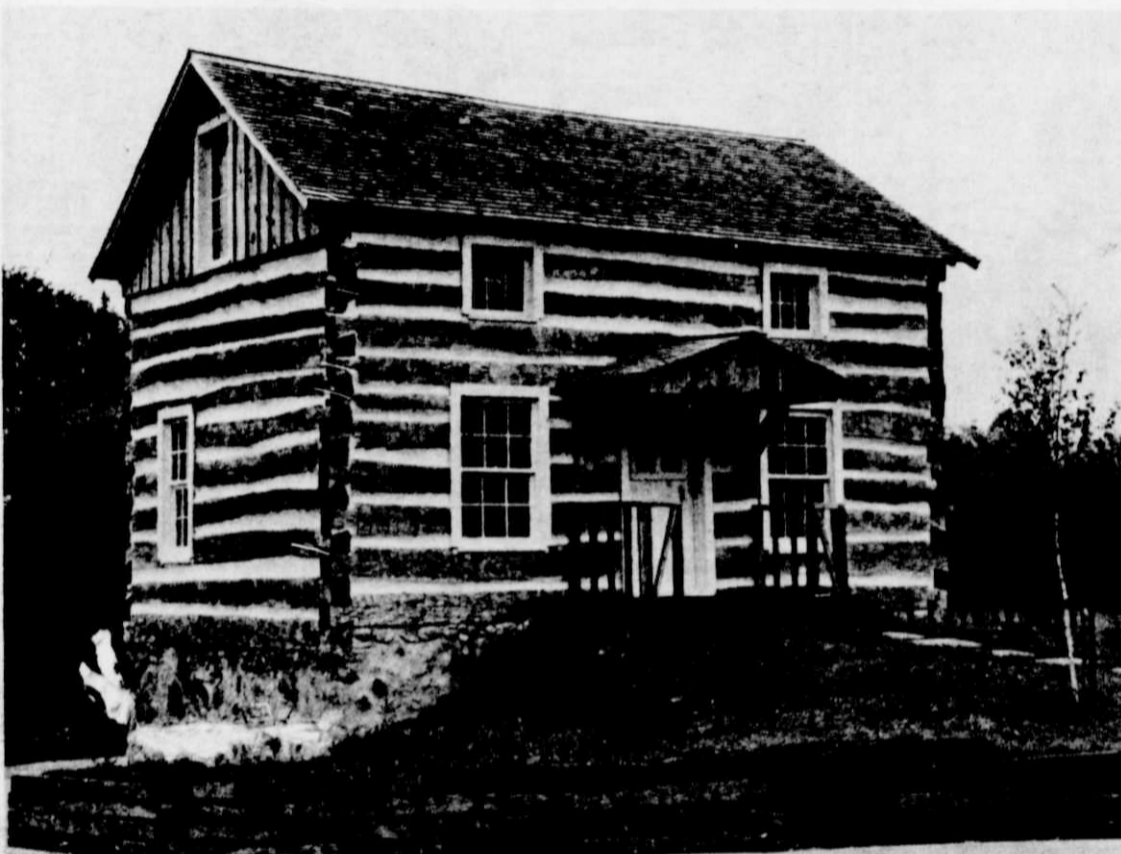

Historical Society to Hold Grand Opening of Log Cabin Saturday



The Kewaskum Historical Society Inc. is anxiously awaiting the GRAND OPENING of the LOG CABIN Friday. The Society is looking forward to sharing their labors and collections of artifacts with the public.

The time of 12:30 p.m. has been set for the doors of the museum to open for the general public. The museum's upper level houses a doctor's office, music room, library, sewing room, general store, school room, post office, plus much more. The museum's lower level houses a blacksmith shop, fire house, carpenter's work shop, cheese factory and misc. farm equipment.

Also at 12:30 p.m. the ladies of the society will begin serving free refreshments (cookies, bars, coffee and punch). The society will be selling 30c hot

dogs for those interested.

