Some Students Will Walk to School While Some Will Ride Bus

On a three to two vote during another special meeting, members of the Kewaskum School Board approved a motion to declare the roadway along Highways 45 and H "nonhazardous" but the district will continue to bus kindergarten through sixth grade students from designated pick-up points near the Bel-Ric/Trailer Court area to school for 1985-86.

The motion, by board member Jean Goeden, came after an hour and a half's discussion on an earlier motion by board member Neal Weare to declare the area "still hazardous" and that K-6 students be bussed, was vetoed three to two, with Goeden, Brigham and Theusch voting against it, Weare and Dieringer for, and Perry Ankerson and Kim Peterson absent.

The district had planned on discontinuing all bussing to the Bel Ric area when construction of sidewalks along the route had been completed. The sidewalk construction had become a priority project in the Village's TIF District after the School Board made several requests,

both directly and written, since 1980, asking that the village install walks. It was felt this would eliminate the hazard of walking on the road so bussing in that area could be dropped, saving the district about \$16,000 per year in transportation costs.

Several of the approximately sixty residents attending the meeting again brought up many of the same arguments which were discussed at last week's meeting, from not having the walks shoveled to concern over children being abducted.

At the start of the meeting, it appeared it was simply a question of busing or not busing, however, many other ramifications surfaced with Weare's motion stipulating busing of K-6 students, opening a whole new can of worms.

A Bel Ric resident asked if that motion pertained to both private and public school students. It was then that Weare learned the parochial K-8 students were being bussed on the early runs with high school students while public school students rode the late bus. "I'm remiss in not knowing the parochial schools start at a different time," stated

Weare. When a hint of excluding the parochial students was made, there was noise from the audience.

Board member Ron Theusch, who voted against both motions, asked about other areas of the village where children walked along the roads and next to highways. He felt the board should remain consistent with its busing policy and, if the area was no longer considered hazardous busing should be dropped. By busing the Bel Ric children, it is showing preferential treatment for some, while other K-6 youngsters from areas such as Knights Avenue and Stark Street will still be required to walk to school. "The thing that keeps coming back to me is what, with the sidewalks, makes this any more hazardous than other routes," he stated.

When parents brought up plowing and shoveling of walks, public works Superintendent Augie Bilgo repudiated statements that it took three days to get roads plowed in the sub-division. "I dispatch the plows at 3:00 a.m. in the morning and one of the first plows goes out to Bel Ric, maybe by the time some people get up there is snow on the road again," said Bilgo. There might be some instance where its 24 hours before we can plow, but never three days, he said. "What we're missing here is the parents' responsibility toward their children in this situation," stated Bilgo.

When one man said the district shouldn't expect the kids to walk along open areas such as the re-load station and cemetery on cold windy days because "they'd freeze their butts," Bilgo noted that area was not any different than walking along the River Road where the wind sweeps across the fields and river. Kids have been walking that route for years. When all was said and done, the end result was that the district will set up bus pick-up points on H and 45, for kindergarten through sixth grade students as the buses will no longer go into the subdivision, and all seventh through twelfth grade students will now walk to school. The new plan is expected to go into effect Tuesday, September 3rd, following Labor Day.

Plans Presented Here for Elderly Housing Complex

The Kewaskum Plan Commission reviewed proposed plans by Dr. Cesar Sison to construct a 43-unit elderly housing complex on land directly behind the doctor's clinic at 1040 Fond du Lac Avenue.

The building, as presented, would contain 42 one-bedroom apartments and a two-bedroom manager's unit.

Lew Herro, of Siesel Construction, Milwaukee, said the project would be developed with tenants 50 and older in mind. All the units are designed for the standpoint that they would be convenient for a handicapped person with wide doors, closets and specially designed kitchens.

Sison said it would not be set up as a nursing or rest home type project with doctors and nurses but rather a place where older people who cannot or do not wish to keep up a home would like to live.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted the building would not be a low income or subsidized housing project, just an apartment setting where all the residents would be in the senior age category.

After viewing the plans, Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling told Herro there were some points which had to be clarified before the commission could make any recommendations. The first concern is the density factor which determines how many units can be constructed on a given parcel of land. "We need to know the net acreage, less the land connected with the clinic, because the number of units you can build is based on that fact,"

said Zarling. Zoning regulations also require 1½ parking spaces per unit, noted Zarling, so it also has to be determined if there is enough room for 65 spaces. You can't carry over any spaces from the clinic area.

