Jaycee Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon Scheduled







Not many of our readers will remember this old business place in the photo taken shortly after the turn of the century. It was the Kewaskum Beer Garden located at Fond du Lac Ave. and Second St., on the corner just west of the malt house. We were informed by one source that the beer garden was operated by a Mr. Zwaschka and a Mr. Keller. Another source told us that John Kohn and Frank Kohn were also proprietors of the place at one time. At that time the corner was a busy place with farmers hauling barley to the malt house with horses and wagons and sleighs.

The home at the left of the beer garden was owned by Gerry Wright, a painter. We are told the story that Gerry also raised some nice, plump chickens. On occasion, some of the "pranksters around town" would help themselves to one of Gerry's chickens, have a chicken roast, and then invite him to eat his own chicken. Gerry would admit the chicken was good, but not like the ones he raised.

Some years later, after the beer garden building was razed, a spacious home was built on the corner by the late M. W. Rosenheimer. Following the Rosenheimers, several other tenants occupied the home before it was moved several years ago to Knights Avenue. ALLEN KOEPKE ELECTED CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

Two Area Hospitals Form New Corp., Hospital Data Processing, Ltd.

In a move designed to provide greater efficiency and contain health care costs, Beaver Dam Community Hospitals, Inc., and St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend, Inc. have formed a new for-profit corporation, Hospital Data Processing, Ltd. The corporate documents were finalized and signed on April 18, 1985 at Beaver Dam, Wisconsin.

Efforts towards the joint venture began in earnest in December with discussions between representatives of the two hospitals. Continued research into the concept firmly established numerous advantages of forming a separate for-profit organization. The new operation will provide greater efficiency and cost savings in daily central processing operations at both hospitals. Fred Bury, Executive Director of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, noted that the new service will provide initial savings in equipment of \$363,000 and operational efficiences of over \$60,000 annually, for the facility. Shared expertise in the management decision process and future savings investment are

additional advantages. The separate jointly owned corporation will provide a high level of sophisticated data processing services on an immediate basis through an IBM System 38 mainframe located at Beaver Dam Community Hospitals. Terminals at West Bend are linked to the mainframe by dedicated phone lines, so that both facilities are "on-line" at all times.

The establishment of Hospital Data Processing, LTD. represents the first joint venture for shared data processing services between two hospitals in the state of Wisconsin. The unique arrangement will make future expansion possible through the corporation's ability to accumulate capital for new and/or updated equipment purchases.

At the first meeting of the Board of Directors, Allen Koepke, Kewaskum, member of the Board of Directors of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, was elected Chairman of the Board; Robert J. Hankes, Chief Financial Officer of Beaver Dam Community Hospitals, was elected President and Treasurer; Marvin H. Neubauer, Chief Financial Officer of St. Joseph's Community Hospital, was elected Vice-President and Secretary. Other board members are Francis W Connors and John R. Landdeck, Beaver Dam; Ron Leonard, Horicon and Fred Bury, West Bend.

Former Teacher Here in Astronaut Competition

A former Kewaskum High School teacher, Katherine Koch -Laveen, 37, drives a tractor and a motorcycle, has flown a light plane, is mom to four children ages one through six, loves teaching chemistry to Apple Valley High, MN, students, and now may go into space.

Mrs. Koch-Laveen started teaching at Kewaskum High School in 1970 and resigned in June, 1976. She also coached girls' golf, track and basketball.

She, along with Steve Brehmer, 33, a physics, chemistry and computer science teacher at Wanamingo High School, Minnesota, were selected recently as Minnesota's two candidates in the national competition to choose one U.S. teacher to fly in the space shuttle next January. The Minnesotans now will compete with two entries from each of the other states in NASA's competition for what Koch-Laveen calls "the ultimate field trip."

"Sure, I want to go...This is a prominent and showy way to demonstrate science," she said shortly after students at Apple Valley High erupted into loud applause when the news of her selection was announced over the school's intercom system.

The showy part "captures the imagination of a broad spectrum of kids, and it really sparkles for talented youngsters," she said "That's what I hope to do by doing some (scientific) demonstrations aboard the shuttle, then traveling to schools across the nation reporting on the experiments and sharing my experience," she said.

She dismissed any fears about going into space, adding that her husband, Eric, an engineer, is a strong supporter of her bid. She said son Willie, 6, "who makes model rockets from scratch," and daughter Angie, 5, are excited, too, while daughters Beth, 4, and Carol, 1, are a bit young to appreciate what's happening.

While in college in the late 1960's, she inquired about becoming an astronaut, "but the field was not really open to women then," she recalled. Her fascination with flight resulted in her taking flying lessons — ''takeoff was the best part'' to get a feel for flying without going on to become a licensed pilot.

But she has been licensed to drive a school bus and a motorcycle, and after growing up on a Wisconsin farm, "I've driven numerous tractors with baler and corn pickers," she said. She still likes to run a tractor and "tootle around on my little motorcycle," she added.

The state education commissioner selected Brehmer and Koch-Laveen on the recommendation of a 10-member advisory committee of teachers, school administrators and a pilot that considered 135 Minnesota applicants. They now move through an interview process in which the National Aeronautics and Space Administration will select, in September, the teacher to go through three weeks of training and then ride the shuttle into space.

More than 200 dental product manufacturers will display the latest dental equipment and supplies at the MECCA Convention Center.

Dentists can also participate in table clincis, audiovisual programs, registered clinics and workshops all geared toward keeping current on scientific topics.

Representing the Washington-Ozaukee County Dental Society at the House meetings are delegates Drs. Richard C. Johannes and Allen D. Langeberg of Mequon and Stephen R. Van Ess of Kewaskum; and alternates Drs. Robert R. Faucell of West Bend and James W. Schwengel and Robert H. Schwengel of Cedarburg.

The 1985 incoming President, Dr. David A. Sampe, a general practitioner in Mequon, will address the House of Delegates, which also elects new officers.

Health buffs in red and white t-shirts will compete in the second annual "Molar Mile" run along Lake Michigan on Sunday, May 5.

Also meeting at the same time are the Wisconsin Dental Hygienists' Association, the Wisconsin Dental Assistants' Association, and the Auxiliary to the Wisconsin Dental Association.

When Mr. Klein opened the oven door again some time later, a flame shot into his face and at the same time, the terrific explosion followed. Klein, who was nearest the stove received the worst injuries. He was thrown into a corner of the room, with one eye blown out and his face frightfully lacerated. Jacob Schiltz and his sister both had their heads and hands badly bruised, but no serious effects were feared.


