Wayne Residents to Vote on Cedar Lake Retirement Village Referendum

At the April election, Town of Wayne residents will be asked to vote on an Advisory Referendum regarding the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit for approximately 200 acres of land to be used for the proposed Cedar Lake Home satellite retirement village in the Town of Wayne.

In a meeting following Tuesday night's 31/2 hour long public hearing, the board, on a 2 to 1 vote, approved a motion to request an impact study from the Southeastern Regional Planning Commission and place the advisory referendum on the April 3rd ballot. Supervisor Mark Strobel made the motion, seconded by Supervisor

Leonard Peter. Board Chairman Carl Hohlweck voted against the motion.

The study will not be a formal environmental impact study, but Peter felt a report giving residents answers to their questions had to be in the hands of the voters before April 3rd. Peter said he would personally help to hand-deliver the reports to make sure residents got the information on time.

Approximately 200 people were on hand to hear Reverend L. C. Riesch, an employee of the Cedar Lake Home and owner of the two parcels of land proposed for the project, present an hour and a half program including slides and preliminary blueprints.

In the primary Tuesday, Kewaskum School District voters narrowed the field of school board hopefuls from eight to six candidates for the April 3rd election.

Veteran School Board member Jean Goeden, who presently serves as board president, was the top votegetter with 521, followed by Norma Serwe 459, Kim T. Peterson 424, Tom Brigham 393, Charles Bindrich 372, and Ronald Beimborn 268. Knocked out of the running were Charles Voge with 179 votes and Colleen Narbatovics 197. This was the second unsuccessful attempt by Narbatovics to win a board

Voting by townships, Ashford and Mitchell cast no votes.

Auburn had 217 votes with Peterson receiving 25, Voge 6, Goeden 23, Beimborn 23, Serwe 50, Brigham 30, Bindrich 41, Narbatovics 19.

Town of Barton cast 65 votes Peterson 14, Voge 8, Goeden 13, Beimborn 3, Serwe 9, Brigham 10, Bindrich 5,

Farmington had a good turnout, casting 503 votes - Peterson 77, Voge 41, Goeden 114, Beimborn 36, Serwe 61, Brigham 71, Bindrich 78, Narbatovics 25.

Town of Kewaskum had 425 votes - Peterson 66, Voge 19, Goeden 79, Beimborn 34, Serwe 87, Brigham 53, Bindrich 60, Narbatovics 27.

Village of Kewaskum cast 861 votes - Peterson 190, Voge 71, Goeden 174, Beimborn 42, Serwe 111, Brigham 142, Bindrich 95, Narbatovics 36.

Scott had 315 votes Peterson 17, Voge 9, Goeden 49, Beimborn 106, Serwe 21, Brigham 19, Bindrich 27, Narbatovics 67.

Wayne voters cast 427 votes Peterson 35, Voge 25, Goeden 69, Beimborn 24, Serwe 120, Brigham 68, Bindrich 66, Narbatovics 20.

A total of 2,813 votes were cast in Tuesday's primary. District Administrator John Long stated the above figures were unofficial and totals were to be verified by canvassers late Wednesday afternoon.

Open Bids for Garbage Truck Chassis

Board OKs Conditional Use Permit for Rooming House

The Kewaskum Village Board unanimously approved the request for a Conditional Use Permit which will allow a rooming house on the first floor of the former Pro-Built office building at 1304 Fond du Lac

Trustee Howard Laubenstein presented the Plan Commission's recommendation to the Board at its meeting Monday night. Several conditions were contained in the recommendation including the point that an occupancy permit would not be issued until the site met all state building code requirements. Fred Robertson, owner of the building, told the Board, all the necessary work would be done once he had received formal approval on his request.

Trustee Mary Krueger said she did not think making a specific condition about revoking the permit because of undesirable behavior was necessary. "If there were six teachers, six doctors or six lawyers moving in I don't think you'd place such a condition on

them. Just because they're drivers doesn't mean truck there could be problems.' Village Administrator Dan Schmidt agreed with Krueger noting there were other village ordinances which would cover such a situation. Schmidt said the commission recommended that condition because they are not familiar with all the village ordinances. "They're mostly concerned with building codes not ordinances.

