Local Women's Clubs Host Dist. Convention; James Reigle Speaker

The 68th Spring Convention of the Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs of the Sixth District was held at Barth's Linden Inn, Big Cedar Lake, on April 17. A total of 161 ladies were present from Plymouth, Sheboygan, Kiel, Chilton, Ripon, Oshkosh, Fond du Lac, Brillion, Rosendale, Campbell-sport, Kewaskum, West Bend, Cedarburg, Port Washington, Grafton, Neenah-Menasha,

Mequon, Thiensville and Elkhart Lake. Hostesses were the Kewaskum Woman's Club and the Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club.

The agenda included election and installation of new Sixth District officers for the next two years and voting on the revisions of the Constitution and By-Laws. Kewaskum Woman's Club President, Rita Etta, gave the Welcome Speech.

Winner of the Sixth District High School Art Scholarship Award went to Terri Golback, student of Plymouth High. She was presented with a \$100.00 award for workshop study at the school of her choice this summer. Jane Phillips, District Art Chairman, stated that only 23 students entered the contest and 10 of these entries were from one club. Elkhart Lake Study Club was her sponsor.

State officers present were JoAnne O'Dwyer, President of Slinger; Dorothy Diamond, 2nd Vice-President of Milwaukee, and Dianne Osius, Jr. Director, of Plymouth.

In the Creative Arts and Crafts contest for members only there were over 150 entries. Bernice Groh, Secretary of Kewaskum Woman's Club, received a first in the sewing competition. Ruth Gruhle, Club Treasurer, received a second in the ceramic division. The judges for the event were Barbara Hinz and Joan Albers of Kewaskum and Patti Dell Agnese of Port Washington.

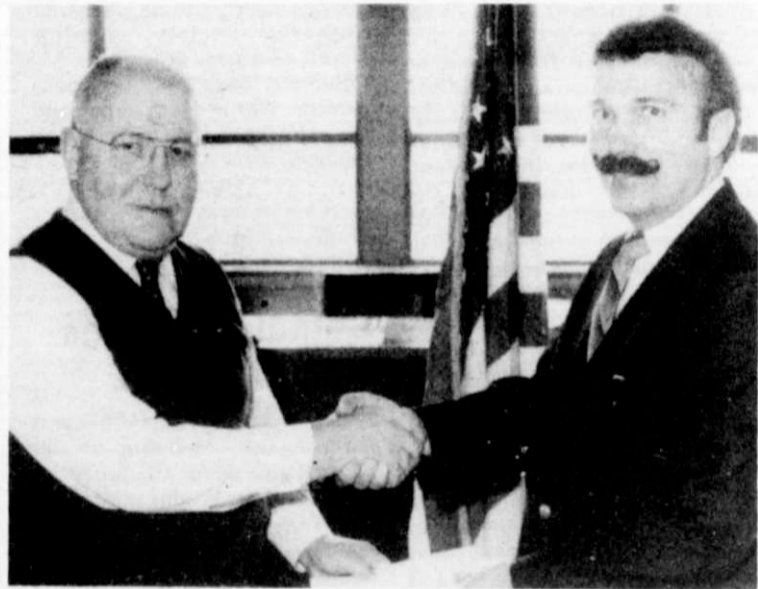
Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club members accepting the award were Nancy Malvick; Conservation Chairman; Lori

Bids Set for Hwy. 45 Bypass, Hwy. 28 Project

Mashuda Contractors, Inc. of Princeton submitted the apparent low bid for grading work on the new U.S. Hwy 45 bypass. The bid was \$2,906,452. That part of the grading will take place on the bypass route between State Hwys. 145 and 60, south of Jackson.

The West Bend bypass grading project is just one of 61 projects in 38 counties scheduled to begin this summer. Bids for those projects were opened April 17. The low bids for all projects totalled \$37.2 million.

The actual grading work on

the bypass should begin in about three weeks to a month.

A second area project, reconstruction of State Trunk Hwy. 28 from U.S. Hwy. 41 to Kewaskum (County Trunk Hwy. "V"), should begin early in May, according to the State Department of Transportation.

