Village Receives Delinquent Cable Fees

School Board Names Softball Sponsors Want Park Lights **District Administrator**

The Village of Kewaskum has finally received its \$3,300 in franchise fees from Riverbend Cablevision of West Bend, said Village Administrator Dan Schmidt at Monday night's board meeting.

The money, which was originally due on March 15th, came five days past the 60-day extension due-date and with a letter of protest. Schmidt told the trustees, the cable company still contends the fee is illegal, however, he also noted legislation is in the works which should eventually resolve the situation.

James Rinas, sponsor, and Merlin Dreher, coach, of adult softball teams, came before the board regarding the subject of

lights on the Kiwanis Park diamonds.

Rinas questioned when lights would be installed at the new diamonds. Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton said \$40,000 has been included in the 1988 budget for lights. Dreher told the board, 1988 is still three years away and I'm sure that if we got lights now we'd have no problem in getting teams and tournaments to the park. Rinas told the trustees. everybody in the area has lights and tournaments and we haven't got anything.

Dreher told the board he works with six girls teams who have been playing on the high school diamond. Now we have a conflict with the high school's summer baseball schedule and we'll have to go out of the

village to find a place to play, noted Dreher.

Rinas asked if the village had looked into the possibility of installing used lighting. Schmidt said Campbellsport had done just that and now they regret it. They found they can't afford the electricity costs of those old lights and maintenance costs on them is also very high. "Ball diamond lighting isn't cheap," stated Schmidt, "Germantown just bid lights for one diamond and the cost was over \$44,000.'

McElhatton told Rinas, if he wanted to get a committee together, his group would work with them in trying to raise funds through fund-raisers, tournaments or anything they came up with. What we need is

Voters Sink Beechwood Lake Pumping Plans

On a 146 to 26 vote last Thursday, Town of Scott residents soundly defeated a proposed plan to pump Beechwood Lake down approximately four feet below its present flood level.

A "Standing Room Only" turn-out came to hear Town Chairman Charles Miller present a recommendation to authorize the township to appropriate up to \$10,000 from the 1986 budget to pump the lake.

Many of the residents, however, felt the results of the vote were a foregone conclusion since the lake has begun to recede slightly on its own. Melvin Moths told the board the Beechwood Lake area residents aren't the only ones faced with high water problems. "As we all know, we're in the sixth year of a high water plain. We, of the southwest corner of the Town of

Scott, anyone within the range of the plateau of Beechwood Lake to Haack's Lake, all have our problems but, when correcting our problems, we pay for them ourselves and we customarily do not go to the county for assistance.

Once the vote was taken, the special meeting was adjourned and only six people remained to attend a second regular town board meeting which included discussion of five alternative options for correcting the flooding at Beechwood.

During that second meeting, Miller told the board it must make a decision as to what position it will take regarding the lake. Lester Benzschawel, Town Clerk, who served on the Pumping Investigation Committee said, "my feeling is, what we did is for the township and the lake belongs to the township, not just Beechwood.





State Opens Bids For Area Bridges


Low bids for the construction of three U.S. 45 Bypass bridges in West Bend were opened last week in Madison.

The Lunda Construction Co., Black River Falls, submitted the apparent low bids on bridges for Decorah Road, Chestnut Street and Park Avenue. Cost of the bridges are \$634,539.09, \$420,781.10 and \$354,666.40, respectively.

These were three of 71 highway improvement projects in 38 counties in which bids were opened May 21. Total cost of the bids is \$28.5 million.

A low bid of \$82,659.73 for construction of bituminous shoulder and tapers at the U.S. 41 and State 60 interchange, the U.S. 41 and County B intersection and an intersection in Fond du Lac county was submitted by Payne & Dolan, Inc., Waukesha.

Work on all projects will begin after engineering and computer analysis by the Department of Transportation. Construction on U.S. 45 By-pass structures is expected to be completed this fall.

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

This old photo of the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Co. in Kewaskum shows the disastrous fire which destroyed the grain elevator located just south of the present plant in September of 1911. The plant was also damaged. It was immediately rebuilt on the north side of the plant and malt production was continued until Prohibition in 1919. During the years 1919-1933, some barley malt was produced and in 1930 and 1931 wheat malt, an experimental process at that time, was produced for General Mills. After the repeal of Prohibition, normal operations were again resumed.

