27 Degrees Below Zero Ties Record; 50mph Winds and Drifting Numb Area

Following last week's severe snowstorm, biting, gnawing Arctic air from Canada reached this area last weekend, causing the temperature to plunge to a record-tying cold, which was accompanied by brutal winds and wind chill readings, together with blinding, drifting snow.

A low of 27 degrees below zero was recorded Saturday night and early Sunday with winds in excess of 50 miles per hour and gusts of 83 miles per hour. The wind chill factor early Sunday morning was 82 below. The unbearable cold temperature tied a record set way back on Jan. 9, 1875, and came close to setting a new record.

The record snowfall of the week before received a fresh layer and county and municipal crews struggled to re-open roads and streets that were drifted shut again by the driving wind. Late Sunday afternoon, crews were shut down because

of fighting a losing battle due to the extreme wind, tightly packed drifts, cold, damaged and stalled equipment, and poor visibility. Hwy. 45 south of West Bend was barricaded and closed entirely to traffic.

Residents were warned repeatedly via radio and television to stay in their homes and not venture out except for emergencies. And nearly everyone did so as traffic was at a standstill and nothing moving. The weather was very dangerous because of the extreme cold, wind and drifting snow. Roads and streets were slippery underneath and visibility poor at intersections due to drifts and snowpiles.

All schools and many business places were closed Monday and scheduled events postponed or cancelled over the weekend. Many churches even cancelled their services Sunday morning.

Plumbers were kept busy

Sunday and working overtime repairing frozen water pipes in homes and business places. The weather caused health problems and bursted water mains in some areas.

All main roads were open Monday but travel was not recommended. Some sideroads and driveways were still closed and impassable Wednesday. The weather began warming up on Tuesday and by Wednesday it reached the teens.

Electric power outages were reported throughout the county and state over the weekend but not in Kewaskum. Motorists took a beating from the cold as freezing temperatures and drifting snow left many cars stranded in garages and ditches, or they wouldn't start.

Sorry the Statesman couldn't get any pictures of the weather or St. Kilian fire but we couldn't even get out of our own driveway Sunday.

Fire Leaves Family Homeless

A two-story stone and wood frame home just north of St. Kilian, owned by the Neil Strassman family, was destroyed by fire on Sunday but the barn and other buildings were saved.

Subzero temperatures, high winds, mechanical problems and frozen equipment hampered water pumping in saving the home. The alarm was received around 9 a.m. by the Campbellsport Fire Department.

Campbellsport Fire Chief Joe Thelen said the weather conditions were the "absolute worst" he has seen in his 31 years with the department.

The Strassmans and their three children were not injured. When the fire started, the children, ages 19 months, 5 and 11, were in the house and their parents were working in the barn.

According to Thelen, the blaze apparently started in the basement, possibly from an overheated heating system. The children ran out to the barn to notify their parents when they discovered the fire.

The Campbellsport department was hampered in fighting the home blaze because of a second fire call on Cloverland Drive Sunday morning.

The Cloverland call was an automatic alarm caused by smoke that backed up into the home. Thelen said some of the equipment responded to that call only to get stuck in snow-

drifts on County BB. This caused a delay in getting some equipment to the Strassman fire.

Firefighters from the Kewaskum, Lomira, Kohlsville and Knowles department joined the Campbellsport crew in battling the blaze in 20 degree below zero temperatures and high wind velocity with the wind chill factor dropping to 80 degrees below. Some firefighters suffered minor frostbite.

Snowplows from Fond du Lac County and the Town of Ashford were called to clear snow to enable firemen to reach the scene and haul water from Campbellsport.

The Strassman family was

left homeless and are staying with their neighbors, the Barnekow family. They are in need of clothing and other items.

Neil Strassman wears size 40 pants with a 28-29 inch length, and a size 16 shirt. His wife, Claudia, wears size 18 slacks, and a 38 blouse. Children include Randy, age 11; Glenn, 5; and Margo, 19 months. Anyone who wishes to donate items may call Mrs. Barnekow at 533-4951.

A fund has been established at the First State Bank of Campbellsport and the Red Cross office in Fond du Lac is accepting donations.

Drawing Sets Positions on School Board Primary Ballot

Five candidates vying for two three-year seats on the Kewaskum School Board has resulted in a primary run-off which will be held on February 16.

