Competition for Kewaskum School And Village Boards on April 2nd

Election for the Kewaskum Board of Education and Kewaskum Village Board will be about the only two contested races for next Tuesday's spring election.

Incumbents Ralph Horner, Jr. and John Spoerl will be battling to retain their school board posts with strong competition from two new challengers, Perry Ankerson and Ronald Theusch.

Horner is a Town of Farmington resident, married, with three children attending Kewaskum schools. He is employed by the Gehl Company. Horner is hoping to win a second term on the board.

Spoerl is single, a Town of Wayne resident engaged in farming. He is also seeking his

second term on the board.

Challenger Perry Ankerson resides in the Town of Wayne, married, with three children attending Kewaskum schools. He is a certified public accountant and presently the president of a Milwaukee manufacturing company.

Ronald Theusch is married with one child who will be entering school. A Kewaskum High School graduate, Theusch was born and raised in the Town of Farmington and he recently purchased a farm in the Town of Wayne. He attended University of Wisconsin campuses and Carroll College.

With three trustees' terms expiring on the Kewaskum Village Board and four candidates, incumbents Paul Blumer and Mary Krueger will have competition from two

write-in candidates, Richard Schlice and Richard Schmidt.

Schlice is married and employed by the West Bend Company. Four years ago he made an unsuccessful attempt to win a seat on the Kewaskum School Board.

Schmidt is a past member of the board, with three years experience as a trustee. He served the last year of an un-expired term and a full term to which he had been elected. He lost a bid for re-election when his term expired last year. Schmidt is married and employed as a foreman by the Washington County Highway Department.

David Nigh, whose term as trustee expires next month, will be running unopposed for the position of Kewaskum Village

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Voters Forum Draws Little Attention

About twenty electors were at last week's Kewaskum Voters Forum arranged for by the Washington County League of Women Voters.

Candidates David Dorn and Daniel Stoffel, who are running for the post of Town of Kewaskum Supervisor, addressed the meeting and answered questions from the audience. The third candidate, Jerome Herriges, was not present.

Among other questions, both men were asked about their position on a countywide library system. Stoffel said his position, for the present, was neutral because the cost isn't justifiable. Dorn was not in favor of the present plan. He noted now, the cost would be \$8 per acre lot per house. "I'm concerned about the cost to the farmer," he said, "if it would cost them \$8 too, alright, but it won't."

The candidates were also questioned about the school tax burden. Dorn indicated a sales tax would be a better way to finance school costs. "It never should have been a part of property tax," said Dorn. Stoffel agreed in principle with Dorn. "I don't believe schools are a function of property tax," stated Stoffel. Property taxes were designed to pay for things like road maintenance, repairs,

snowplowing and things like that, not schools. Stoffel said taxes should be based on net income, not property. As an example Stoffel compared a farmer and lawyer both earning a gross income of \$400,000. The farmer will pay five to six times more in taxes because he needs more land than the lawyer to generate that income.

In the contest for Kewaskum Board of Education, only the challengers, Perry Ankerson and Ronald Theusch were present.

Incumbent John Spoerl submitted a letter of regret saying he had a prior commitment. His letter stated he was still campaigning with emphasis based on quality education at justifiable costs and a coordinated curriculum on a k through 12 basis.

Incumbent Ralph Horner was unable to attend the forum because of a prior commitment to a CESA Board of Control meeting.

In a letter, Horner noted some of the goals he had accomplished during his three-year term included participation in the competency based testing program, academic decathlon, olympics of the mind, and opening of school libraries during the summer.

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District and Kewaskum Teachers Begin Contract Negotiations

Kewaskum Education Association and School Board representatives met last Wednesday to begin contract negotiations for the coming school year.

While neither the KEA or School Board representatives presented any specific financial

proposal, there were several priority items mentioned for each side.

The School Board's negotiating team is seeking a three-year contract, a change in the insurance agreement, changes in snowday make-up procedures and a more explicit definition concerning employee evaluations.

The KEA representatives have proposed recommendations concerning early retirement, separate coaching and advisor contracts for extra curricular activities and a schedule covering additional pay for teachers with large classes.

Chief Negotiator David Wietor said his team had also presented a request that the 1985-86 pay schedule be increased to provide each employee with an average salary increase of \$2,675 if both sides reach a settlement by May 15th. If no agreement is reached by that date, the KEA is asking that figure be raised to \$3,100.

The KEA is also seeking a limit class size to 20 students, excluding choir, band or orchestra. If the class size is exceeded, the KES is proposing each teacher of a large class would receive an added 1% of his or her base salary per student, per semester, for each student over 20. A formula for middle and high school teachers would result in their receiving an additional fee of 25 times the teacher's hourly pay times the number of periods with class overloads.

