Our Schools... A Multi-Million Dollar Investment

In an effort to become more aware of the problems and needs of the district, newly elected school board member Neal Weare, together with a Statesman reporter, spent last Thursday inspecting all the schools in the Kewaskum School District.

Weare carried along with him District Administrator John Long's report containing over 70 items, including repairs and equipment, which he would like to see accomplished with a proposed \$400,000 loan from the Wisconsin Trust Fund.

Weare said he felt the inspection was necessary so he could see for himself, what problems and needs are facing each school. He also felt parents should visit their children's schools and look them over for themselves, rather than take someone else's word about how good or bad situations are at any particular school.

Weare noted he was doubly concerned, since as a school board member, he along with the other members are legally responsible for the maintenance and repair of the district's \$13 million-plus investment.

Weare stopped at each school for about 45 minutes to an hour, going through the building and

discussing it with the principal or person in charge.

By the end of the day, Weare's statement was, "the name of the game is roofs, roofs, roofs and more maintenance," number one on Long's priority list.

At Kewaskum Elementary, with the oldest section being the original high school built in 1924, roof repair was definitely Director of Elementary Education Richard Zarling's top need. He cited an instance when the roof leaked so badly, it ran

down on the burner in the basement. "What would have happened had the furnace called for heat?" said Zarling. The old section of KES is still heating with the converted coal furnace, installed in 1924 when the high school was built.

Throughout the school Zarling showed Weare areas where water is leaking in causing damage to ceiling tiles and walls. In some areas the tile have been replaced and damaged again.

Mathis Music to Build New Store

Dale Mathis, who lives in this village, has announced that he and his wife, Karen, are building a new music store. The new store will be located at 908 W. Washington in the city of West Bend. The new store will be about the same size as their present facility which is located on Hy. 45 about four miles south of Kewaskum.

Mathis feels that the new location will be much more visible and should be more convenient for parents bringing their children in for lessons because of grocery and other stores within two or three blocks.

The store, Mathis Music, will carry the complete line of Hammond and Wurlitzer organs and keyboard computers. Also, Wurlitzer vertical and grand pianos, player pianos and rolls, Yamaha and other brands of folk guitars, and musical accessories. Mathis Music currently stocks about 1000 music books and Dale Mathis indicated that the selection in the new store will be larger.

Construction is expected to be completed by July 23 and the new store should be open for business by August 1.

Madam President to Chair School Board

After a delay of more than an hour and a half, due to a disciplinary action closed session, the Kewaskum School Board finally went into open session for the purpose of electing officers for 1983-84.

Board member Jean Goeden was elected to serve as Kewaskum School Board President, defeating Tom Brigham who was also nominated for the post. Unanimous ballots were cast for Neal Weare who will serve as Vice President, Ralph Horner, Treasurer, and John Spoerl as Clerk.

With the expiration of all the officers' terms and new members taking their place on the board, committee assignments will be made at the board's next meeting.

Business Manager Robert Borch informed the board the district had received an offer to purchase the tape drive and high speed printer units from

the Data Point computer which had been donated to the district. Borch said he had to bring the offer up at this meeting as Tuesday was the deadline to accept the offer which could bring in a profit of approximately \$5,800 to \$6,000.

Assistant Principal Roy Esser, who was instrumental in acquiring the computer, asked what plans were being made for the money. Esser felt that since the company who had donated the equipment had done so with the intent it be used to allow students to gain computer experience, any profits from the sale should be returned to the program.

Borch said a new, slower printer could be purchased for as low as \$1,050. The old printer was too fast to be used as a learning tool by the students, Borch noted.

Brigham informed the board he had received a letter from the Kewaskum Education Association to re-open negotiations.

