## Vacancy Exists for Village Board

### Competition in School Board Race

With only a few hours left before the 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, January 2nd, deadline, the administration office has said three candidates have filed papers for the spring Kewas-

kum School Board election.

Only two terms are expiring and incumbents Ralph Horner and John Spoerl will have some competition for their positions from newcomer Ronald Theusch.

Horner, from the Town of Farmington, is employed at the

Gehl Company. He has three children attending school in the district.

Spoerl resides in the Town of Wayne and is engaged in farming. He is single and has no children.

Both Horner and Spoerl are hoping to win their second terms on the board.

Theusch, of 5337 Highway 28, is also engaged in farming. He has one pre-school child. This is Theusch's first try for a position on the school board.

In the Village Board race, Administrator Dan Schmidt stated Wednesday there is still a vacant post for the Village Board.

The trusteeship of David Nigh is available since he has opted to run for board president succeeding president Gerald Stollenwerk, who will not seek re-election.

Schmidt said the opening could be filled by a write-in candidate. If not, after the election, the Village Board has the power to appoint someone to the job.

## Reigle Elected to West Bend Savings Board

Reigle has been an active participant in local and area political campaigns and has served on the Wisconsin Urban and Rural Development Board. He and his wife, Jane, are the parents of five children and reside in Kewaskum.

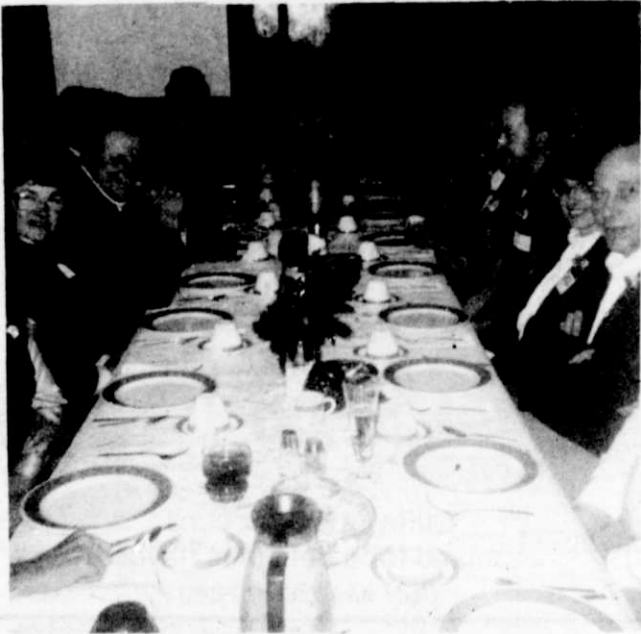

## Surplus Food Distribution At High School January 19

Washington County has received surplus commodity food items that will be distributed to eligible households on Saturday, Jan. 19, between 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. at the following seven locations.

West Bend, St. Frances Cabrini Church, 615 Hawthorne (lower level parking lot); Hartford, Municipal Recreation Department, 525 N. Main St., Germantown, Senior Activity Center, W162 N11960 Park Ave.; Slinger, Village Hall, 220 Slinger Road; Allenton, Addison Town Hall, Village of Allenton; Kewaskum, Kewaskum High School, north entrance; and Jackson, Jackson Fire Department, S. Jackson Dr.

Eligibility is based on the current monthly gross income (before taxes) of all household members with the following limits: Household size 1, income limit \$623; 2, \$840; 3, \$1,058; 4, \$1,275; 5, \$1,493; 6, \$1,710; 7, \$1,928; 8, \$2,145.

Eligible household will receive butter, processed cheese

and cheddar cheese. In addition they may choose one of the following: honey, cornmeal, flour or dry milk in amounts which will vary per household with availability of commodities and household size.

Home delivery is available for elderly and handicapped if there is no one in the household who can get to a distribution site. To make arrangements, call the distribution site in your area.

Persons are prohibited from obtaining commodity foods more than once during this distribution period. Violators will be referred to the district attorney. Also, these products may not be sold, traded or given away by any member of the recipient household.

This program is being coordinated by the Washington County Department of Social Services, and handled locally by various volunteer groups in each community.

Kewaskum's distribution is jointly handled by Kewaskum Kiwanis and FFA.

### Filing Time for Wool at ASCS

To avoid late payments, wool and lamb producers must turn in their 1984 sales receipts and file an application by January 31st.

Farmers who have a record of their wool and unshorn lamb sales are eligible for incentive payments only if the sales are reported to the ASCS office. This quantity sold does not affect the eligibility. However, sales slips should contain the month of shearing, month of sale, number of head shorn, pounds of wool (grease basis), and net proceeds. Shorn wool payments will be made only for bonafide sales documented on invoices prepared by the purchaser. Sales slips for lambs must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn.

Shorn wool is based on a percentage of each producer's return from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool in 1984 up to the support prices of \$1.65 a pound for wool.

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# MY SPECIAL PAM

The following news story was written by Gere Bomchill of Mequon, a classmate of R. G. Edwards, M.D., Kewaskum, who is attending classes in Creative Writing at Concordia College:

1985, just around the corner, what a year for us! You will be 25 years old...I can't believe this is all happening. I just sit here in complete amazement... My daughter 25, and May 19th, Attorney At Law. "Attorney!" I love that—classy title for such a classy person. What you have accomplished in twenty five years is superb and will not, as long as I'm around be forgotten. I'm so proud...When I was twenty five, I had two children, Pam—five years old, and Tim—four years old. I already started to worry about getting these two raised to the best of my knowledge, through college, and out on their own. I know you were just starting school, but you also know I plan ahead. I always wanted you and Tim to have more than I had. I'm sure you will want the same for your children.

