Spring Election Tuesday

Tuesday, April 5, is Spring Election Day in the State of Wisconsin.

For the first time in Tuesday's election, the new punch-card voting system will be used in Kewaskum and Washington County. In the village an informative preview of the punch-card system is being held Thursday, March 30, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

Kewaskum School District

Main interest in the area in Tuesday's election will be for school board members in the School District of Kewaskum. Two members will be elected to succeed John Tessar and Richard Theusch, who are not candidates for re-election. Two candidates on the ballot are Colleen Narbatovics and Norma S. Serwe. There will also be two write-in candidates for the position, namely Laneille Dieringer and Neal Weare. All of the candidates are conducting a vigorous campaign. All are new comers seeking office for the first time. (A resume of the candidates appears on another page of this issue).

Village of Kewaskum

In the Village of Kewaskum a president and three trustees will be elected for two-year terms. Incumbent president Gerald F. Stollenwerk is unopposed for re-election. Incumbent trustees Paul Blumer and David Nigh are seeking re-election, while a woman, Mary

L. Krueger, is running for the third position on the board. Krueger was narrowly defeated as a write-in candidate last year. All three are unopposed.

Town of Kewaskum

In the Town of Kewaskum there is no opposition on the ballot, with all incumbents being unopposed. The candidates are: Chairman, George Allmann; Supervisors, Jerome Herriges and Daniel Stoffel; Town Clerk, Barbara Hinz; Town Treasurer, Dolores Prost.

Town of Wayne

In the Town of Wayne the only opposition will be for the office of the two supervisors, where Leonard W. Peter is challenging incumbents Merlin Ernisse and Mark Strobel. Other candidates unopposed are: Chairman, Carl Hohlweck; Clerk, Orville Kern; Treasurer, Raymond Kudek; Assessor, Alvin Wiesner, Jr.; Constable, Robert Schulteis.

Town of Farmington

In the Town of Farmington the only opposition will be for the two offices of supervisor, where incumbents Carl Hauch and Eugene Laatsch will be opposed by Clarence Steinert. Other incumbent candidates are: Chairman, Vaughn Brown; Clerk, Joanne Oneska; Treasurer, Kenneth Ramthun; Constable, John Hames.

Preliminary School Budget for 1983-84, \$5,190,000

\$400,000 Loan for Repairs Decision To Be Put to District Taxpayers

"Paste and patch or maintain and repair? That's the decision Kewaskum School District taxpayers will be asked to make at a Special Meeting of the electorate scheduled for May 2nd.

The question came up after District Administrator John Long presented a list of eighteen top-priority items he felt must be considered in the 1983-84 budget.

With a price tag ranging from a low of \$374,713 to a high of \$428,125, Long and Business Manager Robert Borch felt these items should be accomplished with funds from a State Trust Fund loan. "There is a need to make expenditures in maintenance which should not be included in the General Fund budget," said Borch.

With a drop in the debt service fund payment from \$317,000 in 1982-83, to the last payment of \$90,000 in 1983-84, Borch felt the district would be able to handle such a loan. On the basis of a \$400,000 loan over a ten-year period, the district would be looking at an annual payment of approximately \$92,000 a year, noted Borch. Checking into the loan situation, Borch said, if the district were to take out the loan and receive the first payment after August 1st, the first repayment would not be due until March, 1985, and the district would not see an increase in debt service from next

year to the year after.

The eighteen top priority projects were picked out of an initial list of seventy-nine items in a 4 1/2 page report which was also presented to the School Board. Some of the items have been put off too long already, Long felt. "As a taxpayer, I would want to spend 3.3% to maintain and improve the district's \$13 million investment," said Long.

Among the largest expenditures are repairs. Roof repairs at the high school \$63,750 to \$106,250, Beechwood \$4,250, Farmington

\$3,100, and repaving the high school parking lot \$60,000. Other priority items include replacement of shop equipment and replacing worn furniture at the high school and Farmington. Approximately seven energy and cost-saving changes throughout various district school buildings were also included in the list. Photocopying machines and computers for all the schools were also stressed.

High School Principal Clark Pearson agreed with the administration's recommendation.