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
MPTI Honors Staff Retirees







Dairyland Seed Acquires Todd Hybrid Corn Research

Orville Strachota, President of Dairyland Seed Co., Inc., West Bend, whose plant is located about one mile south of Kewaskum, recently announced that Dairyland Seed had acquired a hybrid corn research and breeding program from Todd Hybrids of Burlington, Indiana. The acquisition expands Dairyland's hybrid corn genetic base and contains some valuable inbreds.

Dairyland Research Director, Dr. Paul Sun said, "The Todd Hybrid corn breeding program has emphasized disease resistance, standability, and plant health. There appear to be some excellent new lines present in this germ plasm."

Dairyland's hybrid corn plant breeder, Dr. Harold Aycock, who will be working with the superior lines from this germ plasm collection, feels there is material that is ready to bring to market from this breeding program. According to Aycock, "Dairyland will have test quantities of some hybrids available this coming spring and will also be undertaking pilot production of a number of these new hybrid combinations for next season."

Dairyland will be evaluating this material at its new Corn Belt Research facility near Gibson City, Illinois, and also at its Wisconsin research facility near Clinton.

Strachota stated, "Since the first of the year we have strengthened our already deep commitment to the future of agriculture through improved plant genetics. We feel that improved corn hybrids and higher yields will play a critical role in the future of American farming. Our dealers have shown their loyalty to use in the past and we intend to invest our resources in their future. The increased demand for Dairyland hybrid corn helped make this acquisition possible.

The announcement of the Todd Hybrid corn research acquisition culminates three major announcements made by Dairyland since the first of the year. Earlier Strachota had announced the addition of Dr. Harold Aycock to the Dairyland plant breeding staff followed with the announcement of Dairyland's new Corn Belt Research facility near Gibson City, Illinois.

Over 220,000 Surveys Mailed to Catholics In Milw. Archdiocese

A total of 220,830 mailings containing two surveys to all registered Catholics in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee has been completed. On May 15th, 1,000 priests received the mailing. On May 20th, a random sample was mailed to 1,600 households and during the week of May 28th, over 215,000 mailings were sent to Catholic households. Another mailing has been sent to the 3,100 religious Sisters and the 130 religious Brothers during the same period.

Each survey mailing contained a cover letter from Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland stating, "To prepare for the synod, it is appropriate for me to survey the Catholics of Southeastern Wisconsin regarding the issues that they estimate are most important and require attention as we move toward the year 2,000 and beyond.'

Each survey question is translated into Spanish to accommodate Spanish speaking Catholics in the diocese. The survey was developed by the synod coordinating committee and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Urban Research Bureau. It was designed so the responder would be anonymous and was field tested in three parishes in late March.

The surveys can be returned in the envelope enclosed in the survey mailing or during parish liturgies on June 2nd and June 9th

The history of synods in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee dates back over 100 years. A synod was called and convened in 1849, six years after the diocese was formed. In the late 1950's Archbishop Albert G. Meyer called a synod, however, all local planning ceased when Pope John Paul XXIII called Vatican Council II. SYNOD, 1987 will be the first synod to be convened in the 20th century in the diocese.

Fr Michael Newman, chairperson of the synod coordinating committee, explained the purpose of the synod survey. "The Archbishop is looking for measured impressions from all Catholics in the diocese. In his pastoral letter, "Walking Together," he views the synod as a process in which he will have the opportunity to hear shared concerns and hopes.'

The issues identified by reponses to the synod survey will assigned to study be commissions which will prepare reports for presentation to the synod in 1987.

The process by which synod delegates and study commission members will be advocacy program which includes the pro se Temporary Restraining Order/Injunction advocacy services available to battered women.

The expanded program became possible as the result of state funding. The program will provide funds for the printing of booklets explaining battered women's legal rights. FBW will cooperate with other county agencies, local attorneys and local law enforcement agencies in its effort to enable battered women to utilize the legal system with more confidence and a clearer knowledge of their rights.

In April 1986, group sessions for coping with the legal process while maintaining selfsufficiency and self-esteem will begin. A peer counselor will provide emotional support, available options, and arrangements for transportation and child care throughout the decision making process.

