



As a parent and taxpayer in the Kewaskum School District and an English instructor at UW-Oshkosh, I am impressed with Mr. Spoerl's qualifications and recommendations. Would you please print the following open letter.

Dear Mr. Spoerl,

You are wrong. Implementing the Advance Placement Program at Kewaskum High School would cost money. The Advance Placement Program means college level subjects would be taught in the high school. Upon completing the course the students would take an Advance Placement test. Teachers would have to be paid to teach the courses and books and teaching aides purchased.

Another problem with your suggestion, Mr. Spoerl, is finding students interested in taking the courses. In the current school year, only one student is taking a calculus seminar; two students indicated they would be interested in calculus next year; no one signed up for German 3 & 4; eight students want Spanish 3 & 4, and only fourteen students signd up for a combined class of physics and college prep physics. It seems the first order of business is to encourage our students to take upper level high school classes and let the colleges offer the college courses. A sentiment echoed by a college administrator at UWWC.

Very few high schools offer Advance Placement Programs, only the larger schools. One of

the main problems with the program is that many universities do not accept the credits from these classes. Universities that do, have different grade score criteria.

A better program for college bound students, who want a head start on their college education, is to enroll in a course at UWWC during their senior year. A solution used by several Kewaskum students. This way they get a true college, course; are competing with college students, and if they succeed, they will be assured of having college credit.

Your statement, "A student could earn sufficient credits to shorten his... college years by one semester" through Advance Placement, is a GROSS **EXAGGERATION!**

There are many new programs that could be added to the Kewaskum school curriculum, but is now the time to do so? Perhaps when the ecomony improves and the \$350,000 per year debt payment is gone in 1984, we could consider new programs.

WHAT IS BLOOD PRESSURE? By Thomas L. Leitzke, R.Ph.

Think of your blood vessels, all 60,000 miles of them, as flexible tubes or hoses. As the heart pushes blood through these hoses, the fluid is under pressure.

Several variables determine how great this pressure is: among them, the amount of fluid in the system, the force of the heart, and the resistance of the vessels through which the fluid flows. The most important controls for human blood pressure are the microscopic arterial vessels called arteriales which are surrounded by muscle tissue which can clamp down or relax.

Your blood pressure varies greatly throughout the day. At night, when your body is at rest and in a prone position, the pressure is relatively low. When you awake and begin moving around, the pressure goes up. If you find yourself in a stressful situation, the pressure may rise even higher. These are all natural variations in pressure which are not considered harmful to the body.

Blood pressure is usually expressed in two numbers, as in 140/80. The higher number is a measure of pressure during the forceful contraction of the heart or systole. This, the maximum pressure the blood achieves is called the systolic pressure. The lower number is a measure of the pressure during the hearts resting phase diastole, and is known as diastolic pressure. Because your heart spends more time in diastole, your average blood pressure is closer to the lower number.

The average, normal, diastolic pressure in an adult ranges between 60 and 90 mm hg. The average systolic ranges between 100 and 130 mm hg.

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Minutes of Village **Board Meeting**

Mid-Monthly Meeting March 15, 1982 8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald Stollenwerk presided. Trustee Jeffrey Rohrer asked to be excused and was absent. All other Trustee Members were present.

The minutes of the meetings of March 1 and March 8, 1982, were approved as printed upon motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Donald Mlodzik. Voice vote was unanimous.

A motion was made by Trustee Paul Blumer, seconded by Trustee Raynor Herriges to advertise for a summer parttime intern employee, for the Wastewater Treatment Department. Voice vote was unani-

A motion was made by Trustee Richard Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Donald Mlodzik to advertise for a summer parttime employee for the Public Works Department. Voice vote was unanimous.

The Board discussed a request for twice a week pick up by a business place even if the business would pay for the second pick up. The Board recommended we stick to the ordinance and recommend that a private contractor provide that additional pick up.