The award recognizes the outstanding scholastic achievements of one or more students from each graduating class at Kewaskum Community High School and assists in their pursuit of a meaningful college education.

5 Men Charged With Sex Assault in Town Wayne

A preliminary hearing was set for April 5 for five men charged Monday in Washington County Circuit Court with first degree sexual assault and false imprisonment in connection with an alleged attack in the Town of Wayne early Wednesday, March 23, on a 20-year-old Town of Hartford woman.

Charged were Mark W. Kraemer, 22; Peter S. Gumm, 22; Kenneth P. Dippel, 22; and Bryan P. Peterson, 19, all of 5874 Beaver Dam Road, Town of Wayne; and Nickie J. Fuchs, 24, of 1838 Sunset Ridge, West Bend.

According to the complaint, the victim met Gumm, Dippel, Peterson and Fuchs at Bob's Starlight Bar on Highway 33 in the town of West Bend, last Tuesday night. When the bar closed she and some friends left with the men after being invited to a party at their Town of Wayne home. On the way to the house, the car in which the four suspects and the victim were

riding, sped and lost the car in which the woman's friends were following. When the woman and the four men arrived at the house, she met the fifth suspect, Kraemer.

The suspects took turns sexually assaulting her throughout the night until about 5 a.m. She was picked up at the house by a friend, according to Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz. The woman contacted authorities Friday morning. Schwartz stated she had waited to report the incident because she was afraid. She was taken to a hospital where she was examined and treated for cuts and bruises.

Three of the suspects were arrested at the farmhouse. Two others were arrested later at an area tavern.

Judge Richard T. Becker set a cash bail of \$10,000 for both Dippel and Fuchs, \$5,000 for Kraemer, and \$3,000 for Peterson and Gumm.

Borch Resigns As School Dist. Bus. Manager

The School Board of the School District of Kewaskum has accepted the resignation of Robert Borch, District Business Manager, effective May 1, 1983. Acceptance of the resignation and granting of a release from his current contract which ran through June 30, 1983, occurred during a closed session on Monday, March 28, 1983.

Mr. Borch has been employed by the School District of Kewaskum as Business Manager since August, 1978. He has accepted a position as business manager of another school district beginning May 1, 1983.

Plan Commission Tables House Moving Request

After more than an hour and a half discussion Tuesday evening, the Kewaskum Plan Commission voted to table a request to move an existing home.

Mr. and Mrs. Doug Schacht appeared before the commission seeking a permit to move the house they have purchased, from 1502 Fond du Lac Avenue to a lot at 530 Knights Avenue, in the Ideal Subdivision.

The brick home, which is approximately 40 years old, was purchased from Marigold Dairy, which wants the present homesite cleared for plant expansion.

The Schachts told the commission they had checked with subdivision residents prior to the planned move and had received no real objections to moving the home into the area. However, Robert Sparks, representing subdivision property owners along with several other residents themselves, appeared before the commission with a petition against allowing the home to be moved into their area.

The petition contained approximately twenty names, with fourteen against the request and about six who did not object or had no opinion either way.

Sparks said subdivision residents felt the home violated restriction covenants which had been set by the subdivision's developer and which the other home-owners had been obligated to meet when they purchased land and built their homes.

The main objections were that the home is not consistent with the style and type set in the area, being approximately 15 feet higher than surrounding homes along with the possibility that the home was too large for the proposed lot. Another objection was that area residents felt the home would lower property values of surrounding homes. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said the home had been appraised at over \$53,000, while the average appraised value of homes in the subdivision was approximately \$48,000.

Sparks questioned whether or not the village had to go along

with enforcing the subdivision's restriction which were stricter than the village's ordinance. Attorney Charles O'Meara, representing the village, said the village was not obligated to enforce these restrictions and as far as the village was concerned, the home had already met village requirements when the home was originally constructed.

Subdivision residents questioned why the Schachts had not been told by the village there were additional restrictions in this area. Schmidt said, until two months ago, the village knew nothing of the added covenants which had not been filed with the Washington County Registrar of Deeds prior to that time, which would have made them legal or binding.

O'Meara told the homeowners, the village's only obligation was to see that the home met village ordinances, and suggested any other problems should be discussed with another lawyer or handled in Circuit Court.

