New Water Rates Start July 1

As of July 1, Kewaskum Village residents will see a 33% increase in water rates as approved by the Public Service Commission hearing on April

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted the PSC has granted the increase so the village could realize a reasonable rate of return (8%) for operation and maintenance of the utility plant. Schmidt said, however, that since the new rate will not go into effect until the third quarter, the increase will probably result in a break-

even situation. Previous rates have seen the Water Department still running in the "red."

New minimum quarterly charges will be \$8.60 for most residential meters, up \$1.60 from the present \$7.00 per quarter. The commercial meter rates will run between \$17.00 and \$710.00 per quarter, depending on meter size.

Volume charges will be, minimum charge for the first 5,000 gallons used each quarter, the next 45,000 gallons per quarter will be 51c per 1,000 gallons, the next 450,000 gallons a quarter - 45c per 1,000 gallons, the next 3,500,000

gallons each quarter at 37c per 1,000 gallons and over 4,-000,000 gallons per quarter, 23c per 1,000 gallons.

"The PSC recommends we come in next April for another increase," said Schmidt, "however, any increase at that time probably would not go into effect until 1984. This rate (July 1st) should be in effect for a year and a half," said Schmidt.

Water bills received by residents for the second quarter ending June 30th, will be figured at the old rate. The new increases could have been put into effect immediately, but

School Tax Levy Increase of 4-5% Part Of Budget Proposal to Go Before Board

between 4 percent and 5 percent will be a part of the budget proposal to go to the Kewaskum Board of Education on Monday, May 24. Since there has been at least a small amount of new building, the average property taxpayer should see an increase slightly less than that percent, although the actual amounts will vary because of assessment changes.

In the past few years, homeowners and others have seen increases larger than the general increase because certain business property was gradually being removed from the tax rolls. This caused a greater percentage of the school tax to be levied against the

A total tax levy increase of homeowner. That process was completed last year, so homeowners should no longer be feeling the effects of that change.

Proposed spending in those categories (general fund and debt service) which effect tax levies will increase under the proposed budget by 7.2 percent. The general fund goes up 7.8 percent while debt service retirement goes down 1.2 percent. A few months ago, board members had suggested increases ranging from 7 to 81/2 percent.

There is one large segment in the budget which remains unknown, and that is teacher salaries and fringe benefits. While certain increases were calculated for budget purposes, shose could change through negotiations. Since the contract is not yet settled for 1981-82. a number of unknowns.

Final tax levies are affected a great deal by what the state legislature does with school aids which go directly to schools, there are additional school aids which go to the tax relief. These latter aids began last year and are not

Kewaskum budget increases begin from a lower base since per-pupil spending is well below that state average. The 1981-82 state average spending per pupil was \$550 or 21 percent above the Kewaskum figure. Using a comparison cost, which excludes facilities acquisition and remodeling, pupil transportation, food services, debt service and community services, the state average figure is \$615 or 30 percent above ours. These figures come from the Public Expenditure Research Foundation.

Athletic Director's Ball Now In Administration's Court

After almost an hour's lively discussion, a foregone conclusion on the part of many people was confirmed. The Athletic Director's position, as such, was virtually eliminated.

At Tuesday night's special school board meeting, member Tom Brigham again moved to place the athletic director's duties on the administration's shoulders. However, this time Brigham did not specifically single out high school principal Clark Pearson or assistant principal Roy Esser for the job. 'I move that the superintendent, in consultation with his staff, decide which administrator be the athletic director and that the athletic director or his designee be required at 'home' events,'' stated Brigham. The motion was seconded by member Ralph Horner.

Noting that Dave Wietor indicated responsibilities of the position could run two to three hours a day, Brigham said, "assigning the position to an academic person might crimp or hinder the responsibilities this person has in the academic program." Brigham felt the administrators had a more flexible schedule with more free time which would allow for the

necessary time needed to handle these duties.

