Shop-Rite Foods Plans November Opening

If things go smoothly and on schedule, Kewaskum could see the opening of a new KEWA Mall Shop-Rite Grocery store by the end of November.

Prior to Monday's Village Board meeting, Cletus Bartelt, Vice-President of Shop-Rite New Business Development, said his organization was hoping to have the store operating as early as mid-November. Bartelt noted two major factors, the merging of Roundy's and United Foods and the legal dispute between the mall operators and Kewaskum, had delayed by several months the planned opening of Shop-Rite's newest store.

When asked if the Kewaskum store would be connected with Prescott's Shop-Rite in West Bend, Bartelt said no. The KEWA store will be company operated for the time being but would be carrying the same brand lines as Prescott's in

West Bend.

Bartelt and Al Patin, Vice-President of Retail Programs, said the store would be taking applications for employment within the next two weeks. Approximately 30-35 employees including full and part-time will be hired. Paul Behring of Behring's Market will be associated with the new store, however, Bartelt stated he was not free at this time to disclose exactly the status of that association

Shop-Rite Foods Is Denied Liquor License

A public hearing was held at Monday evening's Village Board meeting on the application of Shop-Rite Foods, Incorporated, Milwaukee, for a Class "A" liquor license.

Shop-Rite was represented by Cletus Bartelt, Vice President of New Business Development and Al Patin, Vice President of Retail Programs. Only two citizens, James Boegel of J-N Liquor and a Bel-Ric Acres resident were at the hearing to voice their opinions on the Boegel was application. adamantly against approval of another Class "A" Beer and Liquor License, noting Kewaskum already has two Class "A" and eight Class "B" licenses and another license should not be allowed in the village. Boegel stated, "six months ago Dan Schmidt and Bill Martin told me there was no need for another Class 'A' license. I would like to know if we grew so much in six months, that we need another license.'

A Bel-Ric Acres resident commented she spoke for many of the subdivision residents in favoring approval of the application. The resident stated, "people in Bel-Ric don't like to come into town, the village people really haven't accepted

us. We need something right there for the people who have been rejected for so long."

Boegel felt there was no need for another liquor outlet. Bartelt stated, "we don't believe in restrained trade and will present competitive prices." "I think our store will be a credit to the community," stated Patin "and this kind of license would help us in the overall service to the community."

Trustee Jeff Rohrer said, "my first guess that comes to mind is, if we approve this license, we will have other requests, I imagine a lot of others will be coming in for a Class "A" license, then where do you stop it?" Trustee Paul Blumer stated, "you remember a few years ago when Rosenheimer's and a few others applied, we felt there wasn't enough surveillance as far as teenagers and this situation hasn't changed."

Trustee Raynor Herriges noted he had been approached by Shell to carry convenience items at his station, but had refused. "Everybody's getting into everybody else's business, I think everybody should stay in their own field," Herriges

stated.

Boegel felt the board should remain consistent, noting these applications had been refused [Continued on Page 4]

Meadow Creek Apartments Underway

After many delays which have resulted in rescheduling the starting date, Meadow Creek Apartments, an elderly and low-income housing project in Kewaskum, is finally underway.

Even though construction has begun, Rick Parent, Project Superintendent of Meadow Creek, stated, "things are in a state of a mess." Now that all the technical delays have been cleared up, bad weather has stepped in to hamper construction causing more headaches. When the Statesman talked to Parent Friday, he was looking

over the site and waiting for equipment to come in and pump water out from around the four-unit building so forms could be removed. Parent noted if they could luck out and have a couple weeks of good weather, he could really get the project moving "and get a lot of walls in." "Rain has really put a damper on our schedule," Parent said.

Footings and walls have been poured for the four-unit building, with footings half in for the eight and twenty-five unit structures. Parent stated he is looking at a completion date on the four-unit "between Thanksgiving and Christmas, definitely by

Christmas." Parent has targeted March as the completion time for the 25-unit building with no set completion date on the 8-unit.

Water and sewer lines are in and mains are in the parking lot. Weather permitting, the parking lot will be put in as soon as possible. Parent noted law requires a finished parking lot before any tenants will be allowed to move in.

Meadow Creek Apartments will consist of a 24-unit building for the elderly which will also contain one manager's apartment and four-unit and 8-unit buildings for low-income and single parent families.

In 1954 the idea of a welcome sign at the south entrance to Kewaskum became a reality for the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club. One of the members of the club even dug the trees out of the woods and transplanted them at the site of the sign. The actual building and erection of the sign was accomplished through the generosity of the Wisconsin Conservation Department and their carpenters, the late Clifford Stautz and his son, Clayton.

Over the years this great welcome sign to our village and the Kettle Moraine area has brought great fame to our community. Visitors now remember our name because of the sign. Originally the club had a lad fishing from a blue pool of concrete, but when the cement disintegrated after fifteen or more years, it was never replaced.

Recently members of the Kiwanis Club repainted the sign using white letters on a very dark mahogany background. The wood shows no sign of deterioration due in part to the wizardry of the planners, who had the large telephone poles treated at Granville with creosote.



in the past and this one should be refused also.

A motion by Raynor Herriges, second by Paul Blumer to deny a Class "A" license to Shop-Rite was unanimously approved.

