## Gessner Eliminated in School Board Primary

In a surprise upset, Byron Gessner, incumbent, a Town of Scott farmer, who was seeking a fourth term on the Kewaskum School Board, failed to win a spot on the ballot for the Spring Election on Tuesday, April 6.

Nominated in the School Board Primary Election on Tuesday were Ralph Horner, John Spoerl, Gerald Secor, incumbent, and Joan Rosenberger.

Voter turnout was light. In the village of Kewaskum 274 ballots were cast. The number of ballots cast at the remaining six polling places was unavailable at this writing.

Horner garnered the most votes with 462, followed by Spoerl 382, Secor 284, Rosenberger 229 and Gessner 197.

## Answering System for Pool Area

### Library Fees Increased

The Kewaskum Village Board unanimously approved the recommendation of the library committee to increase non-resident user fees and book fines.

Trustee Dick Schmidt said due to rising costs, the committee recommended increasing non-resident family use fees from \$5.00 to \$20.00 per year. Book fines will be increased from 1c per day per book to 5c per day. The committee also recommended lending time of books be increased from two to three weeks providing adequate reading time for any books checked out of the library.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer asked the board to approve a Park Committee recommendation to rent a telephone answering service for three months during the summer. The answering system would provide pool information when attendants are not on duty. The system would be rented from General Telephone for a total cost of \$58.75 for three months. This figure includes \$32.50 installation charge and \$8.75 per month rental. The board also approved purchase of a two-yard capacity dumpster to be stationed next to the concession stand at the new park. Cost of the dumpster will be \$259.00.

Administrator Dan Schmidt asked for board approval to place an ad in the paper for an assistant librarian. Jean Amerling, the present assistant librarian, has submitted her resignation due to a conflict in hours with her husband's job. Deadline for applicants is February 26.

The board unanimously approved resolution No. 82-1. The resolution objects to the proposed Wisconsin pollutant discharge elimination system permit requirements as submitted on February 11, 1982.

Waste Water Treatment Superintendent Pete Albers said, "the permit does not agree with what was agreed on in June 1981." Albers and Schmidt said they were told at that time that Kewaskum's permit would be issued from Madison, and Kewaskum treatment procedures met all the necessary criteria. Schmidt said, "now the DNR has done an about face" with the DNR engineer in Milwaukee issuing the permit with added requirements which could result in additional costs to the village.

Trustee Raynor Hergges asked how much these modifications would cost. Albers said he really didn't know for sure since the village's engineers, Foth and Van Dyke, would have to determine what is required to obtain the permit. Schmidt said, "if the village doesn't comply the DNR could shut us off." Trustee Dick Schmidt asked, "how can they just shut off a village of 2,500?" "They just take you to court," said Albers, "and they've got bigger lawyers."

Schmidt and Albers are attempting to talk with the DNR engineer in an effort to have her go with the original agreement proposed in June of 1981.

Dan Schmidt informed the board that park funding should go in within the next three weeks. Between \$14,000 and \$21,000 should be available to the village.

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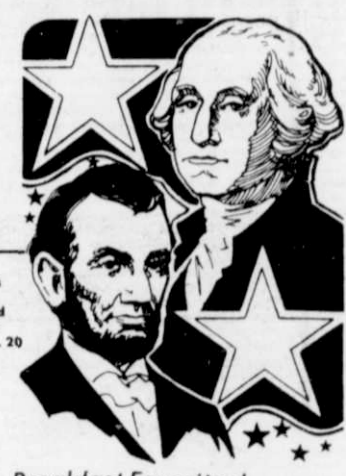


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### Area Students Do Well in UWWC Concerto Auditions

During the spring months they will be assisting with forums for adult volunteer leaders. Know America programs for extension homemakers and other adult groups and Washington Focus, a program of government and citizenship study designed especially for teenagers. This program is open not only to 4-H members, but also to school and other youth groups who come to the nation's capital to learn

### Highway 45 Bypass Fifth on List of Priorities: Panzer

The Highway 45 bypass around West Bend, from Richfield to Kewaskum, is currently fifth on the Department of Transportation's list of priorities but might possibly be higher, according to State Representative Mary Panzer, if economic factors were taken into account. Economic impact on a business community is presently not considered among the criteria used by the Department of Transportation in setting priorities for the highway improvement program.