The LOG CABIN ribbon cutting ceremony will take place in front of the log cabin adjacent to the museum, 1202 Parkview Drive, at 1:30 p.m. The program will consist of:

1. Invocation by Reverend Robert H. Lindau, St. John's Lutheran Church, New Fane.

2. The Pledge of Allegiance by the entire assembly, led by the Robert G. Romaine Legion Post # 384.

3. Welcome by Historical Society President Daniel Schmidt.

4. Statement of appreciation by Village President Gerald F. Stollenwerk.

5. Letter of Congratulations from the State Historical Society of Wisconsin to be read.

6. Presentation of award to be given by Past-President Dolores Kleinke.

7. Official Ribbon Cutting and Grand Opening of the Log Cabin.

8. Benediction by Father Budde, Holy Trinity Catholic Church, Kewaskum.

The log cabin will be open for the public to visit and to see the authentic furnished kitchen, parlor, adult's bedroom and children's bedroom. The Log Cabin's basement will house old fashioned wash machines and devices, a shoemakers shop and assorted signs.

The Kewaskum High School Swing Choir will entertain the public at 2:30 p.m. in the parking lot of the museum.

The festivities for the day will draw to a close at approximately 4:00 p.m., after what the Historical Society hopes is an enjoyable day for everyone.

Proposed School Budget Reflects 7.8% Increase

Superintendent Floyd Brenholt presented the proposed 1982-83 School Budget of \$5,188,189.00, at Monday night's school board meeting.

The proposed budget contains a 7.8% increase over 1981-82, which is within the guidelines of a 7% to 8% spending ceiling set by the board. The 1982-83 figures call for a General Fund budget of \$4,845,525 plus a debt service payment of \$342,664, compared to the 1981-82 General Fund expenditures of \$4,494,917 and debt payment of \$346,737.

Brenholt feels that the overall tax levy will increase approximately 4 to 5%. Brenholt noted, however, that 1982-83 is the last year the district will be faced with the extremely large debt payment. Business Development Director Bob Borch said the debt retirement figure will drop to below \$100,000 for 1983-84, with no debt retirement expenditures in 1984-85, which should result in little, if any levy being set at that time.

After reviewing the proposed budget, board member Ralph Horner stated, "this budget

was prepared with input from the old board. As far as I'm concerned, 2½ to 3% should be the top ceiling," continued Horner. Horner felt it was a mandate from the public that the board look for further reductions and if nothing else, "I think the only place at this point would be salaries and layoffs."

Board member Tom Brigham stated, "I was one that came in with the 7 to 8%." "Basically, I think they did a good job first time around." Member John Tessar recommended that the board members come to the next meeting with their suggestions. President Charles Ogi noted, "the budget is 85% set, anything less is just cosmetic."

Tessar noted that after removing the eleven categories which are fixed, salaries, insurance, fees, etc., for a total of \$4,358,000, "that leaves us with approximately \$480,000.00 to play around with." Board member Richard Theusch stated, "we would have to cut \$215,000's to stay within (Horner's) 3%."

Since the Kewaskum School District is constantly being compared to West Bend and its

