# Lions Chicken Bar-B-Q, Kettle 20 + 2 Run Sunday

On Sunday, August 16, the Kewaskum Lions Club will hold its eighth annual Kettle 20 + 2 run in the village park (River Hill Park). There will be 20 kilometer, 7.5 mile and 3.5 mile races.

Race time is 9:15 a.m. with registration from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. Pre-registration is \$4.50 and registration on the day of the race is \$5.50.

There are 21 divisions for men and women in these races. Medalions and ribbons will be awarded for places one through ten and chicken dinners will be available to all runners at a reduced cost of \$2.00. New t-shirts will be given to runners who pre-register.

The race has grown annually and has drawn a number of world class runners such as Lucian Rosa, the first winner, and Cindy Bremser, who has competed in many national events. Jim Drews holds the Kettle 20 record of 65 minutes. Bremser holds the women's record of 78:43. Last year the winner was Tom Maxson; a UW-Oshkosh runner who ran' the 12.5 mile course in 68 minutes. In this year's field are runners from Chicago and Northbrook, Illinois. Last year a record 317 runners participated in the race.

Other events include a classic auto display on the park grounds from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with the Kettle Moraine Klassic Kar Klub displaying its cars. Other area collectors are encouraged to bring and display their autos as well.

The Lions Club will be serving its famous bar-b-qued chicken starting at 11:00 a.m. and continuing until all are served. Carry out chicken will be available. There will be games and beer and soda served.

# School Board Tables Action on Administrative Salary Raises

At Monday evening's School Board meeting, discussion was held on administrative salaries for 1981-82. Board member Gerald Secor, Chairman of the Salaries Committee, presented proposed salaries which also included raises in fringe benefits. Tentative wage increases ranged from a low of 11.4% to a top of 16.6%.

In reviewing the figures, board member Dr. Charles Ogi stated, "in my opinion some of the percentages are extraordinary." Ralph Horner, a parent and concerned taxpayer. commented, "I work in private industry and we're not seeing raises anywhere the size of these." Superintendent Floyd Brenholt noted some of the "administrative personnel are making substantially less than surrounding areas, noting, somebody in this type of job should have the right to expect a reasonable salary. Brenholt asked Horner if employees were taking cuts at Gehl. Horner replied some workers already had. Horner stated, "16.6% this time and compound it by 10% next time, that's a sizable increase. I don't see how you can do it in good faith to the taxpayer." Secor noted none of the administrative salaries have gone up at the same rate as teachers.

Salary recommendations presented to the board were: Clark Pearson \$31,814 to

\$35,436, up 11.4%

Roy Esser \$30,858 to \$34,381, up 11.4%.

Ken Erickson \$27,224 to \$30,376, up 11.6%.

Richard Zarling \$28,734 to \$32,042, up 11.6%.

David Wellskopf \$19,975 to \$22,567, up 13.0%.

George Allmann \$24,148 to \$27,450, up 13.7% Robert Borch \$25,781 to

\$30,049, up 16.6%.

Dennis Reha to \$24,906, plus three steps.

Board member Tom Brigham stated, "I think there are one or two people who are high, I would like to see this discussed at a special meeting." # **Resurfacing of County Trunk V Begins Next Week**

Road construction is expected to start the week of August 17 on the resurfacing of C.T.H. "V" from the south Fond du Lac County - north Washington County line to C.T.H. "Y' in Campbellsport. The work will consist of placement of bituminous concrete resurfacing, crushed aggregate shoulders, and beam guard.

The five-mile project will be performed under a contract let to Streets and Roads Construction Corp. of Waukesha at an estimated cost of \$262,034.00. Financing will be shared on approximately a 75-25 percentage by the federal government and Fond du Lac respectively, from funds provided primarily

by gas taxes.

This work will be done under traffic with both directions of traffic being routed over a single lane through the construction zone. Motorists are urged to be aware of the flagmen and use caution in the construction zone.

It is anticipated that this project will be completed by September 30.



where Dr. Claus Christiansen had 23 patients, all of whom had been on anti-convulsant medication for periods of 3 to 17 years.

During the 84-day study, while the medication was continued as usual, some of the patients received vitamin D, and others, for comparison, received an inert pill. Vitamin D proved effective in reducing the number of seizures, the medical team reports, though how it does so is unknown.

year, they are substantially higher than proposed in April, resulting in a lower increase than anticipated.

