Ball Park Lighting Tabled for Further Study

Trustee Jeff Rohrer, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee presented swim fee increases for 1982 at Monday night's Village Board meeting

Rohrer noted that while the increases are quite modest, the committee felt they were necessary because park expenditures were exceeding revenues by about \$7,000. Annual income has been around \$7,000 while expenses have exceeded \$14,000. With rising costs this increase will help to bring these two figures closer together, said Rohrer.


Reproductive Rights Program Scheduled For KJWC Meeting

this lighting right now."

This weekly feature will include topics from the fields of medicine, chiropractic, pharmacy, veterinary medicine and dentistry.

DENTAL FLOSS - THE TOOTH SAVER by Stephen R. Van Ess, D.D.S.

In the past, people have accepted the loss of their teeth as an unavoidable part of aging. Today, this is not the case. Dental research has now determined the major cause of tooth loss: periodontal disease. The word periodontal comes from the Greek "peri" (around) and "odon" (tooth). This disease, a condition of the gums and bone supporting the teeth, can now be prevented.

Peridontal disease begins with an accumulation of debris along the gum line, between the teeth, and in the small pockets between the teeth and gums. Left in these areas, the debris causes an inflammation of the gum tissue, which leads either to a deepening of the pockets or recession of the gum tissue. Due to the loss of supporting bone in both situations, it is periodontal disease, not decay, which is the major cause of tooth loss in adults.

To prevent periodontal disease, debris must be thoroughly removed from all surfaces of the teeth at least once a day. A soft tooth brush is excellent for cleaning the broad, exposed surfaces of the teeth, but cannot reach between the teeth. Brushing your teeth and not flossing, is like washing your hands with your fingers together.

When used properly, dental floss can effectively clean the surfaces between the teeth, completing daily oral hygiene. Dental floss is available in many forms; waxed or unwaxed, plain or flavored. There is even a fuzzy floss for cleaning under bridgework. Whatever the form, dental floss is an indispensable factor in the prevention of tooth loss due to periodontal disease.



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

On February 22 I saw the five member majority of the Kewaskum School Board ignore both the advice of the majority of the responsible, experienced businessmen in attendance and the hurting pocketbooks of the taxpayers by voting to purchase the in-house computer. What was the rush? Why could we not have more thoroughly investigated the alternative? There wasn't even an IBM representative present. In addition to objecting to the manner in which the computer purchase was rammed through, I have two other objections. First of all, in talking to people in other districts I find that one of the primary purposes of other systems is to take attendance efficiently and accurately. This system does not. Secondly, this expensive system is primarily for administration, not for instruction. With the state of or economy, any money we spend should directly further our children's education, not give our administrators another justification for current personnel.

Some may feel that the purchase of the computer insures the retention of the business manager position. This is not the basic skill necessary to use. the computer. We could hire three secretaries and still have money left over for what we are paying for that one position.

According to Mr. Brenholt. the business manager will be devoting approximately twenty percent of his time to the. computer the first year. What has he been doing in the past if he has all that time available now?

Once again the majority of the school board has hit our pocketbooks.





VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, uhable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomp-lished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope or given to you if the postage pre-paid return envelope, or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before election day in the case of applications mailed to the municipal clerk, and 5:00 p.m on the day before the election in the case of applications made in the case of applications made in the clerk's office. With one exception, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot must make a separate application before each election. Voters indefinitely confined to their home or care facility because of illness, age or disability need not file an application before each election: a special statement on the application form can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to them before each election: if they fail to make and return the ballots sent to them in an election, they must complete another application later on.

In either case, the marked, sealed ballot must be in the hands of the issuing municipal clerk on or before election day. Any absentee ballot received at the polling place after the polls close or received in incomplete or improper form cannot be counted.