FBW will also provide legal advocacy to children during litigation resulting from a domestic violence situation. These services will carefully avoid infringing on the territory of lawyers, providing such elements as emotional support, aid in using the system, explanations and transportation.



in session only 157 days this year - a short time, considering the multitude of important matters we must decide. This task would be easier if we were not burdened with hundreds of "commemorative" bills, which comprised one-tenth of the legislation introduced last Congress.

While no one would dispute the worthwhile contribution made to society by disabled veterans, or the need for increased awareness of drunken driving, can we similarly justify designating National Mule Day, or National Sewing Month? Where do we, in Congress, draw the line?

In short, all of these matters should be stopped because I think we are paid to consider more important matters.

Members of Congressinal staffs spend hundreds of hours each year on commemorative legislation. Add to that the estimated cost of \$750,000 for printing bills, Dear Colleagues and Congressional Record entries, and it is clear that commemorative bills are not a prudent use of our time or taxpayers' money.

Despite House rules restricting commemorative bills, such legislation is prolific. Last Congress, 652 commemorative bills were introduced, and over 150 have been introduced already this year. We, in Congress, must ask ourselves if we can justify to our constituents - and ourselves - the time spent on leglislating such things. The answer is absolutely

As a result of all this I have

Congress is scheduled to be cosponsored legislation which would prohibit the House from considering commemorative bills. H. Res. 111 would rid us of this unnecessary burden and allow us to concentrate on issues that truly warrent federal action.

Two License Plates to Stay, Stitt Reports

By Senator Donald K. Stitt

Recently the Joint Finance Committee's Transportation Discussion Group considered and later voted against a proposal in Governor Earl's budget that would have required the issuance of only one license plate for all motor vehicles. This proposal has substantial impact on law enforcement, road safety and the costs to taxpayers and drivers.

Under current law, the Department of Transportation is required to issue two license plates to most motor vehicles. The Governor has recommended, in his budget, that all vehicles be issued one license plate.

Twenty states currently issue only one license plate for automobiles and fifteen others are considering single plate legislation. States issue a single plate primarily to reduce expenditures.

Law enforcement officials strongly object to the one plate system even when considering the costs. They believe the reflective front plate has value both as a safety device and as a means of vehicle identification. Surveys of law enforcement

officials from both one and two plate states show opposition to a one plate system. The two plate system is strongly supported by 74% of the officers in Ohio (a two plate state) and 58% of the officers in Pennsylvania (a one plate state). They believe two plates are "very important" for safety and law enforcement reasons.

Although I believe very strongly in the need to reduce government expenditures wherever possible, the need to provide our law enforcement officials with the tools they must have to carry out their duties takes priority. The two plate system clearly increases road safety and enhances the chances of identification of vehicles for law enforcement purposes.

The two plate system will now be considered by the entire Joint Finance Committee. I further expect that this system will also be retained by the Legislature.

A report can be made by telephone, mail, or in person and should include the following information: name of person, what is being reported, date it happened, signature, address, and the claim number under which benefits are being paid (a nine-digit number followed by a letter).

Becker said the following events should be reported:

- Change in mailing address. - Earnings of more than the annual limit - \$7,320 for people 65 or over, \$5,400 for people under 65. People getting benefits because of disability should report any work. - A person goes outside the United States. - Imprisonment for com-

mission of a felony. Dependents and survivors

should also report: - Divorce or annulment of marriage.

- Marriage.

- Adoption of a child.

- Child leaves the care of a parent.

- Child nearing 18 is full-time high school student or disabled.

- Change in school attendance for student 18-19.

- A person becomes unable to

manage funds.A person dies.

More information about reporting can be obtained at any Social Security office or by calling 1-800-242-9946. Free booklets are available which explain reporting responsibilities in greater detail.



U-Turns Are Illegal at Signal Lights

Making a U-turn at a signal light could cost up to \$40.00 and three (3) demerit points against your driver's license, according to Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz.

Wisconsin law specifically prohibits U-turns at signalized intersections whether or not a "NO U-TURN" sign has been erected, according to the Sheriff. Other places where U-turns are prohibited are midblock in a business district or on any through highway in a residential district — unless the turn is at a crossover on a divided roadway where there are no signs posted otherwise. A second or subsequent conviction within a year could result in a forfeiture of up to \$100.00, plus an additional three (3) penalty points.

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


