## Fire Destroys Landmark Supper Club Dairy Daze June 16

The fire was discovered by Silver Creek resident Fritz Heimerl on his way home from work and the alarm was turned in at 5:15 a.m. Saturday

The West Bend Fire Department sent out its Air Tank truck to help the approximately 120 firefighters at the blaze replenish their air tanks.

## Village Board OKs Repair Projects

The Kewaskum Village Board gave the green light to two municipal repair projects at its meeting Monday night.

On a unanimous vote, the board approved the bid of Jack Walters & Sons for residing of, and addition of eaves to the Municipal Garage. Walters' bid of \$22,491.00 was approximately \$2,000 below projected costs for just repairing and painting of the block area which has been

plagued with water leakage problems.

The board also approved the request of Water Pollution Control Superintendent Pete Albers to do mudjacking and replacement of sidewalks around tanks at the treatment plant. The mudjacking is expected to cost \$680.00. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt indicated there was \$1,300 in the budget for such repairs. The balance of the funds will be used to cover the cost of

#### Tentative Agreement on Support Staff Negotiations

Representatives of the Kewaskum School Board and the district's support staff reached a tentative contract agreement for the 1984-85 school year. The new proposal, which will be presented to the full board at its next meeting, calls for a contract with a total package cost of 11.69%

The proposal includes a 5% increase on the salary scale, an additional 10c per hour after ten years and 15c per hour after fifteen years for longevity and experience, plus the entire cost of retirement benefits to be paid

replacing a section of sidewalk which was removed for pipe installation work.

Replacement of windows in the treatment plant's office and restroom will be postponed until next year when funds can be budgeted to cover the cost of the work which is expected to be about \$1,800.

On a 5 to 2 vote, the board approved a revised schedule of building permit fees. Mary Krueger and Tom McElhatton voted against the motion. Krueger told the board she felt some of the fees were already too high. She said that people were being taxed too much already. Even though it's called a fee, it's still a tax, noted Krueger. "You even have to pay a fee to move into your own house," she stated. Schmidt told the board the village had little control over the increases which are recommended by the Wisconsin Uniform Code Association. He also stated that many of the fees are passed right on to the state with the village receiving none of the money. On some permits, all we are allowed to keep is \$2.00 for handling the paperwork, said Schmidt.

The board approved the annual applications for Class A and B liquor and malted beverage licenses. The board also approved a Class B license for Campbell's Village Inn. Mrs. Ruth Campbell told the board she had received requests from some of her customers that she sell beer so they could have it with their meals. Campbell said she would just serve as a convenience to her customers and she did not plan on changing her hours to accommodate the selling of

Public Services Chairman Paul Blumer gave a report on the Town of Trenton's recycling program. Tony Peters, Town of Trenton Public Works Superintendent, gave a short presentation to Blumer and his committee at an earlier meeting. Blumer noted as one point of Kewaskum's recycling effort, the Kewaskum Lions Club had picked up over 50 tons of newspaper last year.

Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton informed the board 200 swim passes have been sold and the pool will officially open June 8th.

by the District. (Presently part of the retirement costs are paid by the employees and the balance by the District).

At the initial negotiations meeting in April, Support Staff reps presented a proposal asking for a 75c per hour increase for all full and parttime employees, all retirement paid by the District, the longevity steps, plus the remainder of their sick leave paid out to an employee when they retired. During that discussion the employees changed their proposal to ask for a 10% increase in place of the 75c an hour. The Support Staff Negotiations Committee came back with a counter proposal of

At Monday night's meeting, the Staff representatives presented a revised proposal asking for an 8% salary increase, longevity, full retirement, but dropping the sick leave payment item.

After some quick figuring by School Board representative Jean Goeden and Neal Weare and Business Manager Baird Stouffer, Weare told the meeting that proposal would equal a 15.2% increase for the total package. Stouffer explained the 8% salary increase and the longevity raises amounting to 2.2%, alone, brought the proposal up to 10.2%.

another hour's After negotiation, the two sides settled on the new 11.69% package which the Negotiations Committee will recommend for approval on June 11th.

Support staff negotiations cover non-union employees such as aides, secretaries, cooks and janitors.







#### **FCC Action Affects** Larger Telephone Co. **Business Customers**

GTE's larger business customers-and any customers who use AT&T long distance services-will be affected by several changes in telephone rates recently ordered by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

The revisions, which took effect May 25, include:

-A charge of \$6 per month per line on all business customers who lease more than jured.

