## Candidates Make Final Push Before Election

Democratic presidential challenger Walter Mondale has made four campaign visits to Wisconsin and Republican incumbent President Ronald Reagan will make one last trip to Wisconsin as the National Election on Tuesday, November 6th, draws closer.

Besides the Mondale/Ferraro and Reagan/Bush tickets, eight other parties will have candidates on the presidential ballot in next week's election. David Bergland and James Lewis are running on the Libertarian ticket, Bob Richards and Maureen Salaman represent the Constitution Party, Larry Holmes and Gloria LaRiva are the Workers World Party challengers, Lyndon LaRouche, Jr. and Billy Davis are on the Independent Party ticket, Dennis Serrette and Nancy Ross represent the Wisconsin Independent Alliance Party, Sonia Johnson and Richard Walton the Citizens Party, Melvin Mason and Matile Zimmerman the Social Workers Party, and Communist Party candidates are Gus Hall and Angela Davis.

Other candidates have also been putting on an all-out effort

in these final days before the election. In the race for the Ninth District Congressional seat, Republican incumbent F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. will face opposition from two candidates, Democratic contender John Krause and Constitution Party candidate Stephen Hauser.

On the state level, Republican incumbent Scott McCallum can expect a fight from Democratic challenger Peggy Lautenschlager as she tries to win the post of State Senator for the 18th District. Lautenschlager, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law

Hefter will remain on as an employee of their company.

## Football Coach Fifrick Resigns

Mike Fifrick, who has head coached the Kewaskum High

football team for the last six years, leading them to their first ever E-W Conference championship last year, officially resigned as head coach last Friday night. Fifrick also indicated that he will not return as a math teacher next year.

Fifrick made the announcement to his players and assistants last Friday night before they took the field at Chilton. Earlier in the day, he informed District Superintendent John Long of his decision.

As to the reason for his departure, Fifrick wants to make one thing clear.

"I didn't make this decision quickly because of the disappointing season. I've been thinking about it for the last six or seven weeks. It even entered

my mind last year."

Fifrick continued, "At this time, I'm not looking forward to next year." He added, "In past years, even when we were losing, I felt there was progress and something to look forward to for next year, but after looking at all three Kewaskum teams I just don't feel there's anything positive to look forward to."

Fifrick said that lack of participation and interest has led to this negative outlook. Fifrick doesn't understand why there is so little interest and participation.

"Last year's championship season seemed to have no effect on the interest of the students." He added, "we're no different

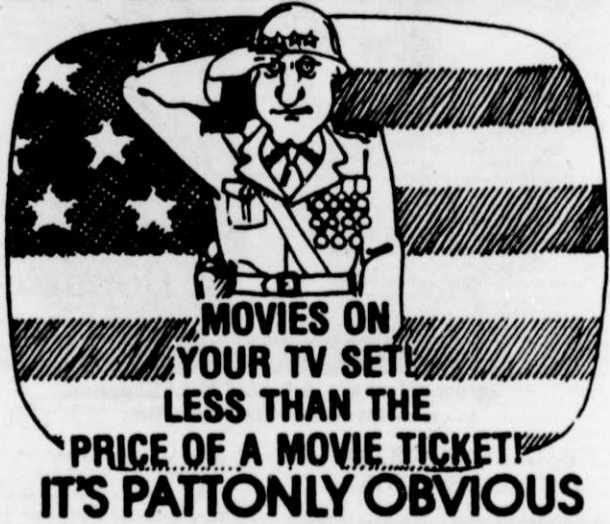

than any other conference school yet they (other schools) have around 90 (boys) out for football compared to our 60. . . you can't build with that."

Fifrick felt a junior high football program might help develop skills which would help make the freshmen and JVs more successful.

Fifrick ends his six year KHS coaching career with a 21-33 mark including the 11-1 record of last year and a birth in the WIAA State playoff finals. This year Kewaskum finished 1-7.

Fifrick remarked that he will leave with a deep satisfaction knowing that, "I did my best and the players gave their best. I have very good feelings about the past six years, but it's time in life to do something else."

The 32-year-old Kiel native says that he has no immediate plans for the future, but he would like to coach and or teach somewhere else. He added that a non-teaching job or graduate work are some other possibilities.

School, is a practicing attorney in Oshkosh.

In the State Senate 20th District, Democrat Sara Lee Johann is running against Republican candidate Donald Stitt for the seat held by Senator David Opitz who decided not to seek re-election.

The post of State Representative for the 59th District is also up for grabs as incumbent Esther Luckhardt decided not to seek re-election after being in office since 1962. Democratic candidate Pat Gruber Jerominski will be going against Republican challenger Dwight York in an effort to win that seat in Tuesday's election.