KHS Wins Four A's In State Forensics

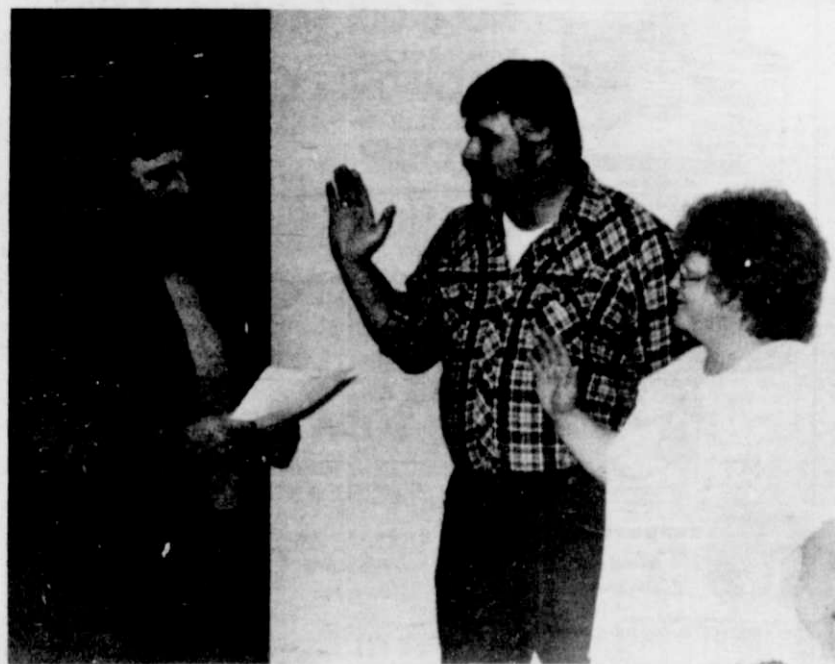

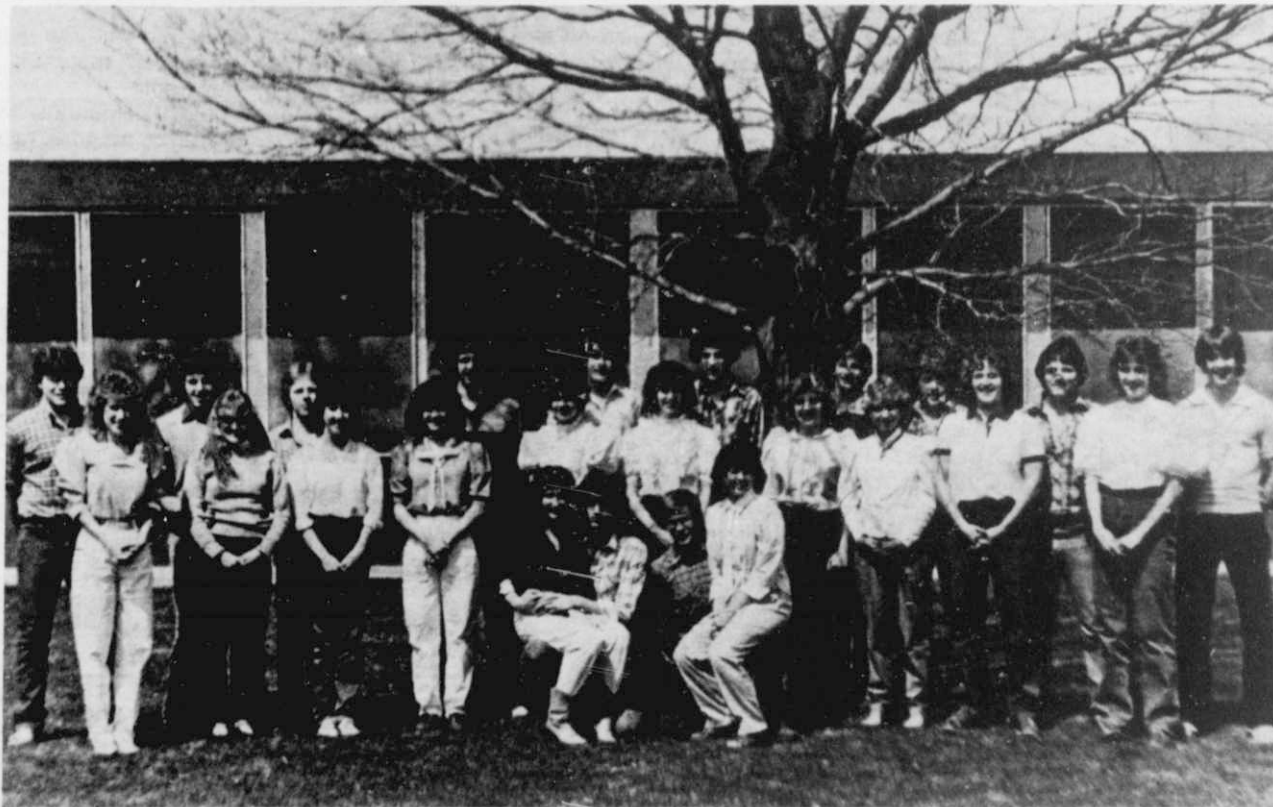

The disease is inherited and incurable. Medical therapy has quadrupled the life expectancy of CF victims in the past 15 years. However, fewer than half of today's live to be 20. Strides of progress are being made, but the fight for a cure continues.

Two years ago an entire string of lights fell from the ceiling in Mrs. Schmitt's room. Luckily the children were not in the room at the time. "I asked for a complete inspection of all lighting fixtures, but never got it," said Zarling.

"Our biggest need is roof repairs, the other items are no big things, just a lot of little things because of the age of the building," said Zarling. "Too many places where things are broken down and haven't been repaired."