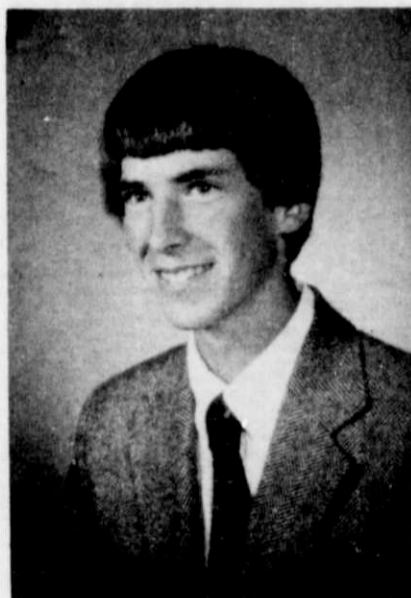

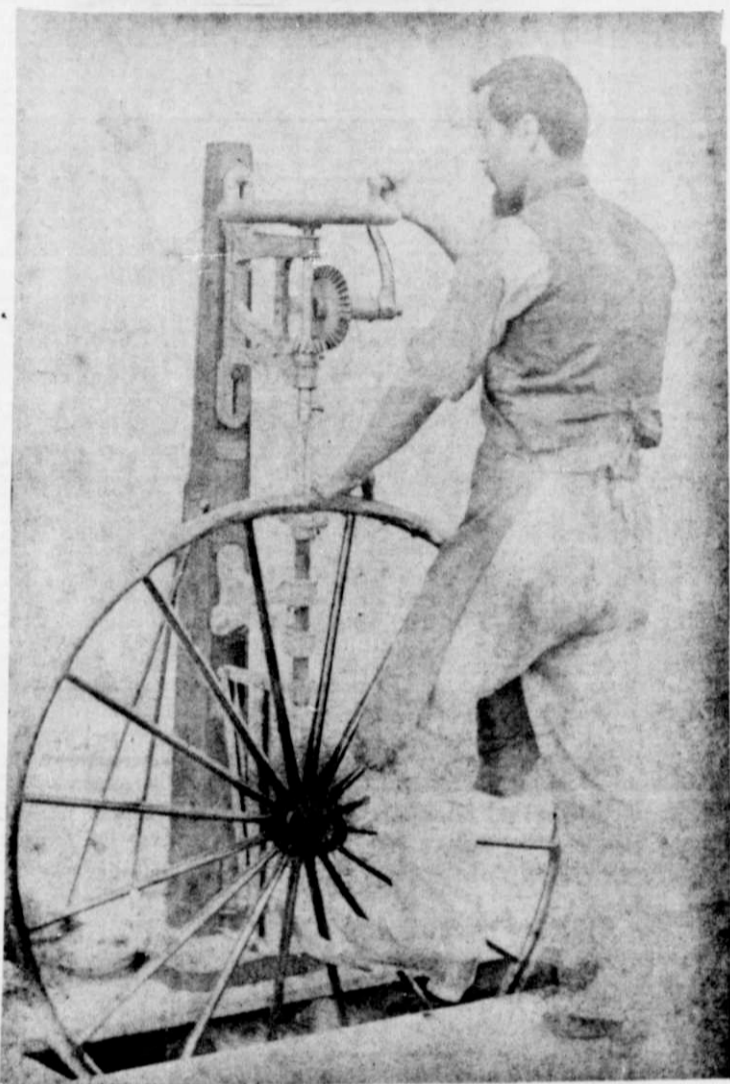

Nic Rimmel is shown as a young man with one of his early inventions. The picture is estimated to have been taken in the late 1800's. In 1871 Nic and his brother Math started a blacksmith shop. In 1875 they converted their business into a machine shop. The business was located on the corner of First and Railroad Streets, where an apartment building now stands. In the late 1800's Math Rimmel relinquished his interest in the business and started a saw mill. This was located down the street a ways, also on First Street opposite the Peace United Church of Christ. The street was then known as Wilhelmina St. or Strasse. Nic Rimmel's business later became Rimmel Mfg. Co. and manufactured corn huskers, cement mixers and grinders.

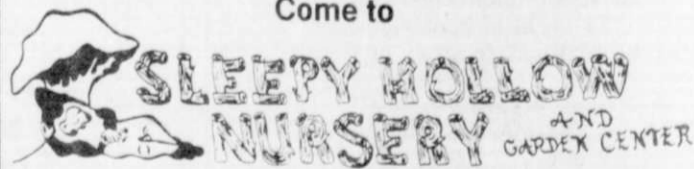

Students from Kewaskum were among the approximately 1000 candidates for graduation at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater on May 15. Of the degrees awarded, more than 850 went to baccalaureate graduates and about 160 to master's candidates.

