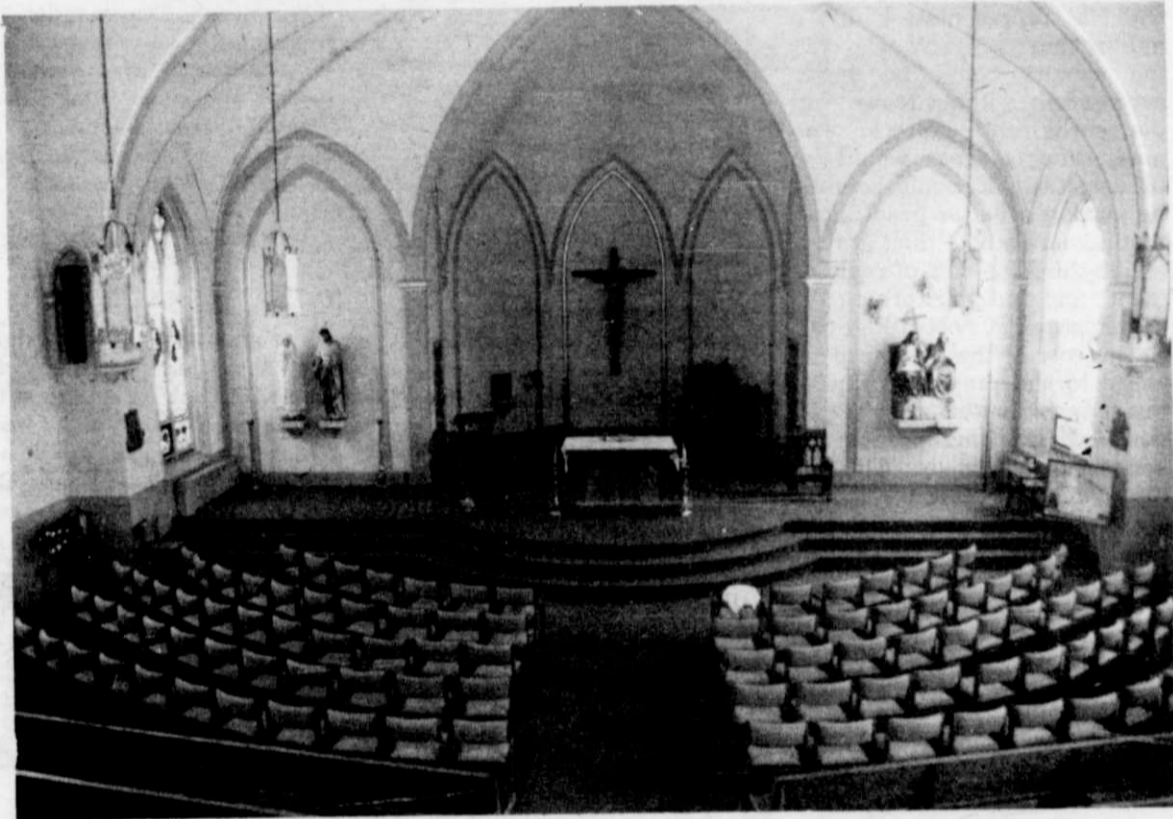

Parishioners Trace History

Holy Trinity to Celebrate 125th Anniversary Sunday

Archbishop Weakland to Be Celebrant at Mass

Through the efforts of a few members of Holy Trinity Catholic Church's congregation, its parishioners will receive a booklet chronicling the history of their church at its 125th anniversary celebration this Sunday, May 25.

Through old records, historical documents and interviews with parishioners who have been lifelong members of

the church, the research team was able to trace the church from its early beginnings in approximately 1861.

Though the first church itself is believed to have been built in 1861 or 1862, on land donated by Mathias and Therese Altenhofen, the parish itself dates back to at least the 1850's when the faithful had to travel to other communities for mass and other services including baptisms and weddings.

The first structure was a brick building believed to be the first church edifice in Kewaskum. The year 1865 is the recorded date for the first marriage and first baptism performed at Holy Trinity.

