Brig-O-Doon Operators Named in Foreclosure

Farmers and Merchants Bank of Slinger has begun foreclosure proceedings in an effort to recoup money that was loaned to owners and operators of the Brig-O-Doon Restaurant, 1139 Fond du Lac Avenue, which quietly closed its doors last March.

Named in the action are, David E. Doerr of Cedarburg and Robert A. Swoboda. formerly of Grafton, owners, who purchased the property from the Edwards family, and Richard H. Roehrborn and his wife Maria of Grafton, who operated the business since 1982. Swoboda is Roehrborn's

brother-in-law.

Swoboda, a real estate dealer who allegedly owes several million dollars to creditors in a three-county area, disappeared late last year and was reported missing by his wife. Stories began appearing in various newspapers regarding some of Swoboda's dealings and he was eventually reported to be living in California.

Farmer's suit indicates Swoboda and Doerr obtained a \$150,000 loan on the property and still owe over \$148,000 plus \$14,000 interest on it. The Roehborns were part of a fourway partnership on a \$30,000

The action also shows the Roehborns took out a \$30,000

loan in July, 1983, and still owe over \$29,000 plus interest on it. In September, 1983, they took out another loan for \$10,000 and owe over \$9,000 plus interest on

County records show back taxes for 1982 and 1983 amounting to \$7,330 are still outstand-

A hearing is scheduled for August 22, in Washington County Circuit Court. Russell Eisenberg, attorney for the bank, will ask that a receiver be appointed. In the suit, the bank is seeking to take possession of all the equipment and collateral so it can be sold and the proceeds used to pay the loan



Are Your Children "Latch-Key Kids?"

Summer vacation presents a special problem for working whose pre-adolescent children don't have the supervision that school provides. In many communities, after-school and summer day care for school-aged children is lacking. If it is present, some parents can afford it, but many others cannot.

These children between the age of six and thirteen fall into the category popularly referred to as "Latch-Key Kids." The term is symbolic of a child with a house key around her neck and who comes home to an empty house.

The increase of mothers in the labor force and the decline of the extended family has resulted in growing numbers of such children. Current estimates are that there are at least six million latch-key children, 13 years or younger in the United States

Latch-key kids aren't a recent invention. There have always been children who come from school, their friends's house, or activities to an empty house.

In past times, however, these kids weren't really alone. They could call Grandma, who lived a few blocks away, or they could go play at the neighbor's house. But this "safety net" is

largely absent today. Today, Grandma often lives in another city, and all too often most grown-ups on the block work during the day. More importantly, neighbors have changed. Adults are preoccupied and rushed at leisure and at work. The last priority on their personal agendas may be someone else's children.

The biggest fear of most latch-key children is that someone will break into their house. The second biggest worry is that they will be hurt by accident or fire. Aside from being anxious for their safety. such children are likely to be bored.

There are measures which can be taken to lessen these worries. Determine safety plans and discuss them with your children. Be sure youngsters know what to do if there is a fire, if they arrive home and think someone may be in the house unlawfully or if someone is hurt. They also need to know how to respond to strangers.


Have a back-up system - a neighbor or friend to call if a parent can't be reached or is too far away when a problem occurs.

Furthermore, plan with your youngsters a satisfying schedule of activities and chores. In addition to TV watching and snacking the child usually does, provide hobbies, games, books and pets to keep the child busy and occupied.



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First Jacob and Theodora Peters Family Reunion Held



The descendents of one of the Town of West Bend's early settlers gathered for a reunion at the K.C. Hall at West Bend on Sunday, July 22, 1984. Before coming to America, Jacob and Theodora Peters lived in Hommersum, Duchy of Kleve, Germany. All six of their children were born there. The youngest son, Anthony, was born and died at about 2 months of age in 1842 so consequently was buried there. The remaining children and their parents came to the U.S.A. in the Spring of 1858 settling in the Town of West Bend on a farm purchased from a Frederich and Katharina Seele on May 27, 1858. It is now Koch's Hickory Valley Orchard located on 18th Ave. between Paradise and Decorah Rd. The first house was a log cabin but they soon built a stone house which still stands today.