The proposal for separate coaching contracts was made because teachers have been reluctant to accept such duties since once accepted, they have been virtually "locked-in" to

Rezoning Denial to Be Recommended by Commission

With a quorum present Tuesday evening, the Kewaskum Plan Commission voted 4 to 0, to recommend the Village Board deny a request for rezoning the Noble Ray property located at 1718 Fond du Lac Avenue.

The Rays had requested rezoning their property from R-2 single family residence, to B-2 general retail and service district. Mrs. Ray, who was present at the meeting, said they wanted to convert the barn into a resale barn for used items.

Mrs. Ray said she had excellent success with a rummage sale last year. She said, however, the village had sent her a letter stating such sales could only run three days. Ray's had run a month.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling told the commission he was totally opposed to the request. "There's no way it can be

legally done," he said. R-2 zoning is strictly residential with no retail accessory allowed. If the zoning were changed to B-2 retail, the house would be in violation, and, you can't have split zoning. "You can't approve something that's not legal and there's no way I can justify this zoning request," stated Zarling.

Zarling said he could give the commission all the reasons they could possibly need for denying the request. He indicated it was not just a simple matter of a zoning change. There were village and state requirements which would have to be met. First off, the Rays would have to provide a parking area with a minimum of six spaces, a space for loading and unloading, and a 24 foot driveway. The parking area would have to be of a nature to prevent dust, etc., problems for adjoining properties. As far as the driveway, the Rays would also have

TORNADO AWARENESS FACTS

One of the most important tornado safety rules is to take severe weather advisories seriously. During severe weather TV and radio should be monitored regularly for updated bulletins and information. When conditions are favorable for the development of a tornado or the weather bureau issues a "Tornado Watch," this means citizens should listen to local broadcasts for further information. When a tornado is sighted and confirmed in the Washington County or surrounding areas a "Tornado Warning" will be issued; at this time the siren in the Village of Kewaskum will be sounded. This warning is in effect for 1 hour unless called off by local broadcast stations and emergency government. If a tornado is sighted near Kewaskum, the siren will be sounded again. The siren and the Tornado Warnings should alert all citizens to move to a place of shelter immediately.

When a Tornado Warning is issued the following safety information should be used:

1. If you are in open country, move away from the tornado's path at right angles. If there is no time, lie flat in the nearest depression or ditch.
2. In an office building, occupants are advised to stand in an interior hallway in the basement, or on the lowest floor.
3. In a factory, a lookout should be posted when a tornado watch is issued. When a warning occurs, workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection. This location should be determined in advanced planning, as should procedures for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines when a Tornado Warning is issued.
4. In homes, occupants should move to the basement and seek shelter under sturdy furniture or workbenches. In a home with no basement, shelter should be taken under heavy furniture in the center of the house. Some windows should be opened to maintain a balance in indoor-outdoor air pressure, but residents should keep away from them.
5. In mobile homes, the best idea is to get out! Mobile home owners are advised to take cover in a nearby building or depression. Trailer parks should have a community leader responsible for posting a lookout and monitoring weather broadcasts during Tornado Watch periods.
6. In schools, again, a lookout should be posted when a tornado watch is announced. Curtains should be drawn and blinds lowered to minimize damage caused by breaking glass. When the Tornado Warning is issued, shelter should be taken in an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Auditoriums, gymnasiums, or other areas with wide free-span roofs should be avoided.
7. In shopping centers, people should go immediately to a marked emergency shelter, stand against interior walls, or seek shelter under sturdy counters. Cars do not provide sufficient protection against tornado-force winds.

electors, "I favor zero-based budgeting, and looking at what you need to support the schools."

Referring to a question regarding a specific percent increase in the budget, Theusch stated, "I don't favor any increase in the budget, what is necessary, is difficult to pinpoint. Six to seven percent is about what I expect," noted Theusch.

When questioned about the closing of schools, Ankerson stated "each year we have to look at the outlying schools and justify their existence. Maybe the answer is Beechwood going to Random Lake," noted Ankerson. Theusch felt the possibility of closing schools had to be studied with a closer look at numbers and dollars. "If you can do in five buildings what you're doing in six, you save money."

Referring to busing between Beechwood and Farmington, Theusch was not in favor of the plan. "Juggling for one year isn't the answer, we will have to look further down the line," said Theusch.

There were no candidates from the Kewaskum Village Board race on the agenda. A League of Women Voters representative said, "due to a lack of communication, they were not aware, until it was too late, that there would be a contest in that election."