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Vetter Vies for Top Skiing Honors

Ashland's Dennis Vetter, formerly of Kewaskum, soon hopes to be the 29th skier in the world to earn the noted cross country skiing Worldloppet medallion..

Vetter departed for Finland and Sweden February 23 to compete in the last two of nine races he needs for the honor.

Vetter is the son of Leland and Vivian Vetter, Route 1, Kewaskum. He graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1962. He and his wife, Jeanette, have two children, Lea Lynn, age 8, and Eric Alan, age 3½. Lea entered her first ski race in Phillips in January.

The Worldlopped League was formed in June of 1978 and is dedicated to giving citizens and world class skiers the chance to compete on an international basis.

Vetter joined the League one year after its conception. There has since been a 76-km race in France added, bringing the total to ten. Vetter explained, "There is a grandfather clause concerning the number of member races so I only have to ski nine."

And even though he has a lifetime to complete them, he has taken only two and a half years to accomplish what only 28 others have done.

"I skiled at the Birkebeiner for many years and then the Worldloppet came along and I liked the challenge of it," Vetter said of his introduction to the League.

Vetter originally began competing as a runner. He's been a distance runner for 22 years, starting cross-country skiing about 12 years ago. "I've found it to be a very nice complement to running in the wintertime."

This will be his third trip to Europe for Worldloppet competition. The Finlandia Hiihto, his first stop on February 28, is one of the most highly organized races in the League and popular with the skiers.

The scenery along World-loppet race trails is captivating, according to Vetter. "In Europe they take their skiing and their races seriously. They set up trails that go right through towns. They throw snow on the roads for the trails and people stand along the side to cheer you on as you ski by," he reminisced.

The Swedish Vasaloppet, March 7, is the oldest race in the Worldloppet having been founded in 1922. "They cut the number of entries off at 12,000 for the Vasaloppet. But there have been so many entrants that they've set up three special races for the week before to accommodate them," Vetter furthered.

Other Worldloppet competitions take place in Wisconsin, Canada, West Germany, Austria, Switzerland and Norway.

This is the last trip Vetter will be making to Europe, at least for skiing. "He'll probably go into bike-racing next," his wife Jeanette remarked.

Vetter has competed in only two bike races since he took it up as a sport two years ago. He has, however, ran numerous marathons including Grandma's and the Boston Marathon. And running has remained his mainstay.

"I promised myself when I graduated from college that I was going to keep running. And in the '60's, running was not very vogue yet. But now I find running is very much a part of my life."

"I started running marathons, a lot of marathons, 12 years ago. Now I only run in one or two a year. I've gotten pretty sick running when it was too hot. So now I choose the races I want and don't run in one just for the sake of saying 'I finished.' I run because I enjoy it," he added.

Although he will no longer compete internationally, Vetter will continue racing in the American Birkebeiner. The Birkebeiner in Cable, Wisconsin, was patterned after the historic Norwegian Birkebeiner Rennet. It is the largest cross country race in North America drawing around 8,000 skiers.

"I think the Birkebeiner is as fine as any of the other races in the League, especially the organization. In fact I think its tops," Vetter commented.

Vetter will have to miss the 1982 Birkebeiner, however, for the first time in five years, as he will be in Finland.

WHEN A TORNADO APPROACHES-YOUR IMMEDIATE ACTION MAY MEAN LIFE OR DEATH

■ Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!

IN CITIES OR TOWNS

In office buildings-stand in an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably in the basement.

In factories-on receiving a tornado warning, post a lookout. Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans.

In homes—the basement usually offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under a sturdy workbench or heavy table if possible. In a home with no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the house. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them!

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds. Trailer parks should have a community shelter. Appoint a community leader responsible for constant radio monitoring during threatening weather or during watch periods.

IN SCHOOLS

Whenever possible, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor.

AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS or other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

If a building is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or to a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

IN OPEN COUNTRY

Move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

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

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
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