Board member John Tessar replied, "I'm kind of surprised at your recommendation Tom, because every time in the past that Mr. Brenholt made recommendations this board turned them down. Now you come along and say, let's put the burden on Floyd. You're really not putting any burden on except you're getting us off the hook because we couldn't decide. Three times last week we had a tie vote so you're really not coming with any new recommendation whatsoever. You're saying it's either going to be the principal or vice principal." Brigham stated not really that there was Mr. Reha and Mr. Larsen. "That's ridiculous," said Tessar, going to the middle and grade school to run the high school.'

Board member Jean Goeden then stated, "the idea is if you're going to give the job to Mr. Brenholt already you can' see with the election, that probably Mr. Borch isn't going to have a job, now you're going to saddle him (Brenholt) with another job in another year? Because next year, if Mr. Borch isn't here, Mr. Brenholt will have to do that job plus athletic director.

Scott's Third Application for License Denied

Ralph Scott, owner of the tavern at 1310 Riverview Drive, made his third attempt at obtaining a bartender's license from the village board.

Scott, along with his attorney Richard Zaffiro, again presented his argument for being granted a license. This time armed with a petition containing 90 signatures of people who were in favor of the village granting the permit.

Trustee Dave Nigh stated, 'I notice that on that list of names only one signature was from the immediate area, some are not even from town." Scott stated he had a second petition circulating in the Riverview area, but had not gotten it back for presentation at the meeting. Trustee Paul Blumer said, personally would like to have seen some of his neighbors on the list, since this is where it all started. The names I'm looking for are the 25-30 who were here for the meetings. I don't see any of those people here."

The board felt Scott had not provided any additional or new evidence to change their decision. The board voted 6 to 0 to again deny the license. Blumer abstained from the voting.

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

Theusch questioned whether Brigham's motion was because of economics. "No, because Mr. Wietor said there was not enough time," said Brigham. "How can he have enough time when we cut 10 days from his contract," stated Tessar. stated Tessar. Theusch said, "if he was overworked with the days he had, why did we cut him more?' Wietor noted he had no release time as recommended for Miss Vesper. "Many times I worked over my lunch hour and evenings at home. I didn't feel the financial rewards and time away from my family were worth it.

One citizen felt the board should hire an athletic director, noting some schools have a full-time athletic director costing thousands of dollars. "At \$600.00, we're getting away cheap," he said. "That's what our administrative staff has been trying to tell this board and the public all along, we're working with 15% less staff than other schools our size," said Theusch.

"I understand Mr. Spoerl called this meeting," said Theusch, "yet Tom made the motion. I would think that you called the meeting (Spoerl) and you would have come in with your own motion." Spoerl said he had no recommendations or anything to say. He called the meeting to see if another board member could come up with a solution to settle the problem.

Tessar questioned Brenholt on what would happen if this motion went through. Brenholt noted the chances were very good a grievance would be filed by the teachers association.

"I personally go along with giving the job to Miss Vesper, it will cost the taxpayers less than 15c a year," said Tessar. Goeden asked how much it

would cost the district if a grievance claim was made. Brenholt felt anywhere from \$300 to \$400. "Then I would rather spend that money to hire Miss Vesper as athletic director," said Goeden. "We'll have to spend the money either way and I'd rather pay it to

Gerald Buchel, a private citizen, asked Brigham to rescind his motion, "because assigning the job to administration doesn't allow for continuity or stability in the athletic program.



These are the original Rosenheimer malthouse buildings built in the 1800's by the Rosenheimer brothers. The business was incorporated in 1891 and the name was changed to L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Company, to honor the Rosenheimer brothers father, the first L. Rosenheimer.

The building on the left was the elevator, the low part the malt house, the tall buildings contained the kilns, the three large storage tanks were usually used for storing malt.

In September of 1911 the elevator burned to the ground with some damage to the malt house. The elevator was rebuilt to the south of its original location. The business is still thriving today.