The church became an independent parish in 1868, when it received its first pastor, Reverend John Mueller. The church then went through a succession of several ministers

Regal Manor Land Annexation Approved by Village Board

After a public hearing Monday night, the Kewaskum Village Board unanimously voted to approve Regal Ware Incorporated's petition for annexation of 10.1 acres of land from the Town of Kewaskum for the construction of its new Regal Manor.

The board also approved an annexation agreement between Regal Ware and the village which will cover several legal issues including setting aside the necessary land for a future

public road.

The only citizen to make any comments was Ms. Marilyn Reinhardt, Town of Kewaskum, who spoke against approval of the petition at this time. Reinhardt told the board she was not opposed to the clubhouse, but that she had several questions about the proposal. She felt that all the governing bodies involved were not fully or properly informed as to the plans for the land.

Reinhardt indicated the item had never been on a Town of Kewaskum Board meeting agenda for discussion but yet it

had no objections to the petition. "I think village action ought to be held up until some of these questions are answered," said Reinhardt, "that's why I asked for a restraining order." In my lawsuit I said there was a conflict of interest and some ordinances had been violated.

James Hammes, attorney for the village, stated Reinhardt's restraining order had been denied in Appeals Court, and her litigation against the village had been judged frivolous and dismissed with the village's

Sister Mary Aquin Miller, Past President of Cardinal Stritch College, Kewaskum Native Dies

Sr. Mary Aquin Miller, the former Isabella Miller, passed away at the age of 82 on Monday, May 19, 1986 at St. Ann's Health Care Center in St.

Francis, WI. She was the daughter of the late Edward and Margaret Miller of Kewaskum.

Sr. Aquin attended Holy Trinity Grade School and graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1922. After graduation she worked at the L. Rosenheimer Department Store in Kewaskum, first as a saleslady and later as bookkeeper.

In September, 1929, she joined the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi in Milwaukee. She attended Milwaukee State Teachers College for two years and then taught commercial courses at St. Mary's Academy, Milwaukee. Later she attended Marquette University where she received a Bachelor of Science Degree and the Catholic University in Washington, D.C. where she received her

doctorate in biology in 1942. After this she taught biology and physics at Cardinal Stritch

until 1878, when Rev. F. Grome was transferred from New Cassel (now part of Campbell-sport).

It was Father Grome who decided the church needed to be enlarged. So, by June 1878, excavation for a fifty-foot addition was dug. Dedicated in August, 1878, the new section cost \$1,000.

In 1880, Father Grome drew up plans for the church's first school. The structure was built, and dedicated on Thanksgiving Day 1880, having cost the parish \$3,000. With the school's construction the School Sisters of St. Agnes accepted it and the teaching duties from 1878 to 1978.

In 1884, a new rectory was completed at a cost of \$3,000. That rectory is still in use today.

In the following years, the church improved its cemetery, organized a Catholic Aid Society, built a sidewalk from the railroad tracks to the school and later to the Lutheran and Catholic cemeteries at the east end of the village along Highway 28. An addition to the school was also completed.

In 1895, Father Grome was transferred to St. Joseph's in Milwaukee. He was replaced by Father Philip Vogt who was to faithfully serve the parish for forty-six years until his death in 1941.

In 1900, the church had grown, so plans were considered for the construction of a new church. Several times in 1904 the congregation sought bids for the new church's construction, but it was not until November, 1904, that a contract was finally awarded to George Boll of Manitowoc for \$12,200.

The old church was torn down in March, 1905. On June 18, 1905, the cornerstone for the new church was laid. In November, 1905, Father Vogt purchased five lots south of the church and donated them to the parish for use as convent and rectory gardens, and a school playground. In December, the four-dial clock was installed in the church's steeple and stained glass windows installed.

The church was consecrated March 27, 1906. The total cost of the building and furnishings came to \$22,691.17, with \$23,186.55 in pledges, cash, and donated items raised, leaving the congregation debt free.

In 1926, the congregation voted to build an addition to the convent and renovate the school.

On June 24, 1933, Father Vogt celebrated his Golden Jubilee.

During the depression years there was no material growth for the church, even necessary maintenance could not be done causing the buildings to fall into disrepair. In 1938, a new ceiling was put into the school hall because of its dangerous condition.

