## 300 Runners Expected

### Lions Chicken Bar-B-Que, Kettle 20 + 2 Run Aug. 15

On Sunday, August 15, the Kewaskum Lions Club will hold its ninth annual chicken bar-b-que and Kettle 20 + 2 run in the village park (River Hill Park). There will be 20 kilometer - 12.5 mile, 6.5 mile and 3.5 mile races.

Race time is 9:15 a.m. and runners may register from 8:00 a.m. until race time. Pre-registration is \$4.50; \$5.50 the day of the race. Make check payable to Kewaskum Lions Club and send to Dale Squier, 1305 Roseland Dr., Kewaskum, WI 53040.

The race this year has been somewhat changed. The 6.5 mile race was the 7.5 mile race last year. The 3.5 and the K20 remain the same. The K20 has been labeled as one of the toughest runs in the State of Wisconsin.

As of August 3, seventy people had already pre-registered. Last year a total of 250 runners competed in all the races. The first 300 runners to register may have their choice

of a K20 T-shirt or a K-20 patch. There are runners as far away as Texas.

Runners may purchase a chicken dinner ticket at a reduced price of \$2.00 if purchased before race time.

There are 22 divisions for men and women in these races and there will be awards for all divisions. First, second and third will receive medallions and fourth and fifth will receive ribbons.

Last year's big winners were Glen Schumacher of Greenfield and Carol Spaeth of Kewaskum in the men's and women's 20 kilometer race. Spaeth is a 1976 graduate of Kewaskum High School where she excelled in track.

The Lions Club will be serving its famous bar-b-que chicken with all the trimmings starting at 11:00 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Carry out chicken will be available. There will be games, beer and soda.

The proceeds for this annual event go to local charities.

## Busy Agenda for Board Of Education Monday

The regular monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education will be held on Monday, August 9. The meeting will be held in the Middle School Library beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Items on the agenda include the final reading and adoption of the revised policy dealing with graduation and a new policy on the adult diploma program. A report of the Data Point computer which was donated to the district will be reviewed.

New business items will include approval of kindergarten fees for 1982-83, approval of health, life and LTD insurance contracts, acceptance of oil, gas and milk bids, approval to purchase equipment items, approval of changes in teaching contracts and additional contracts, and action on a request for a student to remain at the Wayne Elementary School. A presentation will be made by parents from the Farmington area and a review will be made of the high school handbook and policies for 1982-83. A report will be presented on the activity fees collected during 1981-82. Miscellaneous items which arise will also be discussed.

## Village Reassessment To Start September 15

At its meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum Village Board approved the hiring of Bowmar Appraisal Incorporated, Appleton, to do a complete revaluation of all real and personal property within the village.

Reassessment work is scheduled to begin approximately September 15, 1982, and be completed by July 15, 1983. All village residents will receive a letter notifying them of the work and procedures which will be followed. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said Bowmar felt it would have about two-thirds of the village done by January, 1983.

After opening of bids at its last meeting, the board instructed Schmidt to review the four lowest figures for a final recommendation. Of the four, Schmidt eliminated D. E. Erickson Appraisal and James R. Laird Appraisal since they were both \$2,000.00 higher than the low bid. Appraisal Services Company, Eau Claire, came in with the lowest base bid of \$15,275.00, however, extra service charges brought their fee up to \$15,665. Bowmar Appraisal came in with a base of \$15,400.00 and added service charges of \$140.00, for a final fee of \$15,540.00.

Schmidt told the board, after checking references and credentials, he recommended Bowmar. Schmidt said he based

his recommendation on several factors. Bowmar has more experience both in years of its assessors as well as the number of towns and villages it has revaluated. Other communities have been well satisfied with their work. Bowmar has a 97% entry rate for inspection and the company is well-liked by local communities including Campbellsport and Lomira. The bottom line was the fact that Bowmar also ended up presenting the lowest bid.

Trustee Dave Nigh noted that Bowmar had done the village's last reassessment back in 1977. At that time the village was very well satisfied with their work, said Nigh. The board voted unanimously to award the contract to Bowmar.

In other business, the board approved the request of Wastewater Treatment Superintendent Pete Albers to install a new two-inch waterline into the treatment plant. Albers told the board that because the village was required to install backflow preventers into the plant water lines, water pressure had dropped considerably. This results in having to run sprayers longer and use more water to clean filter screens. Adding the two-inch line will reduce both sprayer operation time and water usage. Albers said cost for the new line would be approximately \$1,000, mainly for materials. The trenching and installation would be done by village Wastewater and

## High School Announces User Fee For Co-curricular Activities

Kewaskum Community High School announces its User Fee for Co-Curricular Activities.

