"It was a lot of running at first — we took turns watching each other's kids since this was a volunteer activity," said Hafermann, describing the initial search for a cooperative law enforcement agency and the subsequent establishment of a school's program.

"I'm glad we do it as a project—it makes me feel good," said Hafermann. "It actually is fun. The sheriff's people are very nice, very easy to work with."

The homemakers help by typing, filing, running copies of literature, reassuring youngsters, and washing ink off little fingers. Two or three homemakers return to the schools in

605 Beach Passes Sold

TIF District Projects Near Completion

Bidding on all the Village of Kewaskum's TIF projects came in below estimated figures Administrator Dan Schmidt told the Village Board at its meeting Monday night, resulting in a balance of \$51,000 left in the TIF account.

Schmidt said the money, along with interest earned, will be put into a Debt Service Fund which will be used to help pay off the TIF loan. The final project, curbs and sidewalks along highways H and 45, is expected to begin within a week.

Board President David Nigh commended Schmidt and the municipal office staff for the time and effort put into the TIF program. Because of their working with the engineers, the village was able to save approximately \$15,000 in engineering fees, said Nigh.

Schmidt also informed the trustees that the village's general financial picture was good. Revenues are a little ahead of this time last year and expenditures for this same period are a little below last year's figures.

Pete Albers, Water Pollution Control Superintendent, informed the board that his department will begin to clean the digestors screens at the treatment plant. This is earlier than normally scheduled. Because of the malt house's closing, we're getting a great deal of barley coming through due to their clean-up operations. Schmidt said the malt company had been informed it will be billed for their appropriate share of the digestor cleaning costs.

Parks Committee Chairman Tom McElhatton said 605 beach passes had been sold as of last Friday. He noted some residents had expressed some concern over the weeds at the pool. McElhatton said the weed condition was due to the above normal temperatures and lack of rain. The water has been tested and found to be alright, said McElhatton, and we're working to control the weed

Bingham Dr. Robt. emphasizes that "nature's nutritional balance must be maintained" for arthritis relief. "The interaction among vitamins, minerals, enzymes, essential amino acids and fatty acids important. Six out of 10 patients with any type of arthritis will probably show some improvement and very often a recovery from nutritional therapy along," says Dr. Bingham. So, eat fresh fruits and vegetables, lean meats and whole grains. Avoid processed foods, especially refined carbohydrates such as white sugar and white flour.

1985 United Way Goal for County Set at \$260,000

Jim Oaklief, President of Creative Marketing of America Inc. and this year's United Way of Washington County Campaign Chairman, announced the 1985 drive goal. The goal this year is \$260,000. Last year's pledges totaled more than \$200,000, although \$228,000 was actually expended.

The increase in this year's goal is a result of several factors. For the past several years United Way has been spending more on the agencies than it actually raised during the drives. For example, the 1983-84 goal was \$165,000 but United Way actually allocated \$226,000 and the 1984-85 goal was \$185,000 while United Way actually spent \$228,000.

This occurred because the surplus that had built up during the prosperity of the 70's was being utilized to fund agencies through the area-wide recession of the early 80's. At the same time goals for the drive were not being increased over previous year's collections. That combination of factors has all but depleted United Way's reserve funds.

In addition, the needs of the community are increasing at an unprecedented rate. In 1984 more than 20,000 clients were

served by United Way agencies. That count is expected to exceed 23,000 in 1985.

After last year's campaign the Board decided that the situation required a new approach to the annual fund drive, and has hired an Executive Director to provide professional staffing and accountability, and to help identify exactly where the critical need is in the community.

Jim Oaklief said: "Clearly, something has to be done. The problems are mounting, the volunteers are burning out, and the drives aren't bringing in what this community is capable of doing. At the same time I'm hearing from people who say they didn't realize how serious the problems were getting. We have to change our traditional approach!"

"This county has always pulled together to help people in need. I am confident that we will unite this year to meet our goal, and to provide the kind of services people in this area deserve. United Way is the best tool we have in our battle to solve the health and human care problems here, so I am strongly encouraging everyone to dig deep for their full fair-share this year."

United Way of Washington County includes Allenton, Jackson, Newburg, Slinger and West bend. Kewaskum has its own drive.


