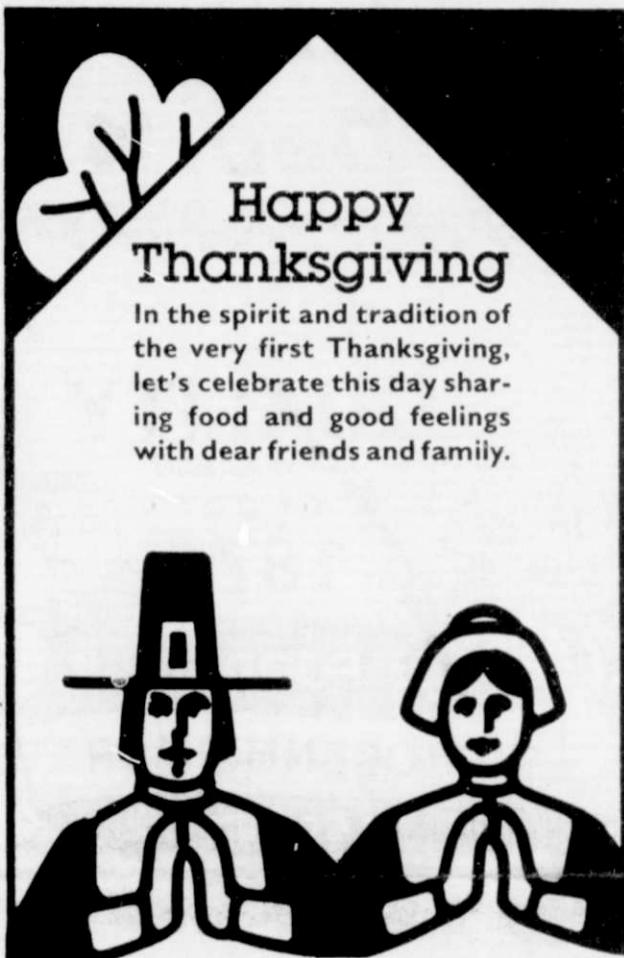

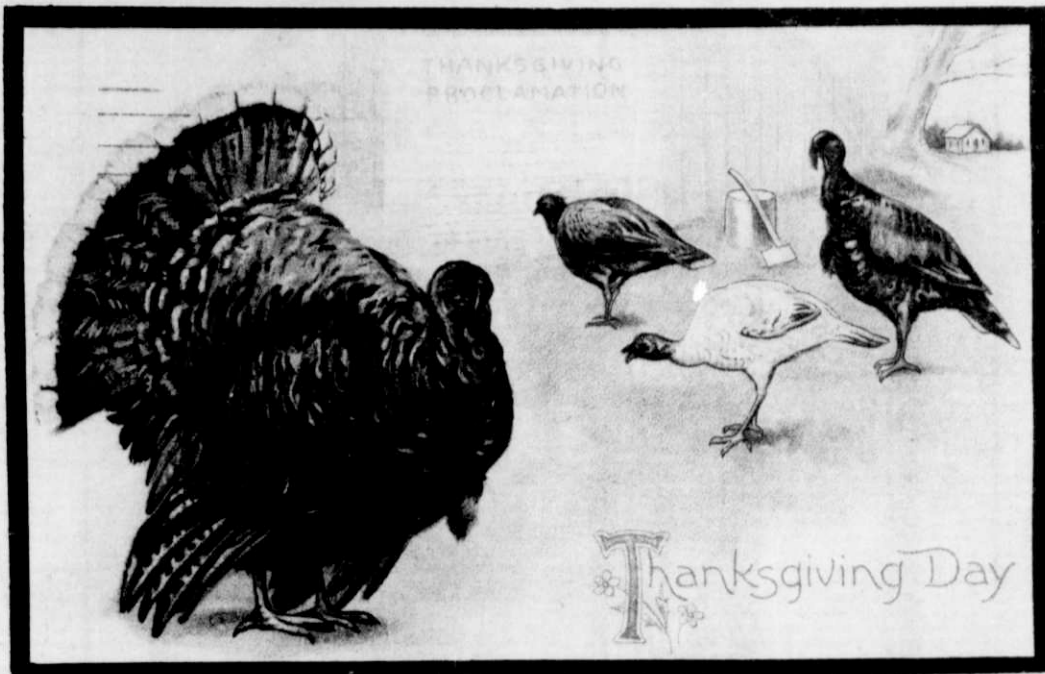

## From the School Board President's Desk....

Why are there so many required courses? Why does my child have to waste his time and our money taking something he doesn't want and won't need?