 A 6.1 percent reduction in AT&T interstate long distance and WATS (Wide Area Telecommunications Service) rates.

-A charge of up to 50 cents per call for customers who use AT&T interstate directory assistance more than twice a month. The first two calls are

"Traditionally, about 40 cents of every dollar of long distance revenues have been used to help hold down the cost of local service. But with competition in the long distance market, that subsidy can't con-

Blanchard explained the FCC is taking steps to lower interstate long distance rates, remove the traditional subsidy and shift the cost burden back to local rates in the form of interstate access charges.

GTE business customers in Wisconsin will pay an interstate access charge of \$6 per line. Blanchard stressed only multiline customers pay access charges under the latest FCC

### Vocational Education In the High School

The age of electronics is opening up a new era. What used to be a simple project of putting together a few vacuum tubes, resistors, capacitors and wires has now evolved into a complex maze of integrated circuits and micro processors. The capabilities of these "chips" are unlimited in today's products—from handheld calculators that do complex functions in micro seconds to wrist watches that besides giving you the time also time events, remind you of important dates, wake you up in the morning, and even entertain you with a video game. Then there is the video field, with digital television circuits, video recorders, wide screen stereo television only to metion a few. The list could go on forever.

The students of today are faced with tremendous challenges and complexities which require much knowledge and understanding. To help prepare the students to better meet these challenges, classes are offered at the introductory level in electricity and electronics. In the first semester electricity, students are taught the basic laws and theories of electricity. They are given the opportunity to apply and use these theories by setting up experiments, using the same tools and equipment that will be used in the

more advanced phase. Upon completion of the first semester, the student should have enough basic knowledge of the electrical area to be able to decide if he would pursue it as a career.


Second semester electricity continues the study and application of laws and theories. Along with these areas, they branch off into two different areas. In one they study residential wiring, learning about the codes governing household wiring of circuits and appliances. With the knowledge, they are able to complete simple wiring circuits, hook up large appliances and wire motor controls.

Another area covered is electronics. Here the student studies simple circuits which are the basic for communication devices, video equipment and/or control equipment. They are given the opportunity to design and construct their own projects. Here they work with both simple and complex circuits, designing and constructing printed circuit boards, mounting components and finally testing the finished project.

The electricity/electronics courses give the student a general introduction into an ever-expanding area. With this they are then able to expand into their area of interest.



Washington county farmers have been approved for \$75,323.00 to install conservation practices under the ACP (Agricultural Conservation Program) according to Hilbert Scheunemann, Chairperson of the ASC Committee.

Under ACP, cost/shares are approved from 40% to 75% of costs to install practices. This is an incentive to encourage farmers to do work they otherwise would not do. Conservation practices have long term effects on saving the soil and preventing pollution of water.

The annual program participants are approved for \$32,231.00 while Long Term Agreements (LTA's) on 4 farms were approved for \$42,092.00. A LTA consists of total package where-by a farmer agrees to install every practice needed over a 3 - 5 year period. Many practices are involved in LTA's which are issued according to the schedule.

A breakdown of annual approvals is as follows: Permanent Cover on 15 farms for \$3,773.00; Stripcropping on 7 farms for \$10,016.00; Terraces on 2 farms for \$3,300.00; Diversions on 3 farms for \$3,095.00; Contours on 1 farm for \$574.00; Minimum Tillage on 6 farms for \$1139.00; No-Till on 7 farms for \$3,696.00; Sod

#### **Crop Reporting Time for County** Farmers at ASCS

All Washington County farmers are urged to report their crops to the ASCS Office immediately after planting according to Donald E. Sampson, Director of the county office. "Producers who did not sign up for the programs could benefit by certifying their acreages because the acreage will be used in establishing the 1985 base acres," Sampson said.

All persons in the set aside programs must certify and be in compliance as agreements are firm and binding. Acreages set aside must have a cover crop to protect the soil from erosion. Five day extensions are available by phone if wet conditions have delayed the seeding.

ASCS verifies that acreage reports are accurate by randomly checking farms with aerial photographs. Measurement service continues to be available at a modest cost to those wanting accurate official fields.

Acreage reports now taken daily on week days between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at the county ASCS office.