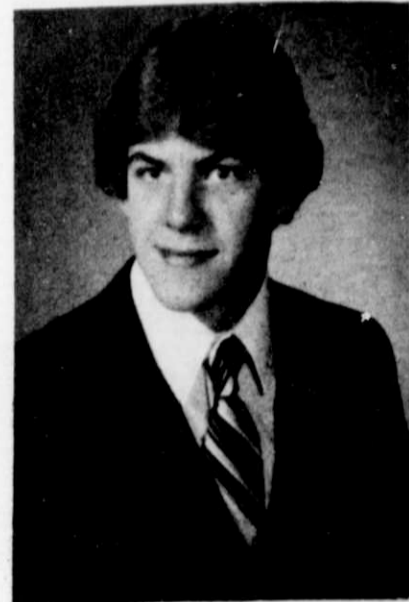

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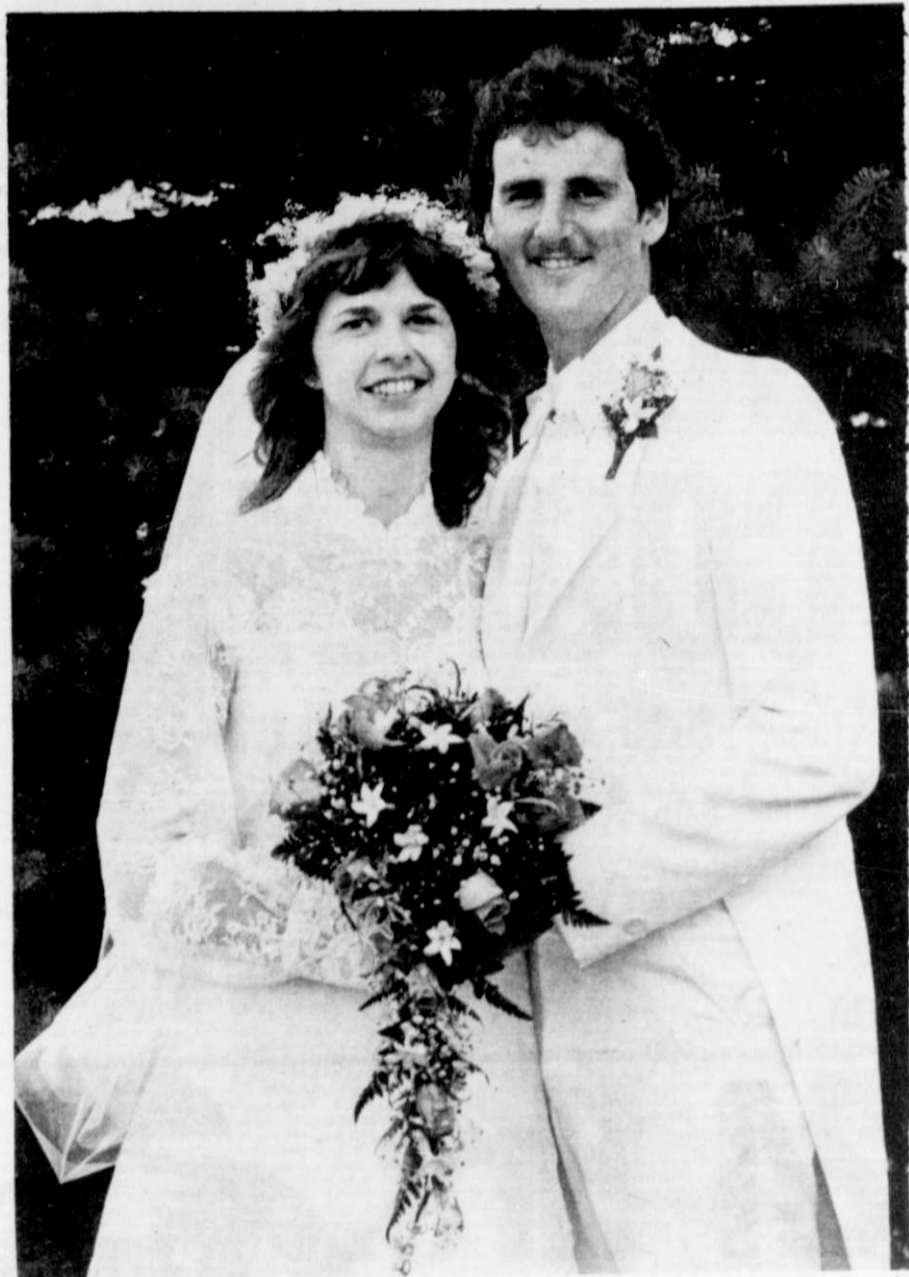