David Nigh, candidate for the board president position was in the audience as was Richard Schmidt, a write-in candidate for village trustee.

Schmidt said he was sorry the village board candidates did not have the opportunity to address the meeting. "As far as my own candidacy," Schmidt noted after the meeting, "I would like the voters to know I was the trustee who brought back the item of placing Kewaskum's name on the new water tower after it had been vetoed. With the help of local organizations we got the painting done."

"Although it was established after I left the board," said Schmidt, "I would also like the electors to know I was the trustee who brought up the idea of the indigent relief work program. Instead of giving free money away, the recipients are now required to put in a set number of work hours in order to receive that assistance."

to get state approval because it would feed into a state highway (45).

Commission member Bob Kirst told Mrs. Ray he was sympathetic to what they were trying to do, but he agreed with Zarling. "That's why we have zoning ordinances and an administrator to see that they are followed."

The commission will make its recommendation to deny the request and a public hearing has been scheduled for the April 15th village board meeting.

The commission also approved a request by Village Administrator Dan Schmidt to allow the zoning administrator to assist him in compiling the latest ordinance changes so the revisions can be sent to the Southeastern Regional Plan Commission for review before a revised ordinance book is published.

Bomb Scare, Vandalism Reported

Kewaskum school officials will take disciplinary action against a 15-year-old middle school student who allegedly called in a bomb scare on Monday afternoon of last week from a pay phone in the building.

A telephone operator contacted police at 3 p.m. after receiving the call. The caller said there was a bomb in locker No. 145 prepared to go off.

The patrolman found locker No. 145 next to a pay phone with the phone number the operator had traced on the call. The patrolman and Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty opened the locker, finding only normal belongings in it. There was no evacuation as school had just let out.

Police investigated and Wednesday morning the suspect was questioned and admitted making the call. The boy has been suspended several times in the past, police said, and school officials will be holding an expulsion hearing on the matter.

Local police are also investigating several incidents of vandalism which took place at two village business places during a five-day period.

Both K-B Lettering at 409

Main St. and Miller's Furniture at 1313 Fond du Lac Ave. reported damage to their display windows. The damage was apparently caused by guns or slingshots.

Bill Breitzman, owner of K-B, told police that he left the building at approximately 5:30 p.m. on March 14, and when he returned back at 10 p.m. there was a hole in the front window. A steel ball bearing was later found just underneath the window.

The next day, Edward Miller reported damage to the east display window in the furniture store, and a ball bearing was also found at the scene. Miller contacted police again on Tuesday after finding four more holes in the same window which police believe may have been caused by a BB or pellet gun. No projectiles were found this time, but there were glass particles scattered throughout the display room.

Police are investigating the matter. The cost to replace the window at K-B is estimated at \$500. No figure was available for the damage to the window at Miller's.

Board President.

The election for Town of Kewaskum Supervisor is the only other race with challengers. Three candidates, David Dorn, Daniel Stoffel and Jerome Herriges will be competing for the two expiring terms.

Dorn, 32, is single and engages in farming and custom combining. Stoffel is engaged in a family dairy operation with several family members. He currently serves as a supervisor on the Washington County Board. Herriges is retired.

Town Chairman George Allmann, Clerk Barbara Hinz, and Treasurer Delores Prost are unopposed.

In the Town of Wayne, all candidates for the various offices are running unopposed.

The Town of Auburn has only one contest, that of constable. Merle Laatsch and Neal Weare are both seeking the job. Incumbents for all the remaining positions are running unopposed.

In the Town of Farmington there is also no competition. All the incumbents are running unopposed.

On the county and state levels, James B. Schwalbach is unopposed for Washington County Circuit Court Judge and Nathan Heffernan is unopposed for Supreme Court Justice.

Incumbent Herbert Grover is being challenged by I.W. Pohlman for the post of State Superintendent of Public Schools.

them permanently unless a replacement could be found.

The KEA is also proposing a pay increase from \$300 to \$3,000 per semester for "teachers-in-charge" for buildings which do not have a full time administrator.

The School Board representatives are proposing a change in insurance premium payments, from 100% district, to 90% district/10% teachers.

The School Board is also proposing a calendar which would require the make up of "snow days." The present contract states the first two snow days of each school year do not have to be made up. The School Board feels the contract calls for 180 teaching days and the students should receive all the required days in class time.

Other points which will be discussed during future negotiating sessions are language concerning disciplinary action, and an early retirement proposal.