In 1941, Father Aloysius Fellenz was transferred to Holy Trinity because of Father Vogt's failing health. It was only during this time in its history that the church was to have two resident priests. At the time of his death in 1941, Father Vogt was the oldest active priest in the district. Father Frank LaBuwi followed Father Vogt as pastor of Holy Trinity.

In 1942, several exterior repairs and improvements were made to the church steeples and roof. A new furnace and

radiators were also purchased and the stained glass windows repaired.

By 1945, all improvement debts were paid and the parish made plans to convert the church basement into a hall for church activities.

In 1946, a new pipe organ was dedicated and the basement remodeling began at a cost of \$18,000.

On May 21, 1950, ground was broken for a new school which was dedicated on August 26, 1951. At that time the convent was also enlarged.

In 1952, a new tower clock and bell ringers were installed.

By 1956, the school had an enrollment of 250 students.

On June 21, 1958, Father LaBuwi was transferred to St. Mary's in Racine. He was replaced by Father John Budde.

On September 30, 1962, the church celebrated its 100th Anniversary with Archbishop William Cousins of Milwaukee celebrating the mass. Also in 1962, the parish had retired its \$35,000 debt and built a reserve of \$29,000 in its building fund.

In 1967, a second story addition to the school was dedicated. During 1974/75, the school had a peak enrollment of 268 students. The close of the school year in 1978, brought to an end an era, covering 98 years, in which the School Sisters of St. Agnes had been responsible for the teaching duties of Holy Trinity's school. The sisters left the parish because of a shortage of nuns. The school was to operate under the guidance of two lay principals, Grace Theusch and Nancy Weston.

Father Budde retired in 1982. The parish's present pastor, Father Robert Berghammer, arrived in July, 1982.

Sister Phyllis Wirtz, a School Sister of St. Francis, joined the Holy Trinity school staff and became principal in 1984.

In 1985, the parish began a pledge drive to raise funds for the current major restoration and redecoration program which is now completed in time to celebrate the church's 125th anniversary on May 25th, 1986. (A previous story on the renovation was published in an earlier issue).

Sunday's activities will begin with a 4:00 p.m. mass celebrated by Archbishop Rembert Weakland. Approximately 28 clergy are expected to attend the service. A reception will follow with a display of old pictures showing various years in the church's history.

The reception will be followed by a 6:30 p.m. dinner at the Amerahn Hall, and will conclude with a dance at 8:30 p.m., which is free to all parishioners and invited guests.

attorney and court fees being assessed against Reinhardt's property.

With approval of the annexation petition, Regal Ware can proceed with plans for the construction of the manor.

In other action, the board approved a liquor license for William Kulas at 109 Main Street (Glacier Inn), and a building permit for Richard Kleinmann for construction of a single family residence at 1150 Midland Avenue.

The board adopted four resolutions pertaining to the transfer of funds to various accounts to cover overdrafts, plus funds for the Highway 28 repaving project in 1987, and the village's capital improvements sidewalk projects.

The board discussed the matter of curb and gutter repair and replacement along North Avenue. Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo told the board that after the last meeting, he looked into another alternative for the repairs. Bilgo said he discussed the problem with a representative of a mudjacking company who felt the repairs could be made successfully without tearing up the curbs and gutters. The mudjacking process would be used instead. It would actually be putting a better base under that is more stable than gravel, at one-third the cost of replacement and not disturbing or re-landscaping, noted Bilgo.

The cost of the work will be assessed to the property owners, but at an estimated cost of \$2.50 per foot for mudjacking as compared to \$8 to \$10 for replacement. I think we should try it if we can save the residents that kind of money, indicated Bilgo.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board there is approximately 300 feet of repair work needed on North Avenue. Before any work is begun, the exact repairs would be measured and the property owners, who will be affected by the work, notified of the pending repairs.

Schmidt briefly discussed the village's sidewalk project and passed out an informational report on the repair and replacement program along with copies of letters which will be sent out to homeowners explaining the project along with various alternative plans for paying for the work.

We have approximately ten miles of sidewalk and I suggest we use a five-year replacement program where we would replace approximately one to two miles annually.

