Long indicated that while Kewaskum students were above the mean national average in scoring, he thought there were two areas which could be improved upon to raise Kewaskum's scores even more.

Long felt the two problem areas were language usage and problem solving in Math. Addressing language usage, Long said, coming from German backgrounds, students from communities like Kewaskum and Sheboygan have a tendency to place some portions of sentences out of order.

Referring to problem solving in math, Long felt there was room for improvement. High School Instructor Fran Charland said one reason for difficulties in this area was students don't

# Pills Taken From Local Pharmacy

Police are investigating the theft of prescription pills from Kewaskum and West Bend pharmacies over the weekend.

About 2 p.m. Sunday, the pharmacist at Kennelly Pharmacy, 927 Fond du Lac Ave. (Kewaskum Mall), reported the theft of two bottles of tranquilizers. The pharmacist said three men were involved, and used a diversion tactic to get the drugs. They "snuck behind the pharmacy counter and snuck out the back door," pharmacist Thomas Leitzke said. Leitzke got the license number of the group's car.

Three bottles of Valium, valued at about \$240, were taken from a shelf at Snyder Drug, 1517 W. Washington St., West Bend, in a similar incident about 3:30 p.m. Sunday, West Bend police said. Two males and a female are being sought. One man asked the pharmacist for help while one of the others took the pills, police believe.

Shortly after the incident, a man fitting one of the suspects' descriptions was seen in the K-Mart Pharmacy, 230 N. 18th Ave., West Bend. Police were unable to locate the man.

Police were investigating the three incidents.

West Bend police described two of the white male suspects. One is about age 30, 5 foot, 11 inches, with dark collar-length hair. The other is about the same height, with brown bushy hair, about age 25.

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

# 4-H, FFA Members Must Register Meat Animals for County Fair Soon

Washington County 4-H and FFA members that plan on exhibiting and selling meat animals at the 1985 Washington County Fair will need to get their projects entered soon. The County Livestock Sales Committee has organized the programs for the upcoming year.

One of the major changes will be the addition of dairy steers to the program. Dairy steers are an important part of the beef industry in Washington County and Wisconsin, and will hopefully be a part of the county livestock project.

Those individuals planning on entering beef animals will need to get their animals entered by November 28, 1984, or bring the registration form along with you the day your animal is weighed in.

Entry forms and information will be sent out to all past families that have exhibited beef, to all beef project leaders and general leaders in each 4-H club and FFA chapter. We hope to be able to reach most of the individuals that are interested in the beef project. Individuals not receiving information can contact the Washington County UW-Extension Office.

Exhibitors entering steers will need to bring them in for weigh-in on either December 1 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Kewaskum Frozen Foods in Kewaskum, or December 8 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Family Farm Meats in Allenton. All steers brought in must be born on or after January 1, 1984. At the time of weigh-in all steers must be castrated and dehorned.

Exhibitors may weigh in two beef steers and/or two dairy steers. Dairy steers must have

only dairy breed blood and not beef breed blood.

Livestock projects are educational projects. Exhibitors will need to complete the feeding plan, record sheet, and participate in at least two educational programs in order to sell their animals.

Individuals with further questions or needing information can contact the Washington County UW-Extension Office.



Dramatic Rise in ATV Related Injuries




According to a recently released report, the Consumer Product Safety Commission has found a dramatic increase in the number of accidents, deaths, and injuries directly related to the rising use of three-wheel bicycles known as all-terrain vehicles.

The report, released by the Commission's chairwoman, Nancy Steorts, indicated injury from all-terrain accidents had increased from 3,000 in 1979, to more than 27,000 in 1983. The rate of injuries for the first nine months of 1984 has almost doubled over 1983 totals with an estimated 53,000 so far. At least 44 deaths in 1982 and 1983 can be directly attributed to ATV accidents.

Approximately two-thirds of the victims involved were between the ages of 5 and 24. Presently there are no safety instruction programs, and few laws governing the use, licensing or minimum age standards for these vehicles.

The commission is expected to carry on its investigation and hold additional meetings with representatives of the ATV industry.





# Winter Road Reports Begin

The 24-hour winter road condition information service will begin for Wisconsin motorists in time for gun deer hunting season, the state Department of Transportation announces.

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The service was scheduled to begin Nov. 15, or earlier if weather conditions warrant, said James W. San Sistine, administrator of the Division of State Patrol. Callers will hear a taped message updated a minimum of four times during the 24-hour period or as road conditions change.

In Madison, the number to call is 266-7040; in Milwaukee, the number is 342-2211; motorists in other parts of the state and from bordering states (Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota and northern Illinois) should call the toll-free number: 1-800-ROAD-WIS (762-3947). The same report is heard on all three numbers

Road condition information is reported by Wisconsin State Patrol and transportation districts for compilation in Madison into a statewide report of primary traffic corridors. Key counties are contacted routinely to keep condition reports current, while others are contacted as a storm approaches or if conditions are changing

Purpose of the recorded reporting service is to provide road condition reports on a statewide basis and to keep telephone lines to State Patrol districts open for reporting accidents or other emergencies that may occur, Van Sistine

The winter road condition reports will be maintained until about the middle of April. During the summer months, the same numbers can be called to obtain detour information.