These questions arise because there are several course requirements to be met in order to graduate from high school. Some of these courses are mandated by state law—others are required because we, the people of the district, see the need for demonstrated proficiency in these areas for everyone. As James Bryant Conant said, "The primary concern of American education today is...to cultivate in the largest number of our future citizens an appreciation both of the responsibilities and the benefits which come to them because they are American and free."

One of the means by which we achieve this understanding is through required courses—at least those required courses which the local people endorse. Just what the required courses and areas of study are and why they are required will be discussed area by area in future columns—unless, of course, some other pressing problem arises.

If you have any comments on a specific requirement, please let me know about it. I especially invite recent Kewaskum High School graduates to respond to the current requirements. While I am always glad to hear from district residents, I would appreciate your signing your letters. I would never identify you publicly without your written permission, but in some cases I have needed more information in order to act on your suggestion, and without a name, I couldn't get it. 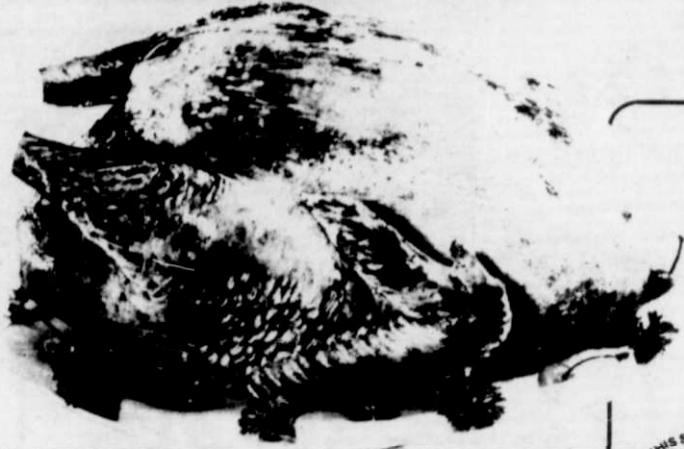