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DNR Payments in Lieu of Taxes Sent To Townships and Municipalities

Recently 764 Wisconsin towns and municipalities with property managed by the Department of Natural Resources within their boundaries received checks from the DNR totalling \$1,005,269 on 1,078,533 acres in 71 counties.

The payments, in lieu of taxes on state-owned lands, were made in accordance with state statutes on lands classified as State Forest lands, Game Management lands, Fish Management lands, Park lands and Central Wisconsin Conservation area leased lands.

The payment scheduled which determines how much the DNR pays each town and municipality is lengthy and complicated, but essentially results in a payment of at least 50c per acre.

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

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

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

Today's Medicine

DRUG ABUSE by R. G. Edwards, M.D.

The definition of drug abuse is the use of any substance in a manner that deviates from the accepted medical, social or legal patterns within a given society. Several specific drugs are used primarily to induce alterations in mood, perception and behavior. Basically, these drugs can be divided into six classes

1) Opiates come from the poppy plant, and the chief alkaloid is morphine. This drug is easily altered to form the drug heroin. The unscrupulous dealer will receive one pound of relatively pure heroin. Then he will adulterate this white powder with other white powders so that the addict may pay \$10.00 for very little real heroin. It is common for these drug crazed addicts to steal and kill to obtain the hundreds of dollars needed daily to pay for their addiction. Most heroin users start by sniffing the powder, but soon learn that a large amount injected into a vein will produce a warm flush of the skin plus a pleasurable sensation similar to a sexual orgasm.


2) Centrae nervous system (brain) depressants are the barbiturates and the tranquilizers used by millions of people who crave the peace of mind these drugs supply just prior to sleep. However, continued use will lead to a need for greater doses and then addiction.

3) Central nervous system stimulants include the amphetamine group and cocaine. The ephedrine plant, grown on the Andes Mountains in South America and cocaine is made from the Coca plant leaves. Users feel a sense of greatly increased mental capacity and physical strength, with little need for food, drink or sleep. This is just the opposite of the depressants.

4) Cannibis includes marijuana, that offers a mild euphoria when smoked in cigarettes, and hashish, which is a much stronger acting drug than marijuana. Both come from the hemp plant.

5) Psychedelics are the drug that produce distinctive alterations in perception, thought, feeling and behavior. These are known as hallucinogens, LSD, acid and angel dust. Bad effects these drugs produce include the fact that incidence of congenital anomalies are markedly increased in the offspring of such users. Plus, the really susceptible user may have a bad trip or freak out experience that can lead to suicide.

6) Inhalants include Nitrous Oxide, the dentist's "laughing Organic solvents, especially Toluene in glue and various aerosol sprays, contain fluorocarbons which may lead to cardiac arrhythmias and death.



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
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

County Sheriff **Explains Moped** Laws and Safety

The warmer weather has brought out many energy-saving mopeds. With their use, many questions about moped safety and their legal use arise. Motorists and moped riders should be aware of the proper legal uses of the mopeds as covered by Wisconsin law.

A moped is defined by Section 340.01(29m) as a "bicycle type motor vehicle with fully operable pedals for propulsion by human power, which has an engine certified by the manufacturer, at not more than 50cc and has an automatic transmission." law further states that the Schwartz urges all present maximum designed speed of the moped operators and those moped shall not exceed 30 mph on level ground.

Mopeds are licensed motor vehicles and are therefore entitled to a full parking place, a information are urged to stop in full lane of traffic, and are or call the Sheriff's Department entitled to the same rules of to obtain additional information right-of-way as any other motor pamphlets.


When operating on a roadway, a moped operator should travel single file in the extreme righthand lane, on any roadway where


the speed is more than 25 miles per hour. Mopeds may be operated two abreast on roads, by consenting operators, where the speed limit is 25 mph or less.