Schmidt asked the board to review the information so the proposal can be discussed at a future meeting.

Schmidt also passed out a survey of 24 communities' water and sewer rates. He noted Kewaskum was third from the bottom on the list in relation to water rates and ninth from the bottom on sewer rates. The village's last water rate increase was in 1982, and sewer rate increase in 1984. He asked the trustees to look over the information and contact him if they had any questions.

President David Nigh signed a proclamation congratulating Holy Trinity Catholic Church on the celebration of its 125th anniversary.

The board then adjourned to closed session.

Sr. Aquin was treasurer of the Wisconsin Foundation of Independent Colleges from 1969 to 1974, received the Cardinal Stritch College Medal of Meritorious Service in 1976, was a member of Delta Epsilon Sigma Honor Society, received the Pioneer Award from the Wisconsin Society for Brain-Injured Children and was a member of the Administrative Council of the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi from 1965 to 1967.

Sr. Aquin is survived by three brothers, Edward, Joseph and Fred Miller of Kewaskum and a sister, Margaret Mehring of Long Lake, rural Campbell-sport, WI.

Visitation for Sr. Aquin will be on Thursday, May 22, at St. Francis of Assisi Convent from 2:00 p.m. until 7:15 p.m. The Mass of Resurrection will be at the convent chapel at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday and burial will be at 9:30 a.m. on Friday at Holy Sepulcher Cemetery in St. Francis, WI.

Fire Damages Campbellsport Broom Factory

Employees of the Elwing Broom Factory in Campbellsport began up operations Tuesday following a fire that extensively damaged the plant late Monday afternoon.

An estimate of the damage was not immediately available but factory owner Jack Kivi hoped to be back in production in a couple of days. He said he would have to inspect equipment and material to see how much could be salvaged.

The Campbellsport and Eden Fire Departments were summoned about 4:45 p.m. Monday after a neighbor noticed smoke coming from the factory. A wall clock stopped at

4:49 p.m. in the factory office which suffered smoke damage.

According to Campbellsport Assistant Fire Chief Phil Hahn the building was filled with smoke when firemen arrived. He said that the first firemen to arrive on the scene were unable to enter the building from either end until they were on the roof. When the flames broke through the rooftop, firemen knew where to apply water.

A false ceiling apparently resulted in the rapid spread through the building. About 50 members of the two fire departments battled the blaze.

Campbellsport Fire Chief Donald Lackas described the concrete block and brick building as extensively damaged with most of the damage appearing in the area of the workbench where Kivi had been working before he left work at about 4:30 p.m.

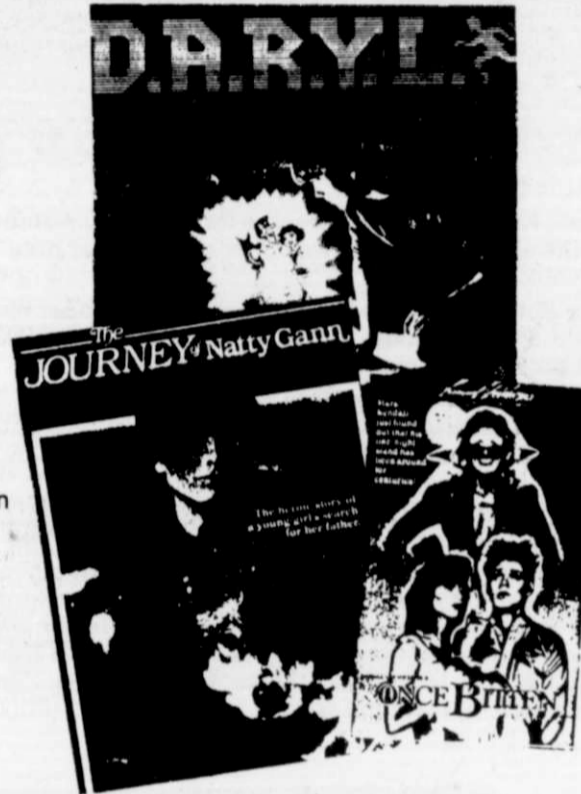

Holy Trinity Congregation, Kewaskum, will observe its 125th anniversary this Sunday. In conjunction with this celebration, the above photo shows upper classmen of Holy Trinity School, taken about 1913.