The commission voted to adjourn the public hearing and delay issuing the permit when it was found that three items had been omitted from the necessary documents needed to seek a permit.

The commission will hold a special meeting on April 4th to make a final decision.

In other action, the commission approved a petition to change zoning from R-1 (single family) to R-4 (multiple family) on 5.06 acres of land owned by Henry and Carole Timblin. The land is situated west of the Bonnie Bell Motel and north of Bonnie Lane. Preliminary plans are for construction of two four-family solar envelope apartments or condominiums.

On Sunday the firemen were called out for a chimney fire at 2:07 p.m. at the Jim Krieg home, 9001 Forest View Drive. Twenty firemen answered the call and were at the scene one-half hour. There was no damage.

ditions. Pearson said many of the items mentioned had been considered in previous years by the past administrator, however, they had always been put off because of the large debt service payment of the district. That's coming to an end now and it's about time we began some much needed maintenance and repair work, noted Pearson.

Long told the meeting of an example of needed roof repairs at the high school. An Art teacher placed a 30-gallon container in a corner of his classroom to catch water from a roof leak. The next morning Board President Charles Ogi was summoned to the school to see first-hand, that overnight, the container had filled to overflowing. Long admitted this was an extreme situation, but still it was an example of some of the problems which must be faced by the district.

Long said, "I recommend we hold a special meeting and present the facts to the taxpayers." Borch said state law requires a public meeting be held for the electorate to vote on setting the value on a State Trust Fund loan. Although the school board would decide the disposition of such loan funds, it cannot obtain the loan without voter approval at either an annual or special meeting. Borch told the board, waiting until the annual meeting might hold up the work as much as a year, as well as delay setting the budget for 1983-84. Board member John Tassar's motion to hold a special meeting was approved.

Board member Richard Theusch felt he would rather see the district go with keeping

the present tax levy to finance the projects rather than take out a loan. Tassar told Theusch he felt his idea was a good one, however, the projects would then be spread over several years, with costs rising in the meantime. With a State Trust Fund loan, all the projects could be done at one time. Borch agreed, noting that contractors are looking for work now and some of the actual costs could be lower than the estimated costs shown on the priority list.

Ogi agreed with Tassar's plan to present the loan idea to the public. It's cheaper for the district to borrow money at 8 1/2% than to have taxpayers borrow money at 14 1/2% to pay their taxes, contended Ogi.

"If the public doesn't go along with this loan, we will have to decide what we want to put into this budget for repairs," said Tassar. Long said, "call a special meeting, let the people decide. They have a big investment, if they say no, then we continue to patch and patch," stated Long.

Borch then presented the budget proposed for 1983-84. The board was asked to keep in mind that the budget figure of \$5,190,000, was strictly preliminary and subject to change or revision. As presented, the budget would reflect an 8.2% increase in expenditures over 1982-83. That would result in a total tax levy increase of 5%.

Borch's report noted the budget proposed was only with the assumption that a State Trust Fund loan would be approved to allow the completion and/or purchase of all items listed in Administrator Long's report of January 18, 1983.

Borch noted the 5% tax levy increase would also provide an additional \$75,000 for the district's cash flow problem. These

monies would reduce the need for short-term borrowing of funds during a period when the district is waiting for its share of annual school taxes.

Borch asked the board for some guidelines as to what percent figure the administration should work with the development of the budget. The 5% figure had been used for the preliminary budget since it had been brought up at an earlier meeting. Board member Tom Brigham said he was in favor of the 5% tax levy increase. "That 5% increase is just keeping what we have this year for next year," said Brigham. Long noted a 5% increase will only allow the district to maintain the services you have. There would be no money for improvements or repairs.

Brigham's motion to set a guideline figure of 5% was approved 4 to 2. Board member Ralph Horner and John Spoerl voted against the motion, Jean Goeden was absent. Horner felt the increase should be even less. Resident Jerry Buchel asked Horner what kind of an increase he would vote for. Horner had no exact figure, other than he felt it could be lower.

In viewing the budget from another aspect, Long was asked how district funds would be affected by the steady decrease in enrollments. Long said the district would not see any losses for the next two years.