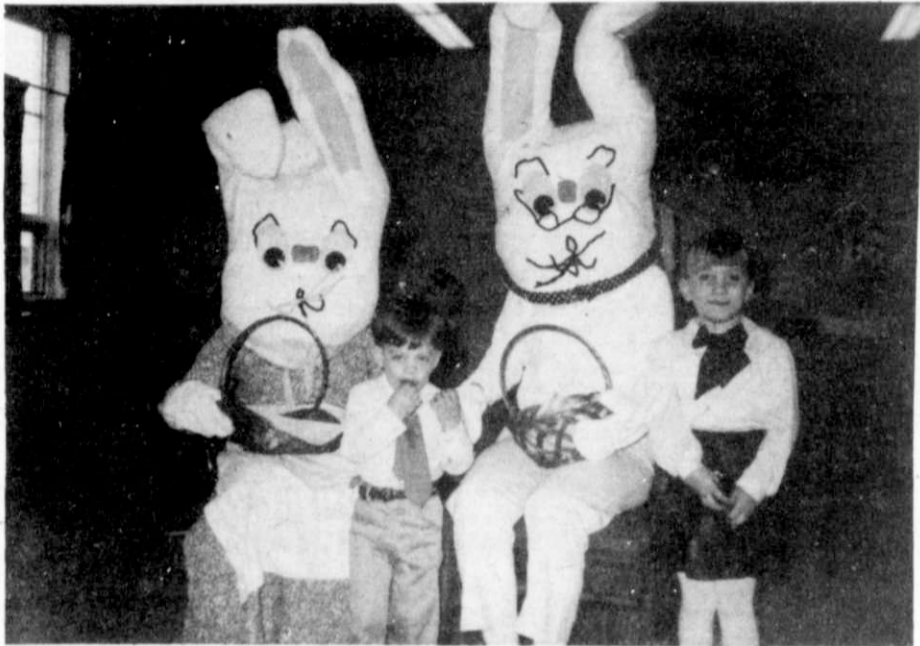

To focus on nearby objects, eye muscles must elongate the eyeball to increase lens curvature. In nearsightedness, this increased convexity becomes permanent because of increased fluid pressure in the eye. Dr. Lane theorizes that if this fluid pressure could be regulated by eliminating sugar in the diet and easing of visual and muscular eye strain, then nearsightedness might be halted and hopefully corrected. Dr. Lane suggests, "Give up sugar - boost your intake of calcium and chromium foods such as dairy products, ocean fish, dark green leafy vegetables, and whole grains."

School District Controversy

School board members and the school district administrator are public figures. They must be accountable to the public. It goes with the job, and they know it. Obviously, if they can avoid taking public stands on controversial issues, they will do so. The public should not let them. No one forced them to take their jobs.

In Kewaskum, a school district administrator apparently was privately informed by the school board that his contract would not be renewed, and he was given the opportunity to resign or be dismissed. He chose to resign.

Citizens quite rightly want to know the reasons for his departure, and how individual school board members voted on this issue. They need to know because they are the electors of the school board, and they are concerned about their children's education.

It is acceptable for school board members to meet in private session on personnel matters, rather than under the glare of the hot lights of

publicity, and no one disputes that. But, in this case, once the discussions were over, and decisions were made, it was the obligation of the school board and the administrator to inform the citizens of the decisions, the reasons for the decisions, and how individual board members voted.

Probably the best procedure would have been for the administrator to have offered his resignation at an open meeting, and for the board to have accepted it there. The administrator and school board, then, at this meeting should have issued a joint statement outlining factually the reasons for the departure, the conditions agreed upon, and how individual board members voted. (To say that the board decision was unanimous is a "cop out." School board decisions are rarely unanimous. What happens usually is that once there is a majority, someone makes a motion to make the vote unanimous, and the minority agrees. Electors need to know the original vote).

If a joint statement was not possible, then separate statements should have been issued. These statements should be factual, certainly not libelous, should show an honest disagreement on issues, and should tell the voters only as much as they need to know. Certainly such statements should not go into unnecessary detail, nor be a harangue, nor damage reputations unnecessarily, and where not merited.

My experience, and research, in public relations indicate that when unpleasant or controversial news is there, the best course is to get it out and over with in a hurry; that is, answer the necessary questions, be straightforward, and honest about it, and then drop the matter from further discussion. The alternative, almost invariably, is what we are now experiencing here in the Kewaskum School District. Rumors spread, tempers flare, lawyers' bills go up, the whole area gets a "black eye" in its reputation, and eventually, the

truth or something resembling it, is finally dragged out one piece at a time in a continuing controversy.

