Man Found Dead In Parked Car

A 47-year-old West Bend man, Walter C. Haling of 1393 State 33, was found dead in a parked car on Kettle Moraine Drive, about one mile north of Hwy. 28, in the Kettle Moraine State Forest east of Kewaskum Tuesday, apparently a suicide according to sheriff's deputies.

Two West Bend young men, both 20, who were hunting discovered the body shortly after 1 p.m. in the front seat of a car. The men told authorities they had seen the car there Monday but didn't look in it. The car was locked.

Deputies found a .22-caliber pistol in the front seat next to the body.

The body was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by the Kewaskum rescue squad.

Light Agenda Covered

School Board Extends Contract of Brenholt

One of the shorter, less controversial meetings held by the School Board in recent months was conducted Monday evening.

The item which seemed to receive the most discussion was a request by Principal Clark Pearson to use two weeks of his 1982 vacation during the fall.

Board members Tom Brigham and Dr. Ogi felt that no exceptions be made on vacation time. Member Jerry Secor noted that school personnel are somewhat restricted in vacation planning since their time is confined to summer months. He felt that since Pearson has worked for the district a reasonably long time and this was a one-time thing there was no reason to deny the request. Brigham said people in the teaching profession know this is an "occupational hazard" that comes with the job. Secor motioned to have the October vacation included as part of Pearson's 1982-83 contract. The motion was approved 5-2 with Brigham and Ogi voting against.

In other action, the board approved the hiring of two

special education aides for the remainder of the year as recommended by the Department of Public Instruction. One aide will serve the middle and high school Learning Disabilities program and one will work in the Early Childhood program. Richard Zarling, head of the special education program, informed the board that 68% of the aide costs are funded.

The board also approved a two-year extension on the contract of Superintendent Floyd Brenholt until 1984-85. The motion passed 6-1 with Ogi opposed.

Theusch told the board he had given Superintendent Brenholt his last tax bill. He has requested Mr. Brenholt to do a breakdown on the school tax amount to show how many dollars go to maintenance, teacher salaries, administration, supplies, etc. Theusch said his purpose for this breakdown was to give district taxpayers an idea of how much money would be saved on their individual bills by suggested cuts for next year's budget. Theusch noted he had requested a similar tax bill from one of the highest paying taxpayers in each township so accurate comparisons could be made. Names would not be used, only figures. Theusch felt, this way, when a cut was suggested people would know in dollar figures what this

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cut might represent on their individual tax bill rather than in district percentages and dollar amounts. Brenholt noted he would try to get as accurate a breakdown as possible.

Next year's budget is already on the minds of the board. President John Tessar asked all the members to turn in their lists of suggested reductions and cuts so a single list may be compiled and information assembled. Tessar noted there would be absolutely no discussion of recommendations at this meeting. A special meeting will be held on November 30 to begin a review of all suggestions.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

A society proudly preoccupied with its own material accomplishments and well-being cannot fairly expect its schools to teach that a snug warmth of security is less meaningful than the bracing adventure of freedom. In all this, to reform our schools is first to reform ourselves!

There is no better place to start caring to recommit ourselves to making America's schools better, than in our community schools. Citizens who visit their schools develop a better understanding of what is being taught and how it is being taught than do those who obtain their information secondhand.

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
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
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

DOT Begins Winter Road Reports Nov. 15

Statewide winter road condition reports will be available to Wisconsin motorists beginning Sunday, Nov. 15, the state department of transportation announced today.

A three-minute report of road conditions statewide is available 24 hours a day to Madison area residents by calling 266-7040; Milwaukee area residents by calling 342-2211; and all other areas of the state by calling a toll-free number, 1-800-362-3000. The department emphasized that the report is the same on all three numbers.

Road condition information is reported by State Patrol and Transportation district offices for compilation in Madison into a statewide report. Key counties are contacted routinely to keep condition reports current, while others are contacted as a storm approaches or if conditions are changing rapidly.

The report is updated at least four times daily, at 6 and 8:30 a.m. and 3 and 7 p.m., with more frequent updates if conditions warrant.

Purpose of the toll-free reporting service is to provide condition reports on a statewide basis and to keep telephone lines to State Patrol districts

open for reporting accidents or other emergencies that may occur. The department said a total of 33 phone lines feed into three automatic recorders.

The road condition reports will be maintained until about April 15.

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
Kewaskum Historical Society News Notes

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WASHINGTON COUNTY'S SOLID WASTE DILEMMA

[Fourth in a series]

The major purpose of a sanitary landfill is to control the leachate (liquid) produced when water percolates through solid waste. There are three types of landfills which are designed to accomplish this control; natural attenuation landfills, zone of saturation landfills or lined landfills.

A natural attenuation landfill is constructed in soils which can attenuate (clean) any leachate produced from the solid waste. Usually the soil under this type of landfill is a silty loam and bedrock or groundwater is at least 30 feet below the bottom of the landfill. The likelihood of finding a natural attenuation site is very small due to our annual 32 inches of rainfall which normally saturates the soil.

Another method of landfill design is to construct a trench or cell below the groundwater table where soils are constantly saturated with water. Although this zone of saturation landfill may seem to be dangerous, it is felt by many experts to be the safest method of burying solid waste.

Built in soils where water moves slowly (usually silt or clay), a zone of saturation landfill protects groundwater because the system that collects leachate in the bottom of a landfill causes groundwater to flow into the landfill where it and leachate is collected and treated. Because of the "tight" soils the amount of groundwater flowing into a landfill is very limited. In fact, water movement is so slow that the excavated landfill stays dry even though it's below the groundwater table.

A lined landfill uses a 5 foot layer of compacted clay to line the bottom and sides of the landfill. The low permeability of this liner is designed to contain leachate within the fill area where it can be collected for treatment. Lined landfills are often used in soils which are not capable of supporting natural attenuation or zone of saturation landfills.

Washington County is now

identifying potential landfill sites in the towns of Polk and Jackson. On-site analysis will help determine if a landfill may be feasible at those sites and what type of landfill might be constructed.