At that time, Holy Trinity School consisted of two rooms, the upper classmen in the "Big Room" and the lower classmen in the "Little Room." The faculty consisted of two Sisters of the Congregation of St. Agnes of Fond du Lac. There was also a "Cook Sister."

This picture was taken on the middle (wooden) church steps of Holy Trinity Church. There were three separate steps directly outside of the three doors of the church. Upon descending these steps, the parishioners were on street level. The concrete platform, which is now there, was not in existence at that time.

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Bumper Grass Clippings Crop Becoming a Costly Headache

"We're back to the old grass clippings problem again," Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo told the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night, "and it's costing the village residents time and money."

The "problem" Bilgo was referring to is the steadily increasing number of bags containing grass clippings that are being put out with the trash for collection. "I'm not saying anything about household garbage, some families have more trash because of bulky things like disposable diapers and things like that, it's the grass clippings I'm talking about." We ran into this situation a few years ago and then we had some dry summers where the problem kind of went away by itself, but now we're looking at some home pick-ups where there are six or seven bags of clippings sitting at the curb along with the regular garbage, noted Bilgo.

One thing the village residents don't realize is how heavy those bags and containers are, said Bilgo. They should try just once to throw one in the garbage truck. People don't fill them up in their backyard and then carry them to the curb, they run their lawnmowers up to the curb and empty the grasscatcher into the container or bag. People stuff those

plastic leaf bags to the top and they aren't made for that weight. Then we come to pick up trash, grab the bag, the bottom rips, and we end up with a pile of grass on the ground.

Bilgo indicated the problem is costing the village manhours to handle the added clippings and money when they're disposed of at the refuse collection contractor's dump site. "I think the people should be aware of the problem because they created it and they have to pay for it, we can do it but it's going to cost the villagers more for refuse collection."

Those residents in town who can afford to have commercial firms come in to fertilize their lawns should also pay commercial refuse collectors to pick up the extra clippings. It's not fair to those residents who just cut their grass and blow the clippings over their lawns or make compost piles, to pay for the clippings we have to haul away.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt noted the Refuse Collection Ordinance specifies a maximum of two trash containers per pick-up. We've been somewhat lenient on that though, allowing three and sometimes four, since we switched from the twice-a-week to once-a-week pickup. Our ordinance does state that people with more than two containers be required to have a

commercial pick up, noted Bilgo.

The board also discussed allowing residents to haul their clippings to the village's landfill. Bilgo said that had been tried in the past and there had been some problems. Bilgo said he was worried about liability if someone were to get hurt out there, and it still would require an employee to be in attendance.

Trustee Howard Laubenstein said Shawano allows its residents to dump clippings at a brush site, but they cannot leave the containers or bags. They must be emptied and taken back. "There are a lot of people who will not stop picking up their grass," said Trustee Mary Krueger, "if people can't handle the bags, they'll learn to put it in smaller bags so they can handle it."

Schmidt indicated the board might have to look into amending the ordinance to prohibit the pick up of clippings. Other communities have already eliminated clippings pick up including West Bend, noted Schmidt and Bilgo.

Schmidt told the board he would get a letter into the newspapers on the refuse collection ordinance.

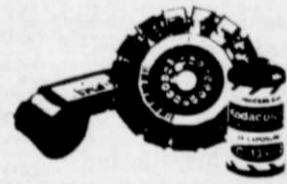
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Melissa Koch Graduates With Highest Honors From Lakeland

A memorial to all Washington County veterans will be dedicated and then will be donated to the City of West Bend on Sunday, May 25. The memorial was erected by the World War Memorials, Inc. and was completed in the Fall of 1985. The ceremony will begin at 1:00 p.m. at the memorial's location at the corner of Main Street and Island Avenue in downtown West Bend.