In other action the Board approved a recommendation to increase the rent of tenants living in a house owned by the village. Rent for the upper unit will increase from \$150 to \$165 per month and the lower unit from \$165 to \$185. The village will pick up the cost of sewer and water service for 1984 only.

The Public Works Committee also informed the Board some repiping would be necessary in the home and recommended funds be allocated in the 1985 budget for the work.

The Board also approved a motion to send certified letters to 17 property owners regarding trimming of trees on their properties. Schmidt told the

At the Feb. 14 meeting of the Kewaskum Area United Way Board of Directors, four new members were accepted to board membership.

The terms of Karen Staehler, Arnie Stommel, and Jack Jadro expired in 1984. The three retiring members were thanked for their efforts on behalf of the United Way.

New officers were elected. Taking over as president will be Roy Esser, vice principal at Kewaskum High School. John Coulter, who has been presi-

dent the past year, will be vice-president, and Ruth Kern,

Ralph Remmel has agreed to continue as treasurer. He has held this all-important and time-consuming office since the first United Way Board was formed in 1978. The Board expressed special appreciation to Remmel, and commended him for the meticulous bookkeeping job he has done.

Gerald Zimmel, budget chairman, presented the committee's recommendation's for the allocation of the 1983-84 Fund Drive money

The recommendation was approved by the Board and funds will be disbursed as

follows: Kewaskum Chapter of A.F.S. \$700; Bay Lakes Council, B.S.A. - \$1,500; Big Brothers & Big Sisters - \$4,000; Children's Service Society \$1,000; Christian Record Braille \$250; Citizens Advocacy \$1,250; Developmental Disabilities - \$2,500; Friends for Battered Women - \$1,250; Kewaskum Blood Bank - \$200; Kewaskum Special Olympics \$700; Nova Services - \$1,850; Wash. Co. Red Cross - \$6,000; Salvation Army - \$600; Threshold - \$5,000; and Wau-Bun Council, G.S.A. - \$2,200.

These funds total \$29,000, almost the exact amount donated or pledged in the 1983 Fund Drive - \$29,436.

Hohlweck said he could not condemn the project noting he had heard both good and bad comments regarding the plan.

Town of Wayne resident Tom Brigham told the audience he felt the township would benefit from such a project through increased jobs in the area of support staff as well as the prospect of the professional employees moving into the township and buying or building new homes.

James Oelhafen, a Wayne farmer, said he had done some "quick calculating" regarding the added tax the township would collect. Using his own tax bill Oelhafen said it would take twenty farms the size of his to bring in the same amount of taxes as the proposed retirement village.

Hohlweck told the meeting, "the land is defintely going to be given away as a gift." The people were told that Reverend Riesch had three options for the land, number one to give it to Cedar Lake for the construction of the retirement village, number two to give it to the county for a park, or number three give it to the state and let it do whatever it wanted to with the land. Riesch told the meeting, "it's my land and I have the right to do with my land what I want to do." He said he was not trying to push anything on anyone only trying to do the most good for the people with his gift.

If the Town of Wayne doesn't want the project it could go to Kohler where it is wanted. Riesch said Kohler has already petitioned Cedar Lake asking that such a project be built in their area.

A starting date of early April had been set for the project so that the initial building would have a roof by fall. Riesch told the people, with the present building recession, the first phase could be constructed for approximately \$3 million, but if it were delayed one year, pro-

jected costs would go to \$5 to \$6 million.

Peter said he thought the project was three to five years down the road and discussion of it could be brought up at the annual meeting. He noted this was one reason why some people felt the project was being pushed down their throats.

Rev. Riesch also learned one unexpected bit of information at Tuesday night's meeting regarding approval of the permit. He and other Cedar Lake representatives attending the meeting were surprised to learn that both town and county approval would be needed for issuance of the permit. Riesch said according to his advisors, the public hearings were strictly informational and the county alone would make the final decision on the permit.

