### Trapp, Horner Win School Board Race

The good weather and the hotly contested Kewaskum Board of Education race apparently had some effect on electors as almost all polls reported a good turn-out for Tuesday's spring election.

Clara Trapp topped the field of four school board candidates receiving 993 votes, followed by former school board member Ralph Horner with 778, Ruth Schmitt 728, and Donald Nowak last with 518 votes.

Trapp and Horner will fill the two posts of incumbents Lynn Dieringer and Neal Weare who were defeated in their attempts for re-election in the February primary election.

A breakdown of the voting by township shows the Village of Kewaskum giving Trapp 223 votes, Horner 162, Schmitt 237, and Nowak 155. In the Town of Kewaskum, Trapp 128, Horner.

Former village board member Richard Schmidt defeated newcomer Gary Moody to win the third post, vacant as the result of Trustee Donald Mlodzik's decision not to seek re-election.

Laubenstein received 358 votes, McElhatton 343, Schmidt 289, and Moody 167.

In the Washington County Board of Supervisors contest, District Eleven incumbents Norbert Dettmann was defeated by challenger Hilbert Scheunemann, 262 to 224. In supervisory districts No. 9 (Town of Wayne) and No. 10 (Town of Kewaskum), Harold Westerman and Daniel W. Stoffel were re-elected without opposition, respectively.

### One Killed, Three Hurt In T. Farmington Crash

A 56-year-old Plymouth woman was killed and three others were injured in a two-car headon crash in the Town of Farmington shortly after 8 p.m. Monday.

Audrey J. Boeckmann, Route 2, Plymouth, died of internal injuries suffered in the crash. Injured were Daniel and Karen Franzen of New Britain, Conn. Daniel Franzen, 27, suffered leg injuries and possible internal injuries. He was listed in serious condition at St. Joseph's Community Hospital in West Bend. Karen Franzen, 26, had bruises to her upper body and was treated at the hospital and released.

They were in the car in which Boeckmann was a passenger. Hospital officials declined further comment on the victims

at their request.

The driver of the second car, James A. Naumann, 30, of 248 N. 10th Ave., West Bend, was cited for operating a vehicle while intoxicated after the car he was driving south on State Highway 144 crossed into the northbound lane, striking Franzen's car at Newark Dr. Naumann was alone in his car.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department said Naumann also was injured in the crash and was taken to the hospital, which also declined to provide further information at his request.

The Sheriff's Department said this was the fifth traffic fatality in Washington County this year, compared to none at this time a year ago.





#### **Volunteer Training** Sessions Scheduled By Battered Women

Friends for Battered Women of Washington County, Inc., a non-profit corporation providing services for victims of domestic abuse and sexual assault, has scheduled volunteer training sessions.

Training dates are April 14 and 21, from 6:30 - 10 p.m. The location has not yet been set. Volunteers are required to attend both training sessions if they wish to be crisis line counselors, court advocates or sexual assault advocates. Other agency volunteers are also encouraged to participate in the training.

Among the topics on the training agenda are: learning how to do crisis line counseling and referrals; services FBW offers; domestic abuse victims and alcoholism in the family; the cycle of battery; legal rights of domestic abuse victims and; the roles of police, district attorney and the courts and abused persons.

Those who complete the volunteer training will be eligible to be trained as sexual assault advocates at a later date.







#### Friends for Battered Women of County Seeks Building for Domestic Abuse Victims

Friends for Battered Women of Washington County, Inc. is actively searching for a large house or other building located in the City of West Bend suitable to be used as a shelter for domestic abuse victims.

Within 30 days it is planned to have narrowed the search for a shelter to three options. The FBW Board of Directors will then select the shelter.

The agency has received a grant totaling \$108,500 for 1986-1987 to open a domestic abuse shelter. (Most of that amount is budgeted to cover salaries of employees).

Your help is needed in locating a suitable shelter facility.