World War Memorials, Inc. was formed at the end of World War II to raise funds to erect a monument to the county's veterans. Around \$3,000.00 was raised and invested. The Executive Board of the local American Legion Post, Lt. Ray Dickop Post 36, was set up as the Board of Directors of the corporation and has continued to maintain that position. In erecting the memorial it is being dedicated in honor of all Washington County veterans who served our country in time of war and peace. The stone that holds the inscription is a

black granite stone that was imported from Sweden. It is the same stone that was used for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. The memorial was designed with the assistance of Laurance Plaskan, a West Bend designer.

Main speaker for the dedication will be James Chapin, Past State Commander of the Wisconsin American Legion. Chapin, of St. Croix Falls, Wisconsin, served in Vietnam with the U.S. Army in 1968 - 69. While serving in Vietnam he was awarded several awards and ribbons including a Bronze Star with a "V" Device for Valor and a Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster. Chapin has been recognized by the Governor and State Legislature of Wisconsin thru a State Proclamation for his efforts on behalf of veterans. He served on the National Vietnam Veteran's Memorial Committee and was one of 57 veterans nationwide to help coordinate the week long celebration in November, 1983. He is also very involved in the Vietnam Women's Memorial in Wash-

ington, D.C. and the Wisconsin Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Nielsville, Wisconsin.

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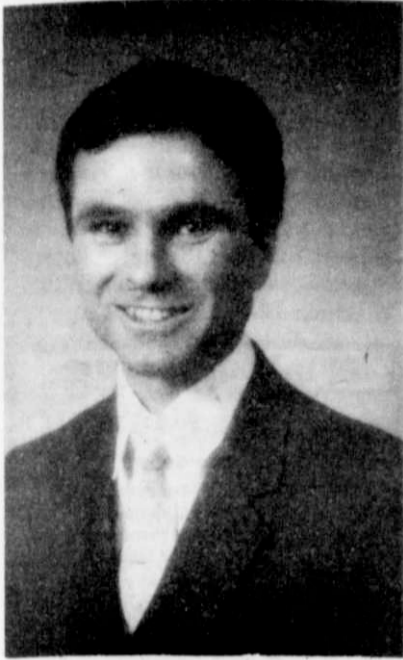

State Patrol Trooper Saved by Bag and Belt in County Accident

"I saw the crash was coming, so I threw up my arm to protect my face. The next thing I felt was the soft silver bag in my face. It happened so fast that I didn't even remember that my cruiser had an airbag," was the way Trooper John Leitner described the accident that demolished his State Patrol cruiser April 7 in Washington County.

"I realized when I climbed out of the car that I only had a few minor cuts and bruises. People have a hard time thinking that airbags really work, but I'm here to tell you they really do the job," he added.

Leitner was pursuing a speeding motorcyclist he had "clocked" on radar at 99 mph on Highway 175 when the Patrol cruiser skidded making a turn onto Crooked Rd. His car hit the road sign and embankment.

According to Col. Howard N. Goetsch, deputy administrator of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's Division of State Patrol, the cruiser was totaled out, but the terms of saving the trooper's life, preventing serious injuries and keeping him on the job, the air-cushion-and-seatbelt combination paid off. Col. Goetsch has been a long-time advocate of both prevention methods.

Using National Safety Council estimates, economic loss of society through accidents is \$220,000 for a death, \$9,300 for each injury, and \$1,190 per accident in property damage.

"We've had a mandatory seatbelt use policy in the State Patrol since 1954," Goetsch said.

The wrecked patrol vehicle was on display May 10-16 at Hill Farms State Office Building and on Madison's Capitol Square May 17 as a part of National Transportation Week observances.

Because of the Patrol's long-standing safety belt policy, in 1984 Wisconsin was one of six state police/highway patrol agencies throughout the country selected by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to participate in an

evaluation of airbag effectiveness. Seventy-five existing cruisers were outfitted with air cushions installed in the steering wheel hubs. To date there have been three deployments in trooper-driven vehicles, Goetsch said. In all instances the airbags performed perfectly.

The airbag is activated only if the vehicle is involved in a crash equivalent to 12 miles an hour or greater into a solid barrier, causing a sensor to send an electrical impulse to an inflator. The split-second inflation and subsequent rapid deflation would not cause loss of control of the vehicle any more than if the driver had sneezed, Goetsch said.

