Scott Bartender Re-Application Denied

Once-A-Week Garbage Collection Schedule to Be Year-Round

Although Ralph Scott, local tavern owner, came armed with three character witnesses and another lawyer, the Kewaskum Village Board unanimously voted to deny Scott's second application for a bartender's license.

Scott's attorney, Richard Shapiro, felt there was some confusion of things done by Scott and things done by his sons. Shapiro stated Scott's financial situation was "dire" and the board should reconsider their previous decision to deny Scott the license.

Trustee Dick Schmidt asked, "do you believe a license is a privilege?" "Yes, I do," said Scott. Schmidt noted that while Scott personnally held the liquor license, there was 26 complaints. Scott said he was on the road driving truck when these incidents took place. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted the records complaints.

Several board members noted the state feels there is no distinguishable difference in responsibility between holding a liquor or bartender's license. The board felt Scott did not show adequate control over situations at the tavern.

After more than an hour's discussion, the board voted 7-0 to deny the application.

In other action the board approved submission of plans for construction of a new chemicals building at the Wastewater Treatment plant. The plant modification is necessary to meet requirements for the village's new water treatment permit. Cost of the 17'4" x 16' building was estimated at village can save \$3,600 by installing its own driveway, and ventilating system and heater [Continued on Page 4]

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
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Schoots to Receive Degree

use a loader to pick them up. Bilgo also noted that some residents are not complying with the village ordinance on handling of brush and branch-

The board unanimously agreed the ordinance should be enforced. Anyone not meeting the code will find cards informing them that trash will not be picked up unless properly contained or bundled.

Trustee Jeff Rohrer, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, reported on the Kiwanis Park baseball sched-

Originally the village had set a cost of \$22.50 per team, plus \$7.00 for every non-village resident player, approximately

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\$128.00 to cover village maintenance of the diamonds and park facilities. The teams would have to supply their own umpires and trophies. The teams asked instead for a blanket fee. A fee of \$150 was established.

The leagues apparently were not happy with the reduced fee and added responsibilities. Rohrer said he had heard "through rumors" that the Men's and Ladies Leagues were going to play elsewhere. "This means the village will not be involved in any way in a maintenance or expense manner" with these leagues said Rohrer.

'We felt we were trying to be fair and open," said Rohrer. The village was not making any profit, just trying to cover expenses.

If any leagues decide to return to the park, they will have to accept what time is left. Rohrer said the Jaycees have their teams set up and he will not shift them to make room for other teams.

The report stated the board and Parks Committee are just asking that everyone that uses the park pay their fair share.


Recover Stolen Car in Tennessee

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

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

DENTAL DECAY - WHAT CAUSES IT? by Stephen R. Van Ess, D.D.S.

Dental decay, we've all heard about it, either directly or indirectly, but what actually causes it? Is it the foods we eat, or don't eat? Is it because we forget to brush and floss as often as we should? Could we have "bad teeth?" Let's examine the cause of decay.

The attack of decay begins as a loss of calcium from a localized portion of a tooth. This is caused by the production of acid, as bacteria on the teeth digest simple sugars. This decalcification is followed by a rapid breakdown of the organic substance of the tooth. For decay to begin, three elements must exist: 1) a susceptible tooth 2) bacteria 3) simple sugars

1) A number of factors can make a tooth susceptible to decay. Some surfaces are difficult to clean, as those between the teeth or in the pits and grooves of the biting surfaces of the teeth. Because of crowding or tipping, some areas might also be hard to clean. It is possible that the tooth structure itself may also be weak, but with the use of fluoride, teeth can be strengthened against the effects of acids.

2) If an animal is raised in a totally germ-free environment, it will never develop decay. This is true, no matter how much sugar it eats, or how susceptible its teeth may be. Because it is not possible for humans to remain bacteria-free, it is necessary to reduce the amount of bacteria on the teeth through regular brushing and flossing.

3) Simple sugars are the only food source for the acid producing bacteria. As the amount of sugar consumed decreases, the amount of acid decreases, and therefore, the amount of decay decreases. Sugar is presnt in one form or another in the vast majority of foods we eat. It is nearly impossible to eliminate sugars from our diet. By watching the contents of foods we eat, it is possible to reduce the excesses of sugars from our diets.

The three causative factors are simple: 1) tooth susceptibility 2) acid producing bacteria on the teeth 3) the intake of sugars. By reducing any one or more of these factors, the incidence of dental decay can also be greatly reduced.

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

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

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

Sensenbrenner to Seek Re-Election

MENOMONEE FALLS - Apr. Ending speculation he might run for Governor of Wisconsin to succeed retiring incumbent Lee Dreyfus, Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. has announced he will seek reelection to the U.S. House of Representatives.

Sensenbrenner told Ninth District Republicans at their annual caucus Friday night he will seek a third term in the 1982 elections. The caucus gave the Congressman its unanimous endorsement at the meeting.

In announcing his plans, Sensenbrenner said President Reagan's policies were beginning to turn the economy around, but that more work was needed to finish the job. "I am seeking re-election to help the President do that job," he said.

Inflation has been cut in half and the prime interest rate has been cut by over five points since President Reagan took office last year, Sensenbrenner pointed out. "Now we must turn more attention to the number one problem of unemployment among the nation's workers," he added.

Sensenbrenner, 39, has re-presented the Ninth District since 1979. Currently, he serves on the House Judiciary Committee, where is the Ranking Minority Member on the Subcommittee on Criminal Justice, and the House Science and Technology Committee. He also is a member of the Housing and Suburban caucuses of the 97th Congress.

Sensenbrenner is married to the former Cheryl Warren, and they have one child, Jimmy, born last December.

The Ninth District includes all of Ozaukee, Jefferson, and Washington counties, and parts of Milwaukee, Waukesha, Dodge, Fond du Lác, and Sheboygan counties.