At each school the principals made the same comment to Weare, "a lot of band-aid" patching and no permanent repairs or continuing maintenance. All the principals were in general agreement that Eugene Muench, who heads the maintenance and custodial workers has his job cut out for him, trying to maintain six widely dispersed buildings.

At the high school, Principal Clark Pearson re-stated many of Zarling's comments. The school has several roof problems with water leaking into the classrooms. The rest again, a lot of small things, repainting doors, replacing stair treads, replacing weather-stripping on doors, locker repairs, and several items which would result in considerable heat cost savings. "We don't do much preventative maintenance," said Pearson, "it's just when they go to hell that they get fixed. It's going to be money, very, very well spent in the long run. I don't think anyone wants to build a new high school," stated Pearson.

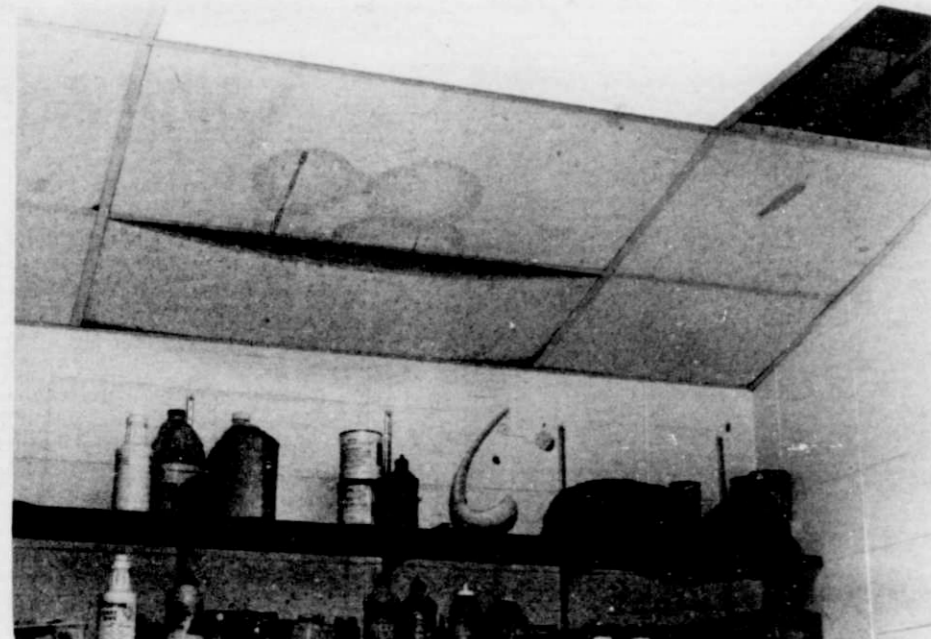
Middle School Principal Dennis Reha stated, "I'll be very honest, most of the things we'd like here, would be nice to have. This building is only nine years old, and most of our problems are preventive maintenance things."

One item Reha felt would be a large cost saving item was, air locks (vestibules) for both the main and rear doors of the building. It would cut heating costs lost through open doors and provide a safe place for kids to clean their wet shoes off in the winter, thereby eliminating a serious slippery hall condition which could result in a serious injury.

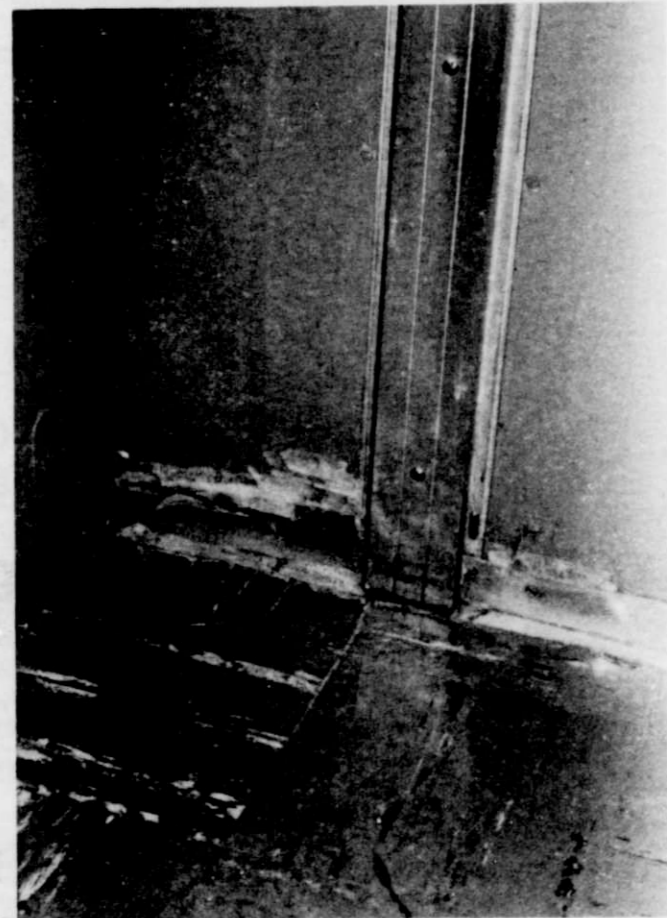
At Wayne, Principal Karen Petric also stated the school suffered from tremendous heat loss through the main door and west doors on the school. We need air locks said Petric. Petric's biggest worry is the safety of the gym area roof. "When we have 8" or more snow on the roof, we can't let the kids in here. Can you imagine what could happen at lunch hour, the whole student body could be gone," said Petric. Petric noted she hated to ask the janitor to go up on the roof and shovel the snow off. I wouldn't want to do it and I'm sure you wouldn't either.