On the county level, incumbent Republican George Nehrbass will face two foes, Democratic challenger Richard Ehrlich and Independent Jeffrey May, in a contest to retain his position as Washing-

ton County Clerk.

While there will be several other offices throughout the area up for re-election, the incumbents will be running unopposed.

## UW Campaign: Slow, Steady

"Slow but steady" describes the pace for United Way's campaign count-down, according to co-chairman Margaret McFadden. "The extension announced last week provides needed time for us to reach everyone in the community to make this campaign a success," she explained.

Unit captains report that their canvass of business, industry and residential areas is half completed. In addition, the Senior Citizen volunteers have finished a mail solicitation to the rural areas.

The U.W. thermometer in front of Valley Bank registers \$10,000 pledged or donated so far. The campaign, also co-chaired by local dentist Steve Van Ess, is trying to raise \$30,000 to support its health and human service agencies.

Campaign coordinator at Regal Ware, Inc., Carol Dreher, estimates that employee contributions will run close to last year's figures. She pointed out that last year Regal Ware in Kewaskum experienced a tremendous increase - 128% - in employee donations over the prior year.

Although the total donated by Regal employees has not been tabulated, a spot check indicates more people are giving money this year, said Dreher.

The response signifies a real feeling of personal involvement in our community, believes Dreher. This year groups of employees viewed a United Way film "Real Heroes" prior to pledging their contribution.

Dreher, personnel manager at Regal Ware Kewaskum plant, noted other employees who worked on the campaign: Karen Schultz, Mark Meister, Aggie Dillinger, Vince Groh, Diane Buchel and John Coulter.

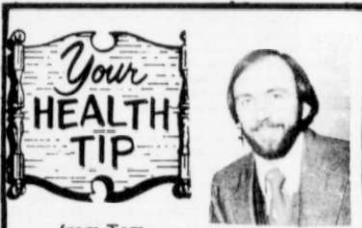

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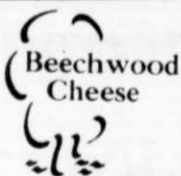

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## Kaneiss Painting Gifted to Gallery

The West Bend Gallery of Fine Arts is receiving for its permanent collection a gift of an oil canvas impressionist painting. The artist, Richard Kaneiss, who resides at Cedarburg, is employed in the Milwaukee Journal art department and is well-known in Wisconsin for his wildlife works and portraiture. Not as well known, but fresh and innovative, are his latest efforts in the abstract medium.

The donor of the painting, the Resident Council of the Cedar Lake Home Campus, has appreciated and enjoyed artist Kaneiss' talent for many years. In 1961 the Council commissioned him (choosing him out of a

group of seven Wisconsin artists) to do a painting of eternity for the focal wall of their new chapel. The special painting for the gallery was purchased from Mr. Kaneiss and presented to the gallery by the campus residents in appreciation for the gallery's community influence on the arts. Lucile Stock, Council President stated: "It is a real privilege for our residents to add this fine painting to the West Bend Gallery's collection. We are all most appreciative of the gallery's exceptional program for all the people of Washington County and beyond."

## Valley Bancorporation Reports Earnings Growth, Increases Dividend

For the first nine months of 1984, net income amounted to \$6,547,148, a 4.5% increase over the \$6,263,560 recorded for the first nine months of 1983. On a per share basis, 1984 totaled \$2.40 per share compared with \$2.30 per share a year ago. For the third quarter, 1984, net income totaled \$2,306,788, an increase of 10.2% over the \$2,093,797 recorded in the third quarter of 1983. On a per share basis, 1984 amounted to \$.84 compared with \$.77 a year earlier. Weighted average shares outstanding totaled 2,724,492 in 1984 and 2,718,469 in 1983.

As of September 30, 1984, consolidated assets totaled \$1.083 billion, an increase of

7.5% over the \$1.007 billion recorded a year earlier. Net loans as of September 30, 1984 amounted to \$625.4 million, compared with \$557.4 million recorded in 1983, an increase of 12.2%. Deposits climbed to \$922.5 million compared with \$848.7.

Stockholders' equity, showing a 10.5% increase over the previous year, totaled \$63.4 million compared with \$57.4 million recorded a year earlier. On a per share basis, book value at September 30, 1984 totaled \$23.25 compared with \$21.09 in 1983.

Recently, Valley announced the proposed acquisition of BANCWIS Corporation. Under the proposal, holders of

BANCWIS Corporation common stock would receive at their election and within some limitations, cash or common stock of Valley. BANCWIS Corporation, headquartered in Janesville, Wisconsin, owns the Bank of Wisconsin, Merchants Bank of Evansville, and BANCWIS Leasing Co., Inc. Total assets on September 30, 1984 were \$170 million.