The primary will narrow the list down to four candidates. Incumbent Gerald Secor drew the prized top spot on the ballot. Secor will be followed on the ballot by incumbent Byron Gessner, Ralph Horner Jr., John Spoerl and Mrs. Joan

Rosenberger.

A polling place for the election has yet to be selected. No municipalities within the school district will hold primaries. The School Board may decide against polls February 16th in towns which have property in more than one school district and have less than 10% of the total vote in the Kewaskum School District. In this case, residents in these areas would have to vote at a poll within the Kewaskum School District.

Gaffke Hired

Village Board Denies Tavern Liquor License

Approximately ten citizens appeared Monday evening at a Village Board hearing on a liquor license application.

The application was that of David Allen Kohler for the premises at 1310 Riverview Drive, formerly John and Dee's. The citizens, residents in the tavern area, all spoke against the approval of the license. Since Kohler has been closely associated with previous proprietors, neighbors were afraid the tavern would again be run in the same manner which resulted in noise, vandalism, and general disorderly conduct.

A letter from the Kewaskum Police Department stated it was also opposed to issuance of the license. Kohler, along with Mrs. Ralph Scott, building owner, said that he was not involved in several incidents related by the police. Police Chief Donald Hlavaty noted, in a routine background investigation, it was discovered that Kohler has a lengthy police record for various offenses. Kohler did not object to the chief's reading his record to the board. The hearing was then closed. After almost no discussion, the board voted unani-

mously 7-0 to deny the application.

In other business, the board approved the hiring of James Gaffke to fill the public works position which became vacant January due to the retirement of Sylvester Schmidt.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board he had received several inquiries regarding village sanding and plowing. The board again stated the village's policy would remain the same as in the past. The village will not do any sanding or plowing for private parties.

Schmidt was questioned on sanding of the intersection of Highway 45 and Main Street. Schmidt stated the county was responsible for maintenance of this area. He noted, however, that the severe cold and wind was making it difficult to keep salt and sand on the road.

In other action President Gerald Stollenwerk proclaimed the week of January 17 through 23 as "Jaycee Week."

Trustee Jeff Rohrer informed the board that the Parks and Recreation Committee will hold a meeting Monday, January 18, at 7:00 p.m. prior to the regular village board meeting. The meeting then adjourned.

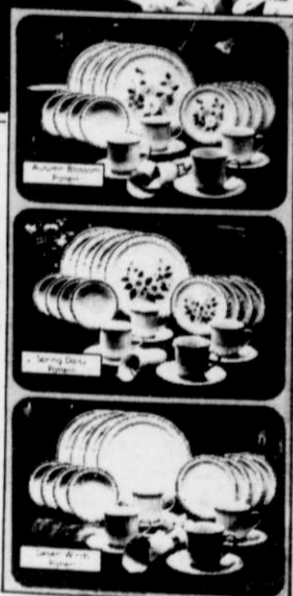
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UW-Madison Band Director to Speak At KHS Booster Club Meeting Jan. 20

Kewaskum school board member Richard Theusch, district administrator Floyd Brenholt, and business manager Robert Borch will be among 3,000 Wisconsin school officials at the annual school leadership convention in Milwaukee, January 20-22.

The convention is jointly sponsored by the Wisconsin Association of School Boards (WASB), Wisconsin Association of School District Administrators (WASDA), and Wisconsin Association of School Business Officials (WASBO).

Principal speakers at the convention include Gov. Lee Dreyfus, State Supt. Herbert Grover, syndicated columnist William Raspberry, and A. University Study May Change Use Of Kettle Moraine State Forest

The Recreation Resources Center (RRC), University of Wisconsin-Extension is conducting a twelve-month study of the Kettle Moraine State Forest for the Department of Natural Resources. Researchers are now seeking data from the users of this 43,000 acre facility located in southeastern Wisconsin, and from its surrounding area residents, land owners, local business people and government officials to aid in the creation of a master plan for the management and development of the forest. A plan mutually acceptable to both the users and the people living in the surrounding area is the ultimate goal.

The forest, made up of two geographically separate North and South units, offers hiking, camping, hunting, fishing, and cross country skiing along with

various other activities. The North unit is especially known for its significant glacial features and aesthetic beauty. Randomly selected users of both the North and South units have been filling out short questionnaires since July. Other persons contacted by the researchers will be asked to do the same. The user segment of the survey will be completed by the end of January.