Space is needed for:

12 beds (75% are likely to be children of clients: there can be more than 1 bed per room).

Storage area for clients' belongings, food, supplies, etc.

Kitchen (to serve at least 12 people at once)

Facilities for food preparation Laundry

Bathroom facilities including toilets, showers, baths, etc. adequate for 12 residents, staff and visitors Office space for 6 to 8 employees (including area for conducting counseling for clients on an individual basis)

Living room(s)

Playroom(s) — nursery Visiting area

Space for outdoor recreation Garage, if possible

Parking space adequate for 12-15 cars.

The State of Wisconsin DILHR health and safety codes for buildings of this type must be met. The grant includes a limited sum for bringing the shelter into compliance with

such codes.

It would be an advantage if the property did not have to be rezoned — as it is planned to open the facility this summer.

Opening a shelter will enable the agency to expand and improve Friends for Battered Women's services. Those services include a 24 hour crisis line, one-to-one counseling, legal advocacy, support groups, sexual assault advocacy, public education, and provision of safe homes for domestic violence victims.

Please let Battered Women know as soon as possible whether you know of any buildings in the City of West Bend which would be suitable for use as a domestic abuse shelter.

Volunteers are also needed to serve on the Shelter Committee. Please tell the agency whether you would be willing to do so.

As this project progresses, the following additional types of help from the Washington County community will be needed:

Volunteers for the crisis line, fixing up the building, transporting clients, office work, telephoning, writing the newsletter, etc.

Donations of items to stock the shelter such as furniture, dishware, appliances, food clothing.

Contributions of funds to help support FBW.





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

#### April Proclaimed As **Motorcycle Safety** Awareness Month

The 1986 motorcycling season is officially underway, launched this week by Governor Anthony S. Earl in a proclamation declaring April to be Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in Wisconsin.

The month will mark the opening of rider training programs across the state, and will be observed at open houses at many of the Vocational Schools which will offer cycle instruction this summer, as well as at many dealerships across the state.

Ronald Thompson, motorcycle safety program manager for the state Department of Transportation, said training courses are scheduled in April to update motorcycle course instructors and to train about 30 new instructors for the 1986 season.

Cycle training will be offered at 36 locations across the state, sponsored by the 16 Vocational, Technical and Adult Education districts, the Port Washington Police Department, and two high schools in the Milwaukee area.

Thompson said 1,452 beginning riders enrolled in the training courses last year, and about 1,800 will be trained during the 1986 season.

Other new programs on tap for 1986 include a new motorcycle skill test which will test cyclists in traffic instead of on off-street sites. The Motorcycle In-Traffic (MIT) test will be offered as the standard skill test in all Division of Motor Vehicles driver licensing

#### THE TRUTH ABOUT HERB

The national media has been poking fun at a small town guy from Wisconsin. His name is Herb, who hails from South Bexley, Wisconsin, population 45.

Herb was being called a nerd. Why? Because he has never visited a Burger King. That startling fact led to a nationwide search for Herb, who was later found and given a media tour of America by the folks at the hamburger chain.

But an absence of Whoppers does not a nerd make. I've looked into Herb's life. I've known a lot of other people just like him. He is a good person, a stout midwesterner, a man of virtue. South Bexley is Wisconsin's Lake Wobegon, a place the fast-food world forgot and time has not improved.

It's true, as Burger King publicists maintained, that Herb has led a quiet life. His mother was a gardener and his father the only pea viner in South Bexley. Herb has never seen a punker or a surfer.

A Whopper isn't the only food he hasn't tried. He's never tried pink tofu or sprouts, either. He was brought up mainly on good Wisconsin dairy products and his mother's homegrown vegetables with an occasional piece of beef raised locally by farmer Walt Bexley, whose paternal grandfather built most of the village of the same name.