Aldwin Seefeldt, the Town of Wayne's attorney, in referring to the ordinances and codes said, because the project had been placed in the category of nursing homes, etc., approval from both the Town Board and Washington County Parks and Planning Commission was necessary.

The Cedar Lake Home Board of Directors will hold a meeting on Thursday. It is not known whether the board will decide to continue with the project or drop it. Riesch said he had no idea what type of recommendation he should make faced with the unexpected turn of events. He said he had reached the point of dropping the whole project and just turning the land over to the county or state. If that were to happen, Wayne would lose all its taxes from the land rather than just a portion designated for non-profit organizations.

ing charges have been increased from \$2.50 per yard to \$3.00. Schmidt said the charge had gone up 50c a yard annually for the last three years.

Schmidt gave an update on the Municipal Building remodeling. He said all the window and vestibule work was done except for a few minor items.

Announce Local Chairman for **Heart Fund Drive**

Darlene Beisbier has accepted the chairmanship of the 1984 American Heart Association drive in Kewaskum. She will be responsible to organize volunteers and direct the local campaign effort to raise funds for the research, community education, and public education programs of the American Heart Association of Wisconsin.

Each year more than 25,000 Wisconsinites representing 1600 villages and townships ask for contributions from their friends and neighbors to support the Heart Association in its mission to reduce premature death and disability from heart disease and stroke. "The impact of heart disease and stroke is felt in every community in our state," chairman Beisbier stated. "But thanks to the research and community programs of the Heart Association, tremendous progress is being made in understanding, treating and preventing our nation's number-one killer - cardiovascular disease. I am proud to be associated with this important effort and ask that you consider the Heart Association for a donation when a local volunteer calls," chairman Beisbier concluded.

It is estimated that over 700,000 Wisconsinites are afflicted with some type of heart disorder or defect. High blood pressure (hypertension) alone is a problem for approximately 1 out of every 6 Wisconsinites. Stroke, a cardiovascular disease which affects the blood vessels to the brain, afflicts approximately 36,000 Wisconsinites annually. Heart attacks are suffered by an additional 29,000 citizens, resulting in death for approximately one-third of its victims. The estimated economic cost of cardiovascular disease in Wisconsin amounts to over 1.2 billion dollars annually.

Both residential areas and local businesses will be solicited in the annual Heart campaign drive. Funds raised in local campaigns help support a statewide programming effort which last year resulted in the training of 30,000 Wisconsin

residents in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR); provided youth education programs on heart health, anti-smoking and nutrition, reaching over 25,000 students; funded a speakers bureau, reaching over 7,000 residents; supported free blood pressure screening programs for thousands to detect high blood pressure, the silent killer; funded \$633,000 in vital state and national heart research to further discoveries in understanding and treating heart disease and stroke; and provided for the distribution of over 1,000,000 pieces of material on risk factors, heart disease, and health information for the patient, family, educator, and lay public.

The American Heart Association of Wisconsin is the only voluntary health organization dedicated solely to the reduction of premature death and disability due to cardiovascular disease. 



Lester Kohn, Local Businessman, Mrs. Wm. Schaub, Others Die

Lester Kohn, 74, of 603 Main Street, Kewaskum, passed away at the Dakota Hospital in Fargo, North Dakota, on Friday, February 17, 1984. He had been on a business trip to North Dakota when he became ill.

Mr. Kohn was born on June 12, 1909, in the Town of Kewaskum to the late Michael and Amanda Kleinhans Kohn. On September 16, 1933, he married Myrtle A. Ludwig in Campbellsport.

He had been a self-employed farm implement dealer in Kewaskum for 37 years. He was a member of Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Kewaskum, their Holy Name Society and also a member of the Kewaskum Historical Society.

Mrs. Melius was a member of Zion United Methodist Church, Batavia, its Ladies Aid and the Pathfinders Sunday School Class.





The Washington County Dental Society brings you this article in observance of National Children's Dental Health Month. It is the third of a series of eight on "Going Through Life with a Smile."