A low bid of \$2,071,426 was offered by the Stoehr Grading Co., Inc., New Berlin, for that work. The State 28 project was one of 45 highway improvement projects in 37 counties for which bids were opened March 20. Low bids for all 45 projects totalled \$25.8 million.

Plan First Pre-Construction Conference for Hwy. 45 Bypass

State Senator Scott McCallum and State Representative Mary Panzer announced today that the first pre-construction conference for the Highway 45 Bypass will take place on Wednesday, May 9, at 10:00 a.m. at the West Bend Public Library. The Library is located at 230 South Sixth Street in West Bend. The purpose of the public meeting is to allow the general public and representatives from construction firms, utilities and city and state officials to review plans for grading the portion of the Bypass from STH 145 to STH 60.

Representative Panzer, a third-term West Bend Republican, noted, "This is a highway project for which a tremendous number of people worked a very long time. We

are now about to begin the long-awaited construction of the Highway 45 Bypass. I would encourage anyone who has an interest in assuring that the construction timetable proceeds efficiently and effectively to attend this meeting."

Senator McCallum echoed Panzer's remarks, stating, "The Highway 45 project is a unique example of strong, grass roots involvement at the local level. I am hopeful that this local commitment will continue and that interested individuals will take the time to attend this meeting and discuss the specifics of the proposal."

The May 9 meeting will be the first of eleven pre-construction conferences to be held in West Bend on the Highway 45 Bypass.

**150 Animals
Immunized at
Rabies Clinic**

The Kewaskum chapter of the Future Farmers of America completed a community development project to set up a Rabies Clinic, which was conducted for two hours with the help of a local veterinarian and the public.

The project was part of the FFA's national Building Our American Communities (BOAC) program, sponsored by R. J. Reynolds Industries, Inc., the largest processor of agricultural products in the western hemisphere.

"Our chapter wants to eliminate rabies within our surrounding communities,"

said FFA advisor Dave Rizzardi. "We selected this project because of the always increasing problem of rabies in Wisconsin. It exceeds most every other danger in the state," he explained.

The Kewaskum chapter had 20 members working on the project. It was completed on April 5. The chapter has 74 members, with Tim Westerman serving as its president.

The seventh annual Rabies Clinic was held in the high school ag shop where animals were registered and vaccinated by FFA members and a local veterinarian. The veterinarian supplied the serum at a reduced cost of only \$5.00 per animal. A total of 150 animals were immunized and all proceeds from the clinic went towards a senior scholarship.

BE WISE ABOUT REYES Awareness Bulletin

The flu or various symptoms identified as influenza occur more frequently during the winter months. Influenza is a viral infection, and as such warrants our special attention because a fatal children's disease is associated with it. The disease, **Reye's Syndrome**, affects children from infancy through adolescence and can develop 3 to 5 days after the onset of the chicken pox, an upper respiratory illness, or other viral infections. It affects the liver and brain, is non-contagious and is often misdiagnosed as encephalitis, meningitis, diabetes, poisoning, drug overdose, or sudden infant death.

After a viral infection has seemingly run its course and the child is feeling better the following symptoms should be treated as serious and as possibly the first indication of Reye's Syndrome. Anti-nausea medication may mask the symptoms of the disease and because of the possible association of aspirin with Reye's Syndrome, parents should consult their physician before using these drugs. Watch for these symptoms, usually occurring in this order:

- PERSISTENT OR CONTINUOUS VOMITING
- LISTLESSNESS (LOSS OF PEP AND ENERGY, DROWSINESS)
- PERSONALITY CHANGE (SUCH AS IRRITABILITY, COMBATIVENESS OR SLURRED SPEECH)
- DISORIENTATION (UNABLE TO IDENTIFY WHEREABOUTS, OR FAMILY MEMBERS)
- DELIRIUM, CONVULSIONS

A child's life can depend on early diagnosis. Reye's Syndrome should be suspected in any child with chicken pox who vomits repeatedly. Phone your physician immediately if these symptoms develop and tell him you suspect Reye's Syndrome. If your doctor is not available take your child to an emergency room promptly. Two liver function tests (SGOT/SGPT) can be done to determine the possibility of Reye's Syndrome. There is a 90% chance of recovery when the syndrome is treated in its earliest stages by physicians and nurses experienced in the treatment of Reyes's.