June 1, 1960, I was lonely. I used to pray to God that you would come early. (I didn't care if anyone counted the months). I was bored with life (probably, because I couldn't work after I reached my seventh month). I wanted and needed someone to love—I also needed to be loved.

Nineteen years old, I'm lying in the labor room and someone (doctor or nurse, I don't remember), tells me the heartbeat of my baby is abnormal. It is going to be born mentally retarded. I was shocked, this was unbelievable. I knew I was RH negative. But the doctor had told me, with the first child, there was only a slim chance of having problems. I forgot the information and just kept praying for you to hurry. I wanted to see what had been growing in my body for nine months. Approximately one hour later, I began to hemorrhage. The doctor then informed me in a very monotone voice, "there is no heartbeat." I don't remember much after that. I assume they put me out.

Needless to say, you proved them wrong and I received "My Beautiful Pam." Your neck muscles were weak, they said you would take a longer time to hold your head up than normal. Who cares? You weren't even a blue baby. What a precious gift I received from God! One week later we went home. The next morning I had to go back to the hospital for surgery. The doctor had called my family together,

(which I never knew until later) not sure whether I would survive the surgery. I distinctly remember the worst part of this little episode was not the surgery. I became hysterical when my father told me he was going to take you, with Grandma, to Wausau. I wanted you in Milwaukee and my father drove too fast. The doctors told my father to calm me down before surgery. You stayed in Milwaukee with grandma. June 17th, for my birthday, I came home for the second time and our life together began.

I was not able to handle you for a few weeks, but I could talk to you, touch you, and even sing to you. In a way I still could not believe you were here and mine.

I stayed home until you were baptized; such a fine baptism. I had cut up my wedding dress to sew your baptismal dress, but that is one project I never finished. Aunt Viola came to my rescue.

At first you were a very crabby, whiny baby. Doctor said colic, only lasted a few months. Dad always commented on the fact that you looked like me and my father. I was so proud...

We began the baby shots at the City of Milwaukee Health Clinic. Everywhere I took you, someone talked and played with you...What curly hair! What beautiful big eyes! I just beamed.

You began to talk quite early (actually never stopped, that is why we nicknamed you Yap-Yap). Teething started, then walking, then the chicken pox, measles, mumps, etc.. You moved into a big bed when you reached one year old and at the same time threw your bottle away. Learning to walk, you fell into the toilet—first scar.

A short time later your brother arrived. You informed me that you would've rather had a sister. You asked if it would be possible for me to trade with Auntie Marleen... You soon accepted your brother and helped me a great deal with him (even when I didn't need your help).

We had to move then, because we had no heat. We moved to the northwest side of town, into a duplex below Uncle Albert and Aunt Esther. The environment was better for everyone. Those two people were the greatest, outside influence on you. Uncle Albert taught you German songs and prayers. When you were absent from my sight, I knew you were with Uncle Albert, chatting. He even took you to the zoo, when I

didn't think he could handle the two of you. But like he always said, no problem when mother isn't around. Remember the shows you and Tim would put on for them? Albert gave me extra money, so you would always have a butter cake on your birthday.

We took the train together to Wausau, to see grandma. I worked, but you had Grandma and Auntie Marleen, and a babysitter named Barb. Grandma and Auntie Marleen were babysitting when you fell in the toilet, Barb was fired because she let you drink beer.

I remember the night you fell out of bed (sleeping with me)... your tooth went through your lower lip...blood all over. Remember when you fell up the icy stairs? You did not want to hang onto my hand because you could do it yourself...When we arrived at the hospital, you were upset because you had blood on your hands and you wanted Dr. Ben Casey. Seven stitches...

Mom switched jobs, worked for Hillel Academy and a Rabbi. With the job you children were allowed to attend "Jewish Community Center Nursery School." I would always put your hair in a pug.

You did like nursery school, but always talked about "regular" school. Your first day of kindergarten, you had to take the bus to school. Tim and I walked you to the corner. (You did ask us to walk behind you—**independent**). The bus arrived. You walked to the rear, sat down, and...oh yes, waved good bye. I cried...my little girl.

What a year when you were six! First the tonsils out, and you going into shock on the table. Then pneumonia; I thought you weren't going to come home. I was yelling and screaming at the nurses and doctors because I didn't think you were being properly cared for. Really, I was scared to death. I had also found you in the bathroom on the floor, maybe once a year, you would pass out and throw up all over yourself. You explained to me that you would wake up with terrible pains in your stomach, go to the bathroom, and not remember anything after that. Doctor's diagnosis: Mild Epileptic...too mild for medication...worse effects from any medicine...probably would out-grow by your eighteenth birthday...You did.

Athletics, School Plays, Operetta, Studies, Brownies, Drawings, cheerleading, so many memories from grade school. I also know you and your brother volunteered me for everything and anything at school.

I remember you announced to

me, about the age of ten, "I am going to be a lawyer." (Bright Dreams). You succeeded as an athlete. I loved watching you play basketball. How about the time you pitched the no-hitter! Your brother ran right on the mound to give you a hug and kiss; he was so proud. (Warm Memories). I can still see you polishing your nails for school, when I questioned you because I knew you knew the no polish rule. You told me the rule was not being followed or enforced and this was your way to bring the issue up...How about when you couldn't get the Pastor to answer your questions about excommunication, so you cried. You told me you had to cry to get their attention. Finally, the principal explained to you some of the details, but you were not satisfied.

