as been active in a number of other areas in the House, leading frequent walking tours of New York City, tutoring foreign students in English, and coordinating social events. He is a native of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and received his BA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, in history and political science with distinction. He completed two years of Law School at Wisconsin before moving to New York City and Columbia University to study for a Master's in International Affairs. He will return to Wisconsin to finish his JD in law in the fall.

At a special meeting of the Kewaskum Plan Commission and Village Board Thursday evening, approval was given to the final revised list of projects in Kewaskum's Tax Incremental District No.1.

Present at the hearing was School Superintendent Floyd Brenholt. His concern was the effect the TIF District could have on the Kewaskum School District in the form of lost revenues from this area. These lost funds would have to be picked up by other municipalities in the school district. Another concern was the low priority given to the plan to provide walkways to Bel-Ric subdivision which would

Railroad Crossing Repairs Continue Village Board OK's Fire **Truck Pumper Purchase**

On the recommendation of the Public Works Committee, the Village Board unanimously voted to accept the low bid of \$54,997.00 from Barnett of Columbus to furnish a new fire truck pumper and equipment. Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo noted delivery of the chassis is expected by November and this should result in the new truck being available by March or April. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated a community from North Carolina is interested in purchasing the village's present truck.

Schmidt informed the board that repair work on the railroad crossings is progressing. Crews are working on the First Street' crossing which was to be finished and open by Wednesday. The Second Street crossing will be closed for repairs next week with work completed by August 15. Schmidt also asked the board to consider a recommendation to keep the beach open on weekends during the entire month of September. He noted a record number of swim passes had been sold this year and there was no reason to close the pool as long as good swimming weather prevailed. Estimated cost for the extra month's operation would run approximately \$350.

approval from both the Plan Commission and Village Board. Rohrer presented a Plan

Commission recommendation that the village consider reducing the width of its sidewalks from five to four feet. This change would result in a material cost savings of 20% on cement.

In other action the board approved Ordinance No.81-6, which will require a fee of \$50.00 for a petition for rezoning. Previously there was no charge involved.

At the close of the meeting, Dan Schmidt made a short statement regarding the 1982 budget. Schmidt noted that although all department heads had done an excellent job of keeping their expenditures in line for 1981, the village, like everyone else in the country will have to look for more ways to hold the line on spending. He noted the village will have to 're-think who provides what to who and combining jobs." Schmidt presented several thoughts on keeping the 1982 budget in line with available funds. Schmidt said he will be asking department heads for three budget figures, "below base budget," "current," and "additional spending beyond budget." Schmidt stated, "I'm the front-line cost-cutter, I need help from Bill Martin and we need help from the board." The board also approved a certified survey map for the Leroy Zipperer property in Bel-Ric Acres.

ed upward to account for inflation over the next few years." There will be 12 categories for improvement plus one for administrative expenses. Thompson noted "the bulk of the expenditures are scheduled for 1982 and '83 and smaller expenditures in 1984 and '85.'' No expenditures can be made after January 1, 1986.

The project schedule for the next five years would be as follows: (Items will not necessarily be constructed in the order which they are listed for a specific year. Also, not all projects listed in the plan may be constructed. Additional projects have been included in the event a particular project must be dropped allowing the village the opportunity to make an adjustment and substitute another project. It is hoped, however, that all projects listed could and would be developed).

The 1982 project schedule would include the water loop to Roseland Drive, Well No.3, and administrative expenses totaling \$955,000.

Construction for 1983 would cover three interceptor sewers, storm sewers and sidewalk on the east and west sides of Fond du Lac Avenue from Highway "H" to the bridge, storm sewer, curbing sidewalk and paving on south side of Highway H from Fond du Lac Avenue to Highway H bridge. and storm sewer curbing, sidewalk and paving from Highway H to Prospect Drive for a cost of \$870,000.

Construction in 1984 would cover a downtown parking lot for a total of \$160,000.

1985 construction would cover repair of the Milwaukee River Dam, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, curbing, sidewalk and paving along the east side of Fond du Lac Avenue from Old Fond du Lac Road south of a distance of 1,000 feet, at a cost of \$140,000.

The total cost of the five-year plan will be \$2,125.000. The Village Board voted 5-0 to approve the project plan. Trustees Raynor Herriges and Donald Mlodzik were not present at the meeting.



Trees for Tomorrow

Robert Getter, President of Kewaskum Kiwanis, and his wife attended the 32nd Annual Natural Resource Tour at Trees for Tomorrow Resources Education Center July 31 through August 2. During this Kiwanis sponsored event, Bob and his wife learned about "This Great Land of Ours."

The 3-day clinic included such activities as touring the Toumey Tree Nursey and Bond Falls, and visiting the Sylvania Recreation Area in the Ottawa National Forest. Also included were addresses on topics such as "Protecting Our Resource Heritage." a slide description of Soils and Waters of Middle East, a discussion of how we can better use our soil and water for food, and on outstanding slide presentation of the plant and wildlife in "The Quaking Bogs: Our Wetland Resource'' which included an extremely rare pictorial description of loons.

Trees for Tomorrow is a resource center whose objectives are to create and encourage an awareness of the need for wise use and proper management of those natural resources upon which the lives of humanity depends. Besides 3-day clinics such as these. week-long workshops are provided for teachers, for which Kewaskum Kiwanis will provide scholarships to teachers in any school; and in winter cross country ski weekends are held to show people the outdoors in winter.


The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. Present were Trustees Raynor Herriges, Donald Mlodzik, Paul Blumer, Jeffrey Rohrer and David Nigh. Trustee. Richard Schmidt asked to be excused.

The minutes of the meeting of July 6, 1981, were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Blumer. Voice vote was unanimous.



Wisconsin State Fair visitors will find Department of Natural Resources in two new buildings this year. Fair dates are August 6-16.

The new buildings on the 1.8 acre site at the south end of the fairgrounds replace the old log cabin which had been badly damaged by wood eating beetles and the open forestry shed which was removed to permit widening of Greenfield Avenue bordering the grounds.

Constructed of cedar logs, the new buildings are designed to retain the rustic charm of the old log cabin. They are planned to be energy efficient with fan-assisted air flow to provide cooling on hot summer days.