talk to Mr. Brenholt, Mr. Pearson, Mr. Wietor? They run the program," said Tessar. "I listened to reports when I was in the audience, what I gathered from not working the lines, things were not working too great," said Horner. "I know where this is coming from," said Tessar. "I'll come right out and say it, Jan Hubbell is the one pushing this A to Z thing," stated Tessar. Ogi said, "do you have definite proof of that?" "Yes, I do Doc, it's been publicized so why deny it. And none of the board members that I know of have talked to Mr. Brenholt or Mr. Pearson or Mr. Wietor about our guidance situation. Not one, at least, showed the courtesy to sit down and discuss this with them and yet we're criticizing that the A to Z is a better situation." Brigham noted he had talked to some of the administrators last fall. "Our administrative staff, it states right in their contract, their job is to hire, terminate, and make decisions, but yet we're telling them they're doing it wrong but nobody talked to them, I don't understand it," said Tessar. "I think we ought to go and talk to them as individuals and find out what the pros and cons are," stated Tessar.

"I'll talk to you if you'd like to hear my viewpoint, but I think it's 'cut and dried' anyway," said Dave Wietor. Ogi said he did not appreciate that remark. "I guess I do feel this is a personal cut," said Wietor. "I have seven years of education in counseling, Mr. Horner, I would never tell you how to do your job, I have no background in your area, Mr. Brigham, I have no background in your area, I would not tell you how to do your job, Doc Ogi, I would not tell you and more likely you wouldn't listen anyway because

you know I'm not as qualified," said Wietor. Wietor noted he had contacted ten different schools and found five different programs and no two completely alike. "Every school told me, why are you contacting us, what we do here is of little or no consequence to the school. You should set up the program which is best for your kids and the personnel you have.

"I have discussed with Mr. Brenholt, Mr. Pearson and Sharon Blank, there is not one of us who is in favor of this split," said Wietor. Wietor told the board, "you're going to tell me how to do my job, but do you know what it is?"

The feelings of the administrative staff and counselors apparently fell on deaf ears as the board voted four to three to split the student body. Horner, Brigham, Spoerl and Ogi voted for, Goeden, Tessar and Theusch voted against the motion.

As predicted by Theusch at last week's meeting, a brief discussion on the creation of an assistant athletic director's position was held. Goeden's motion to institute an assistant athletic director position, open to interested applicants, was defeated four to three. Brigham, Spoerl, Ogi and Horner voted against, Goeden, Tessar and Theusch voting for the motion.

A committee was appointed to study public participation policies for school board meetings. The group will consist of Horner, Brigham and Ogi. Tom Brigham stated he had requests from two citizens to serve on the committee. Ogi said he would not appoint any citizens since it was the board's prerogative to set or amend policies. The public could give their input but they would know the board's decision when it was voted upon. Jean Goeden said, "can I just say something? I think that the meetings have

been run very orderly and everybody has been doing a good job. I just think that you know it's being done in West Bend and that's my statement." "Are you saying we have a consultant from the West Bend school district and running our board, is that what you're saying?" asked Gerald Buchel. "I don't, I don't have a consultant, but they do it in West Bend," said Goeden.