That doesn't make Herb a nerd. That makes him healthy. Herb has enjoyed some of the finer aspects of life in Wisconsin. He has cheered for the Milwaukee Brewers and backed the Bucks. He has been known to partake of Wisconsin's own delicacies of beer and brats. He has spent his summers in the great outdoors of Northern Wisconsin where he savors Friday night Fish Boils.

Today, it's difficult to tell who the true nerds are. Are they America's small town folk who've never known life in the fast lane or the fast food chain, the folks who have never lost touch with the earth and continue believing in neighborliness and love, qualities that grow best in quiet places?

Or are they the urban throngs suffering from indigestion, stress, two-minute lunches and surly dispositions toward people because there are simply too many of them?

And who is to say that South Bexley, Wisconsin is a worse place than New York or Los Angeles? Should we ask all the urban sophisticates who spend their Saturday nights listening to tales from Lake Wobegon?

The truth is that the East Coast and West Coast come up with most of the new trends in America, being the ports of entry for the influence of Europe and Asia, respectively. That makes them trendy

But it is in the Midwest, in little hamlets like Bexley, that the best of those new ideas -- the ones able to survive the journey inland -- take root and are nurtured. Without the Midwest, and without people like Herb, America would be an unstable place, a place without lasting values, a nation in danger of getting lost in

No, Herb isn't a nerd because he comes from a small place and because fast food has never passed his lips. He's the kind of guy there should be more of.

I only hope that all his new-found fame doesn't spoil him.

**Questions and Answers** Q. What is Haemophilus influenzae b (Hib) disease?

A. Hib disease is the most common cause of bacterial meningitis (inflammation of the membranes around the brain) in children below six years of age. This condition can result in mental retardation and other neurologic disorders such as paralysis, seizures and loss of hearing. The illness can also cause a variety of other problems such as inflammation of the throat (resulting in possible suffocation), pneumonia, and arthritis. The disease is fatal in five percent of

Q. Is Hib disease a type of influenza (flu)?

A. No. This disease is not caused by an influenza virus at all, but is actually caused by bacteria. It was misnamed in 1892 when it was mistakenly thought to be associated with an influenza outbreak at that time.

Q. How is the illness spread? A. It is spread from person to person by tiny droplets given off through the nose and mouth.

Q. How common is Hib disease?

A. Haemophilus influenzae b is most common in children under six years of age. In Wisconsin, approximately 100 cases are reported each year. Estimates for all the United States indicate 12,000 cases occur annually.

Q. Who is at risk?

A. Generally children below six years of age, especially younger preschoolers and those in day care centers. The risk of Hib disease decreases after five years of age. This is because most children have developed antibodies by then and are protected. Current U.S. estimates indicate that Hib attacks one out of 200 children before they reach fie years of

Q. Is Hib preventable?

A. Yes, a vaccine against Hib disease was licensed in 1985.

Q. At what age is the vaccine recommended?

A. Generally the vaccine is recommended for children two years through five years, with increased emphasis immunizing younger children (who are at greater risk of illness) as well as children in day care centers. The vaccine may be given to children 18-23

months, especially those in day care centers, however, it is not as effective as in older children and a booster may be needed at a later date.

Q. Is the vaccine safe?

A. Yes. Fewer than one percent of immunized children develop a fever greater than 101°F. Most reactions are mild local reactions, or low grade temperatures within 24 hours of the immunization.

Q. Is the vaccine effective? A. Yes. In vaccine trials, 90% of children 18 months of age and older developed protective antibody levels.

Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) vaccine is available at the regularily scheduled immunization clinics offered by the Washington County Community Health Nursing Service in West Bend, Germantown and Hartford. There is a charge of \$7.00 per dose of Hib vaccine.