A very difficult Sunday for me, was the Sunday you fell out of the car, while I was driving. I had told you to get in the back, and you slid over the back and hit the door handle and out the door. I did not realize what had happened until I felt a breeze. After I got to you, I just held you and cried. Tim had fallen down the basement stairs about an hour before at Aunt Jennie's house. How about my great Mother's Day? Tim was sick Saturday night, throwing up all over. We were in a trailer house with no water. The next day, I heard a scream. I ran out (I knew the scream was from one of my children), and someone comes to tell me you are in the creek (the one I told you not to go in). Well I thought you had drowned. As I'm running to the creek I see you running towards me. Every time you hit the ground with your foot, the blood squirted all over the road. When I got to you, through your crying, you told me you can see the "guts" in your toe. The toe was hanging on, and that was all. The doctor saved your toe, but it does not bend. To this day Tim does not understand why he received a spanking, and you didn't for going into the creek.

The divorce bothered you a lot, because you thought we should at least take care of your dad. He didn't take care of himself. We went to hockey games for Tim, and went to ballet for you. Then the same week dad left, we acquired a new love, Dolly...

We moved to 47th Street, you seemed to like this house the best. We always had a lot of

company, mostly your friends. I always thought Jeffrey was especially nice. At least on 47th street, we had no birds flying at us and no more burglars (should have had a Mach 7). Remember Wendy? By the way, did you guys throw snow balls off the porch at cars or not? Here at this house is where we had a lot of girl talk and of course the normal arguments. During the summer you always took some kind of lessons, golf, swimming, etc.

On to High School, made volleyball, basketball, and choir. You always studied very seriously, much to your benefit. I was very happy to see how you handled your peers as far as drugs. Remember when you told me, someone said you couldn't be their friend if you didn't do dope. "Go to hell, I take care of my body, I'm an athlete, and I don't need your friendship." I again was so proud...

January, 1974, you were playing basketball, at Whitefish Bay, with 30 seconds left in the game. You took a terrible fall. I remember running onto the court, because you just didn't seem to be getting up. You were biting your lip, it was bleeding, and you also had a rash on your arms and upper torso. You told me you thought you better get up or you wouldn't be able to play anymore. I just picked up your head and told you to relax, because someone had to take care of your ankle (you were playing with a sprained ankle, but it was taped). You, very matter of factly, told me the problem was not your ankle, that you had dislocated your knee. Well Pam...when I looked down and saw your kneecap in the middle of your calf, I freaked. I yelled for someone to help, anyone. Your coach tried to snap the knee back in place, but it would not move. The ambulance was on the way. I have seen many bruises, cuts, and went through much sickness with you. This was by far the worst and grossest for me. The doctor put a cast on your leg for six weeks. (Dr. McCabe, the best). You did isometric exercises. The next six weeks you went to therapy, to strengthen the muscles that became weak from the cast. Do you remember the psychedelic crutches? After three months, Dr. McCabe performed surgery, six more weeks in a cast and finally more therapy.

When we went back to the doctor's office for a checkup, were you as surprised as I was to see the x-ray with the pin in your knee? What was that young girl's name in the hospital with you? I remember your nightmares, hearing that sound of tearing, that you heard on the day of your fall... In August of that same year, you came to tell me, all excited, that you could run again. In September you tried out for volleyball. You did not make the team. The coach felt you could not bend as well since surgery. October or November you tried out for basketball again and made it. I really did not approve of your playing sports anymore, although I knew you had to prove something to yourself. The first game you played in, you were okay, not the old Pam. The second game your other kneecap slipped out, but it snapped back in place with the help of your coach. (We had found out from Dr. McCabe that both of your knees were in bad shape). I don't know why that happened, because your knees were taped. I saw you ask your coach to put you back in the game. When you first went in, you were a bit laid back, and I thought — okay she'll play carefully. Well I don't know if you forgot there was a problem, or you thought this is enough of this. You played your best game. After that you gradually removed yourself from sports.

Just remember all the honors you received in high school — Christian Leadership Award, National Honor Society, Homecoming Court, Sang a Solo, 11th out of 358 Students, President of the Senior Class, and Milwaukee Lutheran's AFS Exchange Student. The two honors I remember the most are the AFS Student selection, first student selected from a divorced family. You went to stay with a family in Germany that you had never met. I don't know if I could've done that at your age. Thank God your new family was terrific. You announced to me one day after school, that you had put your name in for tryouts for a solo for the next concert. I know you were doing this for me. You were chosen and you sang "Little Girls"—best concert I ever went to. I still have the tape. You were nervous weren't you, probably the first time in your life.

You were never greedy. You never demanded I buy you clothes because all your friends had them. We discussed almost everything, and I love you for this. Remember your car, I guess it did serve a purpose... "THE BOMB."

Another low blow dealt to you and Tim was your father's sickness and death. I know how

happy you were when dad wanted to see both of you. Tim had remarked—"Now that dad is sick, maybe he'll remember his children." Then I had to tell you he was dying...One month you had a father...I really tried to chase the clouds away for you and Tim, always looking for a rainbow.

Mike Wolf-----First LOVE? When you graduated from high school, you couldn't wait to move out to your own apartment. I thought it was a good idea. As long as you worked and had social security to pay your rent, I couldn't see any reason why not...Remember we talked on the phone everyday, your first experience with cockroaches was devastating...

Marquette University was next. You tried accounting, but that was not for you. You made a lot of new friends and really went to a lot of parties, even learned how to play sheepshead. Graduation came, you had made the Dean's List three times, and now you had a Major in Foreign Languages and a Minor in Business. Remember the summer you went to study in Germany and I came over and spent a week with you. What was the apple stuff you tried to get me to drink? When I met your family I knew why you fell in love with them. Jens and Steffie were great, even if they didn't think I should be so tired. What about Wolfgang?