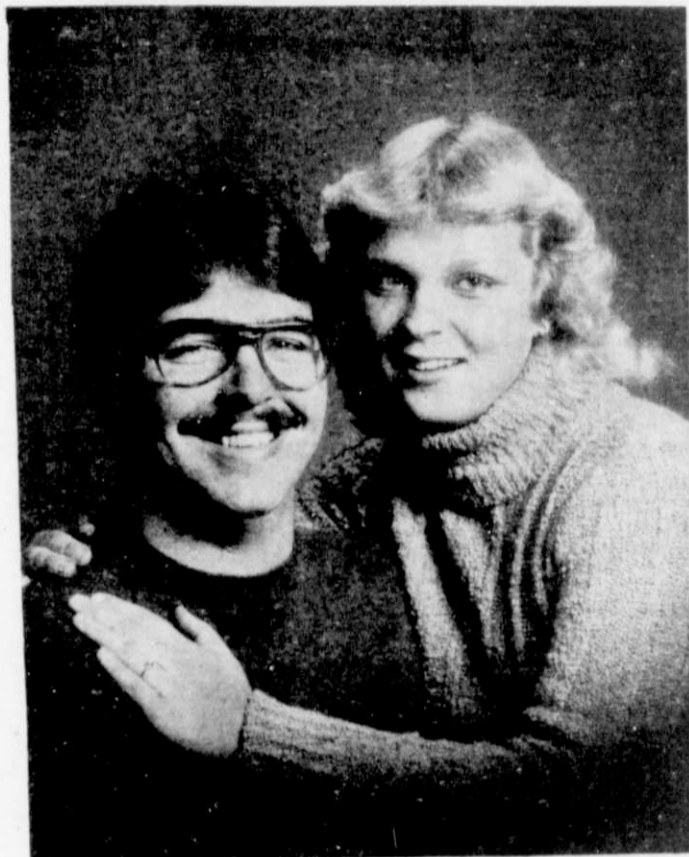

# Today's Medicine

**ATHLETE'S FOOT [TINEA PEDIS]**  
Thomas Leitzke, R.P.H.

One of the most common problems that a pharmacist is asked about is athlete's foot. Athlete's foot is a fungus infection of the foot. It may occur as an inflammation, rash, or scaling of the skin. If the toenails are affected, they become brittle and discolored. Athlete's foot is most common in young adults.

Athlete's foot is commonly transmitted from person to person through towels and locker room or bathroom floors because fungi thrive in these moist conditions.

Athlete's foot is best treated by using a topical cream or solution containing either tolnaffate or undecylenate. You should wash and dry the infected area morning and evening. Then apply the cream or solution. Symptoms are usually cleared in 2 to 3 weeks but can take up to 6 weeks. To help prevent recurrence, continue treatment for 2 weeks after disappearance of all symptoms. These creams or solutions do not require a prescription.

Some personal hygiene tips to follow so that you do not come in contact with the fungus are:

1. Wear clean cotton socks or hose, change them frequently.
2. Don't go barefooted, especially around swimming pools and in locker rooms.
3. Don't borrow socks, shoes, or sneakers.
4. Wear lightweight shoes that permit air to circulate; avoid sneakers and rubber shoes for street wear.
5. Bathe daily and dry yourself carefully with your own clean towel.

## Wisconsin Farm Bureau Annual Meeting at La Crosse Dec. 4-7

The dairy program, state groundwater rules and property taxes are expected to be topics of discussion when delegates from 60 county Farm Bureaus meet in La Crosse for the 63rd annual meeting of the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation. The four-day meeting will be held at the La Crosse Center December 4-7.

Election of district directors, consideration of resolutions, recognition of county Farm Bureaus and young farmers' contests are on the agenda.

Delegates in three of the nine districts will choose representatives to the WFBF Board of Directors. Current directors in those districts are: district 1—Howard D. Poulson, Palmyra; district 3—William Hanson, Dodgeville; and district 5—Henry Birschbach, Mt. Calvary. Directors serve a three-year term with a third of their standing election each year.

The women's and young farmers' committees will nominate their representatives to the board. Current representatives are: Mary Jane Nelson, Holman, and Larry Laux, Adell. They serve one-year terms.

For the first time in the organization's history, a Farm Expo will be held in conjunction with the meeting. Sponsored by Farm Bureau, the Expos will feature over 70 exhibits of farm equipment, supplies and services and is open to the public at no charge. The Expo will be open Sunday noon to 5:30 p.m. and Monday from 11:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

The young farmers' activities will be the focus of the first two days of the meeting. Discussion meets will be held on Saturday with the finals being part of the evening program. Forty-two county entrants will compete in the Outstanding Young Farmers contest. The winners of the two contests receive the use of an Allis Chalmers tractor for

one year, a check toward expenses to compete in the national contests at the AFBF annual meeting and will participate in the Washington Legislative Seminar next spring.

Darlene Maurer, the 1982 Miss Wisconsin Farm Bureau, will crown her successor on Sunday evening at the young farmers awards banquet. Over 40 counties have candidates in the contest for the organization's goodwill ambassador for 1983.

On Monday, WFBF President Donald Haldeman will deliver his annual message following the management reports of the Federation, Midwest Livestock Producers Cooperative and the Farm Bureau Marketing Association.

Special interest conferences will be held on Monday afternoon. Speakers and topics are: Sen. Susan Engeleiter, 33rd Senate District—“Marital Property Reform—What is Needed?”; LaVerne Ausman, WDATCP Secretary—“What's Ahead in Marketing Wisconsin Farm Products?”; Glenn Tussey, associate director, National Affairs Division, American Farm Bureau—“High Stakes in International Trade”; and C.D. Besadny, DNR Secretary, and Peter Pesheck, public intervenor,

Dept. of Justice—“Environmental Regulations—Where Are We Headed?”