Valley also reported regulatory approval for the acquisition of the First National Bank of Rhinelander, with a branch in Lake Tomahawk. The bank, located in Oneida County, had assets of \$55.9 million on September 30, 1984. The First National Bank of Rhinelander joined Valley on October 31, 1984.

Valley is still awaiting final regulatory and shareholder approval for the acquisition of Bank of Oregon. The bank,

located in Dane County, had assets of \$35.9 million on September 30, 1984.

At their October meeting the Board of Directors increased the quarterly dividend to \$.27 per share, or \$1.08 on an annualized basis. Previously, Valley's quarterly dividend amounted to \$.25 per share, or \$1.00 annualized. This dividend is payable December 7, 1984, to stockholders of record November 30, 1984. In discussing the 8% increase in the per share dividend, Gus A. Zuehlke, Valley's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer stated, "this will mark the eighteenth consecutive year in which Valley Bancorporation has increased its per share dividend and supports our philosophy of increasing dividends as Valley

continues to increase earnings."

After the Rhinelander acquisition, Valley Bancorporation, the fourth largest Wisconsin-based bank holding company, will serve Wisconsin through 40 banking locations with additional financial service companies engaged in leasing, insurance, data processing and trust service.

# HALLOWEEN in the Philippines (or KALAG-KALAG)

R. G. Edwards, M.D. is attending classes in Creative Writing at Concordia College near Mequon. The following news story is from one of his classmates:

There was never a real Halloween where I originally came from. It seems the younger generation had always been following ingrained customs. But to my surprise I had never seen a kid go out on Halloween in that part of the world. The kids in our block never donned ghostly costumes nor did they ever accept candies which in a way save many parents from endless worry of poisons, pins and accidents. Things may have changed by now. Suffice it to say that I am glad I don't miss that kind of frolic. But I do greatly miss the spooky feeling that our kind of Halloween brings.

Besides Christmas and birthdays, Kalag-Kalag or Soul-Soul is an event that everybody looks forward to with great anticipation, excitement and anxiety. To the old, it means temporary spiritual reunion with their beloved departed. To the very young it means play, fun and food. To the teenagers, it connotes a chance to meet someone exciting or a kiss and a hug in the dark with their boy friends.

Soul-soul stars on the eve of November 1st and lasts until the eve of Nov. 2nd. In preparation for the big event, all graves are weeded, cleaned, scrubbed and painted. Some of the affluent owners would bring their furniture and stereo sets. Others would bring cards, Chinese Checkers (mahjong) books and other entertaining paraphernalia. Everybody almost without exception would bring dishes and dishes of exotic food, drinks, flowers and candles. The grave becomes a table of sumptuous feast where sparkling dishes and finest silverware are displayed. Whenever all the candles are lit the cemetery becomes a glowing city. Everybody would stand around the grave, the elders would start their incantation, the young ones will follow and the priest will come to bless each and every grave. After the ceremony everybody prepares to go

home. Everything else stays. The food is supposed to be consumed by our deceased relatives. If it appears to be untouched next morning it means the dearly beloved departed had been offended by our actions or words the preceding year.

My mother had always claimed that our departed ones are never really departed from this world. Instead, they are always hovering over us, protecting us and even helping us in times of dire need. She would always insist that a Holy Mass be offered to the faithful departed at the beginning of this yearly event. She also bought the biggest candles and the prettiest wreath around.

Our cemetery is a conglomeration of small, big, cheap expensive, antiquated or modernized graves. A grave may be as simple as a mound of earth with only a rock as a headstone or it may be as expensive or modernized as a half a million\$, a gorgeous vault complete with marble walls, tile roofs, exquisite furniture, jade ornaments, sterling candelabra and dazzling neon lights. These kinds are the hallmarks of rich Chinese merchants who would stop at nothing to honor their dead.

## Elected to County Posts

County Highway Commissioner Frank Scharrer was re-elected to another two-year term in that post at Monday's County Board meeting.

An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

In order to vote for president and vice-president, the elector shall make a punch in the hole indicated on the presidential ballot page by the names for the set of candidates for president and vice-president for whom he or she intends to vote, or depress the button or lever next to the set of candidates for president and vice-president for whom he or she intends to vote. The vote shall be counted for all the presidential electors of those candidates.

