### Ogi to Make Final Selection of Citizens Advisory Committee to Select New Superintendent

Although the other six members have been asked to submit names, it will be Kewaskum School Board President Charles Ogi alone, who will. make the final decision as to who will serve on the Citizens Advisory Committee to select a new superintendent.

The board members had been asked to present their recommendations at Monday night's regular school board meeting. Member Jean Goeden noted, however, she had not been able to find anyone willing to serve. Goeden said she had contacted six or seven people and had received basically the same reply from all, why should they waste their time volunteering when the committee has already been picked. Board member Richard Theusch, too, noted he had gotten the same reaction. Theusch said he had talked to five people, all of whom refused to work on the committee. One citizen told him he knew of two names from Wayne that would probably end up on the committee for sure. Board member John Tessar said he had contacted several people in the district, some of them prominent citizens in the village. Tessar also had no luck in getting volunteers. Tessar said

one comment he received was, have come in said Borch, noting these people felt there was tee, that this screening should be done by the board itself with the help of its hired consultant.

Ogi said he resented the insinuation that committee members had already been decided on, noting that was the reason he asked names be submitted on a blank sheet of paper. Goeden told Ogi it wouldn't make any difference since she was sure he would recognize her handwriting even without a signature.

Tessar was against forming a committee at this time. "Let's see how many applicants we get before we appoint a committee," he stated. Ogi said a committee was needed at this time because the board did not have the extra time needed to screen the one or two hundred applications that would probably come in. Past board member Gerald Secor questioned whether citizens who were not familiar with the everyday activities and duties of a superintendent would know exactly what to look for as far as specific qualifications. "Isn't that what Mr. Buntrock is supposed to do?" questioned Secor. Interim Superintendent Robert Borch was asked how many applications had been received. To date 31 responses

# **Boy Still Critical After**

A 6-year-old Allenton boy who was rescued from the water by a lifeguard from the Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park pond last Thursday morning remained in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Children's Hospital in Milwaukee, it was reported Tuesday.

Steven W. Mertz of 8375 Fairview Drive, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Mertz, was transferred from St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend to Children's Hospital Friday afternoon. The transfer was made for further treatment.

Steven's mother noticed that the boy was missing about 11 a.m. and notified a lifeguard, who cleared other swimmers from the pond. The boy was located in the water and was brought to shore, authorities

The boy was in the water about 10 minutes, according to a Washington County Sheriff's Department report. The child received mouth-to-mouth and cardiopulmonary resuscitation at the scene.

The pond was closed for the remainder of Thursday. It was reopened Friday.

### Killed in Area **ruck-Auto Crash**

Washington County Saturday morning when a car carrying nine Chicago residents attempted to cross US Highway 41 to head south and was hit broadside by a semitrailer truck.

The accident occurred around 9:46 a.m. at the intersection of US 41 and Fireside Road, near County Highway W in the Town of Addison.

The seven victims, five men, one woman and a child, all of Chicago, were identified as: Damaso G. Tellado, 47, the driver; and his sons, Damaso Tellado Jr., 22; and Alcidas Tellado, 16; Margarita Velez, 35; and her son and daughter, Juan Velez, 16, and Awilda Velez, 3, and Nathaniel Battle, 17, Juan's friend.

Three other people were also in the crash driver, Laverne A. Schulz, 41, of Marathon, was in satisfactory condition at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. Francisca Velez, 59, Margarita's mother, was listed in stable condition at Hartford Memorial Hospital, Hartford, and Frances Velez, 11 months, Margarita's daughter, was treated at the Hartford hospital and released to relatives.

It was reported the two families and Battle were planning to fish and picnic at Big Cedar Lake and had stopped at a service station at the intersection of Fireside Road and Highway 41 seeking directions.

According to County Coroner Bob Boltz, all the occupants, including the two survivors, were thrown from the vehicle. Sgt. Thomas Martin of the

Washington County Sheriff's Department said the auto drove in front of the semi and the truck driver couldn't help what he did.

The accident was the state's deadliest in two years. Four ambulances from Kewaskum, West Bend, Allenton and Slinger responded.

What are the qualities the district is looking for in a superintendent? What are the requirements and priorities the Board has set up? What kind of person are we looking

The Kewaskum School Board is looking for a person from the Midwest who is an education specialist with an especially strong background in curriculum and finance. We want a person with district administrative experience who meets the qualifications necessary to be accredited by North Central. The new superintendent should have solid credentials, showing a commitment to academic excellence both through his/her personal credentials and through the presence of a strong academic program in his/her current position. The person must firmly believe in the development and enforcement of strong disciplinary policies.

