IBM Gets District Computer System Order

1982-83 Budget Increase Recommendations Range From 7½ to 8½ %

After 2½ hours of discussion and presentations Monday night, the Kewaskum School Board unanimously voted to purchase an "in-house" data processing system from IBM Corporation.

As requested by board members, representatives of the Cooperative Educational Service Agency District 16 (CESA) and EMI Corporation appeared to explain their systems and why Kewaskum should use their services.

Tim Burk of EMI said the two primary reasons for going with an "in-house" data processing system were No. 1, the cost factor and No. 2, control over your own information. He stated the advantage is the system gives immediate access to your own information which can be obtained on an individual basis rather than having to wait for a complete report. "The minute you feed information to the computer, your files are up to date. Errors are picked up immediately saving time and manpower." With the CESA system, the district has to wait for its reports, make necessary corrections and re-submit the data for a final report. Burk noted the system he was sug-

gesting was both "upgradable and expandable" to handle the future needs. "The service bureau concept is a dying concept," said Burk. More and more schools are looking into in-house processing because technology is going up and costs are going down, making it feasible for schools to have their own systems.

Board president John Tessar stated, "I'll be very honest with you, I haven't heard of EMI before last month." Tessar noted he was concerned with the service end. "What I'm questioning is the after-hours service charge. The going rate right now is \$70 to \$80 an hour." Tessar noted he was more familiar with IBM and its record.

Gerald Buchel questioned whether this system would create additional jobs or insure others. Burk was confident the work could be handled by the present staff and possibly, later on a reduction could be made depending on future demands on the system.

Representatives of CESA felt the district had not checked into all the aspects and problems of owning its own equipment. They felt Kewaskum had not talked with the people who are

George Lendved, of Route 1, Highway D, Kewaskum, was elected to a two-year term as vice-president of the Association of Wisconsin Snowmobile Clubs at its annual meeting February 20 in Wausau.

Lendved, in a tight race, defeated opponent Ken Ehle of Racine County by four votes. For the past nine years, Lendved has served as AWSC Director of Sheboygan County as well as serving as Chairman of the AWSC Poster Committee and Directors' representative on the Executive Committee.

Lendved was also re-elected president of the Northern Kettle Moraine Snowmobile Association at its annual meeting Thursday, February 18.

Jim Gescheidle, of Fond du Lac, was elected AWSC president. He defeated Bill Brown of Dane County.

The AWSC is the largest snowmobile organization in the United States with over 650 clubs and 8,000 miles of public trails maintained by its members.

John Ehlert, publisher of Snowmobile Magazine, was guest speaker at the banquet Saturday night which was attended by over 600 delegates. Ehlert told the gathering of the

dramatic impact snowmobilers have on the economy in the state especially the northern region. In some areas, resorts and businesses showed higher incomes from snowmobiling than all the tourist trade during the summer months. He stated that one dollar spent in the community is turned over 16 times before it leaves.

On behalf of Snowmobile Magazine and Pabst Brewing Company, Ehlert presented AWSC Executive Secretary Art Sherren with a plaque honoring him as "Snowmobiler of the Month" for December.