I suspect that in the Kewaskum situation, the fact that the administrator favored the closing of the Beechwood school, and possibly, the eventual closing of the Wayne school angered residents of those areas sufficiently for them to influence a majority of school board members to vote not to renew the administrator's contract. Auxiliary matters, then, typically are introduced to strengthen the case; certain budget over-runs, personality conflicts, etc. So, why not be honest about it?

I don't claim to have the answers to all of the world's problems, but I would like to make a few suggestions in this situation, which might be helpful:

1) The school board operates under something called, "Board Policies," which is in writing, and is based on state statutes. I have not seen this document yet, but I think it could be amended to spell out how situations like this are to be handled in the future.

2) Candidates for school board should be asked to state in writing, preferably by affidavit, their positions on the handling of public information; their positions should be published, and kept on file; and they should be held accountable for their positions.

3) Newspapers can get the news out to the voters on controversies like this. When they claim they can not, don't believe it; where there is a will, there is a way. What newspapers need is legal protection. Big newspaper conglomerates can afford this; small, independently owned newspapers, where they still exist, can not. Therefore, efforts are needed and should be supported to provide smaller newspapers with the legal protection they need to do their job, at little or no cost to them, in the interest of justice.

Now, let's get the ball rolling.

As a 4-year athlete at KHS, I was on both sides of the issue. There were years where I played a lot and years where I sat on the bench. Inasmuch as it was to some degree fun to play a great deal my senior year in basketball, to this day I would not say it was worth the frustration and humiliation I was forced to endure my junior season on the bench. In games where we held a 20 pt. lead midway through the fourth quarter and I was still hopelessly sitting on the bench, I had to ask myself if it was worth 10-15 hours a week of practice. Would I be rewarded for this? As it turned out, I was never rewarded for that year, and still four years later, I'm still very bitter towards the basketball program at KHS.

What are sports programs all

about? Is it to find your best five or six players and go out and try to beat everyone in the conference regardless of people's feelings? Or is it to take everyone who goes out for a sport and by working together as a unit, develop everyone's talent to its maximum? Then, by combining everyone's talent, play every game the best it can be played. I suggest the latter.

In specific response to "A satisfied taxpayer," who stated that kids who continually ride the bench should quit because they won't play when they're juniors and seniors — how do we know their talents? Have those players had the chance to develop their talents? Will they ever get the chance? Think about it.

There's without a doubt too much emphasis on winning in youth sports today. Everywhere I turn I see examples, and it begins at a very young age. Is it any wonder there's a declining number of students going out for sports nowadays? Does winning matter that much to them? It didn't to me when I was in that situation, it doesn't now, and it never will.

We need to take a serious look at our sports program and develop a sound philosophy that would reap the most benefits for the students involved in our program. 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Local Citizens to Jump Rope for Heart

Local students of Kewaskum High will join the fight against heart disease on Saturday, March 30, when they hold a "Jump Rope For Heart" event to benefit the American Heart Association of Wisconsin.

Teams of four to six students will begin jumping at 9:00 a.m. on the day of the event, and continue for three hours. Each participant will take a two-minute turn jumping before turning the rope over to a teammate. Prior to the event, students will solicit pledges from their friends and neighbors for each minute their team jumps.

The Wisconsin Association for health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (WAHPERD) is sponsoring the program, which is being coordinated by Student Government. Students will be eligible for prizes, but there are other benefits as well.

In addition to helping their hearts, students will be helping the American Heart Association battle heart disease, which is the leading cause of death in the nation. The funds the students raise will help the American Heart Association of Wisconsin

provide public and professional education, community services and funds for state and local heart research. Services such as free blood pressure screening and cardiopulmonary resuscitation training are also provided by Heart volunteers. In the area of education, the American Heart Association of Wisconsin has pioneered an effective teen anti-smoking program called "Save a SweetHEART," which currently involves students throughout Wisconsin. In addition, the Association has developed heart health curriculum modules for students in grades K through 12.

The Jump Rope For Heart program began six years ago in Wisconsin and has since achieved national success. An estimated 800,000 students, parents and teachers in all 50 states will participate in 1985. Last year, Wisconsin students from 379 schools participated in the Jump Rope For Heart program to benefit the American Heart Association of Wisconsin.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

At a nonpartisan election, the elector shall make a punch or a hole at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote (on a voting machine depress the button or lever), or write in the name of his or her choice for a candidate on the ballot envelope provided.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, deposit his or her ballot in the envelope provided in the ballot box, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

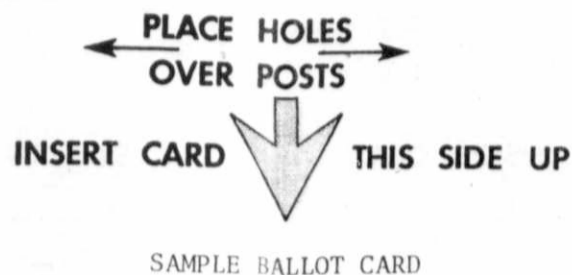

- (b) To vote for a person whose name is printed on the ballot, insert your ballot card with both hands, be sure the pins are through the two holes, hold the punching device straight up and down, press down firmly opposite the candidate and/or proposition selections of your choice.