By law, mopeds are not required to have their headlights on during daylight hours; however, Sheriff Schwartz urges the use of the headlight at all times to provide motorists with a better ability to see the smaller moped. We also support the federal regulations for encouraging the use of brightly colored clothing, helmets, lights and the use of reflectorized materials.

A valid drivers license is required, and no passengers are permitted, even though some mopeds may have a seat style that might accommodate more than one person. Sheriff persons contemplating the purchase of one, to be aware of the laws governing their legal use. Persons desiring additional

WISCONSIN'S NEW DRINKING/DRIVING LAW

WHO GETS CONVICTED OF OWI IN WASHINGTON COUNTY? [Second in a series]

Who is most likely to be convicted of drunken driving in Washington County?

The state department of transportation's computer provided the following information on convictions of operating while under the influence of alcohol or other drugs (OWI) ..

A total of 447 convictions in Washington county has been entered for 1981 violations through the end of March, 1982. A few more may still be awaiting court appearances.

Of these convictions, 6 were under the age of 18, which is the legal drinking age in Wisconsin. Convictions in other age brackets include: 18-24; 19-26; 20-24-120; 25-34-124; 35-44-72; 45-54-46; 55-64-26; 65 over -3.

Statewide, about 46 per cent of approximately 30,000 annual convictions are of persons under the age of 25, an age group that constitutes only 25 per cent of the driving population. About a fourth of all convictions are made as a result of the driver being involved in a traffic safety plan.

Statistics statewide show that about 86 per cent of the drivers convicted each year have not been convicted of OWI in the previous five year period.

Under a new drinking/driving law which went into effect May 1, penalties for all OWI and related offenses have been increased. The new law provides for a minimum 90 day driver license suspension for a first offense, plus monetary penalties totaling about \$440. In addition, all drivers convicted of OWI must go to an approved assessment center to have an assessment of the extent of their drinking problem, and to have a driver safety plan developed. Failure to go for assessment or to comply with the driver safety plan will result in suspension of the driver's license.

Drivers are required to pay for the cost of assessment, and treatment/education programs ordered through the driver

Mr. Ralph Scott then told the Board he is without work and in need of a job. Further discussion was held by the Board on the license being a privilege, Mr. Scott's awareness of the problems which transpired while he held the Class B Tavern License, the difference if any between the Class B Tavern License and Operator's License, the contradictions made by Attorney

Zaffiro in his statements.

The letter of opposition by the Police Department based on the violations of the Wisconsin Liquor Laws as well as the overall behavior of the premise in the past, while Mr. Ralph Scott held the Class B Tavern License at 1310 River View Drive, Kewaskum, WI., was read by Administrator Schmidt. Announce Fishing Regulation Change For Forest Lake

Horicon - A special 14 inch length limit regulation on large mouth bass took effect on Forest Lake, Fond du Lac County, when the fishing season opened on May 1, 1982. Anglers catching largemouth bass will be required to release all bass less than 14 inches in length unharmed to the lake.

Forest Lake is one of eight lakes in southern Wisconsin on which experimental length limits on bass are being tried. The purpose of the regulation is to increase the number of larger bass in the lake. The hoped for benefits include: 1) more bass caught even though some have to be released; 2) more large bass caught; 3) larger panfish for the angler. Length limits are used by many southern states to regulate bass harvest with good results. The trail use of this regulation will enable Wisconsin fish managers to determine the value of this regulation on Wisconsin waters.

To determine if a bass caught is legal size immediately measure the fish when landed. The fish must be at least 14 inches from the tip of the snout to the tip of the tail. A ruler attached to the boat seat, tackle box, or a board, on which the fish can be laid to measure, is the best way to accurately determine the length. Handle the fish gently to avoid injury. If the fish is deeply hooked very carefully remove the lure, or if using only a single hook, cut the line leaving the hook in the fish. Survival of bass which have been caught, carefully handled, and released is quite high, giving the fish a good chance to live, grow, and be caught again.