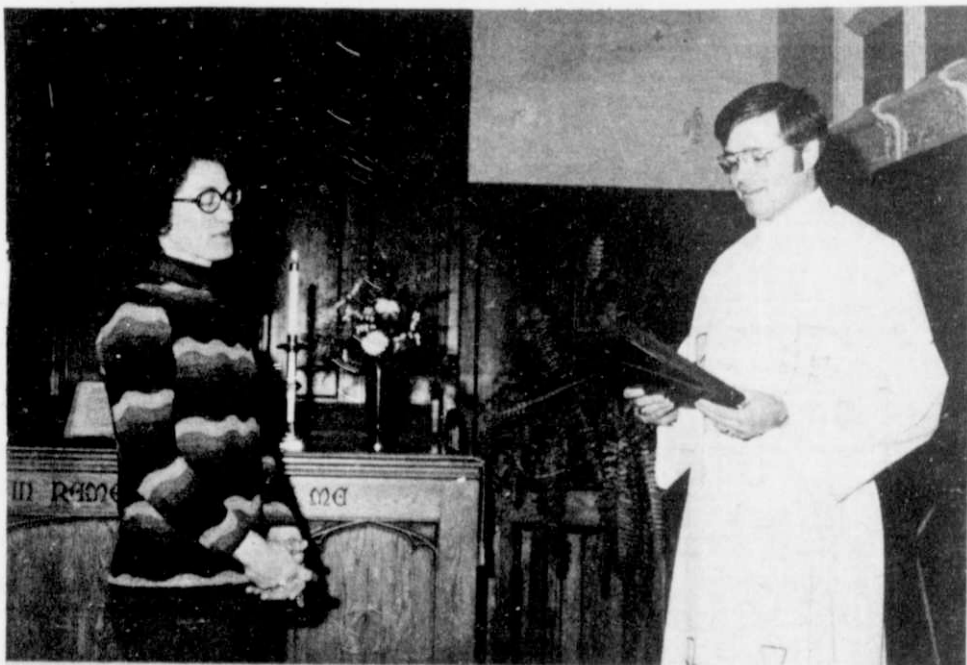

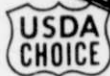

Historical Society Honors Hattie Weddig for Summer Sausage Recipe

The Kewaskum Historical Society, Inc. met for their regular February meeting at the Kewaskum Valley Band at 8:00 p.m. on February 16. The main topic of business was the selection of a building, person or item from the past to be placed on the 8th annual Early Farm Days buttons. Several possibilities were discussed and the society decided on a sketch of the old Village Hall/Fire House, which is still located at 203 Main Street.

The society was also indirectly honored when one of its members received a certificate of recognition from the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, for a recipe submitted for the book, "The Flavor of Wisconsin."

The certificate and recipe are as follows:

Certificate of Recognition

Be it known that a family recipe of Mrs. Henry Weddig was judged worthy of inclusion in "THE FLAVOR OF WISCONSIN," an informal history of food and eating in the Badger State. Published by the State

Historical Society of Wisconsin in 1981.

Recipe — SUMMER SAUSAGE

33 lbs. beef
66 lbs. pork
3 lbs. salt
½ lb. black pepper
1 cup mustard seed
1 piece garlic as big as a walnut
large casings

Grind meats. Grind or finely mince garlic. Combine meats, garlic and seasonings and mix well. Stuff into large casings and tie. Smoke with hickory wood. Makes 100 pounds of sausage.

Hattie said the recipe is over 100 years old. Also she can remember her mother putting it in large casings and tying them with butcher string. Some of the sausages were ten and twenty pounds in weight and more.

The society was also honored with a guest from Bruno, Saskatchewan, Canada. Mrs. Johanna Felix was visiting her relation, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Felix and joined them at the meeting.

actually working with these systems. Board member Charles Ogi agreed with CESA. Tessar asked Ogi how he would know who board members talked to when he had refused to even go along when several of them had gone to Hartford to check out their system. CESA said the district in their words, "would be giving up expertise" which would be available at all times. Their theory is that not everyone can run a terminal and they questioned whether Kewaskum's staff could handle the jobs. Business manager Bob Borch said he felt the two individuals who are now working with the CESA system were capable of handling an in-house system. Superintendent Floyd Brenholt noted he had run into many problems and questions when CESA first came to Kewaskum. However, he said things were eventually worked out and he felt the same thing would hold true for the in-house system.

Brenholt was asked about CESA service. He said the district was completely satisfied on that point and, in fact, it would be much simpler and easier for his staff to stay with CESA. The object of looking into owning your own computer was to save the taxpayers

money. Over a seven-year period, Brenholt feels the district could probably save approximately \$100,000 in processing costs. During that period, projected costs for CESA are expected to run \$251,000, while in-house costs would be approximately \$150,000.

Both board members Tom Brigham and Charles Ogi felt the board should table the idea for another year. Brigham stated, "my recommendation at this time is to put it on the back burner and see how these other systems are working next year." School Board candidate Joan Rosenberger asked "hasn't the board been studying this for a year? You're going to have to spend the money some place, either with CESA or on in house. This has been going on forever," she said.

Tessar commented, all the board has been hearing is cut the budget. Now when we're trying to save \$100,000, what I hear from people is they're not interested.