Awards were also presented to the Jim Esselmann herd and the Michael Becker herd for outstanding increases in production. The Esselmann herd of 171 cows currently averages 16,787 pounds of milk and 602 pounds of butterfat. This is an increase of 2,450 pounds of milk and 64 pounds of butterfat over the previous year. #### New Haemophilus Influenza Type B Vaccine Licensed, Now Available

A new vaccine to protect licensed by the Food and Drug Administration. Haemophilus influenzae b, is a major cause of childhood bacterial meningitis which in turn can result in mental retardation, hearing loss and seizures in up to 50 percent of the 12,000 children affected each year. Death occurs in 5 percent of individuals with meningitis caused Haemophilus influenzae type b. Other complications of the, illness can include epiglottis, (inflammation of the throat that restricts breathing), pneumonia, and arthritis.

According to the Washington County Community Health Nursing Service, Haemophilus influenzae b, is not a flu virus, but rather a bacteria which is transmitted among children much like the common cold, with younger children in day

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
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#### **Engeleiter Honored by West Bend** Savings for 25 Years of Service



#### Credit Card Scheme Still Around County

There's no doubt that the outfit that is trying to bilk county residents by obtaining their credit card numbers, and then use the numbers to make unauthorized charges on the accounts, is still in operation. They recently tried the scam on a county resident...who happened to be a sergeant on the Sheriff's Department!

According to Sheriff Clarence A. Schwartz, the calls are being made from the west coast. It is not known how the con artists select phone numbers. In this case, the woman making the call hung up in the middle of the conversation after the deputy tried to stall her for more specific information on who was behind the scheme.

They told the sergeant that he had won his choice of a microwave oven, a stereo system, or a free vacation. The woman said that his credit card number was needed to "verify the prizes," according to the sheriff.

Based on this report and others received by the Sheriff's Department, the persons making these calls do not waste any time if they suspect something is amiss or if they do not get total cooperation from their target. They hang up and try again with someone else.

"It would be nice if they would try again in the area and a resident would tell the caller to pass the word to his or her boss that they might as well give up making any progress in Washington County. They can tell the con artist that the local Sheriff's Department has been issuing press release and radio announcements regularly and that everyone knows about what is going on," the sheriff re-





Girls' coach Milt Dickensen recognized his three senior starters, Jodi Yearling, Brenda Kober and Lisa Fusek, all of whom earned their third letters. Yearling was the top scorer on the team with 181 points in 16 games for an 11.3 average. She also led the team in free throws, hitting 53 of 89 attempts. Fusek was tops in rebounding with 100, 37 offensive rebounds and 63 on defense. Kober was second in assists with 26, one behind Brenda Vetter, and she also was runnerup in steals with 35.

Yearling was the Indians' only representative on the Eastern Wisconsin Conference's all-conference second team. Fusek had the top field goal percentage, 44 percent, by hitting 60 of her 137 attempts.

Although the girls finished sixth in the conference with a 3-9 record, Coach Dickensen said they never gave up. He said he was anxiously looking forward to the team returning to Class B next year.

Eight other girls, six juniors and two sophomores, were awarded letters, namely Michelle Beck, Jenny Hintz, Terri Schmidt, Lisa Schneider, Tracy Theusch, Brenda Vetter, Brenda Theusch and Debbie The JVs were 6-6 in the conference and 7-12 overall. Kristie Kougl led the team in scoring with 105 points. They were coached by Keith Amundson. The freshmen, coached by Michele Wiedmeyer, wound up 5-5 and 6-8. Jenny Schneider was scoring leader with 129 points including a school record 31 in a game with Plymouth.

At the boys' banquet on March 25, Coach Perry Koth said his team played well even though it doesn't show in their record. The Indians ended up 4-8, good for fifth place in the conference and 8-13 overall. It was a senior dominated team.

Highlights of the season were victories over Chilton, which went on to win the Class B state championship, and Mayville, co-champions of the Flyway Conference. Koth said his team showed marked improvement as the season went on after-a slow start.

Koth praised Todd Steger, the team's best defensive player, who had 54 steals, and the top rebounders, Mike Coulter (171) and Ron Theusch (136). The team- had five different players who scored 20 or more points in a game, namely Tim Rohlinger, Steger,