The heating system is always under repair said Petric, along with the water softener. Some days the water is so salty the youngsters can't get a drink of water. "It's all this band-aid type maintenance," said Petric.

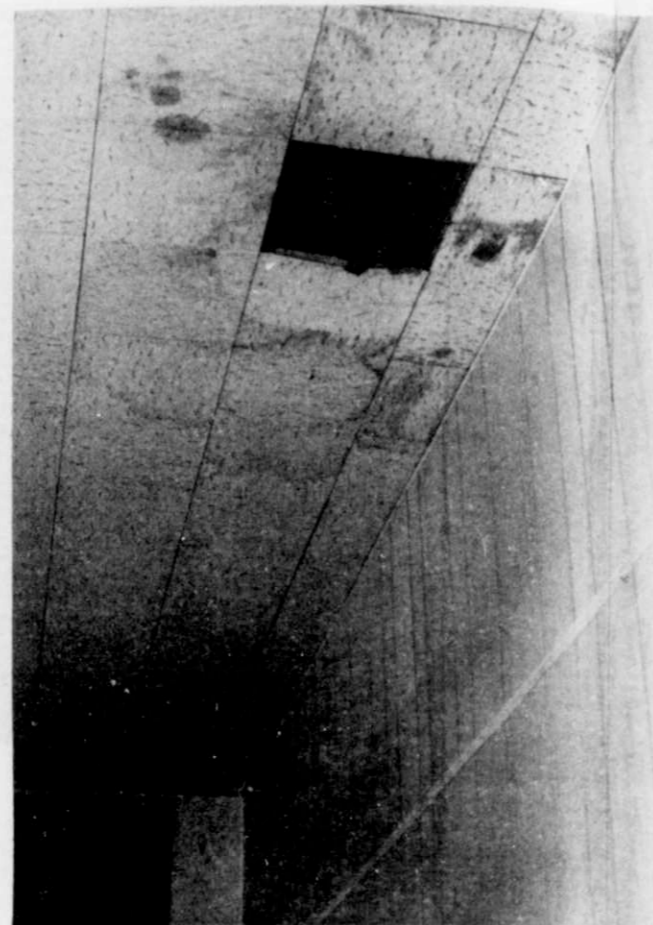
Wayne is also troubled with roof problems. In the new section of the school, water marks show where the water

Wall damage patched with duct tape.



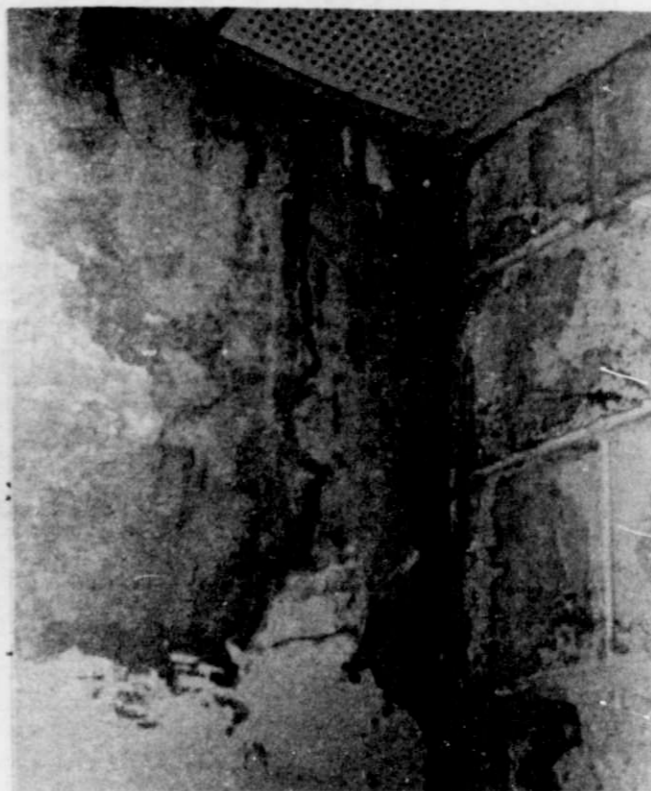
Kewaskum Elementary — Roof leaks water damage in classroom ceiling tiles.