Ogi motioned to continue leasing service from CESA for 1982-83. The motion, seconded by Brigham, was defeated 5-2. Brigham then said, since the board had decided to buy a computer, he would motion to purchase the equipment from IBM, mainly because of their reputation and experience in the computer field. Member Jean Goeden seconded and the

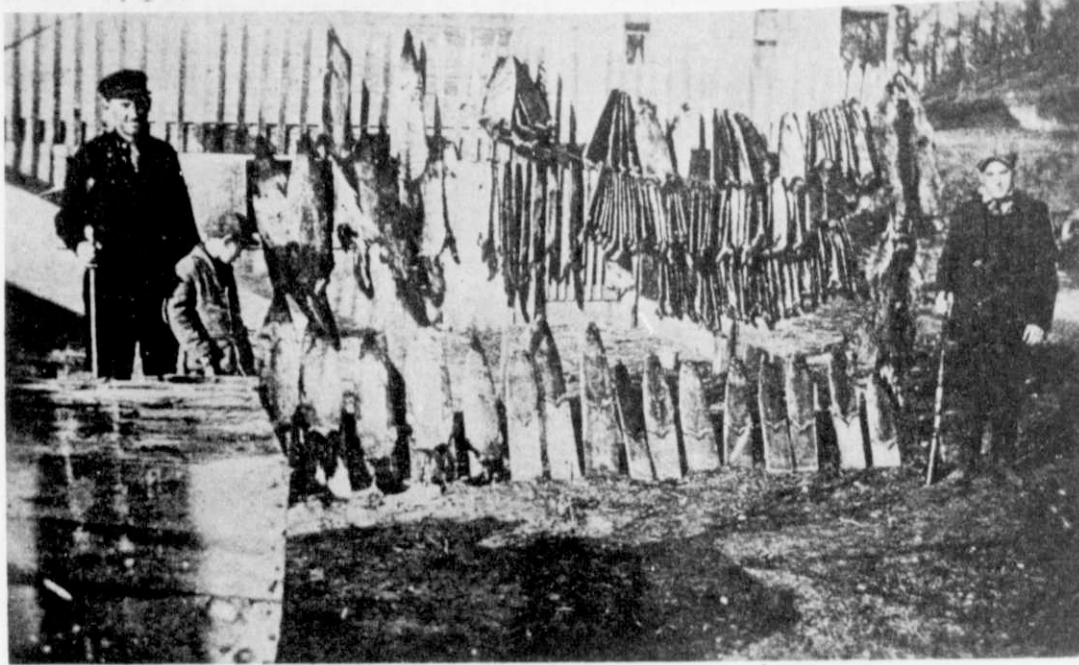

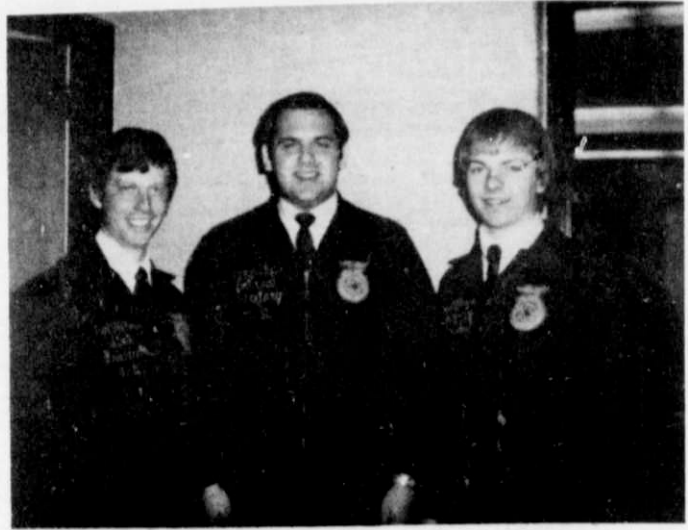
Our two guest speakers were Arnold B. Cortes, State Executive Secretary and Jodee Ehrke, our section 10 officer.

