Retirement Village Referendum Gets Big No Vote in Town Wayne

Newcomers Peterson, McElhatton Elected to School, Village Boards

Incumbents Jean Goeden and Thomas Brigham were successful in their bids for re-election to the Kewaskum School Board. Newcomer Kim Peterson won the third seat, opened by incumbent Charles Ogi's decision not to seek re-election.

Unofficial totals show Goeden received 1,295 votes, Peterson 1,198, Brigham 1,158, Norma Serwe 1,106, Charles Bindrich 859, and Ronald Beimborn 762.

In the Village Board race, first-time candidate Thomas McElhatton topped the votegetters with 412. Incumbents Donald Mlodzik and Howard Laubenstein won re-election with 396 and 394 votes respectively. Incumbent trustee Richard Schmidt was defeated in his bid for a second term, receiving 299 votes.

In the County Board election, Daniel Stoffel received 179 write-in votes to win the District 10 Supervisory post and incum-

bent Norbert Dettmann defeated challenger Mary Lou McKee by a vote of 347 to 71 to retain his position of Supervisor in District 11.

Town of Wayne residents strongly voiced their opposition to the Cedar Lake Home's retirement village proposal. The advisory referendum which asked the townspeople to in-

dicate whether they were in favor of such a project being built in the Town of Wayne received a vote count 162 yes 446 no.

In the presidential primary, Kewaskum area voters again showed their tendency to back a Republican candidate. In the figures available for the Village

Name on New Water Tower Approved Again

Decision on Cable TV Rate Hikes Held Up

Because Riverbend Cablevision has failed to furnish the Village of Kewaskum with annual financial statements for the years of 1982 and 1983, the Village Board voted to table further action on their request for rate hikes until the reports are received.

Board President Gerald Stollenwerk stated, "One of the concerns I have is the increase is going in because of increased operative costs. This is the basic reason given for the increase although we have failed to see a current financial statement that we can review to confirm that."

A Riverbend representative told Stollenwerk that Steve Peterson of Riverbend had said at the Public Hearing last month he would get something to Village Administrator Dan Schmidt. Stollenwerk told her his concern was the village would receive it after the board voted on the request. Stollenwerk said, "he thought it was proper business that the board got the reports before, so we get an opportunity to look at these increased operating costs."

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted that the financial statements were a required part of the village's cable TV ordinance and were to accompany the annual franchise checks. He indicated he had made several written and verbal requests for both the 1982 and 1983 statements and, to date, had received nothing.

Trustee Mary Krueger told the Cable reps that she had called West Bend asking the current rates for service and was given the new rates. She asked how they could go ahead and do this when the increases had not been approved by the village. Krueger was told, Riverbend had anticipated the rates would be approved after the public hearing last month



and they had placed notices in customer bills informing them of the new rates and these were also the ones she had received over the phone. "We felt we had to give our customers some kind of notice about the pending increases," the representative

Schmidt told the board it has the option to take action 30 days after the hearing so it has until April 19th, to make a decision. Trustee Richard Schmidt moved the board table action until the village receives a complete financial statement.

In other action, the "on again, off again" name on name on Kewaskum's new water tower is "on again." Dick Schmidt told the board that during and since the voter's forum, he has received comments regarding the board's decision to drop the lettering of Kewaskum or the logo from the new tower. He said residents have indicated they wanted the name on the tower. Schmidt said, after seeing how much more the new tower stands out over Kewaskum, he agreed.

Administrator Schmidt told the board he had attended the last meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and was told the members were in favor of the lettering, and Chamber President Fred Miller submitted a letter asking the village to reconsider its decision.

Schmidt told the board he had some good news and bad news concerning the issue. The good news was, the village's engineering firm had recommended the use of a less

expensive, but same quality, altitude valve which would save the village \$1,000. The bad news was, painting the name of Kewaskum on the north and south sides of the tower would cost \$1,300.00.

Schmidt said he had been told by the Chamber of Commerce, it would try to come up with the extra \$300.00 to have the painting done. Village resident Marvin Martin told the board. 'It seems others have been discussing it also." He noted the Kiwanis Club was concerned about getting the lettering done too.

Trustee Dave Nigh told the meeting that since the village would receive a \$1,000 credit for the valve, he would motion to go ahead with the lettering. "I'm sure we can come up with the added \$300 someplace.' Trustee Richard Schmidt noted, we said it at earlier meetings. anyone who is willing to donate toward having the lettering done is more than welcome to

The village received four bids for the sale of the 1982 police squad. The board unanimously approved the sale to Beltline Motor Center of Wausau with the high bid of \$2,527.00 Beltline was also successful high bidder on the squad sold last year. The three other bids were Robert Bowman of Troy, Michigan, \$1,551.10; Mark Enright, Kewaskum, \$1,500; and Meyer Ford of Campbellsport \$500.

The board also opened bids for the purchase of a new truck chassis and five yard dump box. The seven bids, ranging from \$21,194 to \$25,900, were turned over to the Public Works Committee for review and discussion

at it's April 16th meeting.

The board also approved spending \$1,600 for the 1984 fireworks display. Schmidt said he and Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo had selected a few additional displays for this year's show since the Kewaskum Fire Department will also be celebrating its 100th Anniversary.

If anyone from this area has any information as far as food, customs, arts and crafts that they would like to share with the girls PLEASE call 626-4284.