If an elector wishes to vote for all candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall make a punch in the hole indicated for the party name of the ticket for which the elector intends to vote, or depress the lever or button under the party designation printed at the top of the ballot. Unless another name has been written in, or a punch made for a candidate for the same office in another party or a sticker applied, a punch in the hole or a cross in the circle at the top of the column for the party indicated on the straight party ballot is a vote for all the party's candidates listed on the ballot. If an elector does not wish to vote for all the candidates nominated by one party, the elector shall make a punch in the hole indicated on the ballot page for the candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or shall insert or write in the name of a candidate and the office on the ballot envelope provided, or separately depress the levers or buttons next to each candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote, or shall insert or write in the name of a candidate.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two ballot clerks or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching his or her ballot may be taken into a booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, deposit his or her ballot, enclosed in the envelope provided, in the ballot box and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The presiding official may administer an oath to a person making such declaration. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

**Campbellsport School Dist. Receives Grant of \$35,485**

The Campbellsport School District has been notified by state Supt. of Public Instruction Herbert Grover that it will receive \$35,485 to provide services and programs for handicapped children.

Joe Bertone, school district administrator and project director, said the funds will be used to purchase Cooperative Educational Services Agency (CESA) 6 services, as well as special education materials and equipment, to help all special education children in the district.

The funds are made available under a federal law designed to provide a free, appropriate public education for young

people ages 3 to 21 who have exceptional educational needs, Bertone explained.

More than 140 grants will be awarded during the 1984-85 school year based on the number of handicapped children identified in each school district. DPI will administer the \$18 million state program, 75 percent of which will flow directly to local school districts or other educational agencies.

Funds may be used for salaries of instructional and support staff, purchase of special materials and equipment, specialized evaluations, vocational education activities and inservice training.

## 25 Years Ago

October 30, 1959

### Farm Credit Initiatives Set to Go Into Operation

Regulations for implementing President Reagan's Farm Credit Initiatives have been completed and are being distributed to Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) field offices, Charles W. Shuman said today.

The regulations provide for a one-time debt set-aside program for FmHA borrowers and loan guarantees for non-FmHA borrowers.

In addition, Shuman has developed guidelines which County Supervisors will use in

signing contracts with local non-Government lenders and farm management specialists. These specialists will provide additional advice and assistance to financially distressed farm borrowers.

In both cases, the action will restore farmers to a positive cash flow position.

"With field office training underway, we will have everything in place for the successful launching of this program,"

Shuman said.

Under the plan announced recently by the President for farmers experiencing serious financial difficulty, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent, to a maximum of \$200,000 of a borrower's debt for five years without interest.

For non-FmHA borrowers, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a loan if the lender

is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the debt.

# Disappointing Indians Lose to Chilton, 16-14

Kewaskum's 1984 football season of suffering drew to a close last Friday night in a disappointing 16-14 loss to Chilton in Chilton.

The loss dropped the Indians to sixth place in the E-W with a final 1-5 conference and a 1-7 overall record.

Coach Mike Fifrick summed the game up in one word, "disappointing."

Yes, disappointing it was. It even started out that way.

Both teams came out flat in the first quarter. Chilton's opening drive advanced to the Kewaskum 21 before Tiger runningback Tim Hephner coughed up the ball to Indian DE Rick Heller.

However, Kewaskum couldn't move the ball after the fumble and was set up to punt on fourth down. The snap from center sailed past Mark Follmann and out of the endzone for a Chilton safety.

Fifrick commented that this safety "increased their (Chilton's) intensity," also noting that Chilton hadn't won for five weeks before last Friday, and that this also inspired them.

Kewaskum had problems of their own. Follmann played the game with an injured ankle which decreased his mobility and LB/G John Gundrum was ejected from the game in the second quarter for allegedly "swinging" at a Chilton player.

Chilton ran their lead up to 8-0 with 2:55 left in the 1st quarter when QB Todd Eisner hit End Terry Owens for a 14 yard TD pass.

Kewaskum got on the board mid-way through the second quarter when Follmann took a 1-yard sneaker into the endzone, capping off a 29-yard drive set up on a Mike Geldreich interception.

Chilton, however, came right back on their last possession on the half. Eisner plowed over from the one and at halftime it was 16-6 Chilton.

Defense kept both teams at bay in the second half. Long possessions by Chilton made up of many rushes ate up the third quarter clock.

With 5:07 left in the game Kewaskum struck back with an 11 yard scoring pass to Geldreich from Follmann. On the extra-point, the holder, Tom Herriges, took the snap and rolled out to his right and hit Tim Dettmann for the two points to make it 16-14, Chilton. This is how it ended as Chilton with the help of Hephner, who rushed for 133 yards on 18 carries, ate up the remaining time as the Indian defense

failed to get the ball back.

Follmann, the E-W's leading passer, finished with 185 yards on 18 out of 33 passing. Herriges caught 5 for 47 yards to up his E-W total to 29 and finish the season as the conference's leading receiver.