Administrators in the Departments of Development and Transportation have begun meeting to coordinate their efforts toward developing that criteria. Representative Panzer expressed her support for those steps, commenting, "The transportation fund needs to be looked at in a broader sense, not only what it means to the state, but to the local areas as well."

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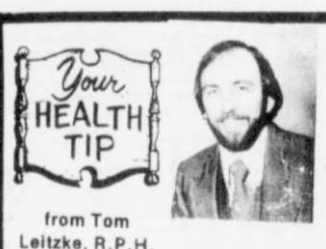
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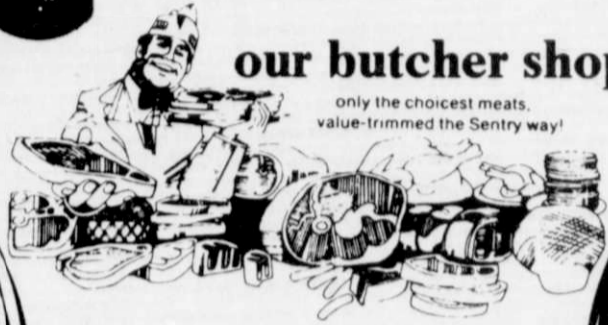

**Sensenbrenner to  
Oppose Tax on Savings**

The Reagan Administration's proposal to withhold taxes on savings interest and dividends has drawn the opposition of Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr., who cosponsored legislation to reject the plan.

Sensenbrenner said the Administration's planned 5 percent withholding tax on such income would place severe hardships on savings institutions, corporations, and savers with very little benefit to the federal government.

A similar proposal by the Carter Administration in 1980 was rejected by Congress.

Sensenbrenner said withholding would increase drastically the record keeping required of savings institutions and savers, would make the institutions tax collectors for the federal government, and would require people with no taxable income, mostly the elderly living on Social Security or pension income, to file tax returns to recover the taxes withheld.

"Not only will withholding inflict unnecessary paperwork burdens, but also it will undo the savings incentives we enacted last year and delay our economic recovery," Sensenbrenner said.

The Wisconsin lawmaker also said the plan is not likely to generate much in new revenues, since the Treasury Department already can track down those not reporting interest and dividend income on their tax returns simply by matching them with information now required of savings institutions by the IRS.

## February 'Law of the Month' Stresses Clear Windshield Requirements

Laws against driving with fogged-up or snow covered windshields will be stressed in February as the "Law of the Month" by the State Department of Transportation said today.

Captain W. C. DeGuire, Commanding District 3, of the Wisconsin State Patrol, said State Troopers and other law enforcement officers frequently encounter motorists attempting to drive with only a small peep hole cleared through the ice and snow on their windshield, or with windows fogged up on the inside and their vision obscured.

"Under these circumstances, a Trooper may issue the violator a citation, require him or her to scrape the windows, or sit by the roadside until the vehicle's defrosters begin to work,"

DeGuire said.

Conviction of violation of Sec. 346.88(4) of the Wisconsin Statutes, which requires drivers to keep windows of motor vehicles reasonably clean and their vision unobstructed, would cost a driver a forfeiture of \$40.00 for a first offense, and more for a second or subsequent one within a year.

DeGuire said the problems of

fogging of interior window surfaces can often be alleviated by opening a side window. A good ice scraper with a long handle and brush is invaluable to help reach ice and snow on center portions of windshields and rear windows.

DeGuire said that if fogging or icing occurs while driving, the driver should pull over and stop to clear the window. Of course, under such adverse conditions, the driver should also use headlights on low beam to be more visible to other drivers

who may also be having problems with fogging windshields.

The "Law of the Month" selects a timely topic for emphasis each month. Local law enforcement agencies are urged to join, DeGuire said.

**Selective Service  
Announces Grace  
Period to Register**

Today, Director of Selective Service Thomas K. Turnage announced that young men who were required to have registered with the Selective Service System before January 8, 1982, but who failed to do so, will be granted a grace period in which to register that will extend through February 28, 1982. During that time, these men may register without fear of prosecution for late registration.

This announcement implements President Reagan's statement of January 7, in which the President endorsed the continuation of registration and provided for a grace period for those who had previously failed to register. The President made his decision based on the findings of the Military Manpower Task Force that peacetime registration will save the United States about six weeks time in mobilizing its manpower in an emergency. President Reagan also reaffirmed his commitment to meeting peacetime military manpower needs without a draft.