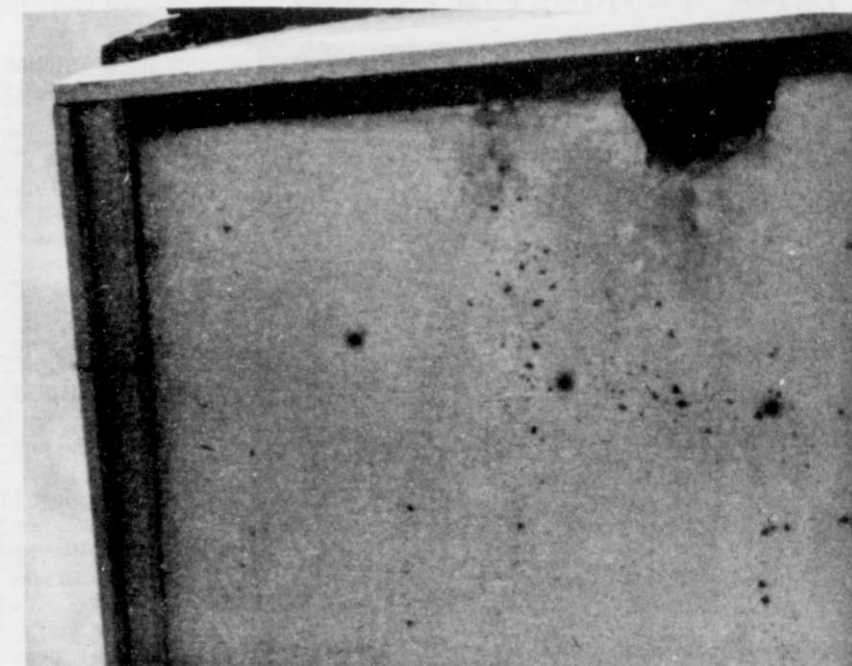
Wayne Elementary — Water damage on steel and concrete roof beams.



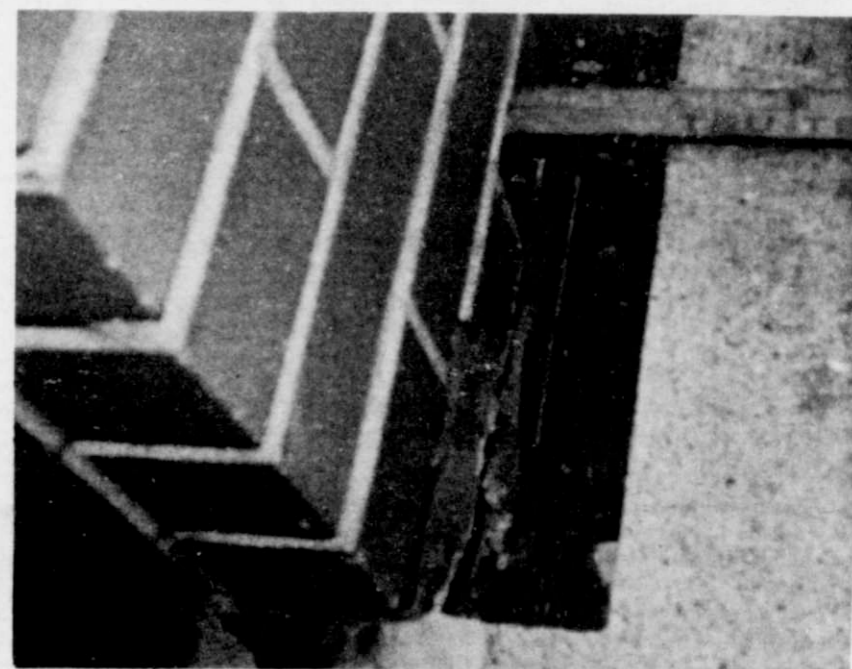
Beechwood Elementary — Rain water runoff damage to blacktop area.

runs down the roof and up under the overhang to the inside ceiling. Concrete around beams protruding on the outside also show water damage.

At Beechwood, Ken Erickson said, "maintenance has been nil." Because of roof problems, ceiling tiles are buckling from water damage. The brick wall just inside the front door was still damp from water seeping down from a roof leak. Blacktop

outside was broken from water damage. One concrete stoop had settled and pulled approximately 3/4" away from the building. "I wouldn't run my house this way and I think 90% of the people wouldn't either," stated Erickson.