In other business, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the board that for a change he had a little good news regarding taxes and the 1982 budget. "The situation doesn't look as bleak as it did two weeks ago,'' said Schmidt. He said he had been informed that Kewaskum will be re-ceiving some state tax credits. Schmidt said, "from all indications we will be \$50,000 to \$60,000 short of last year. This would result in a drop of \$1.47 from last year's credit of \$4.22 down to approximately \$2.75." There had been concern that the village would not receive any State Tax relief for 1982. Schmidt noted these are not exact figures, they do not come out until December 1.

Raynor Herriges stated, "I don't think we should even be talking about it, all we're doing is stirring people up." The news puts it in the paper the way we see it here and I've had people talk to me, my gosh,

they're ready to sell their places here in town." Dan Schmidt said, "I don't know, I think its good to keep the people aware of where we stand and the fact of the matter is, we're not the ones who decide where this money is going or where its coming from." Village Presi-dent Jerry Stollenwerk told Herriges, "I heard just the opposite, last year a lot of people were not warned, if they knew the increase was going to be that high they would have been at the budget hearings. A lot of them thought it crept up on them, but that was not true because it was stated in the paper and I read the articles.' Jeff Rohrer said, "it makes it a, lot easier, too, when I mention it to people who complained about last year's taxes going up and this year's taxes going up. All I can say is, hey, it was in the paper, people knew about it and if you didn't read past the headlines, that's not my fault. People have to read all the article, they can't just read the headline and I think that's a lot of our feedback, if they just read the top paragraph and then they complain."

Herriges said, "what I mean is, once we're sure about what its going to be like, then start putting it out to the people.' We won't be sure until December 1 or after," said Dan Schmidt, "and then I think it's too late." Trustee Dick Schmidt said, "I think every community has the same problem not just Kewaskum.

In closing his comments on taxes, Dan Schmidt told the for nylon carpets. board he had attended a recent

meeting where a gentleman from the Taxpayers Alliance noted that of its 15 member communities, Kewaskum was the biggest loser in State Revenue Sharing. Rohrer asked what caused this. Schmidt said the state uses a three-year formula to calculate tax sharing, and three years ago the village returned \$2.29 back in taxes to the villagers. That directly hurt us in reference to the \$29,000 loss. One of the trustees noted that it doesn't seem to pay to be frugal, communities which spend all their money end up in better shape when revenue sharing is formulated.

The village board will be reviewing the budget in its entirety at its next meeting.

The Parks and Recreation Committee will be meeting at 7:00 p.m. October 17, for its budget review

The board also approved the snowmobile trails submitted by the Sno-Chiefs for the 1981-82 season, however, the board will be sending a letter along with their approval concerning several problem areas on this trail system asking the club to look into these situations and make necessary adjustments.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

Defending champion Two Rivers, which won in the state playoffs last year, lost all of their 22 starters from 1980. Still the Raiders have 14 lettermen back, including running back Dennis Payette and a large group from their unbeaten JV squad.

Permit Required For Canada **Goose Hunting**

A permit will be required to hunt geese in the 16-county Mississippi Valley Population (MVP) goose management area in east central Wisconsin this year. The permit is free and may be obtained at Department of Natural Resources offices and license sales outlets.

Wisconsin has a 50 day split waterfowl season this year. It opened at noon Sunday, Oct. 4, and runs through Oct. 11, then closes for five days. The second half opens Oct. 17 and continues through Nov. 27.

The MVP permit is in two parts with one part to be kept in possession of the hunter while hunting and the other mailed to DNR. The permit is valid for use as soon as the mailed portion is dropped in the mail. Permits may be picked up for use at any time prior to or during the goose hunting season. The MVP permit is not needed in the Horicon and Central zones where hunters must have specific tags obtained in advance to hunt Canada geese in these zones.

The 16 counties where the MVP permit is required are Adams, Calumet, Columbia, Dodge, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Jefferson, Juneau, Manitowoc, Marquette, Outagamie, Sheboygan, Washington Waushara, Winnebago, and 198 Waush 92 Wood.

The permits will be used by 2.0 DNR waterfowl managers to complete a list of hunters who hunt geese in those counties.

10-year plan for management of Canada geese in east central Wisconsin. The plan was adopted by the Natural Resources Board in April following a series of informational meetings conducted in several communities to gather public opinion and comment about the plan. The permit was approved at a public hearing in July

Primary goals of the plan are to insure perpetuation of the Canada goose as a valued wildlife resource in east central Wisconsin, achieve a balanced spatial distribution of the goose population, control crop depradation, minimize disease outbreaks and provide the public with high quality goose hunting and viewing opportunities.

The plan calls for management programs that eventually will accommodate 175,000 geese, at peak population count, in east central Wisconsin by 1990 with no more than about 75,000 of these birds on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge.

The program is intended to provide for an annual hunter harvest of 30,000 to 35,000 geese when population goals are reached. Wisconsin hunters are allotted an annual quota of geese by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. The quota is based on population levels of geese in the Mississippi valley goose flock which migrates through Wisconsin to Illinois and states farther south.

The Fish and Wildlife Service requires each state to keep records and report the number of geese taken by hunters each year. The MVP permit is expected to aid in compiling this information.