Again this year the school board has instituted a \$15.00 user fee for the following activities:

a. All those who participate in interscholastic athletics in grades 9 - 12.

b. Anyone who performs (on stage during a performance) in a play or musical and who is attending the school putting on the performance.

c. All those in grades 9 - 12 who participate in forensics.

d. All those participating in interscholastic chess.

e. All those in grades 9 - 12 who participate as cheerleaders.

f. All those who participate in the high school jazz band.

g. All those who participate in the high school swing choir.

h. All those who participate in high school intramural programs.

Students must pay the \$15.00 in the high school office before they are allowed to participate. This fee is a one-time per year fee and covers a student for all co-curricular activities they participate in for the school year.

The board policy states there will be no refunds made for any reason.

A reminder to all athletes, they will not be able to pick up equipment until this fee is paid.

Students are to pay in the high school office. The office is open between 7:00 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. daily.

## From the School Board President's Desk....

I was pleased to note the large number of district residents who chose to attend the 1982 Budget Hearing and Annual Meeting. It was an example of public participation at its best. Numerous pertinent questions and valid comments were expressed by citizens. Mr. Borch did a commendable job both in the preparation and the presentation of the budget. One must remember that state government has greatly complicated the budget preparation by frequently changing the rules governing the budget; furthermore, not all the figures are final.

One topic of debate at the meeting concerned the placement of the extracurricular user fees. I, too, think they should be listed separately in the budget. A survey of twenty Wisconsin schools closest in size to Kewaskum was made by a Board member, and this survey could give the Board an added perspective. Our extracurricular program is about due for examination, and if any changes are to be made, it would be advantageous to know the amount of money generated by the program.

A second area of concern deals with the basic testing done in our district. After reading about the test results in the annual report, several people had questions. The most frequently asked question was, "May I see the results of my child's test?" According to Wisconsin law, parents may see the results of I.Q. and achievements tests if the child is under eighteen—the child may not without written parental permission. Once the child reaches eighteen, the child may see the results, but the parents may not unless the child gives written permission. The next question was, "What do these numbers mean?" As parents become more and more involved in the education of their children, the schools must adapt by presenting the information so that it may be clearly understood by all. While investigating some of the questions raised by parents, I discovered that other districts have dropped the testing programs we currently use in favor of tests that better measure student achievement and potential. I suspect a review of our testing program might also be in order. Superintendent Search Update: As I stated at a June meeting and have frequently stated since, I feel the community and the full Board must be kept abreast of progress in our search for a new superintendent, so I will be reporting to you in this space. Thus far, the Citizen Advisory Committee has met twice to narrow the field of candidates.

First, we thank you for your integrity: the honesty and justice that sought a fair salary for employees, your remaining "just one of the sisters" even when in office; your encouragement of academic excellence and growth, your firm commitment to principle while seeking reconciliation of differences.

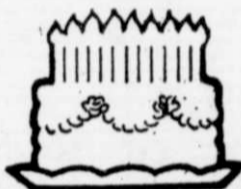

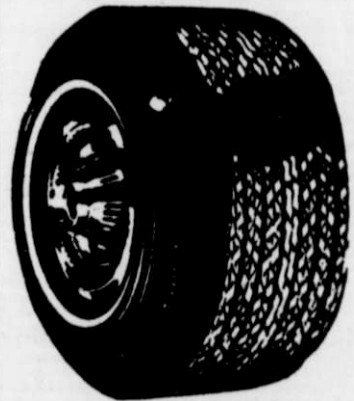

# Today's Medicine

## BACKACHE - MUCH OF IT CAN BE PREVENTED! By H. L. Rumsey, D.C.

An estimate that 34 per cent of the U.S. population under 24, and 39 per cent under 45 have some kind of back pain was recently released by the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons. This means that one out of every three Americans will be tormented by backaches.

The Academy reports that approximately 90 percent of backaches are caused by fatigue and strain — the result of man's misuse of his body: "Most are caused by improperly lifting some object. Bending over and twisting at the same time is a surefire way to court an aching back."

The Academy reports that approximately 90 per cent of backaches below would save America many a backache:

1. Know and observe your physical limitations. Act your age; don't try some crazy stunt to impress others in the crowd.

2. Don't shock the spine when you sit down — come in for a smooth landing.

3. When lifting something, bend your body at the knees. This way you'll let the arms, legs and hips help the back bear the burden.

4. Try to exercise all of your muscles a little instead of a few of the muscles a lot. "Warm up" before engaging in hard exercise or violent sports.

5. Make a conscious effort to improve your posture.

6. While you're on the job, get up and stretch occasionally — it will do you a world of good.