County Farm Bureaus will be recognized for their achievements in membership acquisition and programs at the Monday evening Farm Family Banquet. The President's Trophy will be presented to the top three county organizations.

Two individuals will be cited for their service to Wisconsin agriculture during the awards program.

Delegates will determine the organization's direction for the coming year when they consider resolutions on Tuesday. Those under consideration were approved by members at county Farm Bureau annual meetings this fall.

With more and more air conditioned automobiles keeping windows closed, it's hard for drivers to hear warnings outside their cars. It seems like a good idea.

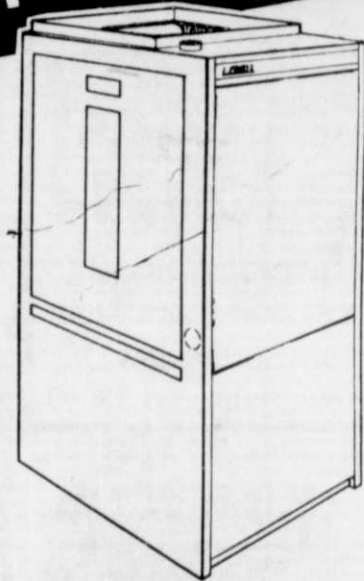

**AUTO INSURANCE  
CAN YOU REALLY AFFORD TO BE WITHOUT IT?**

Wisconsin, unlike some states, makes no requirement for a motorist to have his/her vehicle insured. However, this only holds true as long as the motorist is able to avoid an accident, commented Sheriff Clarence Schwartz in a recent news release.

For the "uninsured" motorist an accident may only be the beginning of problems. Aside from the damage, pain and suffering, and the economic impact of a large civil judgement, a driver operating an "uninsured" vehicle which is involved in an accident, can prepare for a whole list of problems from the Department of Transportation.

When the Department of Transportation receives the report of an accident involving death, injury of property damage to one person's property amounting to \$500 or more, or to government property in excess of \$200, the Secretary of Transportation will make a determination as to the amount of security required to satisfy any judgement for damages against the persons involved in the accident. The Department will then notify the persons in the accident, who are "uninsured," of the amount of security to be deposited with the Department, and the date

by which the deposit must be made. In the same notice, the "uninsured" motorist will be advised that his/her driving privileges will be "suspended" as of the deposit due date, unless such deposit is made.

Sheriff Schwartz went on to say that not only can the driver be suspended for his/her involvement in an accident, but the owner of the vehicle which is involved can, in some cases, also lose his/her license. "Suspensions" can only be removed if the security is deposited, the suspended person has been released from liability, or one year has passed since the effective date of the suspension and the Department of Transportation has received no notice of a damage claim being filed against the "uninsured" motorist.

The Sheriff also addressed the chain of events which occur after a judgement has been made. The first step is the revocation of the "uninsured" motorist's driving privileges and vehicle registration until the judgement is cleared. The judgement is cleared with the creditor's written consent, payment of the judgement, or if the debtor obtains a court order for installment payments to the creditor.

The clearing of the judgement, however, will not in itself allow the person to be reinstated from the revocations. They will continue in effect until

the person involved is re-examined and pays the required reinstatement fees. Proof of financial responsibility must also be filed with the Department of Transportation. This means that proof of insurance is required in the form of a certificate of insurance, or a bond, or certificate of deposit for securities or money, exceeding the minimum liability requirements under the law.

Sheriff Schwartz concluded by saying that most people who don't have insurance in the first place claim they can't afford it. But knowing the results of being "uninsured" and having an accident, can you really afford to be without it?

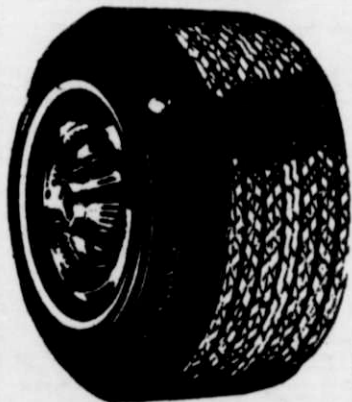

### VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified voter, unable to get to the polling place on election day, may ask to vote by absentee ballot. A qualified voter is one who is a U.S. citizen, will be 18 years of age or older on election day, and who has resided in the ward or aldermanic district where voting is desired to be accomplished for at least 10 days prior to the election. If the voter resides in a municipality which requires voter registration, then registration is also a requisite for the voter who is qualified in other respects.

