Support Staff 8.0% Across-the-Board Increase Approved

In-House Computer Now Out

Ogi Elected Board President

Like a current song lyric says, "and another one bites the dust" seemed to fit the situation as the new Kewaskum School Board reversed a previous Board decision to purchase an "in-house" computer system, which was expected to save Kewaskum taxpåyers approximately \$100,000 in processing costs over the next seven years.

Newly elected Board President Charles Ogi said, "the public is giving us a message." Board member John Tessar said he felt there was no need for any more discussion and the board should just go ahead and vote. As their first official act. newly elected board member Ralph Horner motioned to cancel the computer which was

to have been delivered May 17, and John Spoerl seconded the motion.

Some Kewaskum residents, however, felt the situation should be discussed. Gerald Buchel addressed Ogi and the board asking, "do you dispute the figures of savings? You make your thoughts known but you don't back your thoughts up with figures. You've got administrative staff presenting you with figures, you've had CESA representatives here and they did not contradict those figures." "The savings over seven years is \$100,000," said Buchel. "Some of you people ran for School Board on the stand you're going to save us taxpayers some money," continued Buchel, "all I'm saying is, if you're against this, tell us why and come up with some figures. You've got to come up

with something other than vote it down, it's just not fair to the taxpayers.

Board member Tom Brigham noted his reason for voting against the computer originally was the fact the district computers are relatively new and the savings are as yet unproven, whereas CESA is functional and does the job and administration is satisfied with it. "It makes no difference to them (administration) but it makes a difference to us taxpayers," said Buchel.

Mrs. Diane Buchel stated, half the people in this room and people I talk to aren't aware of the spending costs that are going on, we are using a computer and it is costing each of us a lot of money, every year, and these costs keep going up every year.' Mrs. Buchel noted, "it's your dollars, we're

Kindergarten Committee **To Recommend No Change**

At its first meeting Thursday, April 22, the committee formed to study possible changes in Kewaskum's kindergarten program decided there was no hard evidence to back up any theory that all-day kindergarten would be better or less costly than the present half-day program.

When the idea of all-day kindergarten was first brought up, Superintendent Floyd Brenholt felt a savings in busing costs of around \$40,000 could be realized. However, after checking Campbellsport and Kiel, it was noted aide or specialist (art, music, etc.,) time was added to these programs. Brenholt estimated a cost of \$7,000 to the district for the addition of four hours aide time per section (class) per day if the all-day plan were implemented. This would drop the anticipated savings down to \$33,000.

Several of the kindergarten staff also felt class size would have to be reduced to no more than 20 students. With Kewaskum's present enrollment figures, this would necessitate addition of another teacher, reducing the \$33,000 figure even more. The teachers noted that almost all the districts contacted were working with 20 May Is Bicycle or less students, had aides and/or specialists providing art. music and physical education instruction.

Mrs. Connie Zemlicka, Wayne kindergarten teacher, said, "in sixteen years, I have NEVER had 20 kids. "I had 32 youngsters in one screening and ended up with all 32 that fall." Brenholt noted that Kiel was planning to increase its class. size next year from 20 to 25. So maybe they won't like it (all-day) so much next year

either," said Zemlicka.

The committee discussed adjustment time and how the youngsters would react to allday kindergarten. Several teachers noted teachers they had talked with said some children could not handle being away from home all day and did nothing but cry the entire day. One mother felt this resulted from the fact that many of these youngsters had never been away from home before or had not been left with a babysitter on a regular basis.

After studying reports from several school districts, the group felt these studies did not answer all their questions especially in the area of long term effect and actual dollar savings.

Kindergarten teacher Irene Stradtman recommended the district follow the progress of the Lodi School District and study the impact their all-day program has on its children.

The committee's formal report and recommendations will be presented at the May 10th School Board meeting.

not trying to get something in here that's going to hurt us, it's going to save us money." Mrs. Buchel said, "we're going to have to spend the money anyway." Another resident, Mr. Manthei, said "oh no." Gerald Buchel asked Ogi to correct the gentleman, "that we've got to spend the money whether its CESA or IBM." "There's no question about that," said Ogi. "There's just no big hurry to get into this." said Ogi. The motion to cancel the computer was approved four to three. with Brigham, Ogi, Horner and Spoerl voting for and Theusch, Goeden and Tessar voting against cancellation.

In other action the board approved an 8.0% across-theboard wage increase for support staff personnel. The proposal was the identical plan presented and turned down at the board's last meeting. The new increase will give employees who are at or above the experience steps a 7.7% increase including benefits, and employees on the experience steps an 8.2% increase with an indefinite freeze for a total cost of \$38,439.00.

Two other recommendations, a 7.7% across-the-board including experience steps with a package cost of \$44,528 and an 8.0% increase with experience steps costing \$46,265 were also considered by the board in closed session.