In 1982, you started Law School at Drake University during the summer and then onto Marquette in September. The first year was hell, But I never thought Randy helped the situation at all. After the first year, you planned your high school reunion. I am sure the reunion prompted you to lose weight and become a blonde. The seventy pounds you lost are still lost today; what an accomplishment. Your brother's band played at the reunion. Remember when all your friends came to tell you, they knew he'd be there somehow! You also were being told how much you looked like your mother again. Of course, we know you had many of the same actions, that I did. Remember the day Bill asked me a question, then asked you the same question and got the exact same answer. You don't have to smoke though, just because your mother does.

Second year of Law School, Pam Wirbinsky, again became active. Elected Class Representative to Women In Law, Project Outreach, Teaching Students, Moot Court, 5th Place out of 80...Your friend's death threw you for a loop temporarily, but you planned a beautiful Memorial Service for her.

You went to work for Attorney Howard Mitz; what an

experience. I remember you calling me at work to tell me you had been selected to work for a Judge in Appellate Court, and you saying this is an "honor." At the same time you asked me if we could handle honors. You would not get paid for this; only credits. We handled the honors. I really had to laugh when you volunteered me to speak at the Marquette Law School, to the new parents of students. I had fun doing that and really felt honored.

It is getting closer to your graduation—Attorney Pam. I know you have new fears about entering the world as an attorney and making decisions. I must quote your brother at this time "Don't Worry." You will handle all problems quite well. You will make many stupid errors, just remember not to make them twice. You are a Christian and God is with you.

Through all the highs and lows, you've made it. I will not promise you a bowl of cherries. You will also have many great and happy experiences. Don't dwell on the rough times, but always the happy times. Always be thankful you are here and in good health.

June 1st, I am having a party because we finally made it through Law School, and of course, you have arrived at the wonderful 25.

I am so thankful I had you...I am so proud...Yes, I will probably cry at graduation—just don't look at me. I LOVE YOU...

The three of us had a great life...remember all of our trips, New York, Florida, New Orleans, etc. There isn't anything I would want to change—or anything I want different from you...I have had it all...I am a very lucky mother because of you. I'm not buying you a graduation card, even though all the verses and poetry I'm sure were written for you. I wanted to write and tell you how much I Love You in my own words (You know I can't write poetry). I Love You most of all

because you are PAM...You are a beautiful person...a never-ending source of happiness and pride... Remember you may have become a woman, but to me you are my little girl...Don't change too much...

God Bless - I Love You More..

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## MPTI's Reentry Women Project Serves Displaced Homemakers

You've been a homemaker for 10 years, washing the dishes, cleaning the house, doing the laundry, and otherwise being the unpaid caretaker of your family. The children are out of diapers now, but still need your care. All of a sudden, you find yourself widowed or divorced. You haven't been in the labor market for a decade or more, your skills are rusty, and you aren't confident you can find a job and keep your family together. What can you do?

Moraine Park Technical Institute's Reentry Women Project is an excellent option for you and other displaced homemakers. The project is receiving \$127,000 this year to serve 300 displaced homemakers at sites in Beaver Dam, Fond du Lac, and West Bend. Funds come from the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), the Vocational Education Act (VEA), the State of Wisconsin (through the Wisconsin Displaced Homemaker fund), and the Moraine Park VTAE District.

What is a "displaced homemaker?" This is a person, almost always female, who has been the primary caretaker in the home, without pay. Through separation, divorce, death, retirement, or disability of spouse or other family member, this person has lost the major source of income for the home and family. The person may be employed but not meeting her potential or the needs of the family unit. In many of these cases, lack of marketable job skills and low self-confidence combine to make getting a job or upgrading a present job seem an impossibility.

How serious is the problem in Wisconsin? Over 200,000 women in the state aged 35 to 65 are widowed, divorced, separated, or married to a disabled mate. Many of these people have little or no preparation for finding or holding a job. They do not receive unemployment compensation and they are generally ineligible for social security or public assistance, except for food stamps and general relief. They are frequently without medical insurance and often face legal and financial problems. The lack of job skills, compounded by age and sex discrimination, severely limit their employment options.

How can the Reentry Project help? Each month, a Reentry class begins at the three project sites in Beaver Dam, Fond du Lac, and West Bend. The class runs for three weeks, four days a week. These classes are absolutely free for participants. During the three-week sessions, the women work together with instructors to assess the labor market, their life/career goals, and their skills and interests.

Project participants engage in confidence building exercises, and share common concerns about family problems, age and sex discrimination, and reentry into the labor market. Career exploration and counseling occur. Instruction is provided in job seeking and interviewing techniques. Skills training and educational opportunities through MPTI and other channels are investigated. Job clubs, on-the-job training, and other work experiences are made available to participants. Job placement, support services, and assistance following completion of the program are also offered to project participants.

The Reentry Women Project already has a successful track record. Since its inception at MPTI's Fond du Lac Campus in 1982, more than 360 women have successfully completed the program. Expanded to West Bend in 1983, the project has seen more than 100 of its "graduates" go on to jobs in unsubsidized employment. More than 200 project participants have enrolled in further training and educational programs at Moraine Park.

The expanded services made possible by this year's increased funding include the addition of the Beaver Dam site and increased staffing. At present, the staff includes Sonia Rasmussen, project manager; Mary Jo Reichenberger, instructor at MPTI's Fond du Lac Campus (recruitment in Fond du Lac is handled by Shirley Rufener of Advocap); Ann Stoffel, project specialist, and Linda Olbinski, instructor, both at MPTI's West Bend Campus; and Mary Hickey, project specialist, and Christine Lefebvre, instructor, at MPTI's Beaver Dam Campus.