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# MY MOST MEMORABLE THANKSGIVING

The following news story was written by Olivia A. Luib, M.D., a classmate of R. G. Edwards, M.D., Kewaskum, who is attending classes in Creative Writing at Concordia College near Mequon:

It was mid-September. Upper New York was a gorgeous sight. The foliage had turned into all shades of red, yellow and brown. I woke up feeling some discomfort. I was not due until the last week of the month but something inside me announced that my time had come. Soon the discomfort became real pain and the time interval narrowed down to just a few minutes. I had my living quarters within the hospital compound and I could have easily walked to the Admitting Office but walking was no longer easy for me. Besides, who wants an accident in the corridor. So, I phoned for a wheel chair to the Interns' Quarters. No sooner did they put me into bed when I completely passed out both from fatigue and a sedative injection. When I woke-up, a little bundle was beside me with dark hair and brown eyes. He was a darling. I cabled my husband who was three thousand or more miles away from me. I also called my brother in Chicago and my brother-in-law in California. My co-interns bought a big bouquet of multicolored chrysanthemums.

I was discharged three days later and I found myself in the Interns' quarters again. I had no other place to stay with the baby. At sixty dollars per week, I could not afford an apartment in Bronxville, New York, where I lived and worked. A full time babysitter was also out of question. I managed to go back to work after one week. Of course I had to ingest a mouthful of Darvon compound, so much so that I often seemed to float instead of ambulating. My friends and co-interns managed to baby-sit for me on their days off. Everything went on smoothly until the baby started to cry a lot. Then I was really in trouble. The nurses, who also occupied the same quarters, started complaining to the hospital administrator. I was given an ultimatum: either I send the baby back home or move out of the hospital quarters.

I met a friend whose mother came to the United States just to baby-sit for them. However, they live about fifty miles from me. I made an arrangement with them that I would compenate them for taking care of my baby certain days of the week but that I would do all the butter are served with meals.

laundry, formula preparation, baby hygiene, etc. They were kind enough to agree but to commute almost everyday for about fifty miles one way, three bus exchanges, chilly autumn winds and a fragile bundle in your arms that was more than enough to dampen a strong will.

I decided to send the baby back home even though I knew it was going to kill me. I called the different airlines but no one would accept a baby less than three months old. By now the hospital had decided to send us home, both myself and the baby. With it, all my hopes, dreams and aspirations had turned to ashes. I remembered taking the stairs instead of the elevator so I could cry with every step I made.

"There is always a silver lining, back of every cloud you see," so goes a song I once knew. A young candygirl approached me and told me that her mother might like to take care of the baby in their home. They were in Florida vacationing at that moment but she would call them. A few days later she announced that her parents were willing to assume responsibility of the baby so I could finish my training. They came home a few days short of Thanksgiving. They lived close to the hospital in a town called Yonkers, New York. I entrusted my baby to them. I was free to go in and out of their apartment and above all they would not accept any monetary compensation. I celebrated my first and my most memorable Thanksgiving with them.



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# Minutes of Village **Board Meeting**

Regular Meeting November 5, 1984 8:00 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald F. Stollenwerk presided. All Trustee Members were present.

On a motion by Trustee Donald Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee David Nigh and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the minutes of October 15 and October 25, 1984.

The opening of the sealed bids for the Police Squad replacement for 1985 were as follows:

\$11,485.00. The bids were turned over to the Chief of Police for review and a recommendation.

On a motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Paul Blumer and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the applications for Operator's (bartender's) Licenses upon proper payment of fee and authorized the office to issue said licenses as follows:

NOTE: The Public Department had no objections to any of the applications.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the office to issue the building permit for a small addition to the home at 1511 Fond du Lac Avenue for Greg Ogi. The permit application was approved by the Building Inspector and the Zoning Administrator. The permit to be issued after payment of fees is received. It was made clear that the granting of this permit in no way approves the request of Greg Ogi to proceed with the conversion of his home into a Veterinary Hospital. This matter is to be addressed at such time a conditional use permit is heard.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed with the brief cor-Board some

respondence. Two letters pertaining to the remodeling of the Municipal Building were reviewed. The first was a letter from Fischer-Fischer-Theis, Inc., the architects; indicating it would be possible but economically and practically not feasible to design the proposed addition to accommodate a second floor at a future date for several reasons. The second letter from Ruekert & Mielke, Inc., the engineers, indicated that the cost would run an estimated \$30,000.00 higher and they they recommend that the proposed addition should not be designed for a future second floor.

The Board directed the Administrator to let both parties know they should proceed without a future second story.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed the proposed departmental budgets with the Board along with budget related

information. The entire proposed 1985 budget was then reviewed and discussed and the Administrator asked for guidance regarding the amount of increase, if any, the Board was seeking on the budget. It was the consensus of the Board to try to come in with a 0% increase and the rate per thousand for the village portion of property tax. It was also noted that the public hearing would be scheduled for November 26, 1984, at 7:00