Buchel then asked Ogi to poll the board and get their opinions. I know it's your opinion noted Buchel, but I would like to know how the rest of the board feels about this policy. "I think when Doc brought this up, it was made known by the other six members that we weren't aware of this new policy he wanted to put in, at least he didn't talk to any of us. So we were as much surprised as probably the people in the audience," said Tessar.

Ogi said there were times when discussions would go on for ten minutes without the board members saying anything. "I think it's time that the people who own the ballpark speak out and I think you're trying to shut us down," said Diane Buchel. Ogi said, "I've had nothing but compliments and positive remarks to the fact that we're establishing a policy." "I think you haven't been talking to the right people," said Mrs. Buchel. "Is that according to your West Bend consultant?" asked Gerald Buchel.

In other action the board approved funds to replace lights in the old gym. Borch told the board the new energy efficient lights will save approximately \$228.00 per month in electric costs.

Mrs. Petric gave a brief report on the Gifted and Talented program and her plans for the coming year.

Jean Goeden submitted her formal written resignation from

the Salaries and Wages for Support Staff and Negotiations committees. "If I had been contacted before or had been asked properly, to serve on a committee, I would have been happy to volunteer. With my background from past committees I feel I could best serve the district on other committees."

Although he was inadvertently left off the agenda, Dick Theusch formally resigned from the Transportation Committee.

budget cuts, Brenholt prepared a report giving some comparison figures including the Campbellsport and Slinger Districts.

Brenholt's report stated, "at the last meeting, reference was made to some figures from the papers concerning per pupil costs. A statement made by a West Bend official about buckling down and working harder was quoted, and it was suggested we would have to do that in Kewaskum also."

Brenholt's report showed a Kewaskum student/teacher ratio of 16.2 to 1, while West Bend's is 14.1 to 1. "To state this another way," said Brenholt's report, "we would have to add 18.5 staff members to get down to the West Bend ratio, or West Bend would have to cut 55 professional staff before they would reach our pupil-staff ratio."

In comparison costs, "Kewaskum spends \$2,071 per pupil and West Bend \$2,690. If

we were to spend at the West Bend rate, we would have had to add \$1,220,668 to our budget this year. Looking at it in the opposite direction, West Bend would have to cut \$3,815,516, from this year's budget" (to meet Kewaskum's).

In comparing student costs with Slinger and Campbellsport, Slinger's per student cost is \$1,981, maintaining five buildings, Campbellsport's cost is \$1,882 maintaining only two buildings, and neither district is faced with a debt program the size of Kewaskum's. Kewaskum operates six buildings. "This has definite implications for maintenance, operating, staffing and busing costs," Brenholt's report concluded.

Theusch noted, one recommendation for cutting costs was the closing of Beechwood School, however, it was strongly opposed by the public. A resident of the Beechwood area stated there was no reason for closing the school since the school debt will be virtually eliminated after the 1982-83 school year. She also asked the board to review school boundaries to see if students could be more efficiently distributed through the schools.