\$42.8 Million in Hwy. Aid Checks Mailed by DOT

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation has mailed checks totaling \$42.8 million to counties, towns, villages and cities throughout the state for the April 1986 quarterly payments of shared transportation aids.

The basic payments included \$9.5 million to 1,267 town governments, \$2.6 million to 392 villages, \$18.1 million to 189 cities and \$12.5 million to Wisconsin's 72 counties, according to Julie A. Davis, DOT aids analysis chief. An additional \$2.1 million in

connecting highway aids was distributed to 119 of those communities to pay the cost of maintaining portions of state trunk highways within urban areas.

Basic aid payments to governmental units in this area include: Washington County \$185,044.24; Town of Addison, \$9,052.96; Town of Barton, \$6,356.10; Town of Erin, \$7,869.97; Town of Farmington, \$8,972.89; Town of Germantown \$673.83; Town of Hartford, \$7,407.66; Town of Jackson, \$7,720.40; Town of Kewaskum, \$5,639.97; Town of Polk, \$9,362.68; Town of West Bend, \$6,326.68; Village of Kewaskum, \$9,048.54; Village of Germantown, \$70,459.27; Village of Jackson, \$3,687.49; Village of Slinger, \$6,967.61; City of Hartford, \$69,044.16;

City of West Bend, \$149,620.16; Total, \$594,201.18.

Connecting highway aids were also allotted to: City of Hartford, \$8,060.50 and City of West Bend, \$16,977.53.

The quarterly transportation aids payments help local units of government pay the cost of building and maintaining county and local roads, streets and bridges.

Over a year's time, approximately 30 percent of state motor vehicle and fuel taxes are returned to local governments in these two forms of transportation aids for local road and bridge expenditures. In fact, coupled with several other forms of state transportation aids, more than 42 percent of state transportation revenues are returned to local governments in Wisconsin.

Driver's License ID's Are Best for Hunting And Fishing Licenses

Wisconsin residents should be aware of the new identification procedure in effect this year for the purchase of resident hunting and fishing licenses, Ralph Christensen, Department of Natural Resources chief warden, reminded sportspersons.

The main type of identification is a valid Wisconsin driver's license while three other forms are acceptable. The other three include a Wisconsin Department of Transportation letter of suspension or revocation, a Wisconsin Department of Transportation identification card for the non-driving public, and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources identification card.

"Too many people are not bringing their Wisconsin driver's licenses with them when they are buying their fishing and hunting licenses," Christensen said. "Instead they are filling out a declaration of residence form, which is to be used in place of a driver's license or Department of Transportation identification card."

People who already have driver's licenses should use them, or if the license is suspended or revoked, they should be using that letter as identification and proof they do have a driver's license, Christensen stated.

The new licensing procedure was designed to eliminate fraudulent license purchases and simplify issuance of licenses by agents. Persons under 18 years are exempted from the new law allowing those 16 to 18 time to obtain a drivers license. These people will buy licenses as they have in previous years.

Wild Turkey Population In Area Nearly Doubled

The wild turkey population in the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest has nearly doubled since the original stocking in January, 1985, according to Dale Katsma, Area Wildlife Manager.

"Based on siting reports from citizens, we believe the number of turkeys are well over 100 from the 48 birds originally stocked," said Katsma. "I am pleased with the growth of the flock. It indicates the Kettle Moraine is prime wild turkey habitat."

There have been 21 separate reports of sitings since January. Although there were 119 birds sited, Katsma believes there might be some duplication in the sitings. Reports indicated the turkeys extend from Greenbush south to West Bend.

"Our gobbling transects resulted in 11 males being identified," noted Katsma. A gobbling transect is a series of points along a predetermined route where wildlife specialists will listen for the male's (also known as a Tom) call or gobble. These surveys are run during the turkey's breeding season.

Katsma emphasized that turkey sitings by citizens is important to wildlife managers in tracking the wild turkey population. Through sitings, managers are able to determine the dispersion of the birds. Siting reports from citizens should include date, location and number of birds.

Domesticated turkeys differ from wild turkeys by their behavior and productivity. "Those differences along with the potential spread of disease, it is important that domesticated birds including game farm birds not be released in the

wild," added Katsma.