Tassar asked Long, is it correct that we have two empty classroom areas at Farmington, and are there any other vacant classrooms in the district? Long informed Tassar there was room for two classes in the open concept area at Farmington and four vacant rooms in Kewaskum Elementary. "I hope people don't start jumping all over me," said Tassar. "I hate to

bring this up, but I seriously think the board is going to have to consider closing a school. I'm looking down the road to 1984-85, you can't have six empty classrooms in two schools in 83-84," said Tassar. "All I want the board to do is start thinking about it." Tassar felt this would be one area of reducing budget costs.

Long said enrollments at Wayne and Farmington were tailing off and students from the Town of Auburn were also down. "If it ever came to closing Wayne or Beechwood, you would have to tell parents at least two years ahead," said Long. Board member John Spoerl questioned the closing of Beechwood School. "Beechwood School is one of the schools in the poorest condition we've got," said Long. Along with roof repairs, a considerable amount of work is needed on the

windows and other areas, explained Long. Tassar said these were some of the reasons he felt the board should look into closing a school, not necessarily Beechwood. Tassar questioned the advisability of putting thousands of dollars into a building only to close it a short time later.

Jerry Buchel asked Long when the Department of Public Instruction's study of the district would be concluded. Long said, due to a reshuffling of personnel in the DPI, the study should have been started by now and he expected someone from the DPI any time. He agreed with Buchel that the study would give the district a better idea of where it stands with respect to both facilities and personnel.

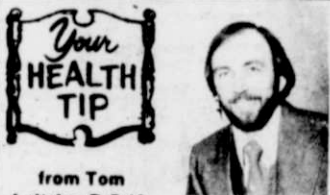

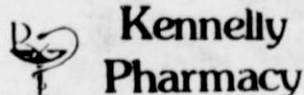

Children are our most important natural resource. We must provide a sound, solid educational basis for their future--and for ours. This should not mean throwing huge sums of money at the schools; rather it means using common sense, creative efficient budgeting, and effective management by objectives together with a sense of dedication to the basics in order to provide all of our students with a quality education.

STATEMENT OF POSITION ON KEY ISSUES

Several issues have been raised during this campaign. The 7 vs. 8 period day is one which has been discussed with much emotion but very few facts. The role of the school board is to examine every presented alternative and then decide what is best for the district based on facts. Until I receive some facts, I do not feel I can take a stand. Another issue is the possible closings of Beechwood and Wayne Schools. I am completely opposed to this from both an educational and financial standpoint. Some of the buildings need repair, and this should be done, but a preventative maintenance program must be developed to prevent this from recurring. Repairing buildings is fine, but it is far more important to ensure that our students have adequate textbooks and library resources. Another issue would be the inclusion of computers in the curriculum; I strongly favor all students becoming computer literate. Tied into the computer issue is the existence of the Long Range Planning Committee. Citizen input is valuable, but too often it takes the form of shouting at the board meetings. This committee is one means of systematically examining issues facing the district, researching the questions, and presenting the material to the board so that it can make a responsible decision. I strongly favor such forms of citizen involvement.

"Do you support the construction of a national or regional high-level radioactive waste disposal site in Wisconsin?"

EXPLANATION

Effect of ratification:

The question is submitted to the electors of this state for advisory purposes only. A "yes" vote would indicate that the voter supports the construction of a disposal site, at some future time at some as yet undesignated site in Wisconsin, for the placement or disposition of radioactive waste materials from regional sources which may be located in states other than Wisconsin. A "no" vote would indicate that the voter is opposed to the future construction of a site in Wisconsin for the placement or disposition of radioactive waste materials from sources which may be located in states other than Wisconsin. The results of an advisory referendum would not require the enactment of legislation with respect to the construction and location of disposal sites for radioactive waste materials, but might influence members of the Wisconsin Legislature and federal, state and municipal officials with respect to the nature of any legislation they might contemplate proposing.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address, before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan or special partisan election, the elector shall make a punch in the hole at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom the elector intends to vote, or elector shall place a cross in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote, or, write in the office and name of the elector's choice on the ballot envelope or space provided.