To obtain an absentee ballot, contact the clerk in the city, village or town in which you reside by mail or telephone, or in person, and request an application form. After properly completing and returning the application to the municipal clerk, an absentee ballot will be sent to you along with a postage pre-paid return envelope, or given to you if the application is submitted to the clerk in person. The deadline for receipt of the application by the municipal clerk is 5:00 p.m. on the Friday before election day in the case of applications mailed to the municipal clerk, and 5:00 p.m. on the day before the election in the case of applications made in the clerk's office.

With one exception, the voter who wants to cast an absentee ballot must make a separate application before each election. Voters indefinitely confined to their home or care facility because of illness, age or disability need not file an application before each election; a special statement on the application form can be completed asking that an absentee ballot be automatically mailed to them before each election; if they fail to make and return the ballots sent to them in an election, they must complete another application later on.

Absentee ballots can be voted at home anytime after they arrived in the mail. They can also be voted right in the clerk's office if submitting the application in person. If returning the ballots by mail, the affidavit-certificate must be properly completed and witnessed by two persons. **Lyme Disease Study of Deer Continues**

Deer hunters registering deer at 13 selected check stations in Wisconsin this season are being asked to cooperate in a Lyme disease study being conducted by the Department of Natural Resources and the Department of Health and Social Services.

Lyme disease is a bacterial affliction transmitted by Ixodes ticks, often referred to as "bear ticks." It has affected more than 70 Wisconsin residents

since 1979. Symptoms include a rash, which usually spreads outward from a tick bite, frequently followed by a painful arthritis. The disease also may cause heart abnormalities and nervous disorders. Symptoms usually disappear after some weeks or months. However, about 10 percent of the patients develop a long lasting arthritis that may permanently damage the affected joint.

Hunters registering deer at the designated stations will be asked to allow researchers to examine the deer for ticks. At six of the stations blood samples will be taken. Hunters registering deer at these stations on November 20 and 21 only, should leave the heart and lungs in the deer until the blood samples have been collected.

Registration stations to be used in the study include the DNR office, Mauthe Lake, Kettle Moraine State Forest (north), Campbellsport.

# Indians Lose Butz, Arndt, Kewaskum to Host Hartford Opener to Slinger, 70-58 In Lakes Opener

The Kewaskum Indians opened the 1982-83 basketball season at home Friday night in their annual non-conference battle against Slinger. The Owls won by a larger margin than usual, 70-58, over the rebuilding, young Indians but the teams were evenly matched until Slinger surged ahead in the final few minutes.

There were two turning points that switched the tide noticeably in Slinger's favor. The first came early in the second quarter when 6-4 forward Dennis Butz injured an elbow when he crashed to the floor and was through for the night. It was a typical first game as both teams started out with ragged play. It appeared like neither team wanted to win.

The Owls had four players in double figures and the Indians three. Brian Miller had 18 to tie for scoring honors with the Indians' Dan Dean. Ken Leeson

had 13 while Ken Vlasak and Chuck Dodge each had 10 for Slinger. For Kewaskum, Dean and Arndt were the big guns. Dean scored his 18 on nine baskets, six in the first half. Arndt hit seven of eight from the free throw line and added four buckets for a total of 15 points. Indian guard Jim Hanrahan scored 10 but was called for several traveling violations.

It was reported that Butz broke a bone in his arm in his fall and will be lost to the team about six weeks. This is a serious blow to the Indians as he was a good rebounder and scorer at 6-4.

With Butz and Arndt both out of the game, Slinger put on a surge in the closing minutes to win by 12 points as they hustled well.

Kewaskum was back in action Tuesday when they hosted a veteran Campbellspport team in another non-conference tilt. Next Tuesday they play at West Bend against the West Spartans.