After February 28, and after identifying the names of those persons who registered during the grace period, Selective Service will carry out a program of full compliance with the registration law. The Department of Justice, in coordination with the Selective Service System, will initiate appropriate enforcement action. This will include action against persons whose names were referred by Selective Service to the Department of Justice for possible criminal prosecution prior to January 8, in the event those persons fail to register during the grace period.

All young men born since January 1, 1960 who have attained age 18 are required to register at any U. S. Post Office. Men born in 1964 are now registering as they reach their eighteenth birthday—30 days before or after it.

Director Turnage said: "With the removal of any lingering doubts as to the future of the registration program, I am confident that the young men of registration age will comply with the law. They are a responsible group—6.6 million of them have already registered. I'm sure that those who

haven't will act as responsibly as their peers and register during the grace period."

Registration is a simple process. A man fills out a form at any U. S. Post Office which asks for his name, address, telephone number, social security number and date of birth. He must bring some form of personal identification with him—such as a driver's license or birth certificate.

Attention Wisconsin Citizens:

We must exert tremendous effort and secure passage of AB370 in the Assembly. There are many important reasons why we need comprehensive marital property reform. Wisconsin is a separate property state. This means that a homemaker spouse who does not contribute to the family income has no legal right to participate in family financial decision-

making. The law places no economic value on the domestic skills and services which are so important in meeting the needs of the family.

Failure to accord any value to the services of the homemaker impacts severely on marriages:

A) the homemaker spouse has no right to credit in his or her name;

B) the homemaker spouse has no right to manage and control marital assets;

C) the homemaker spouse has no right to will any property except that which was acquired prior to marriage or through gift or inheritance;

D) the couple has no right to choose the option of filing a joint tax return, even in cases where the couple jointly operates a small business or farm.

AB 370, comprehensive marital property reform, will eliminate these inequities and move the laws of Wisconsin to reflect the customary belief of most couples that the contribution of each spouse is of EQUAL importance.

Round 1 — UWWC was paired against Swarthmore whose team members included one International Master and three candidate masters. Despite the loss, UWWC had good positions on all boards.

Round 2 — The UWWC Wildcats competed against Michigan's Wolverines. Dusti Howell upset a candidate master in a short 6 hours game.

Although the Wildcats were close on all boards, they lost this match.

Round 3 — UWWC let yet another win slip away to City College of New York.

Round 4 — UWWC won their first match against New York Law School by winning 3 out of 4 boards.

Round 5 — It looked like the Wildcats might make it two wins in a row, but eventually they lost the 8 hour match to Rhode Island College.

Round 6 — After holding the initiative, UWWC dropped a disappointing match to Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Round 7 — UWWC got back on the winning track by beating Jersey City State College.

Round 8 — The Wildcats won their last game against one of Columbia Universities 5 teams and ended with a 3-5 record.

Best results were obtained by Steve Yahr 6-2-2, Kim Manthei 3-2-0.

Dusti Howell was South Central Chess Association conference champion in 1978-'79 and 1979-'80 of Kewaskum High School; Steve Yahr was conference champion in 1980-'81. Kim Manthei was third in conference in 1979-'80 and Jim Simon was junior varsity champion of the SCCA conference in 1980-'81.

When team members weren't involved in a match, which lasted 6-9 hours, they had a chance to see some of New York City. They visited such famous spots as the Empire State Building, the World Trade Center, Wall Street, and Greenwich Village. They also rode

the subways and indulged in bagels (an absolute must for any visitor of New York).

The trip was financed through the help of student government, pizza sales, and also by the team members' personal funds.

The Chess Club is planning on attending next year's tournament which will be held in Columbus, Ohio. Advisor Steve Krevisky mentioned that he'd like to see more men and women chess players. If you're interested, contact Mr. Krevisky in room M-110.