On referenda question, the elector shall make a punch in the hole to the right of the answer he or she intends to give, or make a cross in the square at the right of or depress the button or lever next to the answer which he or she intends to give.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two ballot clerks or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After the official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After the official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so that the printed indorsements and ballot clerks' initials on the outside do show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his or her name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand the inspector his or her ballot enclosed in the envelope provided to be placed in the ballot box, or the elector shall leave the machine or booth, and where paper ballots are used, give his or her name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand the inspector his or her folded ballot to be placed in the ballot box, deposit any unused ballots in the blank ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may be assisted by two election officials of different political parties in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English, or that due to physical disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. Alternatively, an elector making such declaration may have another elector of the county assist in punching the ballot, or may have another elector of the county assist in marking the ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration.

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before receiving the ballot card and ballot card envelope from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot card envelope. Upon receiving the ballot card and ballot card envelope, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and punch/mark his or her ballot card and ballot card envelope. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for punching/mark a ballot card and ballot card envelope, but he or she shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, insert your ballot card with both hands, be sure the pins are through the two holes, hold the punching device straight up and down, press down firmly opposite the candidate and/or proposition selections of your choice.

(c) Write-in voting. To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the printed ballot, use the ballot card envelope to "write-in" the office and candidate's name.

(d) The ballot card and ballot card envelope should not be punched/marked in any other manner. If you incorrectly punch/mark, tear, or deface the ballot card or ballot card envelope, return it to the election judge for another one, but not more than 3 ballot cards or ballot card envelopes shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to punch/mark the ballot card or ballot card envelope. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot card or ballot card envelope may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot card or ballot card envelope is punched/marked.

(e) After the official ballot card or ballot card envelope is punched or marked, remove your ballot card, place it in the ballot card envelope and take it to the inspector at the ballot box, hand him or her the ballot card envelope with the ballot card placed inside, to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(f) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in punching or marking the ballot if he or she declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read or that due to physical disability he or she is unable to punch or mark his or her ballot. If an elector declares that he or she is visually handicapped, he or she may have anyone assist him or her in punching or marking his or her ballot card or ballot card envelope. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person's disability.

(g) Any qualified elector who is absent, or expects to be absent from the village in which he or she is a qualified elector, or who, because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on election day, may vote at such election by means of an absent voter's ballot card or ballot card envelope to be secured upon application to the Village Clerk, not more than sixty days and no less than three days, or by personal application, not later than the close of office hours on the day prior to such election.

From the School Board President's Desk

What are the qualities that make up a good board member? What should we look for in a school board candidate? These questions we all have to answer in order to cast our ballot responsibly on April 5. After so many years on the Board, I have a list of things I look for. Here is my list — how does it compare with yours?

First of all, I look for someone who is interested in the education of our children — someone who has shown this interest through the years, not just right before the election. In addition to someone who is interested, I want someone who is willing to back up this interest by becoming involved as evinced by participation in district committees and groups.

Next, I look for someone with an open mind — one who is willing to fairly evaluate the effect of a policy on all of the children of the district. Can this person keep all of the children in the district in mind? Can the candidates say no to something that may be favorable immediately but that will hurt the district in the long run?

Then I would look for someone who is responsive to district concerns, who is willing to work with the other board members, the administration, and the teachers for the betterment of our district. Does that person have a specific strength that the board could use — for example, education? Does the person have some concrete, constructive suggestions for district improvements?

You know, some have been complaining that the people of the district have no voice in district affairs. Horsefeathers! You are determining the direction of the district every time you cast your ballot. Examine the candidates, and compare their qualifications and platforms. Vote for those people who are capable of carrying out your ideas. Our children deserve it. Your vote does count on April 5.

SCOTT McCALLUM Reports

McCALLUM CRITICIZES GOV. EARL'S PLAN TO GIVE PRISON INMATES 5% PAY HIKE

MADISON — State Senator Scott McCallum (R-Fond du Lac) criticized Governor Earl's plan to give prison inmates who participate in work programs a 5% pay hike. Senator McCallum said, "these pay increases are poorly timed and out of step with the desires of the people of Wisconsin."