1. Infants under 24 months who contact Reyes Syndrome

DO NOT always vomit—they swiftly enter the listless stage. There is an increased number of Reyes Syndrome deaths in infants because they have been previously misdiagnosed as SIDS deaths. An autopsy is the only way to make an accurate ruling on the cause of death.

2. REYES SYNDROME CAN AFFECT ADULTS!! In the summer of 1983 two separate

cases of Reyes Syndrome were accurately diagnosed and laboratory proven, on men in their 30's, in the Milwaukee area. Case 1, - the gentleman entered all stages of RS and recovered completely. Case 2, - unfortunately the gentleman still remains in an irreversible coma.

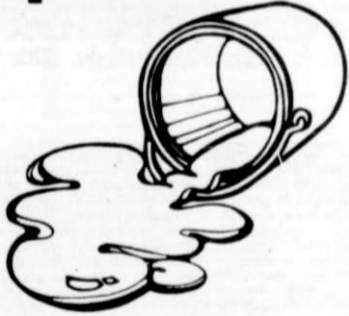

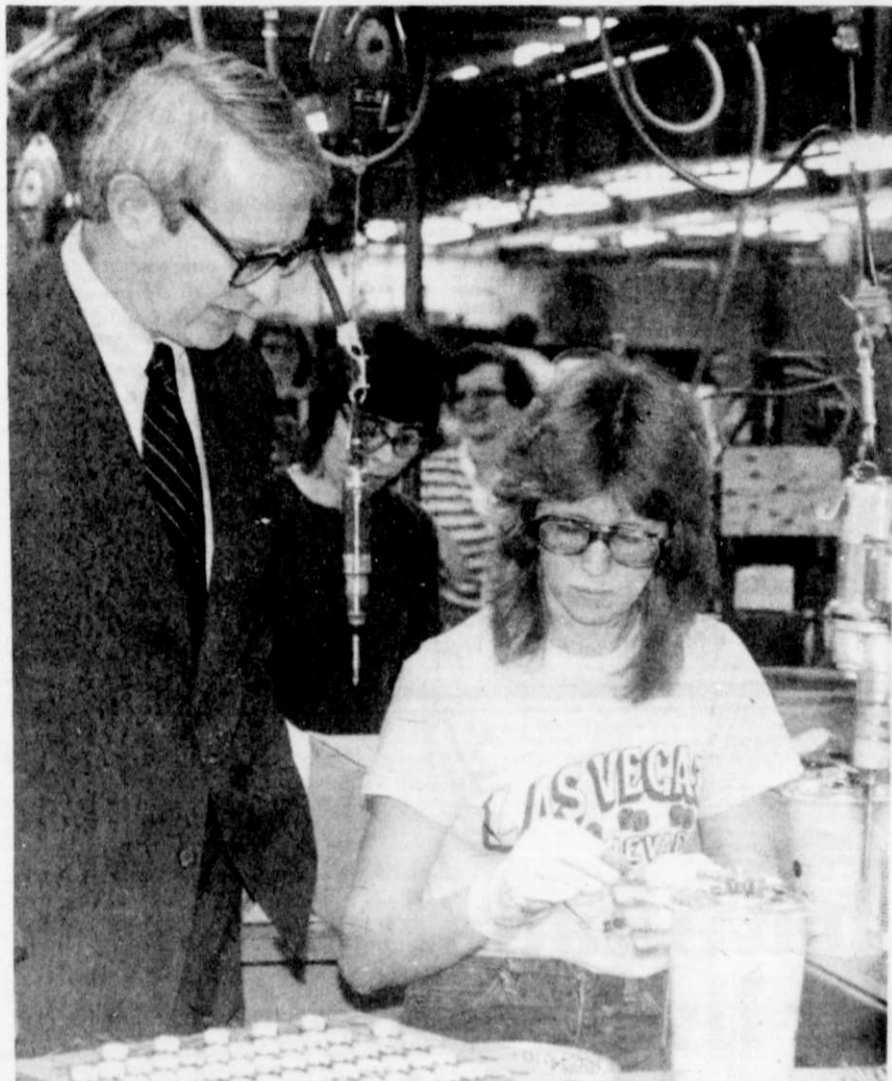

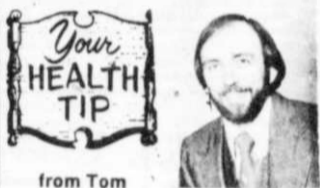

State Waysides to Be Open by May 4

All of the 204 waysides on the state trunk highway system, which have been closed since last Dec. 2, will be open by

Friday, May 4, in time for the opening of fishing season, the Department of Transportation announced today.

Don Jorgensen, chief state maintenance engineer, said wayside closed signs will be down, litter barrels in place, picnic tables and grills ready for use, and any barricades that prevented use of the parking areas during the winter will be removed by the first weekend in May. Waysides, except those on highways with an average daily traffic of 5,000 vehicles or more, are not plowed out in the winter, he said.

Jorgensen said 166 of the waysides have drinking water and restroom facilities with accommodations for the handicapped. Others have only picnic tables and parking areas.

He said the state's 31 safety rest areas, located on Interstate highways, are normally open the year around. However, this year, due to construction on the Interstate, the safety rest area and tourist information center at the Wisconsin-Illinois line will be closed May 5. Temporary quarters will be established 16 miles northerly on westbound I-90 near Janesville for the duration of the construction project.

OUTPATIENT SERVICES

The Washington County Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse is an agency funded to provide prevention, intervention and counseling services in the area of substance abuse. The counseling services include one-to-one, group, and couples counseling, as well as two new and innovative programs to serve adults and adolescents. The Comprehensive Day Treatment Program is designed as an alternative to inpatient