

Razing of the old offices to make room for the library expansion part of the Municipal Building's remodeling is expected to be done this week.

Mueller Excavating Gets Sewer Contract

On a unanimous vote Monday night, the Kewaskum Village Board awarded the contract for storm sewer installation along Highways 45 and 'H' to Mueller Excavating of Campbellsport.

Mueller's low bid of \$74,204. 50, was considerably under projected engineering estimates of over \$100,000. Two other bids were received for the job. Zunker Contractors of Fond du Lac came in at \$78,836, and Ozaukee Excavating of Grafton had a high bid of \$93,650.

Money for the work will come from Tax Incremental District (TIF) funds.

In other action, the Board accepted the recommendation of the Plan Commission to deny a rezoning request from Mr. and Mrs. Noble Ray. The Rays wanted to turn their barn into a resale shop for used items.

The board also discussed replacement of the council room tables with desks. While not all the trustees were against the idea, some felt the money might be needed more in some other phase of the municipal building's remodeling. After considerable discussion, the board voted 4 to 3, to table action until a later date.

Presiding over his last meeting as president, Gerald Stollenwerk jokingly noted the vote was the first time in his six years as board president that he has had to break a tie and it was the last item to come before [Continued on Page 2]

Statesman Staff Writer State Senator Donald Stitt and Assembly Representative Dwight York were guests at last week's meeting of the Kewaskum Board of Education's Policy - Legislation - Instruction Committee.

The two men addressed questions regarding general property tax relief, minimum starting salaries for teachers and taxes for vocational schools. Stitt was asked if the state would consider transferring school aids financing from property to income taxes. Stitt told the audience, "you're talking about \$1 billion a year, that's what the schools are eating up in the school aids program. To put that on income taxes alone," said Stitt, "you'd be looking at income tax increases anywhere from 60% to 75%. That would probably have the effect of driving everyone out of the state," said Stitt.

York addressed the problems involved with state mandating courses. He said Madison is listening to the people, noting changes regarding computer literacy and health education courses have already been implemented. Because computer programs are now being offered all the way down through the elementary level, state mandates have been revised to

KHS Students Return With 2nd Place Trophy in First Olympics of the Mind Competition

Olympics of the Mind (OM) is a multileveled series of problem solving competitions designed to nourish creativity in students. These competitions require teams of students to utilize their divergent thinking skills - i.e., originality, flexibility - to redefine and solve problems. The OM competitions take place at local, regional, state, and international/. world levels. A team must win first place at one level of competition in order to advance to the next level.

Olympics of the Mind competitions are age-graded into three different divisions. Students from kindergarten through fifth grade compete in Division I, students from the sixth through eighth grades compete in Division II, and students in grades nine through twelve compete in Division III.

During an OM competition, each seven-member team of students is required to solve two types of problems, a long-term problem and a spontaneous problem. Each team chooses to solve one of several long-term problems it was provided by the OM Association. The teams have approximately two months to develop and construct solutions to the long-term problems. The one spontaneous problem each team is presented with for the first time at the competition may be a brainstorming type problem, involve drawing, re-quire costume creation, ask for dramatization or creative writing, or involve building something. The solutions to the longrange and spontaneous problems are judged on their quality and each team's style in attaining/presenting their solutions. This was the first year in which the Kewaskum Public Schools participated in the Olympics of the Mind program. The OM program is in its eighth year. All Kewaskum High School students were invited to try out for the KHS Olympics of the Mind team during the week of January 14th-18th. Thirty-six potential team members competed among themselves on

problems requiring creative thinking. Each potential team member was given several problems to solve, some requiring oral solutions and some requiring written solutions. Team members were selected according to the creativity reflected in their solutions to the problems. Members of Kewaskum High School's OM team were Beth Bartelt, Amber Charland, Denise Meyer, Leighton Peterson, Mike Steinhardt, Tom Strigenz and Ron Theusch.

Once the team members were selected, they met frequently during the next two months to work on their long-term problem and develop their spontaneous problem solving skills. The long-term problem the team decided to solve was to build a robot. The robot was required to do classwork in math, science, social studies and geography. Furthermore, the robot had to pick up trash from the floor and place it in a wastebasket and hand in a term paper. The team members' spontaneous problem solving skills were developed through exercises in brainstorming techniques, redefining problems, and the ability to synthesize. This year's OM team was coached by Mr. Robert Sobelewski.

On March 30, the KHS

MPTI Offers Computer Training To Fire Fighters

Computers are being used in every field of occupation these days, and fire fighting is no exception.

Moraine Park Technical Institute is providing microcomputer training to 49 fire fighters from 11 area fire departments this spring. The course, "Microcomputer Applications for Fire Service," was created as a direct result of a survey of interest conducted in November 1984 by Jerry Stepien, Chairperson of MPTI's Safety Division.

Safety Division. "We had suggested computer training to our Fire Science Advisory Committee in late 1983, with little interest," said Stepien. Only a year later the interest was there, an indication of the growing national recognition that computers are valuable tools that can be applied to almost any job situation.

The first class of 20 fire fighters met on Saturday, Feb. 16, for an all-morning, hands-on introduction to the microcomputer. Another 20 fire fighters attended the afternoon session. Instructor Bruce DeBoer, Moraine Park's microcomputer specialist, developed the course to provide specific fire fighter applications of existing computer software.

The course was an ice breaker into the computer world for fire fighters, said Ken Reiser, Chief

Early Season Ban on Alcoholic Beverages In All State Parks