During February and March, 1982, the RRC researchers will hold public meetings at various locations near the forest and in the Milwaukee area. They encourage everyone with an interest in the forest to participate. The public meetings will give everyone a chance to hear about and discuss the findings of the study and to comment on their concerns regarding the use of the resource and regulations governing the Kettle

Moraine State Forest. Definite information as to dates and locations of these meetings will be released in the future.

All information gathered from the study will be assimilated into a comprehensive, written report with recommendations which will be forwarded to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Use of Horses for Logging on State Lands Now Allowed

(MADISON) — Persistence pays off, according to State Representative Gervase Hephner (D-Chilton).

Finally, after three years the Department of Natural Resources will allow the use of horses for logging on state lands, he announced. Due to the diligence of Hephner and his constituent, Lewis Schmidt, the department rule restricting the use of horses in gathering firewood has been changed and took effect December 1, 1981.

Several years ago, Hephner explained, Lewis and his son were stopped from hauling dead wood out of the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest with their horses. "Although it was perfectly legal for the bulldozers down the road to harvest timber in the park," Hephner pointed out, "Lewis and his horses were banned for 'environmental' reasons."

According to department policy, the rule restricted horses in state forests to bridal paths to prevent erosion and damage to the environment and to protect hikers. However, after talking to Lewis, Hephner contacted the department and the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules pointing out the evident ironies of the administrative code prohibiting horses but not bulldozers from

logging on state lands.

"Does the department have any studies monitoring the amount of environmental damage horses cause in a forested area?" Hephner asked. "Are deer also restricted to bridal trails since they can also be an environmental hazard in someone's eyes?" he asked.

At last, however, the problem has been resolved. Therefore, since December, Lewis as well as other citizens in the state who receive a permit, can take his beautiful team of Belgian horses into the state forest to collect firewood for the winter without fear of being arrested.


"It's heartening," Hephner said, "to see constituents fight for something they believe in and cut through the red tape of bureaucracy."

Rusty Indians Lose 1st Conference Game at Kiel

The Kewaskum Indians didn't play a single tuneup game for three weeks between or after the holidays before resuming conference action and the results showed Friday night at Kiel where they played a ragged game in losing to the Raiders, 79-63. It was their first conference loss and they are now 2-1 and 5-2 overall.

The Indians have practice games with Lomira Jan. 26 and Mayville Feb. 23 when they aren't needed. One of these over the holidays no doubt would have helped.

What made the difference Friday night was Kiel's 6-2 senior Brian Christel, who put on a shooting demonstration. A first team all-conference selection last year, Christel hit 11 of 15 shots from the floor and sank 11 out of 12 free throws for a total of 33 points. He made 11 straight free throws until missing his final attempt.

Kewaskum had been making a comeback from a 17 point deficit near the start of the fourth quarter but then Christel, who made a number of hard shots during the contest, went to work again when he broke through for a layup to put his team ahead once more by 12 points, 68-56.

The Indians had scored seven straight points on a 3-point play by Brian Larsen (one of three), a basket by Dale Wodsedalek, and two free throws by Ric Leitheiser. It appeared like Kewaskum was back in the game but Christel's bucket started another Raider spurt of six unanswered points to ice the game.

The Indians didn't play their usual good game. Coach Jim Westphal felt his boys made too many foolish turnovers and played their poorest game of the year.

The Indians got good scoring as usual from Larsen and Wodsedalek with 24 and 22 points respectively. "Wods" continued his hot shooting, hitting on 8 of 14 shots from the floor. Larsen was 9 of 21. Leitheiser contributed 10 points before fouling out.

Following Christel, Chris Konz added 16 points for Kiel and Jim Diem 10. The Indians were outrebounded, 27-24.

The Raiders were hot from the free throw line, sinking 29 of their 34 attempts. Kewaskum also only missed five, making 15 of 20.

Kiel, now tied with the Indians in the standings at 2-1, led from the beginning. The game was close for the first quarter, which ended 16-13, but the Raiders started to move ahead shortly before halftime. After the intermission they led by as many as 18 points.

The Indians were hurt by losing three players with five personal fouls, namely Leitheiser, Randy Westerman and Mike Heisdorf.

Kewaskum has two games this weekend on consecutive nights and both are at home. On Friday they entertain Plymouth and Saturday leading Two Rivers comes here for a key game.