alcoholism treatment for adults. It contains the elements of an inpatient program ie: education, group therapy, recreation and AA orientation but runs from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. thereby allowing the individual to continue living at home. The cost of the four (4) week program is approximately 5% to 10% that of usual drug and alcohol inpatient treatment.

The Comprehensive Adolescent Treatment Program is scheduled slightly different from the Day Treatment Program. Its hours are 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and from 10:00 a.m. to noon on Saturday. While the adult program strongly encourages family involvement in one of W.C.C.A.'s co-dependency groups and the

Family Education series, the Adolescent Program has family therapy scheduled as a direct part of the program. As well as participating in the Family Education Program the parents also participate in a group therapy session with the adolescents on Saturday mornings. Family involvement is encouraged in all the counseling services offered by W.C.C.A. for alcoholism affects the entire family, not just the alcoholic.

The Intervention Program attempts to identify high risk areas within the county in order to concentrate additional counseling and prevention service there. This part of program also assists employers and/or families in setting up interventions. An intervention is a meeting with families and significant others to help the alcoholic recognize the problem and need for treatment.

This usually involves several sessions with the family and whoever else may be involved ie, friends, employers, etc. before meeting with the alcoholic.

The Prevention Program covers a wide range of services. It provides drug and alcohol assessments to individuals referred by Schools, Depart-

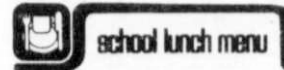
ment of Social Services, Probation and Parole, the Mental Health Center, attorneys, etc. These assessments attempt to determine whether or not a problem exists and to offer accomendations if a problem does exist. The Prevention Program also offers educational services to school, industry and other private and public organizations. This educational programming covers a variety of topics from alcohol/drug and their effects to the effects of alcoholism on the family to alternatives. The Prevention Program will do educational sessions or will assist in training schools and other organizations to do their own educational sessions.