Erickson showed Weare venetian blinds which haven't been pulled up for a considerable length of time because the fabric is sun rotted and they

would fall apart. "It's just so many little things, once the repairs are made, maintenance should be kept up or the repairs won't do one bit of good," noted Erickson.

Farmington Principal Tom Larsen again followed in the same vein with his comments, roof and water problems, plus general maintenance which has just been let slide.

Larsen said the roof contained bubbles which had to be repaired. He, too, showed Weare areas in the classrooms

where water had leaked in damaging ceilings and walls.

On the outside, water damage is beginning to rot the overhangs. Downspouts which are not connected to any run-off systems are washing around away from the foundations; a similar problem was also found at Beechwood.

"The more knowledgeable the people are, the better equipped they are to make a decision, and I've learned quite a lot today," concluded Weare.

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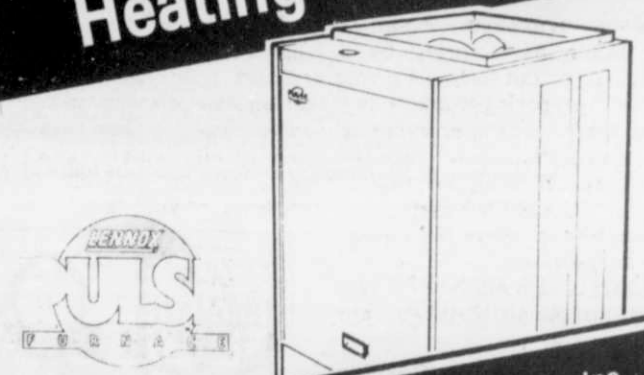

'Spring Fever' and Motorists

Many Wisconsin motorists are bitten each spring by a special brand of "Spring Fever," preparing to take a new boat, trailer or camper trailer on the road for a summer vacation trip, says Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz.

The Sheriff offers the following suggestions:

1. Take a couple of "test runs" to make sure you are really ready.
2. Added weight increases accelerations time, and special caution must be used when passing other vehicles.
3. Sharp turns are out. Swing wide around corners to allow room and time for the trailer to turn.
4. It takes more time to stop, and sudden stops - even at a fairly low speed - can jackknife a trailer or shift the load. Ample room must be maintained between a car with trailer and the vehicle in front, and a speed must be maintained that will make sudden stops unnecessary.

The Sheriff also cautioned that a high trailer or boat can cut off rear vision, requiring installation of special mirrors. A car towing a trailer uses more gas and oil, so keep a sharp eye on the gauge. And pay special attention to your tires!

50 Years Ago

April 28, 1933

In the most daring and horrifying holdup ever committed in this community, Michael Pesch, 58, and his sister Kate, both residing on the Pesch homestead, two miles north of Kewaskum on the River Road in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, were unmercifully tortured by three bandits last Sunday and robbed of their cash, liberty bonds, mortgage papers, deeds, certificate of deposits, personal notes and numerous other legal papers. The bandits, being unable to obtain the necessary information as to where the

hidden money was, ransacked the whole house, strewing contents of boxes, cutting up mattresses and turning up practically every piece of furniture. They even went so far as to cut open hams and spill-out lard from jars thinking the money was perhaps hidden there. The money, liberty bonds and papers were found securely wrapped in a box in a trunk in Miss Pesch's bedroom. It is estimated that approximately \$1,650 in cash in gold and currency, and 19 liberty bonds, totaling \$8,900 were stolen. Mr. Pesch stated that he was in the kitchen when three men entered with drawn revolvers and demanded money which he had hidden. Mr. Pesch refused to obey their commands. He was blindfolded with hands tied behind his back. At one time one of the bandits was so cruel that he heated a piece of iron and branded Mr. Pesch on the right leg. Another bandit kept continually striking Mr. Pesch on his tied hands, which soon swelled to an enormous size, but no word would come from Mr. Pesch's lips regarding the whereabouts of the hidden treasure. He was also struck several times on the back of his head with the butt of a revolver. Kate had been gathering the day's eggs and when she returned to the house Michael yelled to her to get out of the house, but one of the men grabbed her, blindfolded, gagged her and tied her hands behind her back. Miss Pesch also refused to tell where the money was. After two hours the bandits found the loot and hastily made their getaway. After an hour Mr. Pesch was successful in freeing himself and cut the ropes around his sister. He then hastened to the John Etta home, the next neighbor to the south, but no one was there. With his injuries paining him, he then went to the Chas. Krahn home 1/2 miles distant, where Mr. Krahn notified Village Marshall George F. Brandt, who in turn notified Deputy Sheriff Geo. Kippenhan.