After some discussion, an item of more concern to Herro and Sison was the fact that since the apartment and clinic would be on one parcel of land, neither building could be sold separately at some future date. Because the apartments would be built behind the clinic, they would have no other road access except by the clinic's driveway. Also, because of the way the clinic is situated on the land, the parcel cannot be split into two separate parcels. The rear section would have no road access and it is questionable whether a road easement would be legal.

Herro asked the commission to refer the re-zoning request to the September 24th meeting, giving him time to clarify some of the points which had been brought up.

In other action the commission reviewed the request of Dennis Anderson for a conditional use permit for construction of a home on land which is partially in the floodplain area along Roseland Drive. The commission voted to recommend the Village Board approve the request with a public hearing scheduled for September 16th.

The commission will also recommend to the Village Board that a \$50.00 fee for re-zoning requests be adopted. Schmidt said the fee would cover the costs of publishing public notes and mailing correspondence resulting from the requests.



50 Years Ago

August 30, 1935

A group of men representing the J: H. Wise Company, Inc., of Missouri, have been at work in the Bank of Kewaskum several days during the past week, where they installed the new equipment which was purchased by the bank. This equipment is known as the J. H. Wise system of bank protection and makes the bank almost impenetrable to bank robbers. The installation consists of a complete bullet-proof glass which is one and one quarter inches thick and is composed of five laminations of glass and four laminations of pyralin. The installation carries with it the latest improvements of sound travel and ventilation and the fixtures are equipped with self locking type gun ports. Windows have been barred and guarded and the entire installation has been approved of by the Underwriters Laboratories.



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Labor Day Holiday Is Most Deadly Summer Weekend

Labor Day drivers, beware. The summer's last major holiday weekend is statistically the most deadly of the three summer holiday periods on Wisconsin streets and highways, according to the state Department of Transportation.

Maynard Stoehr, director of the DOT's Office for Highway Safety, said accident data indicates that motorists will need to drive with extra care to avoid joining the crash statistics. He urged travelers to obey the speed limit, buckle up and avoid driving after drinking.


Over the past 10 years, Labor Day traffic crashes have killed 195 persons, compared with 138 for July 4 holidays and 154 in Memorial Day holiday crashes.

Last year 20 persons lost their lives in crashes during the Labor Day holidays. The greatest number of Labor Day fatalities occurred in 1977 when 29 persons died. The fewest number of traffic deaths occurred in 1976 when nine were killed.

According to Stoehr, alcohol contributed to a disproportionate number of crashes last year. Of the 19 drivers and passengers whose blood was tested for blood/alcohol concentration (BAC), 10 were over .05 percent, or impaired.

He said the BAC levels of the drivers involved in fatal crashes over the three-day period indicated heavy use of alcohol. On Friday night, the driver of a pickup truck ran into the rear of a tractor-trailer truck, killing the pickup truck driver. His which is evidence of drunken

BAC levels of .14 percent, .15 percent, .23 percent and .19 saw BAC levels of .21 percent,



people killed were wearing seat belts. One crash involving seven people, four non-belted occupants in one vehicle were killed, while the three people, wearing safety belts, in the other vehicle involved were not seriously injured, including a 3-year-old child in a car safety seat

He said that statistics such as these are what keeps law enforcement officers intent upon enforcing the state's drunken driving law. The State Patrol and local enforcement personnel will be out in full force over the holiday weekend keeping a close watch on holiday traffic as it moves northward beginning late Friday afternoon, and on the southbound trip home on Monday.

Motorists are urged to obey the speed limit, limit their drinking, and avoid stress and fatigue. Stoehr said if everybody conscientiously used seat belts their chances of surviving a crash are greatly improved.

Beware of Flares

The sight of an orange or red flare on the side of the road should be a signal to motorists that danger is ahead, says Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz.

Sometimes an officer will be the first to arrive at the scene of a serious accident, and will have to attend to the injured, Schwartz explained. There is no time to direct traffic, so the officer may place ignited flares on the side of the road as a signal to approaching traffic to use "caution."

Frequently, the flares are placed at the top of a hillcrest or before a curve in the roadway. This alerts the motorist that some danger, such as the accident, is ahead. The flare can also be used to warn motorists of a road obstruction, high water, or other danger that is not yet in view.

As soon as other officers arrive, more conventional means of traffic control are then set up, the Sheriff continued.

When a flare is spotted, the wise motorist will slow down and use extreme caution while approaching the scene of the accident, or other event. Be prepared to stop, either upon an officer's order, or on your own, if the road is blocked.