### EXTENSION VOLUNTEERISM INCREASING, NATIONAL STUDY FINDS

Volunteers—the backbone of the Cooperative Extension Service's 4-H Program — are changing in numbers and interests, causing changes in 4-H itself.

A recent national study illustrates the importance of volunteers to Cooperative Extension. One of every 80 Americans works as a volunteer in Extension each year. For every day an Extension professional works, a volunteer works 51 days, time that is worth more than \$4.5 billion a year nationally. Three-fourths of the volunteers donate their time to Extension 4-H, home economics, agricultural, or community resource development programs, or were Extension Master volunteers.

The national study, funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the University of Wisconsin-Madison, randomly selected 315 counties in the United States, of which seven were in Wisconsin. They included Washburn, LaFayette, Vernon, Dunn, Grant, Washington, and Brown Counties.

A 1983 Gallup poll which looked at all volunteers in the United States had direct implications with 4-H. It found that the number of Americans who volunteer their time increased to 53 percent of the population, up from 51 percent in 1981. The increase was mostly due to large numbers of male volunteers.

Fifty-three percent of U.S. men were volunteers in 1983, six percent more than in 1981. The number of female volunteers—although it could be expected to decrease as more women join the work force—remained at 56 percent.

"These figures, especially the increase in interest by male adults, have a lot of implications for those of us in Cooperative Extension," says Jim Everts, State Extension 4-H Program Leader.

As a way to tap male resources, 4-H has emphasized a total family approach in which both men and women are involved in 4-H events with their children. Family camping, family enrollment, and family information packets have all been stressed.

The Gallup poll also showed that more people in the 24 to 29 and 30 to 49 year-age groups are volunteering. "For parents participation is natural because it's their children who are involved in 4-H. But it also offers us the opportunity to reach out and tap people who

are not parents but are interested in education," says Everts.

The amount of time people spend in volunteer work is also changing. "There's more commitment to the volunteer role but not necessarily for a long period of time. Traditionally, we have had volunteers stay in this role year after year. Now we're seeing leaders who are interested in short-term, specific assignments in a topic area," explains Everts. Adults will often volunteer to help out with two or three projects in a certain area, like electronics or woodworking, and when the projects are finished so is their time as volunteers.

"Patterns of leadership do influence the way we offer programs, especially in the urban areas," says Everts. More groups are completing in-depth, exploratory projects in a particular area in six to eight sessions. Then the project ends or is continued in a more advanced unit. "We've moved toward this style because of changing trends among the people interested in working with the youth program," says Everts.

However, the traditional and core part of 4-H is in rural and non-farm areas where clubs are committed year-round.

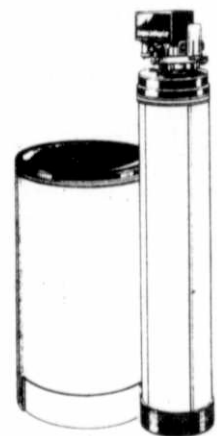
#### TRAVELOGUE

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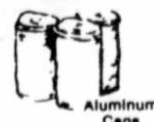
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**TAX RELIEF**

This January, everyone will enjoy a benefit on their federal income taxes called "indexing." This means your taxes will no longer be distorted by bracket creep, or the tendency of taxes to rise automatically with inflation in a progressive tax system.

During the inflationary seventies, Congress funded its Great Society programs often without having to cast a single vote to raise taxes. As inflation pushed more and more Americans into ever higher tax brackets, the government's take soared. At the same time, working Americans just broke even, or actually lost out, with every "cost-of-living" pay adjustment forcing them into higher tax brackets. In other words we have had "taxation without representation."

To end this form of secretive tax increases, the President included indexing as a part of his 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act. I strongly supported the indexing proposal which went into law in 1981 and went into effect January 1, 1985.

All wage earners will benefit, and the lower income groups

will gain the most. If you have entered the workforce for the first time, and expect to earn more, then you will see the largest percent of savings. For example, a family that earns \$12,000 a year will see its taxes lowered by more than 8 percent in 1985. Someone earning more than \$50,000 a year will save about 3 percent.

Although tax indexing may seem at first to be a rather technical tax matter, it actually holds the key to controlling the future growth of government spending and preventing the resurgence of spiraling inflation. The indexing of the personal income tax is a fundamental and far-reaching aspect of Ronald Reagan's tax program. Because indexing benefits all income groups, it should allow for a larger national pool of saved income, which will increase precious capital needed by U.S. industry for job creation. When you create more jobs, you're expanding the local tax base and investing in our children's education as well as other things that lead to a greater quality of life and opportunity for all.

**KEEPING GOOD FARM RECORDS**

Good farm records are an essential part of any farm business. Records are needed for a number of different purposes including income taxes, measuring your financial position, working with your lender, evaluating the performance of the farm, and many other uses.

There are a number of different kinds of record systems, beginning with the simple hand record books all the way to very detailed computerized record keeping programs. The most important thing about any record system that is selected is that it's one that the individual understands and uses.

A record system also needs to meet the needs of the individual business. Was your 1984 record system adequate and did it meet your needs? If not, you may wish to consider starting 1985 with a new system.

The Washington County Cooperative Extension Service has copies of record books for farmers to use. Farm management specialists have developed a series of farm record books. The first one, "Book One," provides for recording the income and expense items, capital purchases and sales, and other information required for income tax purposes. "Book Two" provides for a more detailed record keeping system with a cash flow statement, and the ability to calculate a farm business analysis. Record books are also available for inventory and depreciation items, and a

"Crop Record Book."

