300 Runners Expected

Come to the Brewers Lions Chicken Bar-B-Que, Kettle 20 + 2 Run Aug. 15

On Sunday, August 15, the Kewaskum Lions Club will hold its ninth annual chicken bar-bque and Kettle 20+2 run in the village park (River Hill Park). There will be 20 kilometer - 12.5 mile, 6.5 mile and 3.5 mile races.

Race time is 9:15 a.m. and runners may register from 8:00 a.m. until race time. Preregistration is \$4.50; \$5.50 the day of the race. Make check payable to Kewaskum Lions Club and send to Dale Squier, 1305 Roseland Dr., Kewaskum, WI 53040.

The race this year has been somewhat changed. The 6.5 mile race was the 7.5 mile race last year. The 3.5 and the K20 remain the same. The K20 has been labeled as one of the toughest runs in the State of Wisconsin.

As of August 3, seventy people had already pre-registered. Last year a total of 250 runners competed in all the races. The first 300 runners to register may have their choice

of a K20 T-shirt or a K-20 patch. There are runners as far away as Texas.

Runners may purchase a chicken dinner ticket at a reduced price of \$2.00 if purchased before race time.

There are 22 divisions for men and women in these races and there will be awards for all divisions. First, second and third will receive medallions and fourth and fifth will receive ribbons.

Last year's big winners were Glen Schumacher of Greenfield and Carol Spaeth of Kewaskum in the men's and women's 20 kilometer race. Spaeth is a 1976 graduate of Kewaskum High School where she exceled in track

Village Reassessment To Start September 15

At its meeting Monday evening, the Kewaskum Village Board approved the hiring of Bowmar Appraisal Incorporated, Appleton, to do a complete revaluation of all real and personal property within the village

Reassessment work is scheduled to begin approximately September 15, 1982, and be completed by July 15, 1983. All village residents will receive a letter notifying them of the work and procedures which will be followed. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said Bowmar felt it would have about two-thirds of the village done by January, 1983.

After opening of bids at its last meeting, the board instructed Schmidt to review the four lowest figures for a final recommendation. Of the four, Schmidt eliminated D. E. Erickson Appraisal and James R. Laird Appraisal since they were both \$2,000.00 higher than the low bid. Appraisal Services Company, Eau Clarie, came in with the lowest base bid of \$15,275.00, however, extra service charges brought their fee up to \$15,665. Bowmar Appraisal came in with a base of \$15,400.00 and added service charges of \$140.00, for a final fee of \$15,540.00.

Schmidt told the board, after checking references and credentials, he recommended Bowmar. Schmidt said he based

his recommendation on several factors. Bowmar has more experience both in years of its assessors as well as the number of towns and villages it has revaluated. Other communities have been well satisfied with their work. Bowmar has a 97% entry rate for inspection and the company is well-liked by local communities including Campbellsport and Lomira. The bottom line was the fact that Bowmar also ended up presenting the lowest bid.

Trustee Dave Nigh noted that Bowmar had done the village's last reassessment back in 1977. At that time the village was very well satisfied with their work, said Nigh. The board voted unanimously to award the contract to Bowmar.

In other business, the board approved the request of Wastewater Treatment Superintendent Pete Albers to install a new two-inch waterline into the treatment plant. Albers told the board that because the village was required to install backflow preventers into the plant water lines, water pressure had dropped considerably. This results in having to run sprayers longer and use more water to clean filter screens. Adding the two-inch line will reduce both sprayer operation time and water usage. Albers said cost for the new line would be approximately \$1,000, mainly for materials. The trenching and installation would be done village Wastewater and by [Continued on Page 4]



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From the School Board President's Desk

I was pleased to note the large number of district residents who chose to attend the 1982 Budget Hearing and Annual Meeting. It was an example of public participation at its best. Numerous pertinent questions and valid comments were expressed by citizens. Mr. Borch did a commendable job both in the preparation and the presentation of the budget. One must remember that state government has greatly complicated the budget preparation by frequently changing the rules governing the budget; furthermore, not all the figures are final.

One topic of debate at the meeting concerned the placement of the extracurricular user fees. I, too, think they should be listed separately in the budget. A survey of twenty Wisconsin schools closest in size to Kewaskum was made by a Board member, and this survey could give the Board an added perspective. Our extracurricular program is about due

for examination, and if any changes are to be made, it would be advantageous to know the amount of money generated by the program.

A second area of concern deals with the basic testing done in our district. After reading about the test results in the annual report, several people had questions. The most frequently asked question was, "May I see the results of my child's test?" According to Wisconsin law, parents may see the results of I.Q. and achievements tests if the child is under eighteen-the child may not without written parental permission. Once the child reaches eighteen, the child may see the results, but the parents may not unless the child gives written permission. The next question was, "What do these numbers mean?" As parents become more and more involved in the education of their children, the schools must adapt by presenting the information so that it may be clearly understood by all. While investigating some of the questions raised by parents, I discovered that other districts have dropped the testing programs we currently use in favor of tests that better measure student achievement and potential. I suspect a review of our testing program might also be in order. Superintendent Search Update: As I stated at a June meeting and have frequently stated since, I feel the community and the full Board must be kept abreast of progress in our search for a new superintendent, so I will be reporting to you in this space. Thus far, the Citizen Advisory Committee has met twice to narrow the field of candidates.

Open Letter Highlights Franciscan's Giftedness

A fitting tribute to Sister Mary Aquin Miller on the front page of the monthly Vision of the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi, was written by Sister Justine Peter.

Dear Sister Aquin,

When you were president of our college, you confided that some morning you expected to open your mail and find a check for a million dollars. That never happened, and Stritch is still struggling for its daily sustenance. But you did leave a legacy that is more precious than any amount of money.

First, we thank you for your integrity: the honesty and justice that sought a fair salary for employees, your remaining "just one of the sisters" even when in office; your encouragement of academic excellence and growth, your firm commitment to principle while seeking reconciliation of differences.

Equally treasured is your sense of wonder. Your doctorate in biology afforded you natural opportunities to share your love of God's creation with students and colleagues. Your profound appreciation of the intricacy of leaf and flower, of the complexity of the human body, of the mystery of life, shows in your face and sometimes in sudden tears of awe.

You also have an unexpected side that we have come to love. 

Panzer Dairy Day Set for August 30