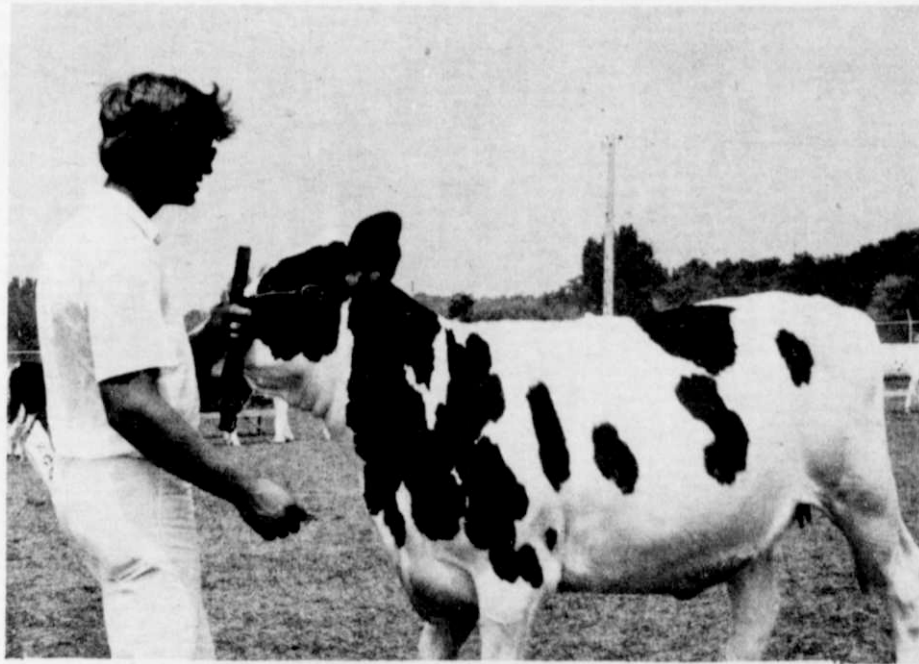

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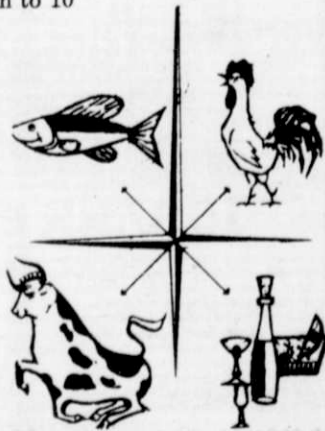

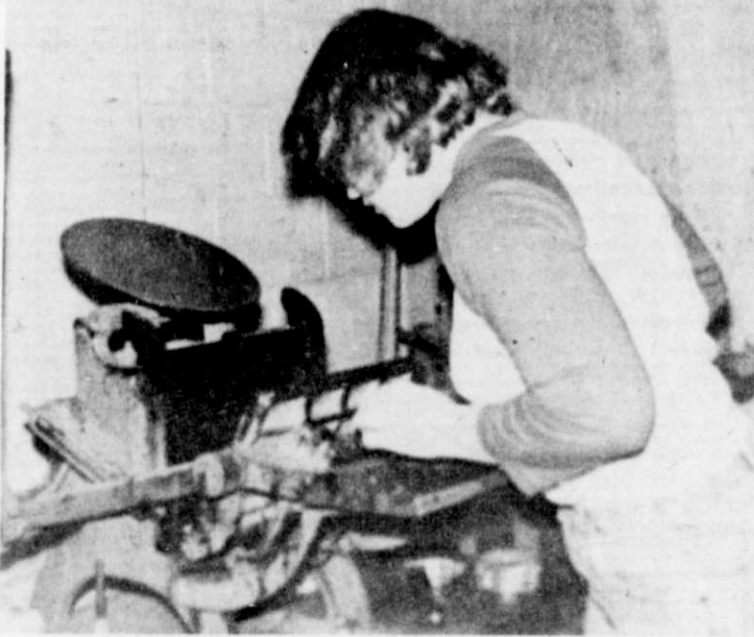

(Attorney Kiefer stated that before any deliberation, the Board should focus on the track record of Ralph Scott for his licensed period of June, 1979 thru October, 1979). Discussion was held on a proposed resolution 82-1 for reasons of objection to the proposed Wisconsin Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit as publicly noticed on February 11, 1982.

RESOLUTION 82-1

WHEREAS, the Kewaskum Village Board has reasons for requesting modifications to the proposed WPDES Permit as follows:

1. Based on a June 25, 1981 report to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, concerning the proposed effluent limitations, the recommendation was made to establish the ammonia nitrogen upper limit based on a correlation of effluent pH. This was done so within the known established stream standards and does not change nor degrade the WPDES intent.

2. The Village of Kewaskum, therefore request that Notation 4 (1.0 MGD) and Notations 5 (.5 MGD) be rearranged to allow for a range of ammonia nitrogen limits, dependent on effluent pH.

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum feels that the above modifications to the proposed WPDES Permit would have significant economic effect and would still provide an acceptable level of discharge characteristics.

Trustee Donald Mlodzik requested that additional emphasis be given to finding alternate sludge disposal sites for the future.

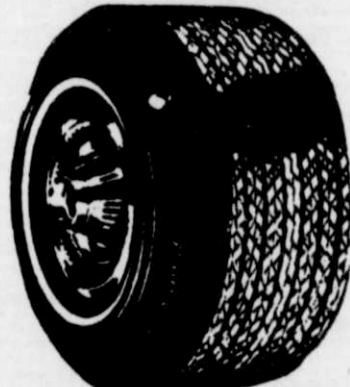

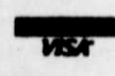