At the present time "Book One" has a price of \$4.50, "Book Two" is \$2.00, the "Inventory and Depreciation Schedule" is \$3.50, and the "Crop Record Book" is \$3.00. Prices may change when current inventories are used up.

A less detailed farm account and record book is also available for business that may not require the indepth records of the above record book systems. This book is available for \$1.25.

Farming is a business, and

you need to keep a good set of business and financial records to help keep your business operating.

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## FIBER ESSENTIAL TO AMERICAN DIET

Health experts today are emphasizing the importance of eating the right foods to stay healthy and trim. But whether or not you're trying to lose weight, nutritionists stress the importance of having enough fiber in the diet.

Fiber is the food component which is often referred to as "roughage." It is not digested, but travels through the system, and, with the absorption of water, forms the bulk needed for the elimination of waste. Equally important is the fact that high fiber foods are also high in vitamins.

Indigestible fiber comes from eating fruits, vegetables, whole grain breads, cereals and pastas, and legumes. Many of these products are the staples of diet in many countries but the typical American Diet — meat, cheese, milk, eggs, sugar, fat and white spaghetti, bread and rice — contains little or no fiber. Even though they may think they are eating fiber, Americans consume foods robbed of fiber because of the use of refined ingredients and additives.

To get the maximum amounts of fiber, people should eat entire fruits and vegetables because the main sources of fiber are in edible skins and stalks. Fiber is composed of complex carbohydrates such as cellulose, and other substances which constitute the cell walls and structural formations of plants. Foods that are processed in blenders, and fruits that are squeezed into juices, do not have the total fiber benefits because the fibrous portions have been broken down.

There are many opinions on the maximum benefits of fiber for the body. Most authorities agree that fiber stimulates the normal action of the intestinal tract in removing waste, while others suggests that fiber can also diminish the amount of cholesterol the body absorbs. Some theories contend that fiber actually can help reduce heart disease, cancer, appendicitis, hemorrhoids, diabetes and diverticulosis (pouches protruding from the intestinal wall). These theories

are supported by the low incidence of such diseases in developed societies where diets contain large amounts of dietary fiber, according to the Sourcebook on Nutrition, first edition, 1978.

The effects of fiber in the intestinal tract — adding bulk and absorbing water — tend to make waste move quickly through the system. It is on this basis of movement that experts suggest bowel tissue is less likely to be exposed to toxins and carcinogens (cancer causing substances) which are produced by bacteria in the intestines. Increased fiber also may reduce the chances of colon-rectal cancer, the second-leading cause of cancer related death.

There also is a lot of information about fiber and its positive effects for people on diets. It is a good way to lose weight since it fills you up with typically lower calorie foods.

Below is a chart of sources of dietary fiber:

**FRUITS** - ones with skins are high in fiber. Apples, pears and orange sections. Fresh, canned, cooked or frozen fruits have the same amount of fiber unless they have been peeled.

**VEGETABLES** - ones with skins, seeds and stalks are highest in fiber. It is not necessary to eat raw; cooking may reduce volume but doesn't effect fiber content. Raw, cooked, canned and frozen have the same fiber.

**BEANS AND LEGUMES** - protein-rich beans (soya, peas, lentils, kidney, lima and garbanzo) are good sources of fiber in contrast to protein-rich foods such as meat.

**BREADS AND CEREALS** - Those made with whole grains (wheat, rye, oats and brown rice) are high in fiber. Breakfast cereals with bran or those that list whole grains as an ingredient are recommended (with no sugar).

**SNACKS AND SWEETS** - nuts, seed and popcorn are good fiber sources. Most baked goods and candies are low in fiber but adding seeds and nuts will make them fiber-rich.

### SET POINT THEORY:

#### Energy Balance and Weight Control

The battle against weight gain can be like riding on a seesaw—endlessly up and down. But between the ups and downs, a pattern may develop.

Many people hover around a certain weight over the years in spite of trying a number of different diets. They may lose weight for a while, but are back up to their usual weight within a few months.

Scientists have developed the set point theory to explain the body's tendency to defend a set weight. A study by the UW-Madison Biodynamics Laboratory and Hazelton Laboratories America, Inc. shows that exercise may be the missing link in lowering the set point.

In order to lose weight, you need to use up more energy than you take in. To do this, you can watch your food intake, increase your energy output or combine both. But most diets only emphasize controlling food intake. Research shows that activity level directly affects weight loss. Exercise can have a very positive effect, but it has to be part of your regular lifestyle. You can't look at it as something you do once a month.

Regular exercise can increase the resting metabolic rate, the rate at which the body burns calories while at rest. Typically, when dieters drop below 1,200 calories a day, their bodies try to conserve energy, which decreases the resting metabolic rate, the rate at which the body burns calories while at rest. Select whatever type of exercise you like. Consider time, money and your fitness level when choosing an activity. Before beginning any exercise program, check with your physician. The exercise you choose must be moderate to brisk to raise heart and breathing rates, sustained at least 30 minutes without interruption, and repeated at least three times a week.

Tailor your activity to what's practical for you. Though people often associate exercise with Olympic athletics, a brisk walk around the block or jumping rope at home also counts.

If you're dieting, examine your eating habits carefully. It's important to eat good foods

from all four food groups. Try to cut back on portion size rather than food diversity. An occasional piece of apple pie isn't a sin.

By eating well and exercising, you can avoid getting stuck at a certain weight. Lowering the set point through exercise could be a ray of hope for frustrated dieters.