"We only had about five minutes in closed session to discuss this and I don't think it's a fair discussion as far as the new board members are concerned," said Tessar. "The committee has studied these proposals and spent a lot of time on them, I recommend we go along with their recommendasaid board member Ralph Horner. The new increase was approved five to



Area Residents Present Ideas for Kettle Moraine Forest's Future

Over one hundred people living in the Kettle Moraine Forest area attended a University of Wisconsin informational workshop at the Campbellsport High School on Thursday, April

The meeting, along with three others held throughout southeastern Wisconsin, was designed to collect input from forest users, area residents and local businessmen for furture development and use of the Northern and Southern Kettle Moraine State Forests.

The University of Wisconsin Recreation Resources Center, in conjunction with the Department of Natural Resources, has been conducting a survey over the past twelve months regarding various aspects of the forest. Random visitors to the forest throughout the entire year were asked to fill out a questionaire stating, what brought them to the forest, what activities they participated in, where they were from, what they would like to see changed or remain the same, and various other items regarding the park.

Of approximately 1,000 questionaires answered by park users, 22% were from Mil-waukee and 10% were from Cook County, Illinois alone,

plus other areas of Illinois. After a short presentation by U-W representatives headed by Don Shank, the meeting was divided into seven groups allowing a one-hour discussion period to come up with each group's ideas for the park. All the groups contained various sports enthusiasts including hunters, fishermen, snowmobilers, etc., as well as naturalists and conservationists. The groups were asked to come up with a list, each group was then asked to select the five most important objectives to be met in any future DNR planning

When the seven lists were posted, several ideas appeared on almost every list. All were in agreement that there should be no further expansion of the park's territory. There should not be any further expansion of campsite areas and any future development should be kept as natural as possible with no further blacktopping of roads. Another point of major agreement was, an increase in user fees, along with some type of fees to be paid by such park users as hikers, cross-country skiers and horsemen who presently pay only for a park sticker. The groups were in general agreement that the Department of Natural Resources be required to pay a higher tax rate to townships containing park lands. The present DNR tax rate is 50c per acre compared to approximately

Although only five objectives were discussed from each group, all recommendations and ideas brought up at the meeting will be compiled with previous workshop and questionaire data into a report and forwarded to the DNR for its planning program which is expected to go into effect by 1990, roughly eight years away

At present, there are about 65 people on the Citizen Advocacy waiting list in Washington County who could benefit from having a volunteer to share with them.

Today's Medicine

INSOMNIA & OVER-THE-COUNTER SLEEP AIDES by John R. Jankowski R.Ph.

Insomnia is the occasional inability to attain restful sleep. It is estimated that 50% of the population experiences insomnia at some time and 33% experience it frequently. Although most insomnia is temporary, some cases may be of sufficient duration of severity to interfere with a person's daily functioning. Severe or chronic insomnia may be a symptom of psychological or physical illness.

Insomnia can be classified as either difficulty in falling asleep or difficulty in remaining asleep. Difficulty in falling asleep can be caused by: stress and/or anxiety (worry, excitement), pain or physical discomfort (headache, toothache) or a change in daily rhythym (change in workshifts, jetlag). Difficulty in remaining asleep can be caused by: age (elderly are more prone to early or frequent awakenings caused by changing sleep cycles), depression, or physical conditions (heart conditions, asthma, ulcers, back problems).

Drugs may cause sleep distrubances. Certain weight loss preparations which contain stimulants (caffeine, amphetamine, etc.), as well as other medications (nicotine, theophylline, etc.) may produce nervousness & prevent sleep in some individuals.

Although many over-the-counter (OTC) preparations are promoted for safe and restful sleep, consumers should be cautious. Many of these OTC products contain drugs found in prescription medications but in much lower doses. It is assumed that these lower doses minimize the adverse effects of these agents. Unfortunately, the sedative effects are also minimal because sedation (drowsiness) is a secondary or side-effect of

Preparations containing antihistamines (pyrilamine maleate, doxylamine succinate) are the most satisfactory OTC products to use. These types of products are for occasional use and only at the recommended dose. These products are best taken 30 minutes before bedtime. Because of their sedative action, antihistamines may impair one's ability to drive or operate hazardous machinery. Using these products with alcohol or other depressants will intensify the sedative effect. These products are not designed for those less than 12 years old or pregnant or nursing women.

There are several nondrug methods for relieving insomnia. These are:

- 1) abstain from products containing caffeine (coffee, tea, colas, etc.)
- 2) avoid heavy meals several hours before bedtime.
- 3) avoid naps during the day.
- 4) perform light exercise before bedtime to relax the body.
- 5) designate a specific time for sleep.
- 6) relax by engaging in positive activities such as reading in bed, watching TV, or listening to relaxing music.

7) minimize outside disturbances at bedtime.

Finally, if sleeplessness persists continuously for more than 2 weeks, consult your physician. Remember to mention if you are taking other medications or if you have any special medical conditions. If in doubt about the use of any medications, prescription or over-the-counter, always consult your pharmacist or physician.

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

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