25 Years Ago

March 25, 1960

Kewaskum's second annual Dairy Day event held Saturday in the high school gymnasium, agriculture rooms and cafeteria, was a tremendous success according to the Kewaskum Business Association, sponsor of the program. A record crowd judged at approximately 1,200 persons jammed the gymnasium for the evening show and additional hundreds were present for the noon luncheon, afternoon show and ladies' program. More than 600 persons were served the free noon dairy lunch, approximately again as many as last year when some 300 enjoyed the meal served in the cafeteria by the ladies. Roman Foerster and Edgar Miske received awards for outstanding conservation work on their farms. To climax the program, Sandy Oppermann was crowned Dairy Day queen by Miss Wisconsin.

Last Friday, March 18, was the final date for filing nomination papers at the village commissioner's office for offices in the Village of Kewaskum to be elected at the spring election on Tuesday, April 5. Vacancies to be filled are three trustees for two years and one justice of the peace for a two-year term. Five candidates filed papers for the three trustee offices, namely two of the incumbents, Arvin Merwin and Joseph Schwind, and three newcomers, Harold Degner, John Geidel and Harry R. Heinecke. Robert G. Kroncke is the only candidate for the justice office.

Only \$8.21 in cash was obtained in a safe burglary at the Heinemann Dairy in Kewaskum sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning. The thieves gained entrance to the building through a rear boiler room door. The burglarly is believed to be the work of professionals by the systematic way in which they broke open the safe. They broke off the combination on the safe and then peeled off the front plate to gain entrance. The burglars also ransacked all of the office desks but the \$8.21 was the only money taken. The rest of the cash had been deposited before the close of the day's business.

50 Years Ago

March 29, 1935

Ralph Heisler, 21, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Heisler of this village, passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend, last Sunday, as the result of injuries he suffered in an automobile collision on Highway 33, three miles east of West Bend, at about 1 a.m. Sunday morning. He suffered a fractured skull and never regained consciousness. Three other young people in the car with Ralph were not critically injured, although two of them, the Misses Olive and Ella Windorf, were treated at the same hospital for cuts and bruises and severe shock. Joseph Uelmen Jr., also of Kewaskum, escaped uninjured. The accident happened near the West Bend airport when a Buick

sedan driven by Rudolph Esselmann of the Town of Trenton, ran into the left front side of the car driven by Heisler, and the young man received the full force of the impact. Ralph Leo Heisler was born at Milwaukee on November 13, 1913. He came to his present home in Kewaskum with his parents in 1924 where he has since resided. He leaves to mourn his early demise, his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Heisler, three brothers, Russell, Franklin and Louis Jr. and a sister, Marcella, all at home.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Gerald F. Stollenwerk presided. All Trustee Members were present.

On a motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Paul Blumer and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the minutes of March 4, 1985.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt presented a tax collection report update for 1984 to the Board. The report indicated tax collection is ahead of 1983 showing 69.95% collected and 26.8% postponed for 1984 compared to 68.1% collected and 28.4% postponed in 1983.

Administrator Daniel Schmidt reviewed a variety of correspondence with the Board as follows:

1) Legislative Bulletins on pending legislation and a meeting of the Mid-Moraine Association Legislative Committee.

2) Update of the League of Wisconsin Municipalities pertaining to the Governor's Budget proposals.

3) Results of the Department of Transportation Meeting.

4) Announced the bid opening for the storm sewer project along Fond du Lac Avenue and CTH "H" for April 10, 1985, at 4:30 p.m.

5) Reviewed auditor's year end balance sheet for the Water Utility.

Trustee Howard Laubenstein, the Plan Commission Representative, announced that a meeting will be held March 26, 1985, at 8:00 p.m.

Reconsideration of Resolution No. 85-1, authorized the Village President and Village Clerk to file application on behalf of the Village of Kewaskum for a loan in the amount of \$300,000.00 and for such funds to be used for the Municipal Building - Addition and Remodeling project. (due to an application technicality) was considered and acted upon as follows:

RESOLUTION NO. 85 - 1A

FORM OF RECORD

The following preamble and resolutions were presented by Trustee David Nigh and were read to the meeting.