Daily lunch tickets, grades 1-12, will go from 95c to \$1.00, reduced lunch from 20c to 40c, adult \$1.10 to \$1.25. Five-meal tickets for grades 1-6 will increase from \$3.75 to \$4.25, grades 7-12 \$4.00 to \$4.50, reduced lunch \$1.00 to \$2.00, adult \$5.50 to \$6.25. Borch noted they will be monitoring costs very closely and prices may have to be increased later in the year.

Kindergarten fees were increased from \$8.00 to \$13.00 per semester. Borch informed the board the school would not receive any subsidy for the daily milk served as in past years, therefore, the fee must cover the full cost of the milk, plus costs for crackers and straws.







comment, and make necessary changes during the planning effort.



### SHOCKING

When you travel the highways, shock absorber replacement is a big service in stations, nearly a 'racket' on some freeways. How can you test your own shocks?

Push down or stand on the end of the car bumper and then jump off. The car should bounce back and stop no more than one bounce. And a leaking shock is nearing a breakdown. Rattles from shock connections mean loose nuts which make that shock inoperable and unbalances the car's weight and stability.

A new \$1.1 million electronic local and long distance callchanneling facility of General Telephone Co. of Wisconsin went into effect Saturday in Campbellsport.

A similar facility costing \$290,000 will go into effect Aug. 15 in Theresa.

When placing local calls, residents of those areas will be required to dial the complete seven-digit number, Eastern Division Manager Robert G. Burger of Plymouth said.

However, customers wishing to place calls to others on the same party line will also be required to dial only the sevendigit local calling number. When such a party line call is placed, the caller will hear a recording asking that he or she hang up and wait a sufficient amount of time to allow the called party to answer, Burger said.

Additionally, in Theresa, all

one-party customers placing direct-dialed long distance calls will no longer be required to report their own telephone number to operators before having calls channeled.

"The reason for this change in procedure is the installation of automatic number identification," Burger said. "It makes use of highly sophisticated, expensive electronic equipment to automatically register tollcall origination points."

A different dial tone will accompany the new system, Burger said. "It will not affect service but is to be expected with the new electronic equipment."

Touch calling, an optional service which allows customers to push buttons to record digits rather than turn the dial, will be available to all one-and twoparty customers, Burger said.

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## 4-H An Individual And Group Effort At the County Fair

Our Washington County Fair is over for 1981. It's good to look back and see what it means. When I see the thousands of exhibits made by the 4-H members, I think of the tremendous learning opportunities for each individual young person. As a 4-H member, each one selects some project to work on during the year. His individual fair exhibit is a sample or a product of the skills that he has learned. This learning is what makes 4-H and the fair as a part of the 4-H experience so important.

While the learning by the individual in his own project is important, I think equally important is the opportunity for learning to work cooperatively as a group; you could see this many places at the fair. There were the club livestock exhibits where all the members needed to work together, there were club banners made by many of the clubs. Many of the clubs worked together in the 4-H club refreshment stand. And one side of the exhibit building was filled with educational booths made by 4-H clubs.

The educational booths are an opportunity for a group to get across a certain practice or bit of information to the public. I would especially like to comment on several of the booths that received blue ratings. Karen Pikoske of West Bend was chairman of the booth committee for the Badger Boosters 4-H club. Their booth was entitled "1981, Year of the Disabled." It pointed out what has been done already to help the disabled such as education, job openings and public facilities. It also showed what needs to be done in the future such as more community involvement, more job opportunities and more public acceptance.

The B-Mer-E club booth under the chairmanship of Mrs. Ernest Jones of West Bend was entitled "Dairy Products are helpful and Udderly Delicious." They pointed out the nutritious products made of milk.

The Jr. Hi-Lite Happy Workers under the chairmanship of Marge Slaughter of Richfield entitled their booth "Save Money on Gift Wrap." It showed how to make gift wrap using inexpensive paper and block printing ideas.

Claire Beder of Hartford was chairman of the St. Lawrence Eager Beavers 4-H club booth; it was entitled "Give a Helping Hand." It showed a hand putting litter into the wastebasket or garbage can. It pointed out that we are responsible for keeping our environment clean.

So as I look back at our 1981 Washington County Fair, I see it as a real learning opportunity for a youth to learn his individual projects in which he has an interest and I also see it as an opportunity to learn to get along and work cooperatively with others in trying to accomplish a certain goal.