"Mommy! Daddy! My wiggly tooth fell out!" If you're a parent, you're sure to hear this speech or one much like it from your child, usually when he or she is around age six. Children are excited about losing their primary baby teeth, as they know this is an important step in becoming an adult.

As a toddler, your child had twenty small teeth that fit nicely into a child-sized jaw. But again the time he or she enters first grade, the primary teeth will begin to be replaced by thirty-two larger permanent teeth. This second set of teeth will have to last for the rest of your child's life.

Losing the primary teeth is a natural, painless process, part of growing up. When it's time for a particular tooth to be replaced, its roots slowly dissolve into the surrounding tissues. Without roots to anchor and support it in the jaw, the tooth becomes loose and falls out. In a few weeks, the gap in the child's mouth is filled by a new, permanent tooth.

You should be concerned, however, if your child loses a

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[If No Answer Call 626-4902] 1674 Springview Dr. Kewaskum, WI 53040 tooth has been lost too soon. Space maintainers are metal or plastic devices that can be used to hold the space for the permanent tooth.

The honor of being the first permanent teeth in a child's mouth usually belongs to the "six-year" molars, which can appear as early as age five. These molars, located just behind the primary teeth, are often mistaken for primary teeth by parents. As a result, they often do not receive any special attention and are likely to be attacked by decay.

What can you do to help your child have strong, healthy permanent teeth? Encourage good dental health habits. Daily brushing and flossing, the use of fluorides, a balanced diet, and regular dental visits are important for everyone. For healthy teeth tomorrow, take care of your child's teeth today.

HEATING WITH WOOD

Q. We just went up north to check our deer hunting cabin and found raccoons in the chimney of the fireplace. They're above the damper so we made sure the damper was shut tight and left them there. What now?


A. You could hope they leave by opening day, but don't count on it. Any attempts by you to physically remove the critters may result in your dearly wishing you'd never bought the place. Raccoons can be pretty nasty fighters. The old trick of smoking them out is not only rought on the animals, especially little ones, but is also a little dangerous. If they have made a nest of sorts above the damper, a fire could ignite the material and in turn set off the creosote

in the chimney, giving you a rip-roaring chimney fire to contend with.

The local Humane Society or Animal Control Shelter might handle this problem for you. If not, they sometimes rent live-traps, or know where you can get one. Get instructions from them on the proper use of the trap. Some chimney sweeps will take care of situations like this if you're not inclined to do it vourself.

When you are rid of the animals you should make sure the chimney is free of any nest, especially on the smoke shelf above the damper, and then install a chimney cap on top with metal screen sides. They are available from most hardwares, wood stove dealers or chimney sweeps. This will prevent birds, raccoons and other unwanted guests from, let's say, dropping in uninvited.



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



REPORT CHANGES IF YOU GET SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME CHECKS

If you receive monthly accounts. supplemental security income (SSI) checks, you must promptly report changes that could affect your eligibility or amount of payments. Failure to do so could result in an overpayment and a fine of up to \$100.

Following are some things you must report to Social Security (most can be handled by phone):

• Change of address - Do this even if your checks are deposited directly in a bank or other financial institution.

· Change in income - Report any increase or decrease in income from working, other government benefits, support or alimony, gifts, and other sources

· Change in resources - Let Social Security know if you buy or sell real estate, a car, life insurance, stocks and bonds, burial plots, or other resources. Also report changes in any individual or joint bank

 Change in your household -Report if the number of people living in your household changes because of a birth, death, marriage, divorce, separation, or other reason.

· You enter or leave an institution - Notify Social Security if you enter or leave a hospital, nursing home, halfway house, jail or prison, or any other institution.

• If you leave the U.S. for 30 days or more - You are not eligible for an SSI check for any full month you are outside the

• Your disability improves - If you get SSI checks because of disability or blindness, report if your condition improves or you start working.

If you have any questions about SSI and what to report, contact any Social Security office. The people there will be glad to help you.

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