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# Wisconsin Outdoors and Conservation News

## The Peregrine Falcon, An Aerodynamic Marvel



This week we begin a series of articles on creatures of the wild written by the popular retired chief naturalist of the Department of Natural Resources, George Knudsen. The 10 articles will feature favorite wild creatures and George will relate his experiences with them. A drawing by the author will illustrate each of the articles. George, and his son Jeff, now run the White Pine Nature Center near Hayward, Wisconsin. We think our readers will enjoy George's folksy style and his inside-and-out grasp of nature. The articles are scheduled to run as space permits.

It was 1938 when I saw my very first peregrine falcon. I was fishing late September walleyes in the river at Black River Falls, Wisconsin when it happened. The feathered rocket plummeted to within 20 feet of the water and shot past me so fast I could actually hear its wings slicing the air. It came so close to me that I saw its blackish cap, comma-shaped "sideburns," and slate-colored back. Its long, pointed, powerfully-beating wings and relatively narrow, round-tipped tail would have been identification enough, but the close pass really clinched it.

I saw peregrines quite frequently in ensuing years, including two European peregrines in France in 1944. One of these European speedsters did a few aerobatics over and alongside the cathedral on the hill supporting much of Laon, France. I think it was trying to show me it was as good a flyer as the one I saw on the Black River. Talk about speed!

After about 1955, peregrines

became increasingly rare in North America and were finally placed on the U.S. endangered species list. Along with the bald eagle and osprey they were victims of the pesticide DDT. With the ban on the use of DDT, and the release of hybrid, captive-reared young peregrines into suitable habitats, there now seems to be a glimmer of hope for at least a partial recovery of peregrine populations. In my own case, I've seen more migrating peregrines in the last three or four years than I had seen in all of the 1960s and 1970s.

Most of the birds being seen now during migration are arctic peregrines, a sub-species. They seem to be staging a comeback! The peregrine sub-species, that until a few decades ago inhabited the entire U.S., Canada, and Mexico, is thought to have been extirpated east of the Rocky Mountains except for some in eastern Canada; its numbers west of the Rockies are increasing somewhat.

It would be a tragic loss if this beautiful bird should become extinct, for in my opinion it is the sparkling diamond in America's treasure chest of birds. It has been prized by falconers, including kings, sultans, and emperors for centuries, and it still has extremely high aesthetic appeal to all who know it.

Peregrines prey on pigeons, doves, shorebirds, and ducks—they're also called duck hawks—but they'll take other birds as well. Capturing them in full flight, the falcons hit them hard enough to stun, or kill them. Before their decline, peregrines would nail pigeons over the streets of New York City and carry them to ledges high on the perpendicular sides of skyscrapers. Peregrines nest on steep cliffs, so these constructed precipices, and the abundance of pigeons suited them fine. They even nested on the window ledges!

I remember an early morning when from a blind I was watching about 20 male prairie chickens going through their violent, competitive dancing on their "booming ground." Suddenly, the chickens changed from foot-skidding, booming live creatures to motionless, ground-hugging stones. Immediately, I saw the reason! Three feet above ground, and coming in like lightning, was a peregrine. It had its eyes on just one of the crouching chickens, the one it bowled over in a cloud of feathers. The falcon swept around in a half circle, but found its prey already in full, fast, frantic flight. The peregrine powered its way after its escaping breakfast and both disappeared over the rise. That chicken was so scared I wondered if it escaped, or perhaps collapsed of fright somewhere over the horizon!

In September, 1982, a peregrine streaked into my backyard, shot upward in a steep climb, and swung, at top speed, back the way it came, but a good 300 feet higher. All this took only six or seven seconds. What a sight! What a terrific success as a bird!

Through the years I've seen my share of very rare birds, and other animals, but I often cannot recall the particular settings. Not so with my peregrine encounters. They are such outstanding, aerodynamically perfect birds that I can visualize my sightings of them in quite precise detail. Peregrines are hard to forget!

Remember the peregrine falcon when you fill out your state income tax form. A donation on the line marked "Endangered Resources Donation" will support peregrine falcon restoration in Wisconsin among other projects to protect and manage the state's endangered and nongame Wildlife and natural habitats.

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## Indians Beat Germantown, Lose to Waukesha Memorial

Inconsistency plagued the Kewaskum Indians (now 4-5) during last weekend's Germantown Holiday Tournament.

In Friday's opening round game, team work and patient shooting enabled the Indians to get by host Germantown, 50-46.

However, in Saturday's championship game, KHS hit on only 13 of 65 shots (20%) in losing to favorite Waukesha Catholic Memorial, 69-47.

**Kewaskum 50, Germantown 46**  
Kewaskum stayed in control and in front of Friday's game through most of the first three quarters, using a patient offense which allowed them to shoot 41% from the floor on the night.

Germantown stayed close during this period, however mainly because of the play of their star forward Paul Wagner, who scored a game-high 26 points and grabbed 7 rebounds on the night. "He really hurt us," later commented KHS coach Perry Koth.

Germantown took its first lead, since the opening basket, on the last bucket of the third quarter, making it 37-36. This lead fluctuated from one to three points until a jumper from Indian Tim Rohlinger finally tied the score at 45-45 with 1:56 to play in the game.

Wagner drew a foul on Germantown's next possession and made one of two free throws to put the Warhawks back on top, 46-45.

Mike Steinhardt, who played one of his best games of the year — 14 points, 8 rebounds, and three blocked shots — then banked in an inside shot on the other end to put Kewaskum ahead by one. Two clutch free throws with :13 to go by Tom Herriges and one more by Brian Ruplinger with :02 left, sandwiched between Germantown's last two unsuccessful possessions of the game, made the final score 50-46.

Following Steinhardt in scoring was junior Bob Yahr with 10 points, Herriges with 7, and Todd Wiedmeyer and Ruplinger with 6 each.