Funeral services for the late August Arndt, 69, of the Town of Scott, who died at his home at Beechwood on April 16, were held on April 19, at the Immanuel Lutheran Church. He is survived by his wife, the former Wilhelmine Gatzke and five daughters: Mrs. John Brandenburg, Mrs. Louis Butzke, Mrs. Ernst Hauses, Mrs. Albert Lohse and Mrs. Alvin Butzke.

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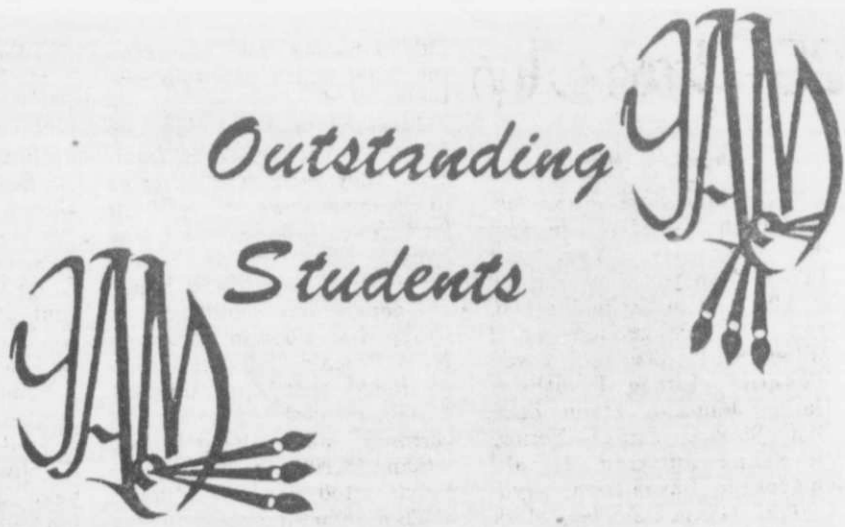

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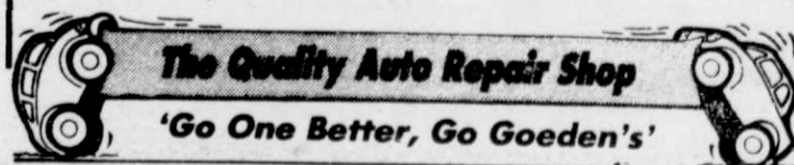

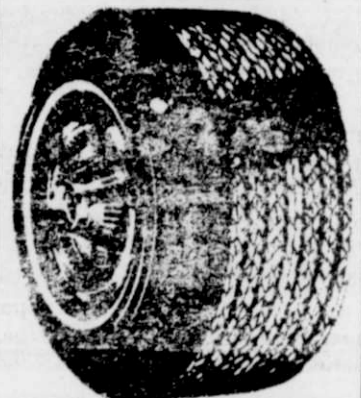
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Minutes of Village Board Meeting

April 18, 1983
8:06 P.M.

NOTE: Commissioner William S. Martin was present to swear in the newly elected Village Officers. They are as follows: President Gerald F. Stollenwerk, Trustees David Nigh, Paul Blumer and Mary Krueger, the Village's first female Trustee Member.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in mid-monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald F. Stollenwerk presided. Trustee Howard Laubenstein asked to be excused and was absent; all other Trustee Members were present.

The minutes of the meeting of April 4, 1983 and the special meeting of April 7, 1983 were approved as printed upon a motion by Trustee Jeffrey Rohrer, seconded by Trustee Paul Blumer. Voice vote was passed unanimously.

The opening of the sealed bids for the proposed construction of a deep well, 12 inches in diameter, to be located on Village property approximately 350 feet NE of the intersection of USH "45" and CTH "H" immediately W of the Village garage, were as follows:

On a motion by Trustee Richard Schmidt, seconded by Trustee Donald Mlodzik and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board turned the well bids over to Robert Skatrud from Ruekert and Mielke, the Village's engineer for review and a recommendation.

The public hearing on the petition of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Timblin for the rezoning of the parcel of property which is Part of the NE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 and of the SE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 16 T12N, R19E, Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin. The parcel is located just N of Bonnie Lane and just W of the Bonnie Belle Motel.

On a motion by Trustee Jeffrey Rohrer, seconded by Trustee Richard Schmidt to suspend the rules to take action on agenda items IX. A. (Review and discussion on the petition of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Timblin for the rezoning of a 5.06 acre parcel) and VIII. A. (Review and discussion regarding financial consultants recommendations in reference to TIF and proposed financing). Roll call vote was passed by the majority. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 1 "Absent."

The Board reviewed the comments made at the public hearing and asked Mr. Timblin several questions. I. Mr. Timblin would and could you provide a dimensional drawing of your proposed buildings? II. Mr. Timblin would it be possible for you to proceed with only rezoning a portion of the 5.06 acres?