W.C.C.A. offers a variety of services to a variety of people. It is funded by the Comprehensive Community Services Agency (C.C.S.A.) 51.42 agency, United Way and private funds. W.C.C.A. is also developing an active volunteer program and is open to suggestions on ways to provide new and better services.

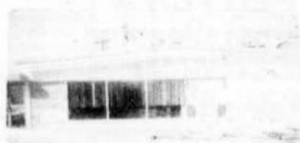

FISHING SEASON OPENS

Saturday, May 5

Looks Good for Fishing Opener

The opening of Wisconsin's 1984 general fishing season is Saturday, May 5th, and prospects look good for the opening this year. Inland water fishing is greatly improved because of the relatively mild winter and fewer winter fish kills reported.

Green Bay perch fishing is the best it has been in years and the Great Lakes are brimming with brown trout.

A reminder to anglers that the musky season opens on May 26th north of Highway 10 this year to protect them during their spawning period when they are most vulnerable. The later season opening for muskies in the north is also an attempt to curtail illegal harvesting of the species.

Anglers are also advised that there are several other regulation changes this year. Obtain a copy of the 1984 Fishing Regulations Pamphlet and study it. Some of the more significant changes are listed here.

Because southeast Wisconsin does not have enough trout streams and spring ponds to meet heavy fishing demands, the trout daily bag limit has been reduced to two trout in aggregate in Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Walworth, Washington and Waukesha Counties. This reduction should enable survival into the fall of a greater number of trout, thus spreading the catch throughout the open season. This bag unit does not include Lake Michigan tributaries upstream to the first dam or lake and other lakes (ponds) stocked on a put and take basis.

In an attempt to maintain a trophy fishery on Lake Superior tributary streams during the extended season, beginning October 1st, anglers will be permitted only two rainbow trout in the five aggregate trout and salmon daily bag limit. By reducing the rainbow trout daily bag limit during the expanded season, this migratory fish will better retain its reputation as a trophy fish. See page 20 of the 1984 fishing regulations for extended seasons.

Trout and salmon snagging is no longer permitted in the Fox River, Brown County or in the Oconto River and its tributaries in Oconto County. Due to the improved water quality of the Oconto and Fox Rivers, large numbers of walleyes can now be found in both rivers. Because of the increased walleye population, snaggers sometimes hook more walleyes than salmon causing substantial losses of walleyes. Nighttime fishing is now permitted on these streams.

A slot size limit on largemouth bass means that anglers may keep any fish caught that are below the minimum size and above the maximum size. For example, the slot size limit on the largemouth bass in Kimball, Mueller, and Sawyer Lakes in Langlade County is 12 inches to 16 inches. This means an angler

can keep largemouth bass that are less than 12 inches or greater than 16 inches. The daily bag is five. Any largemouth caught between 12 to 16 inches in the lakes must be released.

Slot sizes were established to allow these fish to grow up to the size where they can prey on panfish thereby controlling the panfish population.

Slot size limits also help to increase the size of game fish for sport fishing.

Other regulation changes include:

— Motor trolling is prohibited on all Vilas County waters except Smoky Lake.

— Fish refuges have been established on portions of Spider Creek, Sawyer County and Fisher and Catherine Lakes, Iron County.

The Department encourages anglers to practice catch and release and to obtain permission when using private lands to gain access to lakes and streams.

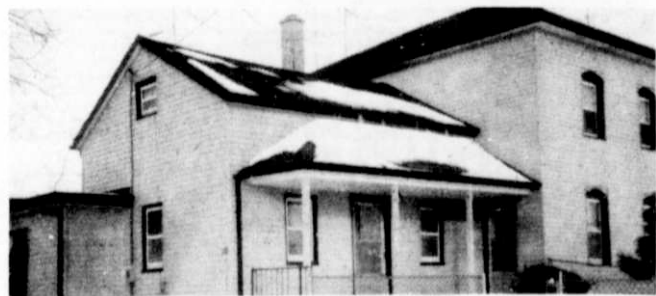

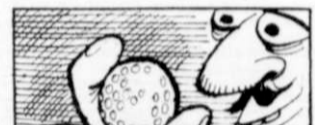