The children coming to America with their parents were: Gertrude, who married Peter Hacker and lived on the east side of Big Cedar Lake; John, who married Maria Kogl and lived on the homestead; Petronilla, who joined the School Sisters of Notre Dame and took the name of Sr. Emmeranna; Michael, who married Anna Marie Wagner and moved to a farm in the town of Trenton where they lived until they purchased another farm in the town of Polk in 1888; Gerhard, who married Susan Gonring and lived on a farm near the present day Cedar Lake Home. All had large families.

Relatives came from many parts of Wisconsin and six states - Arizona, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Texas, Washington, and Rome, Italy. More than 600 relatives attended throughout the day with over 500 being served the catered dinner.

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
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ELDERLY HEALTH CARE SPENDING

Although many in Washington have complained that the government's share of health care spending for people age 65 and over is dropping, new figures indicate otherwise. The health care study on the aged, released by the Health Care Financing Administration, contained new figures that show the government's share has actually increased since 1977.

The nation's 29 million elderly will receive \$120 billion in health care in 1984. This represents one of every three dollars spent on personal health in the United States, although the elderly constitute an eighth of the population. Other figures include:

-Older persons will spend an average of \$4,202 for health care in 1984, including \$1,900 for hospital costs, \$868 for doctor bills and \$880 for nursing homes. (However, most of this money won't come out of the elderly's pockets).

-Instead, Medicare will pay 49% of the health costs for the elderly, Medicaid almost 13% and almost all other federal, state and local government sources about 5.6%. All told, these government contributions come to \$80.5 billion or 67%. This compares to the 1977 share paid by the government of 64%.

-The elderly's portion of national personal health care costs has risen from 29% to 34.3% since 1977. (This is partly due to the increasing proportion of the population that is elderly).

-In both 1977 and 1984 Medicare paid 74% of hospital charges for the elderly. Medicaid and other government programs pay another 14 percent. In other words, government pays 88% of hospital costs of the elderly.

For other medical services, the ratio of government expenditures is lower. For in-

-Medicare and other government programs pay three-fifths of physicians' bills;

-48% of nursing home costs; -35% of costs for drugs, medical sundries, home care, eyeglasses and such.

The results of this study clearly demonstrate the government has not neglected the health care needs of our elderly despite what some have said. If anyone provides rhetoric to the contrary, he or she is simply distorting the facts.

Consumer Protection Materials

Sheriff Clarence Schwartz reminds Washington County residents that a wealth of information, free to the public, is available at the Sheriff's Department lobby.

Among the information supplied in a special pamphlet rack are materials on consumer protection issues, which have been published by the Department of Justice in Madison.

One popular item is a special form which consumers can fill out and mail to the Department of Justice if they feel they have been cheated by a dishonest business or mail order firm. The information also includes a special toll free phone number that can be used for further information on consumer rights.

The pamphlet rack also contains information on motor vehicle laws, and materials for parents and other concerned citizens on the dangers of drug abuse.

Sensenbrenner Seeks Presidential Award for Area Here

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Menomonee Falls) has asked President Reagan to consider awarding the prestigious "President's Citizen's Medal' to Scott Berner of Waukesha who saved the lives of three people this

Sensenbrenner told the President Berner that demonstrated unselfish heroism when he broke out the windshield of a burning truck that overturned June 21st on I-94 in Milwaukee's Marquette Interchange and pulled the three from the vehicle minutes before flames had engulfed the cab. Berner was injured in the rescue but the family, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Leadon and their 4-year-old daughter all of Portland, Oregon, escaped serious injury. Sensenbrenner said it was doubtful they would have been able to free themselves to escape the flames had Berner not rushed to their aid.

Sensenbrenner said the heroic act deserved the highest recognition. Milwaukee Fire Chief William Stamm has commended Berner for the rescue. Many citizens have written supporting letters. Sensenbrenner forwarded copies of the letters to the White House.

"I believe people of Wisconsin would be proud to see the Citizen's Medal awarded to Scott Berner in recognition for what he has done for others.' Sensenbrenner told the President. The Wisconsin Congressman, who was injured earlier this year escaping from a house fire, said he had great respect for the courageous act that Berner performed.