Mr. Timblin indicated it would be possible to get drawing of the building and that he could proceed with only rezoning a portion of the 5.06 acres, but preferred not to.

On a motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Donald Mlodzik and unanimously carried by roll call, the Board tabled action on the petition pending receipt of dimensional drawings of the proposed buildings for the Board to review at the next meeting. 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Gruber Finishes Third in NCAA Championships

UW-Oshkosh wrestling standout Rick Gruber became the first Titan wrestler to be named All-American for the third year by placing third at 118 lbs. at the NCAA Division III Wrestling Championships at Wheaton College recently.

The junior from Campbell-sport defeated Tim Marks of John Carroll (fall 4:00) in his first match and then conquered Ryan Haines of Upper Iowa (9-3). Gruber lost in his third match to John Barna of Trenton (7-6), but then came back to defeat Steve Gliva of Augsburg (9-2). In the match for third place, Gruber defeated Dave Averill of Albany (7-6).

Last year Gruber finished second in the NCAA tournament, losing the championship match by one point. So, in the past two years at the NCAA tournament, Gruber has lost only two matches. Ironically, he lost both by one point and trailed in each, 4-0, before battling back. If he returns to national meet next year and becomes an all-American, it would be only the second time in Titan history for an athlete to be named as an all-American for four years. The only athlete so far is gymnast Casey Edwards.

Senior Rich Tomaszewski won his first match at the 142-pound class by defeating Tom Alioto of Allegheny (7-6), before losing his next two matches and being eliminated. Al Kilcoyne lost his first match at 134 and was also eliminated for Oshkosh.

"We were a little disappointed on the way home," said Titan Coach Terry Barth. "But when you compete in a national meet, you are going to run into some very tough competition. I thought the wrestling this year was very tough at the national meet. I think Rick was really hoping to win and it is tough to accept third place when you finished second the year before. But his consistency is what's so remarkable. He has finished second, third and fourth in the nation's toughest meet and he can take a great deal of pride in knowing he has finished near the top every year."

Gruber finished the season with a mark of 29-3, while Tomaszewski, from Weyauwega, was 22-3.

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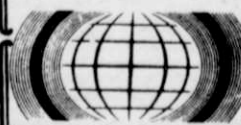

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Kewaskum Smallest School In State in Class 'A'

According to a WIAA (Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association) press release, Kewaskum is the smallest school in the state competing in Class A.

Kewaskum almost was switched back to Class B but will remain in Class A for the second straight year. The cutoff between A and B is 774 students. Kewaskum is the smallest in A and Sauk Prairie is the smallest in B with 768. The cutoff between B and C is 360 (Southwestern - smallest B) and 358 (Riverdale - largest C).

There are a number of changes in classification of WIAA schools for the 1983-84

school year, with 12 schools moving from one class to another.

The number of schools in each class remains the same as this year: 128 in A, 118 in B and 178 in C.

Moving from Class B to A: New Holstein, Seymour and Sparta. Moving from Class A to B: De Pere, Milwaukee West and Monona Grove. Moving from Class C to B: Baldwin-Woodville, Southwestern (Hazel Green) and Royall (Elroy). Moving from Class B to C: Brodhead, Darlington and Wisconsin Heights (Mazomanie).

Indian Boys Win Triangular Meet, Place Third in Another

In a very close triangular meet at home Thursday afternoon between three Eastern Wisconsin schools, Kewaskum came out the winner over Chilton and Plymouth.

All three schools finished within five points of one another with the Indians on top, scoring 58 points to 57 for Chilton and 53 for Plymouth.

Chilton believed they had won but an error was discovered in the 800 meter relay scoring, and the Tigers lost two points, which moved Kewaskum into the lead.

The victory was the first ever by a Kewaskum team in conference outdoor competition, as some of the boys turned in fine performances.

Brian Johnson was a double winner in the high and low hurdles. His 15:54 in the highs and 41.9 in the lows were both best for the year.

Gregg Clasy continues to improve in the weights. He was second in the discus (126-1) and in the shot with 39-10.

Jeff Nigh had his best time in the 1600 with 4:59.8 and AFS student Peter Nohlmans got his place in the triple jump with 36-4.

Slinger was the winner in eight individual events and 1600 meter relay, winding up with 96 points to 42 for Campbellsport and 32 for Kewaskum.

Winning coach Terry Krall of Slinger pointed to the overall team performance as the main highlight of his squad's victory. The Owls scored three or more points in every event and showed depth in the pole vault and triple jump with three places in both events.

Tim Luedtke and Andy Tischendorf stood out for Campbellsport. Luedtke won the 100 meter dash, the 200 and brought home a win in the 800 meter relay by making up a 15 yard deficit on the anchor leg.