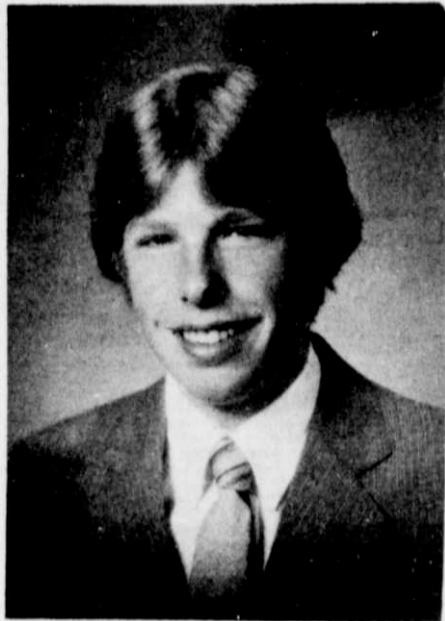

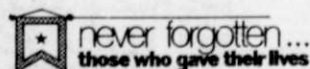

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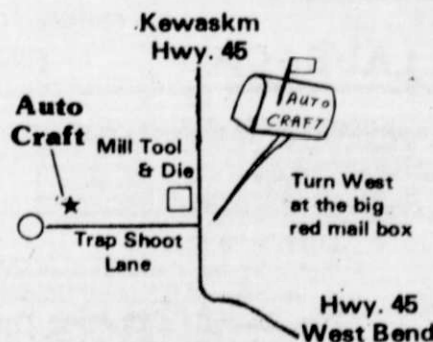
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Letters to the Editor

WHIPLASH


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Death of Herman Vollmer, Others

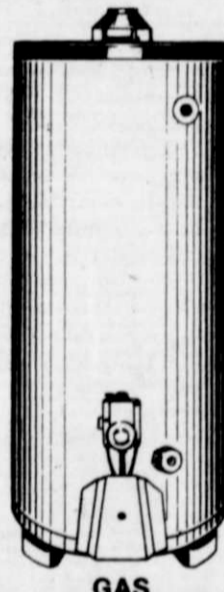

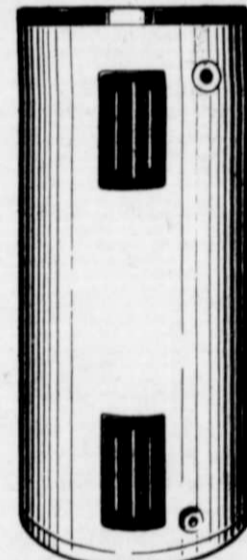
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4-H Rabbit Showmanship Workshop June 5

All Washington and Ozaukee County 4-H Rabbit project families are invited to the rabbit showmanship workshop. It will be on Saturday, June 5, from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. at the Ozaukee County fairgrounds at Cedarburg. John Skinner, University of Wisconsin rabbit specialist will be teaching rabbit showmanship. There will also be help on identifying breeds and tattooing your rabbits. Members are asked to bring their rabbit and a mat or cloth for your rabbit to stand on.

Showmanship is different from a rabbit show. Showmanship stresses the skill and knowledge that a member has, rather than the quality of the animal he happens to own. It teaches handling animals so that the animals are not injured and so that the animals don't injure the handlers.

Showmanship really involves the skill of looking at an animal to determine its quality. It is as if you were judging an animal in a show or looking at an animal which you wanted to purchase. You would want to examine the ears for evidence of ear canker and to check the eyes and nose for evidence of health. The teeth should be checked for proper matching. The feet and tail need to be checked. You should run your cupped hand over the body from front to back to feel its conformation and total covering of flesh.

These are the things that can be learned through showmanship. It can help you as you participate in the showmanship contest. It will be held the first time at the Washington County fair this year. It can also help you as you select your animals for the future.