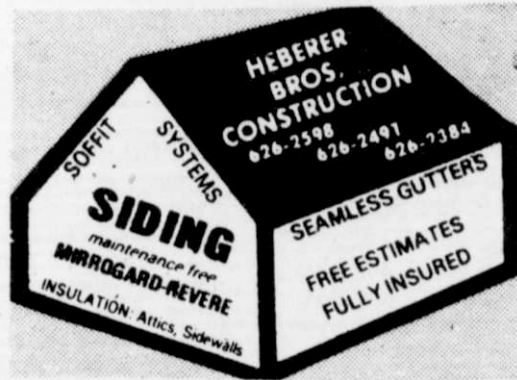

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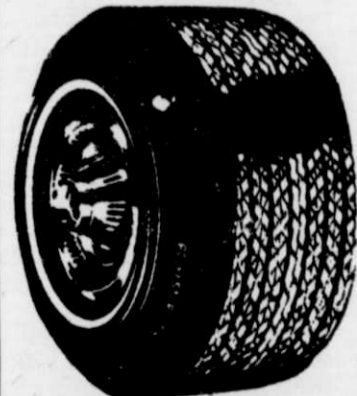
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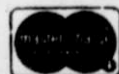

## Dairy Feeding Seminar to Be Held in County

Dairymen in Washington County will have an opportunity to receive information on feeding dairy cattle at a "Dairy Feeding Seminar" scheduled for Thursday, February 25. The program will be held from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. in the Basement Auditorium of the Washington County Courthouse in West Bend.

Dr. Terry Howard, University of Wisconsin-Extension, Department of Dairy Science, will be conducting the session. The program will focus on the basic principles of feeding dairy cows and balancing rations.

Feed costs make up the largest cost of producing milk. Reducing or holding the line on feed costs is one way to stay ahead during a time of stable or low increases in the price of milk.

The session will discuss:

1. Reading and understanding feed test reports. How to calculate percentages, moisture and dry matter.

2. Basic needs of the dairy cow — energy (TDN), protein, fiber, calcium, phosphorous, and minor minerals and vitamins.

3. How much will a cow eat? — size, milk production, individual vs. group feeding. How to calculate what your cows do eat.

4. Balancing the ration — elements of a balanced ration, Badger Ration Balancer, Least-Cost Ration Balancer.

5. Questions and answer period — A time to answer any other questions and concerns you may have on dairy feeding. There is no registration cost. 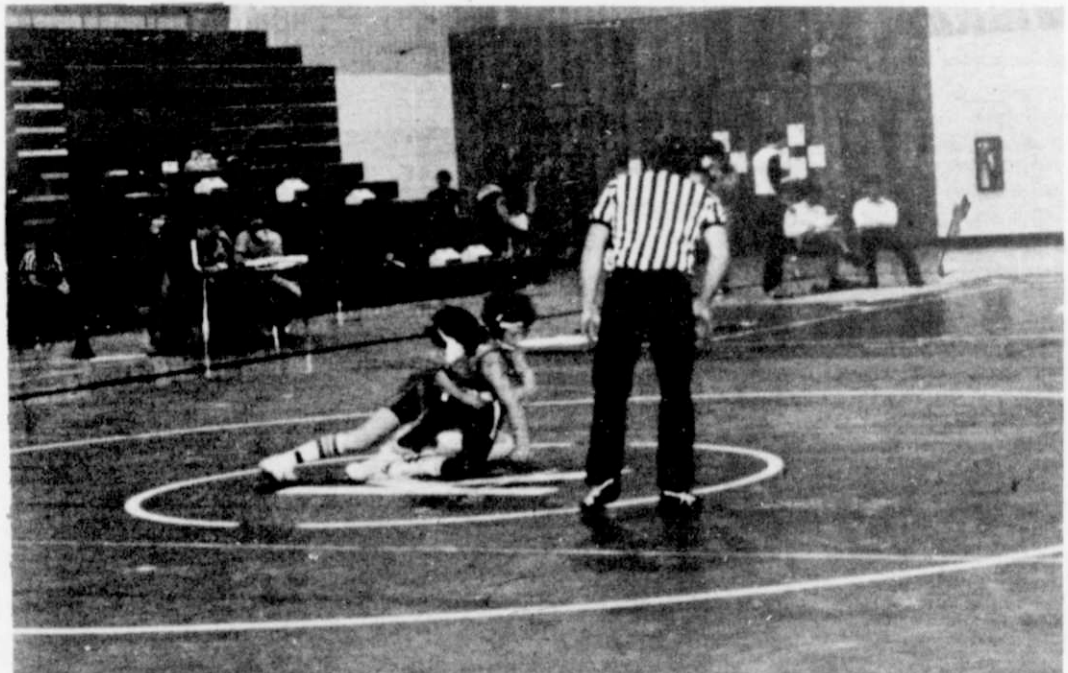