The candidate should espouse the development and implementation of stringent evaluation procedures which will insure accountability of students, faculty, and fellow administrators. He/she must have an awareness of current trends in education and methods of implementing them. Curriculum and staff development must be stressed, and the candidate should be willing to work with the faculty to improve the curriculum. At the same time, the superintendent should be willing to make unpopular decisions as long as those decisions will benefit the students' education. The new superintendent must be aware of community needs and willing to respond to them. Activity in professional organizations and community endeavors would be expect-

The new superintendent should be experienced in several areas. The primary area must be curriculum. Negotiating and budget would be next. 

would be a shame to spend \$4,000 to \$5,000 for a consultant only to end up hiring a person from the district. Board member Ralph Horner asked, 'John, why didn't you hire from the inside last time?" Tessar said he was not on the board when the last superintendent was hired, replying to Horner, "if they jumped in the river are you going to jump in with them? I'm not." Theusch stated he was on the board to hire a superintendent. The reason the district hired from the outside then was, the person the board had selected from within the district turned the job down. Horner asked if that person would accept it now. 'He's no longer with the dis-Theusch. stated Resident Gerald Buchel told the board he felt they should look very carefully 'in-house' before going outside the district.

The board approved the creation of the committee on a 4' to 2 vote. Ogi, Horner, Spoerl and Tessar voting for, Goeden and Theusch voting against. Tom Brigham was absent. Tessar noted he voted for the committee even though he was against the idea, because things have to get going. Too much

Ogi was asked why he alone would make the committee appointments. He said it was board policy that the president has the power to make the final selection from the recommendations of the board.

In other action, the board denied a recommendation to increase substitute teacher pay rates. Tessar motioned to accept the increase, but it died for lack of a second. Tessar asked if there was a problem with the recommendation. Horner stated, "I'd like to see a freeze." Tessar noted the district is paying approximately \$5.00 per hour. "I don't think that's too high," said Tessar. Borch noted one reason the district had been successful in getting the specific substitute needed in most cases was the equal or slightly higher salaries. Without the increases the district may find it more difficult to find the qualified substitute. Tessar noted substitutes look at a job and take the one which offers the best pay

The question of kindergarten bussing and class assignments has not been resolved. Richard Zarling, who represents the administration on the Transportation Committee, presented two alternates to the board. Alternate No. 1 would result in no Beechwood kindergarten class, two Farmington, three Kewaskum and one Wayne class. This would result in a maximum riding time to 50 to 55 minutes for some students. Alternate No. 2 would have one class each at Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, with three at Kewaskum. This would have 15 Farmington and one

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Kewaskum student being bussed at Beechwood, with a maximum riding time of 30-35 minutes. Zarling recommended the board approve alternate No. 2. Horner felt there was a third alternate. This would be to bus 15 to 16 Kewaskum students to Beechwood and eliminate the need of busing the five Farmington students. Zarling said he would have to go back to Johnson Bus to see how feasible this route would be. Horner was appointed to meet with Zarling and Erv Gorecki to check out his recommendation. West Bend News reporter Judy Harlow asked Horner whether he made this recommendation because it might affect where his son would go to school. Horner said

The board tabled action on repair or replacement of the high school air conditioner. The district received three bids for rebuilt compressors and only one bid on a new unit. Tessar said, "I question putting this much money in a used unit.' The original air conditioner was installed in 1966. Rebuilt prices ran from \$13,440 to \$15,046. The new unit price was \$20,-008.00. Tessar noted Thuemeling Industries was high by \$2,000 on the rebuilt unit. "I'll

wager he's \$2,000 high on his new unit bid." The board agreed and asked Borch to again seek bids on a new unit from other companies.

The board tentatively approved a calendar for the 1982-83 school year. Final approval is dependant on the settlement of a contract with the teachers union. Tessar asked Borch if there was any way of getting a decision out of the arbitrator. "This has been going on for 71/2 months," said Tessar. Borch noted there is no law stating how quickly an arbitrator has to make a de-

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





### Today's Medicine HEARTWORM CAN BE FATAL By Charles J. Ogi, D.V.M. Heartworm is a serious parasitic disease that is

potentially fatal to dogs. Once thought to be limited to warm, humid regions, it is now present in every state of the Union - and in near epidemic proportions in all states east of The adult heartworm lives within the chambers of the

heart and blood vessels of the lungs. Here it blocks or reduces blood flow, leading to death or damage of vital organs. It is transmitted from an infected dog to an uninfected dog through the bite of a mosquito. The larvae (immature heartworms) pass into the dog's bloodstream. They eventually moved to the heart region where they continue to grow up to lengths of more than a foot.

A blood test performed by a veterinarian is the only sure way to diagnose the presence of heartworms. If the test is positive, your veterinarian will begin a program to destroy the heartworms. If the test is negative, your veterinarian will start your dog on a preventative program of daily

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
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Sue Carlson



Seefeldt pointed out that the courthouse is not open on Saturdays and will not be open on Saturday, July 31. "However in accordance with a Wisconsin Attorney General's opinion, walk-in payments on Monday, August 2, will be considered as timely," Seefeldt reported.

He cautioned that all payments by mail must carry a July postmark to be considered timely. "Any mail postmarked in August will be subjected by State law and County ordinance to an 81/2 % interest penalty on the outstanding balance, Seefeldt stated.

Seefeldt also advised that to insure prompt crediting of their account, taxpayers should include the tax key numbers of the properties on which they are paying taxes. "This number can be found in the upper right hand corner of their tax receipts," said Seefeldt.

"Taxpayes paying in person should also bring along the proper tax key numbers or their first half tax receipts to aid in the processing of their payment," Seefeldt added.