By the provisions of sec. 67.12(12) of the Wis. Stats., all municipalities may borrow money for such purposes in the manner prescribed, and,

By the provisions of Chapter 24 of the Wisconsin Stats., the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands of Wisconsin is authorized to make loans from the State Trust Funds to municipalities for such purposes. (Municipality as defined by sec. 24.60(2), Wis. Stats., means a town, village, city, county, school district or VTAE district).

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village of Kewaskum in the County of Washington, Wisconsin, borrow from the Trust Funds of the State of Wisconsin, the sum of Three hundred thousand and no cents Dollars (\$300,000.00) for the purpose of public improvements to the Municipal Building, 204 First Street,

(Addition to and remodeling of) and for not other purpose.

The loan is to be payable within Ten years from the 15th day of March preceding the date the loan is made. The loan will be repaid in annual principal installments with interest at the rate of eight and one half (8.5%) percent per annum from the date of making the loan to the 15th day of March next and thereafter annually as provided by law.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that there shall be raised and there is levied upon all taxable property, within the Village of Kewaskum, in the County of Washington, Wisconsin, a direct annual tax for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the loan as they become due.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that no money obtained by the Village of Kewaskum by such loan from the state be applied or paid out for any purpose except the public improvements to the Municipal Building, 204 First Street (Addition to and remodeling of) without the consent of the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that in case the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands agrees to make the loan, that the president and clerk of the Village of Kewaskum in the County of Washington, Wisconsin, are authorized and empowered, in the name of the village to execute and deliver to the Commission, certificates of indebtedness, in such form as required by the Commission,

for any sum of money that may be loaned to the village pursuant to this resolution. The president and clerk of the village will perform all necessary actions to fully carry out the provisions of Chapter 24 and Sec. 67.12(12), Wis. Stats, and these resolutions.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this preamble and these resolutions and the aye and no vote by which they were adopted, be recorded, and that the clerk of this village forward this certified record, along with the application, for the loan to the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands of Wisconsin.

Trustee Paul Blumer moved adoption of the forgoing preamble and resolutions.

Trustee Donald Mlodzik seconded the motion for adoption of the preamble and resolutions.

The question being upon the adoption of the foregoing preamble and resolutions, a vote was taken by ayes and noes, which resulted as follows:

Trustee Howard Laubenstein voted - Yes

Trustee Thomas McElhatton voted - Yes

Trustee David Nigh voted - Yes

At least three-fourths of the members of the village board of the Village of Kewaskum, in the

County of Washington, State of Wisconsin having voted in favor of the preamble and resolutions, they were declared adopted.

On a motion by Trustee Donald Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee Mary Krueger and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board lifted the winter parking restrictions to begin immediately.

On a motion by Trustee Mary Krueger, seconded by Trustee Thomas McElhatton and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the purchase of the storm sewer material required to proceed with the North Avenue project from Forrer Supply, Inc., the provider of the low quote.

On a motion by Trustee David Nigh, seconded by Trustee Paul Blumer and carried by the majority, by voice vote, with Trustee Howard Laubenstein abstaining, the Board approved the purchase of a mower for the diesel tractor at a cost of \$1,190.00.

On a motion by Trustee Donald Mlodzik, seconded by Trustee Howard Laubenstein and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board granted River Bend Cablevision a 60 day extension with appropriate interest to be charged on the 1984 Franchise Fee. The matter

was discussed and it was the consensus of the Board to join forces with the City of West Bend and other communities affected to resolve the matter.

The Board briefly discussed the Satellite Earth Station requirements as recommended by the Southeastern Wisconsin Region Building Inspector Association and indicated it will be placed on the agenda again for further discussion.

Motion was made by Trustee Howard Laubenstein, seconded by Trustee Paul Blumer to adjourn the meeting. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent." The motion was carried unanimously.

Tornado Safety Precautions Can Save Lives, Property

[2nd in a series]

When a tornado approaches - your immediate action may mean life or death, according to the Wisconsin Division of Emergency Government.

The tornado season in Wisconsin is generally recognized as April through September. However, tornadoes have occurred in every month in Wisconsin with the exception of February.

There is little that can be done to avoid the property destruction tornadoes bring; but tornadoes do not have to be killers. You can take precautions when a storm threatens and thereby save lives, reduce threat of injury and lessen property damage.