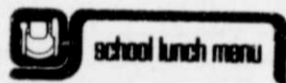
The pay raises, which would cost taxpayers an additional \$112,600 would also be paid to inmates who participate in study programs. "We don't pay college students to study at the University of Wisconsin. I see no reason to be paying inmates to go to school, especially in these tough financial times," McCallum said.

The Fond du Lac lawmaker also objected to the proposal because, "it is an affront to the prison staff who will be asked to accept pay increases of far less than 5%. As the recent problems at Waupun pointed out, correctional employees literally place their lives on the line every time they report for work. It is unreasonable to ask them to accept a pay plan that is less generous than that given to

inmates."

In addition to raising inmates salaries, the Earl plan would also make inmates wages exempt from state withholding taxes. "Not only is the governor granting inmates generous pay increases, he is giving them a new tax break as well," McCallum said.

"Governor Earl has granted huge pay hikes to his appointed commissioners and to prison inmates," McCallum stated. "What the governor fails to understand is that many Wisconsin workers will be foregoing pay increases because of the economy and they cannot afford the taxes that will be needed to pay higher salaries to commissioners and inmates."

Today's Medicine

AFTER THE SOUNDS of screeching brakes and grinding metal have died away, the first thought following an auto accident is of injury. But if there are no broken bones or blood, the victim's attention usually turns to the vehicles involved.

Assuming you are uninjured just because everything appears to be all right is a common mistake. Every accident victim should arrange for an examination to insure that they have not incurred a whiplash neck injury. Symptoms may not appear for hours, days, or even weeks after the accident, yet the damage will have been done following the instant of impact.

Another mistaken assumption is that auto accidents, or similarly clear cut, recognizable accidents are the only cause of whiplash. While they are the major cause, they are by no means the only one.

FALLS, blows to the head or neck, attempting to maintain your balance on a slippery sidewalk and even turning your head too quickly can produce a whiplash injury. When the symptoms appear later, you may not even associate the headache, tension, muscle spasms, stiff neck or restricted neck motion with the incident that caused them.

Other symptoms of whiplash include blackouts, fatigue, extreme nervousness, loss of balance, loss of hearing, ringing in the ears, nausea, gastro-intestinal pains, light-headedness, cold hands or feet, excessive sweating, increased reaction to drugs, poor memory, eye strain and rapidbeating of the heart.

OF COURSE, these symptoms might not all be present in a particular case and their presence does not necessarily mean that you have suffered a whiplash. Only a thorough examination can reveal that.

I urge everyone who has been in an auto accident or who has suffered a fall or blow to contact a Doctor of Chiropractic and arrange for an examination as quickly as possible. Time is on your side only if you act promptly in the case of whiplash. To delay can open the door to a lifetime of suffering.

Kewaskum FFA to Hold Annual Rabies Clinic

It is the time of the year once again when dog and cat owners should begin to think about having their pets vaccinated against rabies.

Rabies is an acute disease caused by a virus. The most common form of contamination is by means of a bite from animal to animal containing the virus bearing saliva. The virus may be transmitted by contamination of fresh existing wounds.

The incubation period is variable but signs of the disease may become visible within 15 to

20 days. There are three phases the disease divides into. The first sign is general loss of appetite and change in behavior. The second phase is known as the paralytic form where paralyzation and salivary excretion begin. The third phase is the furious form, when the animal become very irrational and viciously aggressive.

Dogs rarely live more than ten days after the onset of these signs. Death usually results through progressive paralysis of the central nervous system.

Wisconsin is one of the leading states in rabies and rabies related cases, a statistic the state could do without. The Kewaskum Future Farmers of America is concerned about the problem. The chapter will conduct a rabies clinic Thursday, April 7th, from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Kewaskum High School Agriculture Shop. Doctor Charles Ogi will administer shots at a reduced cost of \$5.00 per pet. All proceeds from the clinic go to the scholarship fund.