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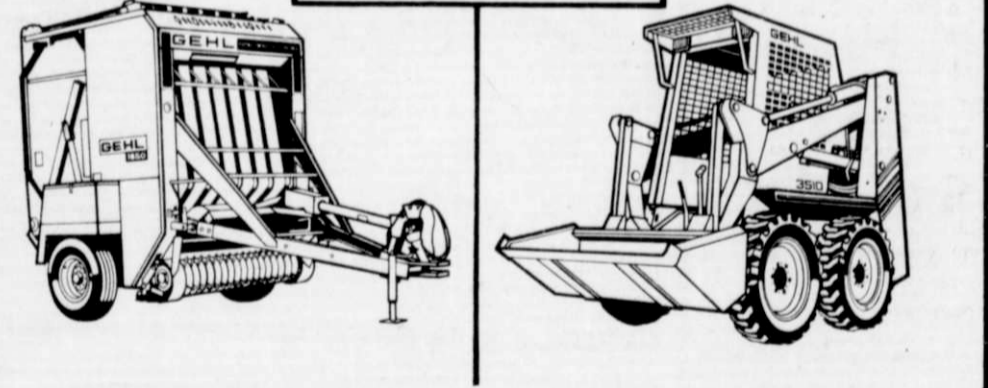
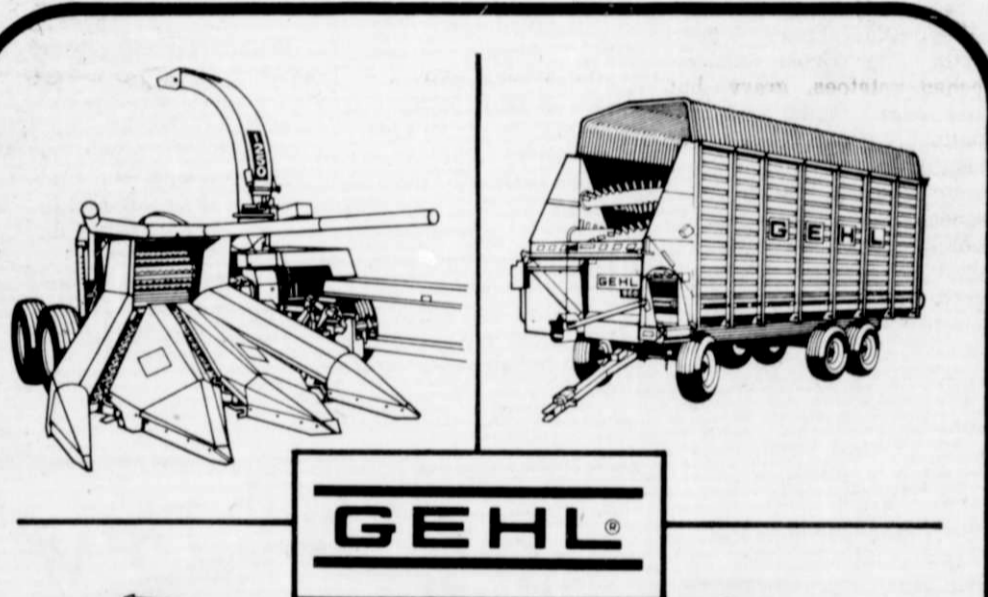

WISCONSIN'S NEW DRINKING/DRIVING LAW

RECORDS SHOW DRUNK DRIVERS KILL 411 PEOPLE IN 1981

(Third in a series)

A total of 411 people died in 1981 and 46 were killed through March of this year, because of driving errors committed by drivers who were drunk, according to a study by the state department of transportation.

Russ Fleming, chief of accident data in the division of motor vehicles, said his staff studied accident files on all fatal accidents, then checked the blood/alcohol concentration (BAC) of the drivers judged by investigating officers to have caused the accident.

The study found that of 927 traffic fatalities in 1981, there were 411, or about 45 per cent, killed in accidents in which the at-fault driver was drunk.

"The results are appalling," Fleming said. "Although we previously had information about BAC levels of drivers killed in car crashes, we were never certain whether the drunken drivers were the guilty

ones or innocent victims. This study definitely shows that alcohol is the causative factor in a great number of deaths," he added.

The study found that 358 drivers caused the deaths of 411 people in 1981, and that 44 drunk drivers have caused the deaths of 46 people so far this year. In 1981 fatalities, the victims were responsible for their own deaths in 275 instances, plus their passengers, drivers or passengers in other vehicles, motorcyclists, bicyclists and pedestrians.

"In view of this study, I don't think that anyone can claim that Wisconsin's new drinking-driving law is too harsh," Fleming said. "In fact, this study shows that drunken driving is a crime that should not be tolerated. The fact that the drunk driver himself or herself is the most frequent victim does not in any way alleviate the seriousness of the offense," he added.