Tornadoes are the most devastating local storms that occur in the world. On the average, 700 occur nationally, killing at least a hundred people and causing millions of dollars in damage during a bad year. The winds in a tornado turn counter-clockwise with speeds that can reach 300 miles an hour. As an illustration of the horrifying power of these killer storms, it's reported a Minnesota tornado carried an 83-ton railroad coach with 117 passengers aboard, 80 feet in

the air. While most tornado damage is caused by the violent winds, most injuries and deaths result from flying debris.

Most tornadoes move from southwest to northeast. Generally, tornadoes occur in the spring in the late afternoon on a hot day. But remember, tornadoes can happen any time.

EASY TO RECOGNIZE. You'll have no trouble recognizing an actual tornado! It is a funnel-shaped cloud extending down from the base of a thunder cloud. As it touches earth, it writhes and twists throwing up debris in all directions. It is usually accompanied by hail, violent thunderstorms and winds. Its noise is so loud it can blot out the sound of crashing buildings and falling trees.

When the skies look threatening listen to the radio. The National Weather Service and the Severe Storm Warning Center track all weather systems with sophisticated radar and are usually able to give adequate advance warning of violent weather conditions. A **TORNADO WATCH** means the atmospheric conditions are such that tornadoes could develop. A **TORNADO WARNING** means an actual funnel has been

sighted in your area. Warnings are usually accompanied with a description of the speed and direction of travel of the funnel. Many communities have also arranged special warning systems such as sounding warning sirens.

When a watch is issued, listen to broadcast advisories, and be ready to take cover. It is wise to collect a battery-powered light and radio and have family members within earshot under watch conditions. Also, take your car keys; should a tornado hit your area, your car still may be operable - but keys could be lost in the rubble.

IMMEDIATE ACTION SAVES LIVES. When a tornado threatens, immediate action can save lives.

Stay away from windows, doors, outside walls and protect your head.

IN HOMES OR OTHER SMALL BUILDINGS go to the basement or a place in the middle of the house, like a closet, bathroom, or interior wall. Get under something sturdy.

IN SCHOOL, be calm and follow the directions of your teacher. Stay away from auditoriums and gymnasiums with wide, huge roofs that could collapse easily.

IN SHOPPING CENTERS OR VERY LARGE BUILDINGS look for a predesignated shelter. If there isn't any, a middle hallway on the lowest floor is the next best place to take

shelter. **IN MOBILE HOMES OR CARS,** leave them and find shelter in a building. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert with your hands shielding your head (be sure to watch out for standing water in these culverts).

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KHS Track Teams Rout Sheboygan Falls

The KHS track teams won every event last Friday with the boys winning, 106-12, and the girls, 70-30, in a coed indoor meet held in Kewaskum.

The Falcons (who had most of their top athletes competing in a different meet that night) were simply no match for the superior Indians. Seniors Mike Steinhardt and Mark Follmann led the boys and totalled 36 of their team points.

Steinhardt set a KHS indoor record in the long jump with an incredible leap of 21'2 1/2", breaking the old mark by nearly a foot. He also took firsts in three other events — the high jump (6'2"), 40 meter dash (5.3), and the 200 meter dash (25.4).

Follmann won both the high (7.0) and low (6.6) hurdles and added seconds in the long jump and high jump.

Others performing well were John Mertzig (second in the 40, third in the 200), John Harju (3rd - long jump, 3rd - 45m highs, 2nd - 45m lows), Troy Kuphal (2nd - pole vault, 3rd - high jump), Bill Gruss (2nd - 3200, 3rd - 1600), Mark Johnson (2nd - 45m lows, 2nd - 45m highs), and freshman Miles Shaw (2nd - 1600, 2nd - 800).

Boys' coach Dave Drexler was pleased with his team's first meet and commented that he was confident that the result would have been the same if Falls' top runners would have been here.

In the girls' part of the meet, KHS coach Denise Leong was pleased with her team's performance, in particular the effort of soph Jenny Hintz, who won the shot put with a toss of 33'10 1/2".

Double winners for the girls included Amy Kougl in the high jump (again jumping 5'0") and the 40 meter dash (6.1), Sandy Secor in the long jump (14'9 1/2") and the 45 meter hurdles (8.3), and Sandy Klein in the 1600 (5:54.2) and the 3200 (13:07.7).

Also winning were Lisa Fusek in the 200 (30.0) and Lori Batzler in the 800 (2:41.6). Soph Brenda Vetter won the 400 in another impressive time 1:05.9) and then thrilled the crowd once more as she came from behind in her anchor leg of the 1600 meter relay to carry her team to victory.