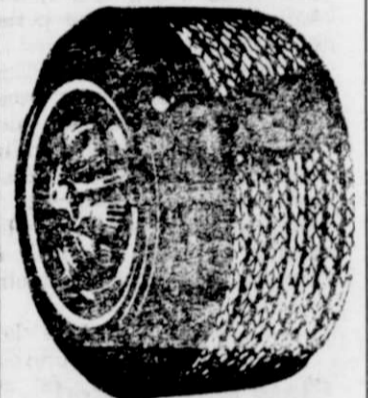

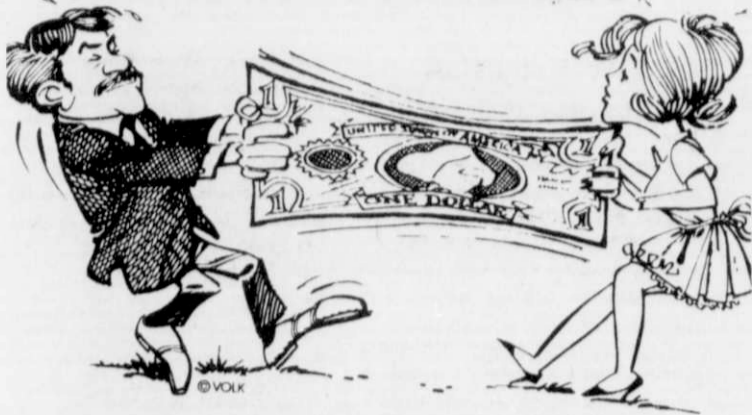

KETOGENIC DIETS CAN BE DANGEROUS TO YOUR HEALTH

For the estimated 30-40 million overweight Americans hungry for the magic solution to their excess poundage, new diet gimmicks are as full of hope as the first crocus of spring.

Some of the newest are the ketogenic diets.

Following the diets leads to a condition called ketosis. Proponents claim ketosis helps you lose weight. Unfortunately, ketosis can be life threatening for some people.

Low carbohydrate, high protein, high fat diets that result in ketosis can be dangerous.

It's a good thing people can't usually stick to gimmicky diets long enough to cause permanent harm.

Exactly what is ketosis?

It's a condition that occurs with diabetes and starvation. When the body is forced to use its own fat as its major source of calories, some fat will be incompletely oxidized. The acidic products of this incomplete oxidation are called ketones.

Ketogenic diet pushers claim carbohydrate intake prevents the burning of body fat and actually stimulates the body to make more. Protein and fat from the diet are supposed to facilitate body fat loss because of hormonal changes.

Dieters even test their urine for ketones and if they are present, feel the diet is working.

While the point of dieting is to burn up stored body fat, it is not a good idea to try to do it with fasting or a very low carbohydrate intake.

The body requires glucose both to burn fat efficiently and

as fuel for the brain. Glucose comes from eating carbohydrates. In the absence of carbohydrates, muscles may be robbed of their protein to provide glucose.

The heart, a muscle, can be fatally weakened by this process. Quite possibly this is why some victims have died of liquid protein diets and anorexia nervosa.

Even if you don't have heart failure, a ketogenic diet may lead to heart tissue losses which are impossible to detect.

You can also damage your kidneys. Eliminating ketones may put an excessive burden on them. If you already have kidney disease, you can't tolerate it. If you have poor kidney function, a long period of ketosis may precipitate kidney disease.

Since ketones compete for elimination with uric acid, susceptible individuals may develop gout, a disease caused at least in part in excess levels of uric acid.

Ketosis also disturbs the body's acid-base balance, and leads to dehydration and electrolyte loss, with possible serious consequences.

Proponents claim ketosis can bring on a state of euphoria. The dieter feels energetic and vibrant and hunger seems to disappear. Instead of feeling euphoric, however, some people feel rotten. They suffer headaches, nausea, stomach cramps and other unpleasant side effects.

Anyone who fasts indis-

criminantly or uses modified fasting as a diet technique could suffer the consequences of ketosis. Modified fasting includes using a protein supplement and a very low calorie diet—500 calories or fewer per day.

The best protection from victimization by every fad diet that comes along is to be familiar with the principles of sound weight loss. The most reliable way to take weight off is by gradual weight reduction, with a balanced diet and plenty of exercise.

The ideal diet should be 500 to 1,000 calories fewer than your current daily intake. Reject any diet that provides fewer than 800 calories a day as unsafe.

And, as the 90% of dieters who regain all their lost weight in six months know to their sorrow, the only way to keep weight off is through permanent lifestyle changes, including sensible eating habits.