**Waukesha Catholic Memorial 69, Kewaskum 47**

In Saturday's Championship match up, Kewaskum had to contend with a well-balanced Waukesha Memorial team which had narrowly beaten a strong Hartford squad in their opening round game.

Hartford, incidentally, had beaten Kewaskum earlier this year by eleven points, so predictably so, Waukesha Memorial blew out the Indians, 69-47, and took home the championship trophy.

Nothing fell in for the Indians against Memorial, as a strict zone defense caused Kewaskum to take many poor shots. Kewaskum was so cold, in fact, that they made just four out of 30 shots (13%) during the first half, and just 13 of 65 (20%), all night.

Kewaskum did manage to cut a 34-17 Memorial halftime lead down to 12 points, mainly because of a high spirited full court press employed at the beginning of the second half, but it wasn't nearly enough as Memorial continued to shoot at a hot pace which would end at 49% for the night, and coasted to a well deserved win.

Tom Herriges and Brian Ruplinger, KHS coach Perry Koth's senior guard combination, sparked Kewaskum with 9 and 8 points, respectively, followed by Tim Rohlinger, Todd Steger, and Mike Steinhardt, each with 6. Ron Theusch led in rebounding with 6.

Memorial was led by Dan Kaminski and Steve Hanley with 12 and 11 points, apiece. Hanley paced in rebounds with 10.

Kewaskum and Plymouth, both with 1-2 conference records, will square-off in Plymouth Friday beginning at 7:45 p.m. with the JV and freshmen scheduled to start at 6:15.

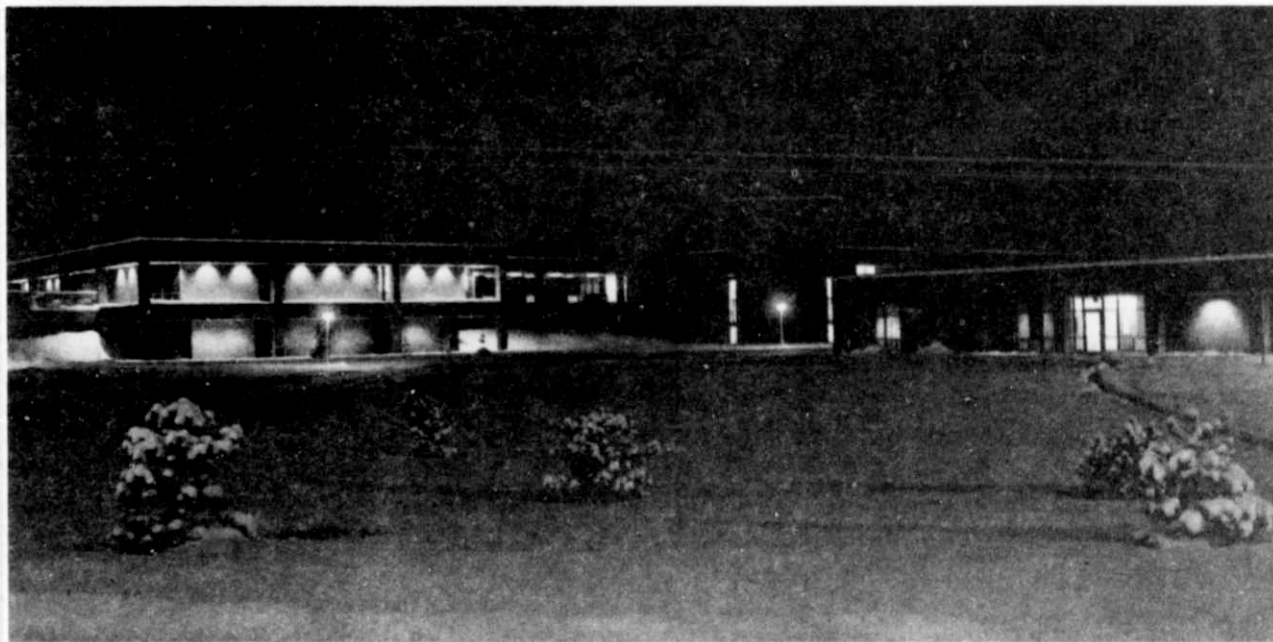

## ADULT AND CONTINUING REGISTRATION INFORMATION

**Social Security Number:** This becomes your student identification number and is used only for this purpose. It will not be given out to anyone for directories, etc. It is necessary to maintain personal files on all students. This requirement is voluntary.

**Course Numbers:** List a complete nine-digit number on the registration form.

**Course Fees:** They represent the total cost for instruction of the course. Additional requirements for project, art supplies, consumed food and beverages are necessary in some courses. (Fees are subject to change without notice.)

**Textbooks:** Used in most courses and cost approximately \$3.00 to \$40.00. Students are expected to purchase texts as soon as possible in the Campus bookstore or from Center Coordinators.

**Supplies:** It is recommended that you do not purchase supplies for any class more than three (3) days prior to scheduled starting date of class.

**Cancelled Classes:** NWTI reserves the right to cancel classes. Notification of cancelled classes will be sent out approximately five days prior to the start of class.

### PRIOR TO REGISTRATION YOU SHOULD KNOW THE FOLLOWING:

1. Refunds are given automatically only when the class is cancelled due to insufficient enrollment. Student refund requests must be in writing.
2. You must be at least 16 to enroll in the regular evening school courses. If you are attending high school, you need a signed statement of permission from your parents and your high school principal to enroll in evening classes.
3. Check the course starting and ending dates so that you are aware of the time necessary to be in class. All classes are scheduled to start as indicated unless otherwise notified.