On a long trip taking several hours of sustained driving, it's easy for a driver to lose the feeling he/she is making progress and it's easy to yield to the temptation to step up speed, Sheriff Schwartz acknowledges, but he gives the following suggestions:

1. A rest break during a long trip will help break up the

monotony and consequent hypnotic effect of long periods at the wheel.

2. Another good habit to develop is to keep your eyes moving. Look frequently to both sides. Look ahead far and near, and make good use of your rear-view mirror to be aware of what traffic is following you.

3. Anticipate which ramp you intend to use in leaving the freeway, and be properly positioned well in advance to avoid the risk of cutting suddenly in front of other traffic to make your exit.

Clean Vehicles

A clean car is a safer car, says Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz. Vehicles which have not been washed for weeks during the cold weather experienced this past winter have accumulated dirt and grime which needs removing, he pointed out.

Wipers clearing the windshield assure visibility where it's most critical, but all other glass in the vehicle and all lights on the vehicle also should be kept clean to fulfill their intended use properly.

Even the small bulbs lighting up the auto registration plate on the back of the car should be cleaned, and both front and rear

plates should be kept clean so their reflectorized surface can serve as a safety aid at night under the reflection of headlamp rays from vehicles which are following you, it was added.

The Sheriff said he had seen several grime covered cars and trucks in recent weeks on which "pranksters" had lettered the words, "Wash Me." Maybe the perpetrators were more than fun-loving friends of the owners of the vehicles which were the target of their attention, Sheriff Schwartz said. He concluded, spring should be clean-up, fix-up time for both one's car and home.

KUGLES KEG AND TODZ MAHAL END SEASON FOR KEWASKUM

HOWARDS GROVE — The Kewaskum Lakes basketball team lost its first two games in the 28th Annual Howards Grove Athletic Association Tournament over the weekend, and was thus eliminated from the tournament. Kugles Keg of Reedsville romped over them on Saturday, 119-74, behind John Mack's 24 points. Kewaskum then entered the tournament's consolation bracket, and Todz Mahal of Milwaukee defeated them in a much closer game, 84-69, as Joel Claassen led the way with 22 points. The tournament continues through this Saturday with the championship game slated for 8:00 p.m.

Playing without a few of its key players, Kewaskum was no match for Kugles Keg on Saturday. Kugles is composed of college players from UW-Stevens Point, UW-Oshkosh, and UW-Eau Claire. Kewaskum again had a definite height disadvantage.

Kugles outscored them in every quarter. They jumped to a 27-18 lead in the first quarter as Greg Shimon had nine. It was 55-32 at the half, with Kugles getting balanced scoring in the second quarter. Kugles blew the game open with a 36-16 third quarter to lead 91-48, as Mack had 12. The teams played on fairly even terms in the fourth quarter as Kugles settled for a 45-point win.

Six of Kugles' seven players were in double figures. Besides Mack, Cam Curtin and Kevin Ziegler each had 20 points, Greg Shimon had 19, Paul Durkee 18, and Charlie Novak 12. For Kewaskum, Leon Laatsch led with 23 points, Mike Maney had 18, Bill Backhaus 16, and Jeff Lehnerz 13.

Kugles made five of six free throws for 83.3 percent, while Kewaskum was six of 10 for 60.0 percent.

Moving into the consolation bracket, Kewaskum found the going a little easier against Todz Mahal of Milwaukee Sunday night, but nonetheless couldn't pull out the win. A bad first quarter did Kewaskum in, as they played on even terms with the Milwaukee team the rest of the game.

The 28-12 first quarter was Kewaskum's doom. They trailed by only 11-8 when Todz

Kewaskum finishes the season with a record of 9 wins and 9 losses, including 0-3 in tournaments. They won the Lakes 'B' Division championship with a 9-6 record, after finishing in last place the previous year.

The Land o' Lakes Basketball Annual Awards Banquet will be at the D & G Club in Port Washington on Friday, April 8, with cocktails at 6:30 p.m. and dinner at 7:30 p.m. Kewaskum will receive the first place team trophy in the 'B' Division and individual plaques for its players. Leon Laatsch, who finished third in league scoring with 476 points and a 31.7 average, will receive an all-league award.
